Fr. Tom's Gospel Reflection

Among all of our readings today, our Gospel seems to dominate; so much so, that we could fail to notice or pay attention to the words of our first reading from the prophet Isaiah. In many ways this short passage, taken from the Song of the Suffering Servant, sets the scene for the second reading and the Gospel. Taken together, all of our Scripture passages point to one common question: Does suffering have meaning?

Surrounded by the impact of suffering, we often seek to try to explain it or at least understand it, even when no such explanation is possible. As people of faith, suffering seems to go against our most basic image of a loving and caring God, and we find ourselves wondering: How could a loving God let this happen? Throughout history, humanity has struggled with this question and has come up with a variety of answers, some of which are helpful, others simply not so.

For some, suffering is simply the punishment for sin; for others, it is a moment of trial, a test to measure our heroic virtue and faithfulness to God. Others see it as a moment of grace whereby God strengthens our inner beings. Still others are happy to see it as a great mystery, beyond their comprehension. However we see it, we have to admit that in moments of personal suffering, these explanations may not bring comfort or justification.

As people of faith within the Roman Catholic tradition we oftentimes seek meaning through the lens of Sacred Scripture. Listen again to the words of Isaiah—The Lord was pleased to crush him in infirmity; and in the words of the Letter to the Hebrews—[Christ] has been tested in every way, let us confidently approach the throne of grace to receive mercy and to find grace for timely help. At first glance we might not find much solace here, but then when we look through the eyes of the suffering of Jesus, we see that these words do not seek to explain suffering but to help us realize that even in moments of pain and suffering good can emerge. The Suffering Servant does not suffer in vain but will justify many. Justification here has more than its legal sense of being acquitted and being restored to right relationship with God. Because of this justification, we can now confidently approach the very throne of God.

This theme of finding value in suffering can also be found in our gospel passage. The disciples are basking in the privilege and status of being chosen followers of Jesus, and so they seek the ultimate glory of special seats in the Kingdom. What they are surprised to hear is that leadership and authority are not about glory or special status but service and self-giving. Here, in a radical way, Jesus reverses the worldwide view of power. Here suffering and service, symbolized in the cup of suffering, become the hallmark of Christian discipleship.

So, if leadership and discipleship are given new meanings, is it too much to ask if suffering also has another meaning in the context of our relationship with Christ? Yes, it remains a reality in our lives and no matter how innocent or blameless we may feel, it is an unwelcome visitor at all times. But in Christ we can begin to use it for a greater purpose, to learn from it and to join our sufferings with his for the justification of others. No moment of human suffering goes unnoticed by God. Indeed, that we suffer speaks of our human condition; how we suffer speaks of our faith in Christ. What gives us hope is that in Christ's suffering, he triumphed over sin and death in the Resurrection. Our hope is that we, too, will one day share in that victory with him in heaven.



DIOCESE OF VENICE SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY

The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist

Report any abuse against minors to the Florida Department of Children and Families at 800-962-2873. If Diocesan personnel or volunteers are involved, also notify the Diocesan Victims Assistance Coordinator, Susan Benton, at 941-416-6114.





FLORIDA'S PRO-ABORTION AMENDMENT EXPLAINED Why Floridians Should Vote NO on Amendment 4

Titled "Amendment to Limit Government Interference with Abortion," Amendment 4 would enshrine **UNREGULATED ABORTION** in our state constitution, making Florida one of the **MOST PRO-ABORTION** states in the nation. The amendment language is **MISLEADING**, and its proposed outcomes are **DANGEROUS**.

WHAT IT SAYS

No law shall prohibit, penalize, delay, or restrict

before viability

abortion

or when necessary to protect the patient's health,

as determined by the patient's healthcare provider.

This amendment does not change the Legislature's constitutional authority to require notification to a parent or guardian before a minor has an abortion.

WHAT IT DOES

PUTS WOMEN AT RISK

Amendment 4 would jeopardize existing laws and prohibit new ones that voters on both sides of the abortion issue support, including health and safety laws that protect women.

ALLOWS SECOND AND THIRD TRIMESTER ABORTIONS

Though not defined in the amendment, "viability" is defined in Florida law as the stage of development when the life of a fetus is sustainable outside the womb (Ch. 390.011(15)), generally accepted to be 22-24 weeks of pregnancy, or about 6 months.

CREATES A BROAD "HEALTH" LOOPHOLE

"Patient's health" is not defined in the amendment, allowing post-viability, extremely late-term abortions for treatable, temporary health concerns. Emotional health would justify an abortion when a child could survive outside the womb.

WEAKENS MEDICAL DOCTOR REQUIREMENT

"Healthcare providers" – not just physicians – could determine if an abortion is "necessary" to protect the mother's "health." Even some employees of abortion clinics, such as nurses and counselors, could approve late-term abortions.

ELIMINATES PARENTAL CONSENT

While preserving parental notification in our state constitution (Article X, Section 22), the amendment would invalidate the current law that requires parental consent for a minor to have an abortion (Ch. 390.01114(5)), making abortion the only medical decision for which parents have no say.
