

Dear Parishioners,

In 2022, you contributed \$786,583 toward our Catholic Faith Appeal (CFA) goal of \$603,000! We can't thank you enough for your generosity and support. The Diocese of Venice's **Office of Marriage and Family Life** strives to equip the Faithful to live out God's plan for marriage and family in all stages of life.

Each year, couples celebrating 25, 30, 35, 40, 45, 50 and 50 plus years in marriage are invited to a Mass where they are honored and recognized. The ceremony is a spiritual celebration of the beauty of a couple's fidelity, sacrifice, and joy in their sacramental commitment to one another.

For engaged, newly wed, and long married couples, marriage conferences, such as Together in Holiness, are available. These conferences aim to inspire couples to grow together in faithful union.

Safe Haven Sunday as well as a variety of workshops are offered to parents seeking assistance in addressing the current culture issues with their children.

The **Office of Marriage and Family Life** encourages couples planning for marriage to utilize a virtues-based, mentor-led program, Witness to Love. This program integrates modern principles of psychology and the virtues to help couples facilitate and talk about their relationship to one another and to God. The newly engaged choose a married couple from the Parish to serve as mentors before and through the early stages of their marriage. This relationship has two purposes: it deepens the understanding of the Church's theology of marriage for the engaged couple and, for the married couple, it reawakens an appreciation for the Church's understanding of marriage in their own lives.

Further, those seeking comfort after suffering the death of loved one are encouraged to attend bereavement seminars.

In addition, a 14-week workshop is available to support individuals experiencing the pain and loneliness of a divorce.
