Safe Environment Training

The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

- **St. John the Evangelist** also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):
- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist

Report any abuse against minors to the Florida Department of Children and Families at 800-962-2873. If Diocesan personnel or volunteers are involved, also notify the Diocesan Victims Assistance Coordinator, Susan Benton, at 941-416-6114.

Catholic Faith Appeal


Dear Parishioners,

In 2022, you contributed \$786,583 toward our Catholic Faith Appeal (CFA) goal of \$603,000! We can't thank you enough for your generosity and support. Gospel Reflection With Fr. Tom

The appeal of this marvelous Emmaus story is that it talks about where we live. It's not about a high-falutin' revelation, or about great saints, or about exotic places and people. The Emmaus story is about ordinary, everyday despair and ordinary, Monday-morning drudgery. It's about bumping into a stranger on the way to work, about sitting down at a table, about sharing a meal. It's about our commonplace lives as we go through the motions of our day, vaguely wondering where God is in all of this, wondering, does my life matter? Will things get better? What's it all about, anyway?

You know the story. A couple of unknown, down-in-the-mouth followers of Jesus are trudging along a dusty road, chatting as they head back home and back to work. Their conversation is full of despair and discouragement, small talk, disappointment: life is a burden and doesn't live up to its promises.

Immediately, the readers of this tale know that these disciples are not just on the road to Emmaus, but they are on the road of life and have just experienced one more hurt, one more letdown. Where is God in all of this? When they meet the stranger, he asks them about their conversation and they recite their woes. Their conversation is ours, the everyday stuff: the kids, the economy, world crisis, spouses, lovers, school, the job, the boss, and so on, the threads of the daily fabric of our lives.

Then the two men add their disappointment. They say, "We were hoping " Hoping for what? For answers to their questions, the same thing we all hope for as we move through life. Where is God? Does my life count? Does anything make any sense? Why should I have this sickness or betrayal or accident or death of a loved one? Why don't I have some sign that God is near? I could put up with anything if I felt the presence of God, I'm sure of that.

The Emmaus story picks up on the lives of every man and every woman and every child. We are all on the road of life: some just beginning their journey, some in the middle, and others near the end. Along the way we gossip, we win a few and lose a few, we enjoy the company of family and friends, and we despair when our enemies seem to win. And that is all part of the conversation on the road to Emmaus. Then the disciples sigh: "We were hoping for a God of justice and compassion to make sense of it all. And suddenly, into this routine conversation, this wondering, comes God, the stranger with the holes in his hands who shares food, shares himself.

And that is the point of the story: God is here. God penetrates our everyday lives, but we don't always know it. Just as our friends going to Emmaus finally recognized the Risen Christ in the simple breaking of the bread they remind us that God is there in our lives, too, although we don't see it most of the time. God loves us and wants to be near us; this story invites us to see that God's love can be found everywhere.

God raised this Jesus; of this we are all witnesses. Exalted at the right hand of God, he received the promise of the Holy Spirit from the Father and poured him forth, as you see and hear."

They stopped, looking downcast. One of them, named Cleopas, said to him in reply, Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know of the things that have taken place there in these days?"

And he replied to them, "What sort of things?"

They said to him, "The things that happened to Jesus the Nazarene, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, how our chief priests and rulers both handed him over to a sentence of death and crucified him. But we were hoping that he would be the one to redeem Israel; and besides all this, it is now the third day since this took place.

Some women from our group, however,

have astounded us: they were at the tomb early in the morning and did not find his body; they came back and reported that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who announced that he was alive. Then some of those with us went to the tomb and found things just as the women had described, but him they did not see."

And he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are! How slow of heart to believe all that the prophets spoke! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?"

Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them what referred to him in all the Scriptures. As they approached the village to which they were going, he gave the impression that he was going on farther. But they urged him, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening and the day is almost over." So he went in to stay with them. And it happened that, while he was with them at table, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them. With that their eyes were opened and they recognized him, but he vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, "Were not ourhearts burning within us while he spoke to us on the way and opened the Scriptures to us?" So they set out at once and returned to Jerusalem where they found gathered together the eleven and those with them who were saying, "The Lord has truly been raised and has appeared to Simon!" Then the two recounted what had taken place on the way and how he was made known to them in the breaking of bread.
