
### Luke 6:27-38

### Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope



The 2025 Jubilee Year, as established by Pope Francis, has begun. Five locations in the Diocese of Venice have been designated as Jubilee pilgrimage sites by Bishop Frank J. Dewane. These pilgrimage sites are Epiphany Cathedral in Venice, St. John XXIII Parish in Fort Myers, St. John the Evangelist Parish in Naples, St. Paul Parish in Arcadia, and Our Lady of Perpetual Health Retreat & Spirituality Center in Venice. These five locations, located in each of the geographical

regions (Deaneries) of the Diocese, were selected for the convenience of the faithful, so that they may take advantage of the grace of the Jubilee Year. The public schedule for each of the Diocese of Venice pilgrimage sites will be announced in the coming weeks and shared on the Diocese's website and on social media, with more events and activities to be announced.

### **FAQs About the Jubilee**

#### What is the Jubilee Indulgence?

The Jubilee Indulgence is a concrete manifestation of God's mercy and is a gift of grace specific to the Holy Year. An indulgence is a grace granted by the Catholic Church through the merits of Jesus Christ to remove the temporal punishment due to sin. It is not a forgiveness of sin but the remission of punishment for sins already forgiven. It may apply either to oneself or to souls already in purgatory.

This treasury of grace entered human history in the witness of Jesus and the saints, and by living in communion with them our hope for our own forgiveness is strengthened and becomes a certainty.

The Jubilee indulgence allows us to free our hearts from the weight of sin because the reparation due for our sins is given freely and abundantly.



#### How do I gain an Indulgence?

#### Pilgrimage

The Apostolic Penitentiary's Decree on the Granting of the Indulgence during the Ordinary Jubilee Year 2025 indicates that the Faithful may obtain the Jubilee Indulgence if they undertake a pious pilgrimage to a Jubilee Site, including those designated by their Bishop. The person seeking the plenary indulgence must participate in Holy Mass or any of the following: celebration of the Word of God, the Liturgy of the Hours, the Via Crucis, the Marian Rosary, or a penitential celebration, which ends with individual confession.

#### Pious Visit to Sacred Places

Likewise, the faithful can obtain the Jubilee Indulgence if, individually or in a group, they devoutly visit any Jubilee site and there, for a suitable period of time, engage in Eucharistic adoration and meditation, concluding with the Our Father, the Profession of Faith in any legitimate form, and invocations to Mary, the Mother of God, so that in this Holy Year everyone "will come to know the closeness of Mary, the most affectionate of mothers, who never abandons her children" (Spes non confundit, 24).

#### Additional Requirements

Further requirements to obtain an indulgence are that the person be detached from sin and repentant, receive the Sacrament of Penance and Holy Communion, and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father. These conditions may be met specifically at a Jubilee Site but should be done on the same day or within a few days of the indulgenced act.

### Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope

#### What is the Importance of Penance in a Jubilee Year

The Jubilee Indulgence may also be obtained through initiatives that put into practice the spirit of Penance which is, in a sense, the soul of the Jubilee.

The Diocese of Venice will offer additional, Diocesan-wide times for the Sacrament of Reconciliation during Lent. Confession will be offered throughout the Diocese on Friday, April 11 from 4:00 pm to 8:00 pm, and on Saturday, April 12 from 9:00 am until noon.

Additional examples of putting into practice the spirit of penance include carrying out more frequent works of charity and mercy. An Indulgence may be obtained, for example, by means of a visit, for an appropriate amount of time, to our brothers and sisters who are in need or in difficulty, in a sense making a pilgrimage to Christ present in them. More examples include:

- Abstaining at least one day a week from futile distraction, such as social media or television
- By donating a proportionate sum of money to the poor
- By supporting works of a religious or social nature, especially in defense and protection of life in all its phases
- Supporting the quality of life of young people in difficulty, the needy or lonely elderly people
- · Dedicating a reasonable portion of free time to volunteer activities that are of service to the community

### **Jubilee 2025 Bull of Indiction: "Spes Non Confundit"**

On Thursday, May 9, 2024, the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, Pope Francis officially proclaimed the Ordinary Jubilee of 2025 with the public reading and delivery of Spes Non Confundit, the Bull of Indicition for the Jubilee Holy Year 2025, in Saint Peter's Basilica at the Vatican. This papal document lays out the foundation for the 2025 Jubilee and its theme, "Pilgrims of Hope." Included below is paragraph 3 from this document.

#### A word of hope

3. Hope is born of love and based on the love springing from the pierced heart of Jesus upon the cross: "For if while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, much more surely, having been reconciled, will we be saved by his life" (Rom 5:19). That life becomes manifest in our own life of faith, which begins with Baptism, develops in openness to God's grace and is enlivened by a hope constantly renewed and confirmed by the working of the Holy Spirit.

By his perennial presence in the life of the pilgrim Church, the Holy Spirit illumines all believers with the light of hope. He keeps that light burning, like an ever-burning lamp, to sustain and invigorate our lives. Christian hope does not deceive or disappoint because it is grounded in the certainty that nothing and no one may ever separate us from God's love: "Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril or the sword? No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom 8:35.37-39). Here we see the reason why this hope perseveres in the midst of trials: founded on faith and nurtured by charity, it enables us to press forward in life. As Saint Augustine observes: "Whatever our state of life, we cannot live without these three dispositions of the soul, namely, to believe, to hope and to love".

#### Part 7

In Part 2 of this series, I addressed the issue whether it was completely irrational to believe that the Bread and wine truly become the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ. I then addressed the fact that not all reality is physical and that the most important things in life are not physical. There are things in life which happen but defy physicality. We call these events MIRACLES. However, as we all know, many just deny their existence, and do not bother to go any further.

Jesus must have shared this frustration. We see this particularly in the Gospel of John. Here are 2 separate verses where Jesus points to His miracles as a reason (although not a perfect reason) to believe in Him:

"If I am not doing the works of my Father, then do not believe me. But if I do them, even though you do not believe me, believe the **works**, so that you may know and understand that the Father is in me and I am in the Father." In 10:37-38


"Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the **works** themselves." In 14:11

We are no different than the Jews, miracles do help us to believe, even if, in the end, they cannot remain the only reason to believe. So, are there miracles which can help us to believe? The answer is an emphatic Yes!!! There are many miracles associated with the Eucharist which have been extensively investigated about which the only rational conclusion must be that a miracle has occurred after the bread and the wine were consecrated at Mass. There are hundreds of such miracles. In the two concluding articles in this series, I will describe two different types of miracles—Eucharistic miracles directly involving the physical Eucharist, and Healing miracles of Eucharist involving a miraculous, instantaneous, unexplainable, well documented cure of an individual.

### The Eucharistic Miracle at Lanciano, Italy (~750 AD)

The miracle at Lanciano, a small Italian town on the Adriatic sea about 150 miles due east of Rome, is, perhaps, the most famous of the Eucharistic miracles. About 1300 years ago. A Basilian monk was having personal doubts about the Real Presence. While saying mass after consecrating the Host and the wine, the host suddenly became human tissue, and the wine

became real blood. That would be miraculous enough if true, but why believe it to be true? The reason to believe it is true is that it is an ongoing miracle. It still exists and presently can be seen daily in a monstrance in the Church of St. Francis in Lanciano. As we all know bread/wine/muscle/blood all decay fairly quickly, certainly much less than 1300 years. The elements of this miracle have been investigated by modern Medicine. The tissue, as it turns out, has no preservatives and is myocardial tissue from the left ventricle. It



contains arteries and veins, even the vagus nerve. What is additionally interesting is the tissue is

not just a hunk of cardiac muscle. The cardiac tissue is still attached to a rim of bread of the host. The cardiac muscle cells are intermixed with the host bread cells— an impossibility. The blood has formed into large, coagulated pellets, can be liquefied, and is type AB human blood from a Middle Eastern male. (Can't help but pray "O Sacred Heart of Jesus we adore you!"). Of course, one can't say it is the heart and blood of Jesus, but one must acknowledge that this is an unexplainable miracle and does support the belief that something does happen when the priest says the words of consecration.

### The Eucharistic Miracle at Sokolka, Poland (2008 AD)

A similar miracle involving a change of substance occurred Oct 12, 2008 in Sokolka, Poland. In this instance, a consecrated host was dropped onto the floor during Eucharistic distribution. As part of the standard protocol, the host was placed in a small vessel with water, then stored in a safe in the Sacristy. A week later the safe was opened and a blood stain was seen on the Host. The Host was transferred to a Tabernacle and removed from water Oct 20.

On Jan 7, 2009 the host was examined and well documented by two professors of histopathology (Univ. of Bialystok). The studies proved that no foreign substance was added to the consecrated host rather, part of the host took the form of heart muscle of a person near death. They declared the Host to be myocardial tissue which showed signs of extreme spasms as in preceding death (of an individual), and other unusual signs. Similar to the Host at Lanciano, they stated, "The fragments of the Host were interconnected with cardiac tissue as if a fragment of bread had transformed itself into a body."—that is the cardiac muscles cells were interspersed with bread cells, an impossibility. The Doctors further stated that "Even the scientists of NASA, who have at their disposal the most modern analytical techniques, would not be able to artificially recreate such a thing." Other experts have agreed that such and mixing of cardiac and bread cells in a live specimen is not possible.

There are many other such events including ones in Buenos Aires, Argentina in 1992, 1994, and 1996 which Pope Francis as Associate Bishop Jorge Mario Bergoglio. Similar to the others, the tissue is traumatized cardiac tissue from near the entrance to the left ventricle, type AB blood from a Middle Eastern male. At this point, I must also point out that such Eucharistic miracles have only occurred for Communion consecrated in the Catholic Church. Next week we proceed to the Healing Miracles of the Eucharist.

# DIOCESE OF VENICE SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY

The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist
