





Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope



The 2025 Jubilee Year, as established by Pope Francis, has begun. Five locations in the Diocese of Venice have been designated as Jubilee pilgrimage sites by Bishop Frank J. Dewane. These pilgrimage sites are Epiphany Cathedral in Venice, St. John XXIII Parish in Fort Myers, St. John the Evangelist Parish in Naples, St. Paul Parish in Arcadia, and Our Lady of Perpetual Health Retreat & Spirituality Center in Venice. These five locations, located in each of the geographical

regions (Deaneries) of the Diocese, were selected for the convenience of the faithful, so that they may take advantage of the grace of the Jubilee Year. The public schedule for each of the Diocese of Venice pilgrimage sites will be announced in the coming weeks and shared on the Diocese's website and on social media, with more events and activities to be announced.

Jubilee 2025 Bull of Indiction: "Spes Non Confundit"

On Thursday, May 9, 2024, the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, Pope Francis officially proclaimed the Ordinary Jubilee of 2025 with the public reading and delivery of Spes Non Confundit, the Bull of Indicition for the Jubilee Holy Year 2025, in Saint Peter's Basilica at the Vatican. This papal document lays out the foundation for the 2025 Jubilee and its theme, "Pilgrims of Hope." Included below is paragraph 1 from this document.


A word of hope

2. "Since we are justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand; and we boast in our hope of sharing in the glory of God... Hope does not disappoint, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us" (Rom 5:1-2.5). In this passage, Saint Paul gives us much to reflect upon. We know that the Letter to the Romans marked a decisive turning point in his work of evangelization. Until then, he had carried out his activity in the eastern part of the Empire, but now he turns to Rome and all that Rome meant in the eyes of the world. Before him lay a great challenge, which he took up for the sake of preaching the Gospel, which knows no barriers or confines. The Church of Rome was not founded by Paul, yet he felt impelled to hasten there in order to bring to everyone the Gospel of Jesus Christ, crucified and risen from the dead, a message of hope that fulfils the ancient promises, leads to glory and, grounded in love, does not disappoint.

FAQs About the Jubilee

What are the Holy Doors?

The Holy Door is perhaps the most powerful sign of the Jubilee, since the ultimate aim of the pilgrim is to pass through it. The opening of the door by the Pope constitutes the official beginning of the Holy Year. Originally, there was only one door, at the Basilica of St. John Lateran, which is the cathedral of the Bishop of Rome. Later, to allow as many pilgrims as possible to take part in the Jubilee experience, the other Roman Basilicas also opened their own Holy Doors. These Holy Doors, all located in Rome, are the only Holy Doors of the Jubilee. In crossing the threshold of the Holy Door, the pilgrim is reminded of the passage from chapter 10 of St John's gospel: "I am the door. If anyone enters by me, he will be saved and will go in and out and find pasture." Passing through the Holy Door expresses the decision to follow and be guided by Jesus, who is the Good Shepherd.



Catholicism and the Real Presence by David J Keys, PhD[1]

Part 6

To more fully understand an event, it is a good idea to review the writings of all those who have been there plus even those who may not have been there but knew those who were. This is true of historical events of the Vietnam War, the American Civil War, Attila the Hun, etc. and it's also true of Jesus and the Institution of the Eucharist.

Thus, while we examine the Gospels to see what they say about the Eucharist, we also look to the Apostle Paul who was not even there on Holy Thursday. Let's look at what he says about it. Paul writes in 1st Corinthians 11:23-26, "For I received from the Lord while I handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night he was betrayed took a loaf of bread and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said this is my body for you. Do this in remembrance of me. In the same way he took the cup also, after supper saying this cup is the new covenant in my blood do this as often as you drink of it in remembrance of me." The first thing to note is that these words repeat actual words said at the Last Supper. Jesus wanted Paul to remember these specific words. Why? Apparently, because these words are ritual words to be said as part of a liturgy. At the Last Supper, Jesus had set up a liturgy which the apostles were to follow. We now call that liturgy, the Mass. The Apostles called it "the breaking of the bread". The Last Supper was not a one-time event strictly for the Apostles.

Now there are many other examples of "the breaking of the bread" in New Testament Scripture. Jesus himself on the night of His Resurrection while walking with two disciples along the road to Emmaus discussed the Scripture and broke bread. This same format has been a part of the Catholic Mass since the first century. Paul also gives us evidence that the "Mass" was common practice —"the cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ?" (1 Cor 10:16-17). Luke the Evangelist agrees. He writes in Acts 2:42 "they devoted themselves to the teaching of the apostles and to the communal life, the breaking of the bread and to the prayers."

So, yes, they "broke bread" regularly, but did the early Church believe the Eucharist is the flesh of Jesus? Let's read the writings of St. Ignatius of Antioch (a disciple of the Apostle John) from his Letter to the Romans 7:3, about 110 AD—" I desire the bread of God, which is the flesh of Jesus Christ, who was the seed of David; and for drink I desire his blood." And in a letter to the Smyrnaeans (Smyrneans 6:2, about 110 AD), speaking about non-believers Ignatius says—'They abstain from the Eucharist and from prayer because they do not confess that the Eucharist is the flesh of our savior Jesus Christ." Another Early Church Father, Justin Martyr, wrote around 151 AD—" the food which has been made into the Eucharist by the eucharistic prayer set down by him (a priest) ... is both the flesh and blood of that incarnated Jesus" (First Apology 66).

There are many other well-known Early Church Fathers, such as Irenaeus, Saint John Chrysostom, Saint Ambrose, Clement of Alexandria, Tertulian, Hippolytus, Origin of Carthage, etc. who repeated similar statements. But those are individuals! Did the Church itself say so? Yes, many times. Here is but one example from the Council of Ephesus (Letter of Cyril to Nestorius 431 AD). "We offer the unbloody sacrifice in the churches,... and are sanctified, having received his holy flesh and the precious blood of Christ the Savior of us all."

Catholicism and the Real Presence by David J Keys, PhD[1]


Do non-Catholic Christians agree that the Early Church believed in the Real Presence? The answer is Yes. However, apparently, they may agree that the Early Church taught this, but they just believe the Early Church was sadly mistaken. For instance, in the 20th century, J.N.D. Kelly from Oxford University wrote:

"Eucharistic teaching, it should be understood at the outset, was in general unquestioningly realist, i.e., the consecrated bread and wine were taken to be, and were treated and designated as, the Savior's body and blood...The bread and wine, moreover, are offered "for a memorial (eis anamnasin) of the passion," a phrase which in view of his identification of them with the Lord's body and blood implies much more than an act of purely spiritual recollection."

So, Kelly admits that the Early Church believed it was the Real Presence and that it is not just spiritual, but I guess he feels he just knows more than they did.

In the last few weeks we have seen that the typologies of the Old Testament became real and more glorious. These typologies are trustworthy prophecies which were fulfilled. The New Testament has also prepared us for the Real Presence through the miracles at Cana, the feeding of the 5000, and John 6. We have seen that at the Last Supper Jesus followed through with His promise to give us His flesh and blood. Finally, the Real Presence has been an uninterrupted teaching of the Church (thousands and thousands of books could be referenced). But many still will not believe. They need physical evidence, and that I will present in the final 2 segments on Eucharistic miracles.




Celebrating VEARS

DIOCESE OF VENICE SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY

The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist







The Naples Council caseworkers met with and helped 247 people, reaching over 1,302 individuals and families (+50% Increase over November).

423 aids and services were granted. That totaled \$125,461 in assistance.

Ponder, today, the image of The Divine Mercy. Ponder, especially, the fact that no image will even come close to expressing the full depth of love pouring forth from the Heart of our Savior. Grow in a desire for that Mercy as you ponder this sacred image.

Lord, You have poured out upon the world Your infinite Mercy coming forth from Your divine Heart. May I bask in that Mercy now and always. Jesus, I trust in You.






