

# Fr. Tom's Gospel Reflection



We sometimes envy the apostles and the first disciples. We are convinced that they had an advantage over all later Christians because they were actually present at the events related in the Gospels. They saw the risen Jesus with their own eyes, and touched him with their hands. Therefore, faith was easy for them. And we are convinced that it would be easy for us too if only we could see Jesus personally, as the apostles did, or if only we could see for ourselves the miracles he performed, as the first disciples did.

Yes, the first disciples had the advantage of seeing Jesus with their own eyes. But did that make faith any easier for them? When they looked at Jesus what did they see? They did not and could not have seen God, for God is not immediately visible and knowable. In Jesus they saw a human being ostensibly like themselves. But to go from there to believe that he was the Son of God required a huge act of faith.

This accounts for the fact that there were many who heard Jesus speak and who saw him act, who did not believe in him. Even the apostles themselves, who had been with him from the beginning, are shown to be slow to believe. Seeing is not necessarily believing.

The shock caused by his passion and death on the cross was so great that the apostles were slow to believe in the news of the Resurrection. When Jesus appeared to them on Easter evening, he rebuked them for their unbelief and hardness of heart, because they had not believed those who saw him after he had risen.

Where does all this leave us? We can't see Jesus the way the apostles saw him. We can't be present in the upper room going over the events of Holy Week when Jesus drops in. We can't put our finger in the wounds of Jesus. We can't look into his face and say, "My Lord, and my God." We must live by faith, not by sight. Yet if we would believe in Jesus we must see him somehow. But just how may people like us see Jesus? What must we do in order to believe?

We are disciples at second hand. For the disciple at second hand, things are harder in some ways, but easier in others. Things are harder because twenty centuries have gone by since Jesus walked the earth. A lot of dust has gathered. The light has dimmed. But on the positive side, the notion that the Son of God walked the earth has become "naturalized" over time, and so in some ways has become easier to believe. But at the end of the day, all disciples are essentially equal - all have to make the leap of faith. We become disciples through faith.

The friends of Jesus saw him and heard him only a few times after that Easter day, but their lives were completely changed. And by sharing their faith our lives will be changed too. We are able to travel in hope because we know that good will triumph over evil, and life will triumph over death, because Jesus is risen.



# DIOCESE OF VENICE SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY



The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist







# Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope



The 2025 Jubilee Year, as established by Pope Francis, has begun. Five locations in the Diocese of Venice have been designated as Jubilee pilgrimage sites by Bishop Frank J. Dewane: Epiphany Cathedral in Venice, St. John XXIII Parish in Fort Myers, St. John the Evangelist Parish in Naples, St. Paul Parish in Arcadia, and Our Lady of Perpetual Health Retreat & Spirituality Center in Venice. These five locations, located in each of the geographical regions (Deaneries) of the Diocese, were selected for the convenience of the faithful, so that they may take advantage of the grace of the Jubilee Year.

#### **Jubilee 2025 Bull of Indiction: "Spes Non Confundit"**

On Thursday, May 9, 2024, the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, Pope Francis officially proclaimed the Ordinary Jubilee of 2025 with the public reading and delivery of Spes Non Confundit, the Bull of Indicition for the Jubilee Holy Year 2025, in Saint Peter's Basilica at the Vatican. This papal document lays out the foundation for the 2025 Jubilee and its theme, "Pilgrims of Hope." Below is paragraph 10 from this document.

#### Signs of hope

11. Signs of hope should also be shown to the sick, at home or in hospital. Their sufferings can be allayed by the closeness and affection of those who visit them. Works of mercy are also works of hope that give rise to immense gratitude. Gratitude should likewise be shown to all those healthcare workers who, often in precarious conditions, carry out their mission with constant care and concern for the sick and for those who are most vulnerable.

Inclusive attention should also be given to all those in particularly difficult situations, who experience their own weaknesses and limitations, especially those affected by illnesses or disabilities that severely restrict their personal independence and freedom. Care given to them is a hymn to human dignity, a song of hope that calls for the choral participation of society as a whole.



"We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart, and far-sighted vision. The forthcoming Jubilee can contribute greatly to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth that we so eagerly desire."- Pope Francis

#### Reflection 13: An Invitation Within the Silence

So often in life we seek satisfaction from the passing things of the world. Be it riches, fleshly pleasure, prestige, or anything else, we must come to discover that one thing and one thing alone satisfies. The Divine Mercy of God is what we seek. Everything else is an illusion of satisfaction. If we try to satisfy our souls with other things, we will be left in interior sadness, anguish and disillusion. The Mercy of God keeps calling out and inflicts a sweet pain until we respond (See Diary #8).



Reflect upon the "sweet pain" inflicted upon your soul every time you try to find satisfaction in something other than God's Mercy. It's "sweet" because it's a rebuke of love from God calling us to trust only in His Mercy. It's "painful" in that we should allow ourselves to see clearly that attachment to anything not of God does not sit well in our soul. Every attachment to things outside of God's Mercy will ultimately be experienced as a burden.

Lord, may I allow myself to feel and experience Your Mercy calling me to turn from all that is not of You. Help me to run to Your Mercy in all things and to turn from those things that ultimately weigh me down and are painful and burdensome. Jesus, I trust in You.




Mercedes, a widow, and her adult son with disabilities live under pressures. We are helping them.



# Jamaica Outreach Program

"Healing Beyond Teeth: Tyrone's Story of Trust and Care"



In the St Pius X Church community in Kingston, Jamaica, 6-year-old Tyrone (not his real name) sat nervously outside the dental clinic set up by the Jamaica Outreach Program. His fingers fidgeted with his shirt, and his wide eyes darted toward the doorway. Inside, the hums and whistles of dental equipment filled the air. Tyrone had heard stories from his friends that dental fillings were unbearably painful, and the fear was hard to shake.

Tyrone underwent the oral hygiene education program during the last mission and was screened for dental disease. He was encouraged to attend

the clinic to have the dentist examine him and have a couple of fillings placed. Tyrone reluctantly agreed, but now that he was here, he felt his courage slipping away.

"Tyrone?" called a cheerful voice. Dr. Adam, the pediatric dentist, stepped outside with a warm smile that immediately eased some of his tension.

Tyrone hesitated but shuffled inside, his heart pounding. Dr. Adam knelt to his eye level and said gently, "I know you might feel nervous, but my job is to make sure you're comfortable and your tooth feels better." His calm tone reassured him.

He spent a few minutes chatting about Tyrone's favorite football (US soccer) team and his love for mangoes, gradually helping him relax. Dr. Adam explained every step in simple terms and even let him hold a mirror to watch. "If anything feels uncomfortable, just slowly raise your hand," he said.

To his surprise, the filling was quick and painless. Dr. Adam showed him his newly restored tooth in the mirror. Tyrone beamed. "It didn't hurt at all!" he exclaimed, feeling a wave of relief and pride.

The next day, Tyrone returned without hesitation. "I'm ready for the other side now," he announced. With Dr. Adam's gentle care, the second filling went just as smoothly.

By the end of the mission, Tyrone's fear had transformed into confidence. His bright smile and bravery became an inspiration to his classmates, proving that even the most daunting challenges can be overcome with the right support. Tyrone even vowed to take better care of his teeth and eat healthy foods.

Stories like this are made possible during every mission, thanks to the dedication of caring dental professionals who volunteer their time and expertise, and the generosity of donors who support the Jamaica Outreach Program.



# JUST IN TIME FOR EASTER- Jesus and the Jewish Roots of the Eucharist Back in the Gift Shop for a limited time!

In recent years, Christians e verywhere are rediscovering the Jewish roots of their faith. Every year at Easter time, many believers now celebrate Passover meals (known as Seders) seeking to understand exactly what happened at Jesus' final Passover, the night before he was crucified.

Jesus and the Jewish Roots of the Eucharist shines fresh light on the Last Supper by looking at it through Jewish eyes. Using his in-depth knowledge of the Bible and ancient Judaism, Dr. Brant Pitre answers questions such as: What was the Passover like at the time of Jesus? What were the Jewish hopes for the Messiah? 



#### The Canonization of Carlo Acutis

#### Who was Carlo Acutis?

Carlo Acutis was born on May 3, 1991, in London to a wealthy Italian family, and grew up in Milan. His precocious faith journey took off after he received First Communion at the young age of 7, and he regularly attended daily Mass, prayed the rosary and participated in eucharistic adoration.

While he enjoyed regular pastimes for his age — hiking, video games, and joking around with friends – he also taught catechism in a local parish and did outreach to the homeless.

Acutis used his computer savvy to create an online exhibit about more than 100 eucharistic miracles recognized by the church over many centuries, focused on the real presence of Christ that Catholics believe is in the consecrated bread and wine.

In October 2006, at age 15, he fell ill. Ten days later, he died of acute leukemia at a hospital in northern Italy. His body was later transferred to an Assisi cemetery as Acutis had asked, because of his devotion to the hometown medieval saint, St. Francis.

#### Why will Carlo become a Saint?

His road to sainthood — the canonization process — started more than 10 years ago at the initiative of a group of priests and friends, and formally took off shortly after Pope Francis began his papacy in 2013. Acutis was named "venerable" in 2018 after the church recognized his virtuous life, and his body was taken to a shrine in Assisi's Santuario della Spogliazione, a major site linked to St. Francis' life.

He was then declared "blessed" in 2020 after the Vatican dicastery that studies sainthood processes recognized a miraculous healing through Acutis' intercession — a child in Brazil who recovered in a "scientifically inexplainable" manner.

His road to sainthood — the canonization process — started more than 10 years ago at the initiative of a group of priests and friends, and formally took off shortly after Pope Francis began his papacy in 2013. Acutis was named "venerable" in 2018 after the church recognized his virtuous life, and his body was taken to a shrine in Assisi's Santuario della Spogliazione, a major site linked to St. Francis' life.

He was then declared "blessed" in 2020 after the Vatican dicastery that studies sainthood processes recognized a miraculous healing through Acutis' intercession — a child in Brazil who recovered in a "scientifically inexplainable" manner.

Last year, the church paved his way to sainthood by attributing to him a second miracle — the complete healing of a Costa Rican student in Italy from major head trauma in a bicycle accident after her mother prayed at Acutis' tomb.

Acutis' canonization Mass will be Sunday, April 27, at 10:30 a.m. in front of the Vatican's St. Peter Basilica, in conjunction with the celebration of the Holy Year's jubilee for teens.

The Canonization Mass will be broadcast on the EWTN OnDemand platform.




