Gospel Reflection with Fr. Tom

Some Alpine valleys are so deep that the rays of the sun do not reach them at all for days or even weeks in the middle of winter. These days can be very depressing ones for the people who live in those valleys. It's almost as if life was one long night. A priest who ministered in one of these valleys tells the following story.

One day in the depths of winter he was in the classroom of the local school chatting with the children, who hadn't seen the sun for nine days. Then all of a sudden a ray of sunshine shone into the classroom. On seeing it the children climbed onto their desks and cheered and shouted for sheer joy. It shows that even though the sun may not touch the skin it can still warm the soul.

This little incident shows how light is a source of great joy. For sick people the night is usually the hardest time of all. How they welcome those first rays of light which signal the end of the night and the dawning of the day.

Matthew compares the arrival of Jesus on the scene to the coming of a great light to a people who had been living in deep darkness. He saw Jesus as fulfilling the great prophecy of Isaiah: 'The people that lived in darkness have seen a great light; on those who dwell in the land and shadow of death a light has dawned.' Jesus described his mission in similar terms when he said: 'I am the light of the world.'

History is littered with examples of teachers who brought darkness into the world through their teachings. The teaching of Jesus was truly a source of light to all who accepted him, and of course still is.

He said, 'Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you.' Thus he rejected the darkness of revenge, and brought the light of forgiveness and reconciliation.

In his parable of the Good Samaritan he rejected the darkness of neglect and indifference, and urged people to care for one another.

In his teaching on authority he rejected the darkness of domination and oppression, and urged those in positions of leadership not to lord it over people, but to serve them in gentleness and humility.

But it was above all through his deeds and encounters with people that his luminous goodness manifested itself. How many people came to him in darkness and went away bathed in light. Thus he brought sinners out of the darkness of sin into the light of God's grace and love. He brought outcasts out of the darkness of rejection into the light of acceptance by the community. He brought the sick and the wounded out of the darkness of pain and illness into the light of well-being.

He brought Zacchaeus out of the darkness of greed and selfishness into the light and joy of sharing.

He brought Martha and Mary out of the darkness of grief into the light of hope and life. He brought the Good Thief out of the darkness of hopelessness into the light of heaven itself. Though Jesus brought God's light into the world not everybody welcomed it. Sadly, some refused his light and opted to remain in darkness. This is why he began his preaching with a call to repentance: 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.' To repent means to acknowledge our darkness, and to open ourselves to the light. For those who accepted him, Jesus truly became the light of their lives, and the light of the world. We still walk in the bright light Jesus brought into our world. By living in it, we become a source of light to others, a lamp for their steps and a light for their paths.
