Safe Environment Training

The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist

Catholic Faith Appeal SUPPORTS: Vocations

The **Office of Vocations** works in collaboration with Parishes and Schools across the Diocese to raise awareness of God's calling in the life of each person. The three primary functions of this office include promoting vocations to the Priesthood and Religious life, assessing and evaluating candidates who present themselves for consideration, and overseeing the human, spiritual, academic, and pastoral formation of seminarians.



The Permanent Diaconate Office provides support in the discernment process as well as during formation. Formation entails five years of study, prayer, and human and pastoral preparation. Further guidance is provided to the Deacons in their ministry by recommending resources and organizing events for continuing formation and spiritual growth.

The Religious Sisters within the Diocese of Venice provide support and resources to individuals discerning the call to a religious vocation. Primarily, the Sisters serve in positions that educate, form, and promote a deeper spiritual life. It is often in Parishes and Schools located in financially challenged areas where the Sisters serve as they themselves livea life of poverty. In a unique way, they serve as a human and spiritual resource.





Seminarians also need our spiritual and material support to sustain them in following Our Lord's call. Currently, twelve seminarians are preparing to serve the Faithful in the Diocese of Venice. With yearly expenses of over \$75,000 per seminarian, the CFA provides the financial assistance needed to educate and form our next generation of priests.

I recently asked Sr. Nicole what inspired her to enter her vocation and where she finds inspiration in her role at St. John Neumann HS. Interview by Colleen Donnelly, Operations Manager

"How do you hear God's voice? The Lord has oftentimes spoken to me through the voices of children. Before I entered, I taught fifth grade in the Boston Public Schools. A student made me a card that said, "Ms. Daly, you are like my mom." Spiritual motherhood had been on my heart, but that made me a little more open to ask the question, "Lord, what do you want from me?" It was that Holy Week that He spoke loud and clear. A friend gave me a flyer to visit the Salesian Sisters, and there I met examples of women living out their love for Christ with a vitality and joy that was life giving. Now it's my joy to do the same with the young people at St. John Neumann. As God would have it, however, they are often the ones that bring His love to me!"

Catholic Faith Appeal


Dear Parishioners,

In 2022, you contributed \$786,583 toward our Catholic Faith Appeal (CFA) goal of \$603,000! We can't thank you enough for your generosity and support. 

Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord

Gospel Reflection With Fr. Tom

We sometimes envy the apostles and the first disciples. We are convinced that they had an advantage over all later Christians because they were actually present at the events related in the Gospels. They saw the risen Jesus with their own eyes, and touched him with their hands. Therefore, faith was easy for them. And we are convinced that it would be easy for us too if only we could see Jesus personally, as the apostles did, or if only we could see for ourselves the miracles he performed, as the first disciples did.

Yes, the first disciples had the advantage of seeing Jesus with their own eyes. But did that make faith any easier for them? When they looked at Jesus what did they see? They did not and could not have seen God, for God is not immediately visible and knowable. In Jesus they saw a human being ostensibly like themselves. But to go from there to believe that he was the Son of God required a huge act of faith.

This accounts for the fact that there were many who heard Jesus speak and who saw him act, who did not believe in him. Even the apostles themselves, who had been with him from the beginning, are shown to be slow to believe. Seeing is not necessarily believing.

The shock caused by his passion and death on the cross was so great that the apostles were slow to believe in the news of the Resurrection. When Jesus appeared to them on Easter evening, he rebuked them for their unbelief and hardness of heart, because they had not believed those who saw him after he had risen.

Where does all this leave us? We can't see Jesus the way the apostles saw him. We can't be present in the upper room going over the events of Holy Week when Jesus drops in. We can't put our finger in the wounds of Jesus. We can't look into his face and say, "My Lord, and my God." We must live by faith, not by sight. Yet if we would believe in Jesus we must see him somehow. But just how may people like us see Jesus? What must we do in order to believe?

We are disciples at second hand. For the disciple at second hand, things are harder in some ways, but easier in others. Things are harder because twenty centuries have gone by since Jesus walked the earth. A lot of dust has gathered. The light has dimmed. But on the positive side, the notion that the Son of God walked the earth has become "naturalized" over time, and so in some ways has become easier to believe. But at the end of the day, all disciples are essentially equal - all have to make the leap of faith. We become disciples through faith.

The friends of Jesus saw him and heard him only a few times after that Easter day, but their lives were completely changed. And by sharing their faith our lives will be changed too. We are able to travel in hope because we know that good will triumph over evil, and life will triumph over death, because Jesus is risen.

Peter proceeded to speak and said:

"You know what has happened all over Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached, how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power.

He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses of all that he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree. This man God raised on the third day and granted that he be visible, not to all the people, but to us, the witnesses chosen by God in advance, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead.

To him all the prophets bear witness, that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name."
