


#### The Jubilee Prayer

### 2025 CFA



Dear Parish Family, In 2024, you contributed \$810,780 toward our Catholic Faith Appeal (CFA) goal of \$603,000! We can't thank you enough for your generosity and support. And, because we surpassed our goal, \$179,265 will come back to the parish to further support our programs and ministries. Now, once again, we have been called to work together toward our 2025 goal. The needs in our communities are more pressing than ever, and your support will directly help those in Southwest Florida. St. John the Evangelist has been assigned a goal of \$603,000 for 2025.

#### Programs supported by CFA include:

- Catholic Education: The Office of Religious Education oversees the faith formation of children and administering adult faith formation programs such as the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults. On-going formation and support for leaders are offered through retreats, conferences, and workshops. The Catholic Schools Department serves more than 6,200 students, a record-breaking number, at 15 Catholic schools. STREAM (Science, Technology, Religion, Engineering, Arts and Math) is integrated as the learning model in all classrooms. At the same time, the Diocesan curriculum called, "The Gifts of Christ: Truth, Beauty, Goodness, Affability, Fortitude, Humility, and Prudence is the norm. This approach enables students to develop cognitive thought processes and gain skills such as leadership, communication, complex problem solving, teamwork, and creativity. Catholic virtues are infused in every subject as well as promoted and practiced throughout the school environment. The result is a 97% graduation rate with the remaining 3% of students entering the military or work force. In addition, students receive college scholarship awards that are three times the amount of that of public school counterparts.
- Vocations: From the Seminarian programs that instruct our future priests and deacons to providing support for the 35 different women's religious orders and 26 different communities of brothers and priests within the Diocese, the CFA ensures we provide for the education and well-being for those who have dedicated their lives in service to us and our faith.
- Evangelization and Retreat Centers: The Office of Evangelization reaches out with programs and ministries to Parishes, schools, homes, workplaces, prisons, and the larger community. Opportunities to experience the fullness of the Catholic faith are provided so as to draw every person to the Lord. This is accomplished through conferences, retreats, Bible studies, prison ministry, Eucharistic Congresses, and other vital initiatives to strengthen the faith throughout the Diocese. The Office of Youth and Young Adult Outreach coordinates events like the Annual Youth Rally, as well as ongoing Theology on Tap, for youth and young adults to deepen their relationship with Jesus Christ. The younger generations face numerous challenges in our society. These programs endeavor to illuminate spiritual growth and highlight our faith tradition. The Office of Marriage and Family Life exists to promote and strengthen families to carry out God's plan allowing the basic unit of society to grow together in holiness and raise children in the Catholic faith. Engaged couples are formed for sacramental marriage, and married couples are empowered to become active witnesses and supporters of family life. Our Lady of Perpetual Help and Campo San Jose Retreat Centers provide an ambiance to inspire a deep personal relationship with the Lord. By removing the distractions and noise of everyday life, one can more clearly listen to the lord.







## Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope



The 2025 Jubilee Year, as established by Pope Francis, has begun. Five locations in the Diocese of Venice have been designated as Jubilee pilgrimage sites by Bishop Frank J. Dewane. These pilgrimage sites are Epiphany Cathedral in Venice, St. John XXIII Parish in Fort Myers, St. John the Evangelist Parish in Naples, St. Paul Parish in Arcadia, and Our Lady of Perpetual Health Retreat & Spirituality Center in Venice. These five locations, located in each of the geographical regions (Deaneries) of the Diocese, were selected for the convenience of the faithful, so that they may take advantage of the grace of the Jubilee Year. The public schedule

for each of the Diocese of Venice pilgrimage sites will be announced in the coming weeks and shared on the Diocese's website and on social media, with more events and activities to be announced.

A series of Jubilee Adoration Nights at various Parishes will be the first in a series of opportunities within the Diocese of Venice to participate in the Jubilee Year. Each Jubilee Adoration Night will take place from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. on the following dates and locations: Thursday, Jan. 16, St. Agnes Parish, 7775 Vanderbilt Beach Road, Naples; Friday, January 31, St. Andrew Parish, 2628 Del Prado Blvd., Cape Coral; Saturday, March 22, St. Patrick Parish, 7900 Bee Ridge Road, Sarasota; and Friday, May 2, St. Paul Parish, 1330 E. Oak. St., Arcadia.

#### Jubilee 2025 Bull of Indiction: "Spes Non Confundit"

On Thursday, May 9, 2024, the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, Pope Francis officially proclaimed the Ordinary Jubilee of 2025 with the public reading and delivery of Spes Non Confundit, the Bull of Indicition for the Jubilee Holy Year 2025, in Saint Peter's Basilica at the Vatican. This papal document lays out the foundation for the 2025 Jubilee and its theme, "Pilgrims of Hope." Included below is paragraph 1 from this document.

**1. SPES NON CONFUNDIT.** "Hope does not disappoint" (Rom 5:5). In the spirit of hope, the Apostle Paul addressed these words of encouragement to the Christian community of Rome. Hope is also the central message of the coming Jubilee that, in accordance with an ancient tradition, the Pope proclaims every twenty-five years. My thoughts turn to all those pilgrims of hope who will travel to Rome in order to experience the Holy Year and to all those others who, though unable to visit the City of the Apostles Peter and Paul, will celebrate it in their local Churches. For everyone, may the Jubilee be a moment of genuine, personal encounter with the Lord Jesus, the "door" (cf. Jn 10:7.9) of our salvation, whom the Church is charged to proclaim always, everywhere and to all as "our hope" (1 Tim 1:1).

Everyone knows what it is to hope. In the heart of each person, hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite our not knowing what the future may bring. Even so, uncertainty about the future may at times give rise to conflicting feelings, ranging from confident trust to apprehensiveness, from serenity to anxiety, from firm conviction to hesitation and doubt. Often we come across people who are discouraged, pessimistic and cynical about the future, as if nothing could possibly bring them happiness. For all of us, may the Jubilee be an opportunity to be renewed in hope. God's word helps us find reasons for that hope. Taking it as our guide, let us return to the message that the Apostle Paul wished to communicate to the Christians of Rome.

#### Part 5

The Institution of the Eucharist

It was crunch time. Jesus knew that He would soon be arrested, tortured, and put to death. Jesus was sent to the world by the Father through a virgin named Mary to repair the separation caused by the sins of our First Parents and, subsequently, by us. Now, the degree of an offense is determined by whom is offended. Pushing your brother down is bad, pushing your mother down is worse, pushing the President down lands you in jail. Thus, the disobedience of Adam and Eve had resulted in an infinite offense (since God is infinite) resulting in a separation between God and mankind. Jesus being infinite in nature yet possessing a human nature could make up for that offense by living a life of love and obedience to God. Thus, Jesus became the New Adam and Mary became the New Eve. The world, however, rejected Jesus and crucified Him on the cross, while Jesus remained loving and obedient to the end. God accepted Jesus own sacrifice, and thus we were redeemed.

But is the removal of the separation the sole reason the divine Son of God became man? No!!! There was more that still needed to be done. The Father had also sent the Son to show us how to live, which He did. He sent Him to proclaim the Good News, which He did. In His wisdom, the Father knew that without further help, man would be overcome by sin in the world. An authoritative Church was needed. Mankind needed a Church, gifted with the Spirit of Truth (Jn 14:26)—a body of men who would continue to teach all that Jesus had taught them so that believers would be one (Jn 17:20-21). Jesus had taken the steps to train 12 men to be his first Bishops (Overseers) of the Church (Acts 1:20) with one man at the head (Mt 16:18). That night He must ordain them to do that function. Whatever they would decide to bind or loose, He would bind and loose in Heaven (Mt 18:18). Whoever hears them would hear Jesus (LK 10:16).

Still, is an authoritative Church enough? No. Man with his damaged human nature due to the sin of our first parents needs graces in order to live the life one is called to live. Jesus had revealed in John 6 how He was going to provide graces on a regular basis. Jesus told the disciples that He would provide His flesh and His blood which they must eat and drink in order to receive those graces and possess eternal life (Jn 6:51).

Yet, how could that be done? Jesus had long awaited for this Holy Thursday night (Lk 22:15) in order to fulfil His promises of John 6. That night He would both give them His body and blood through the consecration of bread and wine and also would ordain The Apostles, His Bishops, so they could do the same for the faithful.

#### Analyzing the words

While at supper, Jesus takes the bread, blesses it, and says "Take, eat; This is my body" (Mt 26:26). Later he took the wine and offered it up to the Father. and said "This is my blood" (Mt 26:27). Jesus has shown them how he is to give His flesh and blood as promised in John 6. He then added, "Do this is in remembrance of me". (Lk 22:19). Many Christians believe that this statement is just a "Remember Jesus" memory, but there is much more to this statement. First of all, Jesus is speaking specifically to the Apostles. He did not command this when speaking to His followers who were part of the 5000, or at any other time. This is specific to the Apostles.



Secondly, one has to ask what is the "This". Is it not the act of changing bread into His body and wine into His blood? There is nothing about the word "this" used this way that is symbolic. For instance, my father liked to make fudge and he taught me to do the same. When I remember my father's words to me to "do this" when making fudge, my fudge turns out to be real, not symbolic. The same is true of Jesus words to the Apostles. There is no inference of symbolism.

So what do the words mean. The word for "Do" (poieite) can also be translated as "Make" and is often associated in Scripture with sacrifice as in "Make Sacrifice". The word for memory is "anamnesis" and means "make present". Jews when celebrating the Passover do not just remember the Passover night, thet make present (anamesis) that night as if they are preparing to flee Egypt. Thus, the "Do this in remembrance of me" can faithfully be translated, "Make present this sacrifice in my name".

In this way at the Last Supper Jesus fulfilled His promise to provide His body and blood as stated in John 6 in a repeatable unbloody manner, re-presenting the "Once for all sacrifice" of Calvary, in order that we could receive eternal life. What he promised, He delivered. But is this what the Apostles and the Early Church believed or was this some later development in Catholic teaching. To discover that, we will look next week at the Eucharist in the time of the Apostles and the Early Church Fathers.

Blessed Carlo Acutis did not strive to become famous but rather to cooperate with God's graces as generously as possible. That journey brought him many experiences that were all united by a burning desire to serve God and others.

#### **Reflection 5: Redemption of the World**

The Incarnation was the greatest act of Mercy ever known. The only subsequent act that surpassed it was the act of Jesus dying on the Cross destroying sin and death by His blood. The redemption of the world, through the blood of the Cross, is an act of love and Mercy that we will never fully comprehend. We could never be grateful enough for this act since we will never fully fathom the depth of this love.

Spend time throughout this day pondering the crucifix. Hold it in your hand, look at it, imagine it and meditate on it. And then try and close your eyes from time to time pondering the full reality of the Crucifixion. This was not an easy sacrifice. It was especially difficult to receive such brutality and to say, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do." This is Divine Mercy. Lord, help me to gaze deeply upon Your Cross and to discover, within that Cross, an ocean of pure Mercy. Wash me in this sacrificial love and help me to obtain eternal redemption. Jesus, I trust in You.

#### DIOCESE OF VENICE SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY

The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist
