



Safe Environment & Volunteers Needed

DIOCESE OF VENICE - SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY

The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist

Report any abuse against minors to the Florida Department of Children and Families at 800-962-2873. If Diocesan personnel or volunteers are involved, also notify the Diocesan Victims Assistance Coordinator, Susan Benton, at 941-416-6114.

He said this indicating the kind of death he would die.



Gospel Reflection with Fr. Tom

Few sights are as beautiful as that of a field filled with young stalks of wheat. To watch them swaying in the wind and dancing in the sun brings joy to the heart. But how strange is the process by which these stalks come into being.

The grain of wheat has to be buried in the cold damp earth as in a tomb. Then it has to die. If it didn't die, no new life would come forth. But when it dies, from the grave of the old grain, a shoot of new wheat miraculously springs forth. It's an amazing paradox--life coming from death.

Just as the grain of wheat has to die in order to bear fruit, so we must die to self if we are to live fully and fruitfully, and realize our full potential as human beings and children of God.

Death is part of life. We are born to die, to die that we may live more fully; born to die a little each day to selfishness, to pretense, and to sin. Every time we pass from one stage of life to another, something in us dies and something new is born. We taste death in moments of loneliness, rejection, sorrow, disappointment, and failure. We are dying before our time when we live in bitterness, in hatred, and in isolation. Each day we are creating our own death by the way we live.

When Jesus says, 'Anyone who loves his life loses it; anyone who hates his life in this world will keep it,' he is not telling us to hate ourselves or our lives. We have to learn to love ourselves. God wants us to be merciful with ourselves. Nobody can love us if we do not love ourselves. Unless we love ourselves we won't be able to love anyone else. Of course, we have to distinguish between true love of self and selfishness. To forget self, to transcend self - that is what it means to lose oneself, to deny self, to die to self. It is when we forget ourselves that we are most free and most happy. It is in getting out of ourselves, in dedicating ourselves to causes beyond ourselves, that we grow and bear fruit. We may live longer if we take things easy. We will exist longer. But will we live longer?

What a poor world it would be if everyone put their own personal safety, security, and selfish advancement first and last - if no one was prepared to go beyond themselves. It is always because people have been prepared to die to self-interest that the most precious things humanity possesses have been born.

Jesus gave us an example. He gave his life in the service of his heavenly Father and of us. But he didn't find it easy. When the actual moment of death arrived, he was filled with fear. Jesus' life wasn't taken from him. He gave it - gave it out of love of God and of us. To love is to accept that one might die another kind of death, before one dies one's own. The way of love is the way of the cross, but the way of the cross leads to the resurrection.

Those who die to self will find the moment of actual death easy. The hour of death will become an hour of glory. It is by dying that we are born to eternal life.

What is Divine Mercy Sunday?

Divine Mercy Sunday is celebrated on the second Sunday of Easter. It is based upon the private revelations given to *Saint Faustina Kowalska*, in which Christ recommended a particular devotion to His Divine Mercy.

Who is St. Faustina?

St. Maria Faustina Kowalska of the Blessed Sacrament was born in Poland on Aug. 25, 1905. She died on Oct. 5, 1938, after being chosen by Jesus to become the apostle of the Divine Mercy. She was canonized by Pope John Paul II on April 30, 2000, as the first saint of the new millennium. Her feast day is Oct. 5.

Is Divine Mercy Sunday approved by the church? Yes, Divine Mercy Sunday is officially approved the Church. A decree by the Vatican's Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, promulgated it on May 5, 2000.

St. Faustina's Diary contains many passages in which Our Lord Jesus is quoted as requesting that a <u>"Feast of Mercy"</u> be officially established in the Church. In the diary Jesus declared:

"This Feast emerged from the very depths of my mercy, and it is confirmed in the vast depths of My tender mercies ... It is My desire that the Feast of Mercy be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion on that day shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment due".

What is the Divine Mercy Chaplet?

A chaplet is a form of prayer, the usual five-decade Rosary is also considered a chaplet, other chaplets often have fewer beads and decades than a traditional rosary and use a different set of prayers. A chaplet can be used as a novena or to highlight special days and special seasons. Its purpose is to initiate a devotion. The Chaplet of the Divine Mercy is a set of prayers that includes the use of the traditional five-decade Rosary with specific prayers.

What is the Image of the Divine Mercy?

Jesus described to St. Faustina how his divine mercy image should look. Faustina wrote that on the night of Sunday, Feb. 22, 1931, while she was in her cell in Plock, Poland, Jesus appeared wearing a white garment with red and pale rays emanating from his heart. According to her diary, Jesus told her:

"paint an image according to the pattern you see, with the signature: 'Jesus, I trust in You' [in Polish: "Jezu, ufam Tobie"]. I desire that this image be venerated, first in your chapel, and then throughout the world. I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish."

On April 7th, 2024, We invite you to the Recitation of the Chaplet of the Divine Mercy at 2:30 pm then Holy Mass, and the Veneration of both the Divine Mercy Image and a First Class Relic of Saint Faustina.

Each episode will last about one hour. Deacon John Sebastian will be your moderator and host. He will briefly introduce each episode and answer any questions you may have about the content.



Attentiveness to our Eucharistic Ministry to encourage ongoing learning and to engage more volunteers for Eucharistic Ministers who bring Christ to all in our Parish, both at Mass and to those who are not able to attend Mass.






