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

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# Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope



The 2025 Jubilee Year, as established by Pope Francis, has begun. Five locations in the Diocese of Venice have been designated as Jubilee pilgrimage sites by Bishop Frank J. Dewane. These pilgrimage sites are Epiphany Cathedral in Venice, St. John XXIII Parish in Fort Myers, St. John the Evangelist Parish in Naples, St. Paul Parish in Arcadia, and Our Lady of Perpetual Health Retreat & Spirituality Center in Venice. These five locations, located in each of the geographical regions (Deaneries) of the Diocese, were selected for the convenience of the faithful, so that they may take advantage of the grace of the Jubilee Year. The public schedule for each of the Diocese of Venice pilgrimage sites will be announced in

the coming weeks and shared on the Diocese's website and on social media, with more events and activities to be announced.

A series of Jubilee Adoration Nights at various Parishes will be the first in a series of opportunities within the Diocese of Venice to participate in the Jubilee Year. Each Jubilee Adoration Night will take place from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. on the following dates and locations: Thursday, Jan. 16, St. Agnes Parish, 7775 Vanderbilt Beach Road, Naples; Friday, January 31, St. Andrew Parish, 2628 Del Prado Blvd., Cape Coral; Saturday, March 22, St. Patrick Parish, 7900 Bee Ridge Road, Sarasota; and Friday, May 2, St. Paul Parish, 1330 E. Oak. St., Arcadia.

# Catholicism and the Real Presence by David J Keys, PhD[1]

#### Part 2

Last week I left us with the question, "Is it rational to believe that the consecrated Host could be the body, blood, soul, and divinity of Jesus Christ?" After all, the consecrated Host looks like bread, tastes like bread, smells like bread. The Precious Blood we receive looks like wine, tastes like wine, smells like wine. How could rational people believe this? Yet the primary workforce of the Church, that is the priests, are probably the most educated of all workforces. Each priest has at least a Master's or a PhD, or even multiple such degrees. Still, they believe that the Eucharist is more than what our senses tells us. What gives? It would be so much easier to just say the Eucharist is symbolic of Christ.

But there has been 2000 years of belief in the Real Presence. Thousands and thousands of books, articles, sermons, etc. have professed this belief. Can we just neglect all that has gone before, as if we are intellectually superior to those individuals. What are we missing that they understood? The truth is that we are missing a lot. The modern world knows so much about physicality that they think that reality means physicality. For many, spirituality is not really REAL. Our sense of reality has been skewed by science. Don't get me wrong. I love science and have a PhD in Physics that demonstrates that, but I have come to understand that the most important things in life are non-physical. Atoms, quarks, photons, bosons, etc. are wonderful and are necessary parts for our physical existence, but without the non-physical side of reality—the spiritual side, there is no meaning to life. Certainly truth, justice, love, beauty, creativity, knowledge, wisdom, and on and on, are not physical, but are very real. The absence of such realities would lead us onto the "darkness".

So, let's be honest with ourselves. A gold wedding ring looks like a metal, could pass electrical current like a metal, melts at 1064 °C, yet takes on a reality far different from and far surpassing that of a metal as measured by science. Simply put, the reality of a wedding ring transcends that of a piece of metal. Physicality is but a narrow part of Reality. To understand the Eucharist, we must expand our mind beyond just physicality. Religion helps us to see the reality that science itself cannot.

Because of the differing viewpoints of reality as only physical versus including non-physical, Science and Religion will sometimes present two different Truth sets that seem at first to contradict each other. As has been often said, "Truth cannot contradict Truth". Logic tells us either one must be true and the other side false, both are false, half-truths are being presented, or, as commonly happens, the two sides are not addressing the same issue. This latter point is certainly true of Science and Religion. They often appear to be at odds because they ask different questions. Science deals primarily with the WHAT and the HOW. Religion deals primarily with the WHO and the WHY. The Bible doesn't teach science, although it may have science within it. Science on the other hand has no answer at all for the WHO and the WHY things are as they are.

# Catholicism and the Real Presence by David J Keys, PhD[1]

So at this point, let's just acknowledge that there is more to reality than physicality and begin to try to understand why the Church understands and proclaims that reality of the Eucharist is the Real Presence, which, in this case (as with all miracles) overrides what our senses and science tells us has occurred. Our goal is to of come to know what the Church says is true. As St Augustine said, "Believe so that you may understand!" If you limit yourself to physicality, you will never more fully understand Reality or spirituality.

To know what the Church is saying is true, we must first understandstand how we know anything. Knowledge is, of course, non-physical. Knowledge is built upon TRUST which is another non-physical reality. Think about it. Everything you know is built upon trust, whether that be trust in our senses, our experience, or the experiences of others. Your knowledge is based on what your parents /teachers/books/the internet (!!!!) etc. have conveyed to you, and thus, your knowledge may be right, wrong, or in between. For instance, Science currently tells us that the universe is 13.8 billion years old. Do you believe that? I can tell you that you have no absolute reason to believe that. You believe because you trust the physicists who tell us that. The relatively few physicists who have actually measured 13.8 billion years trust the work that has gone on before them. They trust that the equipment that they are using was calibrated by someone trustworthy based on trustworthy standards. The more trustworthy information you receive, the more likely you are to "know". Still the information may or may not be true. The more sources of trustworthy information agree, the more likely they are to be true. Trustworthy information/evidence is the key to knowledge. But what if the information given to you is more than true? What if it is prophetically True—a trustworthy prophecy that really happens? The Jews saw many miracles of Jesus but it was Jesus fulfillment of prophecy that led to a belief in Him as Messiah. Fullilled prophecy is powerful.

So now let's begin to see what the Church has to say about the Eucharist. Is it trustworthy? Does it fulfill prophecy? Is it consistent? Does it contradict past teaching? Next week we will continue our journey and will begin to look at what the Church teaches the Old Testament has to say about the Eucharist.

# DIOCESE OF VENICE SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY

The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist
