It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he should not see death before he had seen the Christ of the Lord. He came in the Spirit into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to perform the custom of the law in regard to him, he took him into his arms and blessed God, saying:

"Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in the sight of all the peoples: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel."

The child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about him; and Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted-and you yourself a sword will pierce-so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed."

There was also a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was advanced in years, having lived seven years with her husband after her marriage, and then as a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple, but worshiped night and day with fasting and prayer. And coming forward at that very time, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem. When they had fulfilled all the prescriptions of the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.

Catholicism and the Real Presence by David J Keys, PhD[1]

New Testament Prophecy and the Eucharist

Last week I touched upon the topic of *Old Testament Prophecy and the Eucharist. and the Old Testament.* This week we will be discussing *New Testament Prophecy and the Eucharist.* My guess is that you had already guessed that. But really is there a prophecy about the Eucharist in the New Testament? I thought prophecy only pointed towards the New Testament. Wrong!!! Let's see how Jesus our Priest, PROPHET, and King prophesied the Eucharist.

The First Miracle of Transubstantiation— The Wedding Feast of Cana

Shortly after Jesus baptism in the Jordan river by John the Baptist, Jesus and His mother were invited to a wedding in Cana. Jesus brought along with His newfound disciples. Now I don't believe that bringing the disciples to the wedding caused the wedding couple to run out of wine, but, nonetheless, they did run out of wine. Mary sensing the possible embarrassment to the couple, simply mentions to Jesus, "They have no wine." Jesus being more perceptive than I, knew right away that His mother wanted Him to do something about it. He said to her "What have you to do with me? My hour has not yet come." He might have said. "Mom, I know what you want, but the time is not right for me to begin a public ministry." Despite that, Mary told the servants to "Do whatever He tells you to do." Being a good son, Jesus fulfilled His mother's wishes, and ordered the servants to fill the purification jars with water. The water miraculously turned into wine, that is, the substance of water was transformed into the substance of the finest wine.

Later, in His ministry at the Last Supper, Jesus would tell His apostles that the bread they will eat and the wine they will drink has become His very body and blood. In that case, unlike the wine at Cana which exhibited the taste, color, and aroma of wine, the body and blood of the Last Supper would retain the outward appearance of bread and wine. This is an example of Prophecy by Similarity and shows that Jesus has the power to turn anything into anything else that he wishes.

The Multiplication of the Loaves and Fishes

After Cana, Jesus' ministry began to grow and grow. Soon he had thousands of people listening to His Teachings. At one point there were 5000 men plus women and children listening to Jesus' teaching. Jesus realized that the people following Him must be getting hungry and said to Phillip, "Where can we buy enough food for them to eat?" Phillip probably thought, "Are you kidding?", but knew better than to say that. Finally, a boy stepped forward and offered 5 barley loaves of bread and a few fish. Jesus told the people to gather themselves in small groups. Jesus then holding the loaves and the fishes in His hands raised His hands up to heaven, gave thanks to God, then told the apostles to pass the food around. The apostles must have been flabbergasted at such a request; but, remembering the wedding feast of Cana and all the miracles he had already performed, they did as Mary had told the servants at Cana to do and

did whatever He told them to do. When all had eaten, they collected 12 baskets of food leftover. While the apostles did not fully understand what had just happened, they did understand that Jesus was not constrained by natural laws and that Jesus desired to feed His people. Evidently, there was no limit as to the number of people Jesus can feed.

At the Last Supper, Jesus would hold the bread and wine, give thanks to God, and feed the Apostles what He said was His flesh and blood. This was definitely another Prophecy by Similarity.

John 6

The next day after the miracle of the loaves and fishes just discussed, Jesus went to Capernaum and the people followed. There he chastised them saying, "Amen, Amen, I say to you, you are looking for me not because you saw signs but because you ate the loaves and were filled. Do not work for food that perishes but for food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you." The Son of Man, who is Jesus, evidently will give them a food far greater than bread. He then stated, "I AM the bread of life" and further clarified that this bread is His flesh which they are to eat. Many Christians consider this statement to be symbolic, but this statement is far different in structure. All other "I AM" statements are structured as "I AM the (metaphor); explanation. For example, "I am the gate (metaphor); whoever enters through me will be saved" (explanation). In the bread of life "I AM" statement, he stated that the bread is His very flesh. IF "flesh" was only a metaphor then He is clarifying the "I AM the bread" metaphor with a second "flesh" metaphor, not with an explanation. To demonstrate that His "flesh" was not symbolic, Jesus states five more times that they must "eat His flesh and drink His blood".

Those listening to Him did not think that He was speaking metaphorically, for many of them no longer followed Him after those statements. It is only at the Last Supper where we will discover how Jesus is going to miraculously give the apostles (and us) His flesh to eat. This is a Direct Prophecy, clearly spelled out, but not understood. Next week we will discuss the events of the Last Supper.

Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope



The 2025 Jubilee Year, as established by Pope Francis, has begun. Five locations in the Diocese of Venice have been designated as Jubilee pilgrimage sites by Bishop Frank J. Dewane. These pilgrimage sites are Epiphany Cathedral in Venice, St. John XXIII Parish in Fort Myers, St. John the Evangelist Parish in Naples, St. Paul Parish in Arcadia, and Our Lady of Perpetual Health Retreat & Spirituality Center in Venice.

These five locations, located in each of the geographical regions (Deaneries) of the Diocese, were selected for the convenience of the faithful, so that they may take advantage of the grace of the Jubilee Year. The public schedule for each of the Diocese of Venice pilgrimage sites will be announced in the coming weeks and shared on the Diocese's website and on social media, with more events and activities to be announced.

A series of Jubilee Adoration Nights at various Parishes will be the first in a series of opportunities within the Diocese of Venice to participate in the Jubilee Year. Each Jubilee Adoration Night will take place from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. on the following dates and locations: Thursday, Jan. 16, St. Agnes Parish, 7775 Vanderbilt Beach Road, Naples; Friday, January 31, St. Andrew Parish, 2628 Del Prado Blvd., Cape Coral; Saturday, March 22, St. Patrick Parish, 7900 Bee Ridge Road, Sarasota; and Friday, May 2, St. Paul Parish, 1330 E. Oak. St., Arcadia.

What is the Jubilee?

The Jubilee is a special year of grace and spiritual renewal, deeply rooted in the Bible (Leviticus 25:8-13). In the Old Testament, every 50th year was marked as a time of reconciliation with God, with others, and with creation, featuring the forgiveness of debts, restoration of property, and rest for the land. Jesus proclaimed this Jubilee mission at the start of his ministry:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty in captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord." (Luke 4:18-19).

His words and actions give the Jubilee its profound meaning of liberation and transformation.

Since the first Jubilee in 1300, called by Pope Boniface VIII, this Holy Year has been a time for personal and communal renewal. In 2025, under the theme "**Pilgrims of Hope**," the universal Church invites us to deepen our faith, walk together in communion, and experience the transformative mercy of God.

As the Diocese of Venice, we embrace this call to live the Jubilee as a time of grace, encouraging our young people to encounter Christ and be witnesses of hope in the world.



DIOCESE OF VENICE SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY

The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist
