Patrick's Primary School as a Grade One Teacher, teaching children who require a bit more attention due to varying degrees of learning disability. I love teaching and look forward to see and teach my students, and I do learn from them as they give different perspective to my teaching profession, which is usually fun.

I love to laugh; I find humor in most things. I love to sing, dance and watch movies. I'm a responsible lady who is involved in most aspects of my church, St. Peter Claver. I've been a member of my church since I was 5 years old. I'm currently the coordinator for the Youth and Young Adults Ministries. I'm also the secretary of the Parish Pastoral Advisory Council as well as a choir member

The Church Does Not Ask Us to Have Blind Faith

This week, we'll continue our examination of the reasonableness of Christian faith. So far we discovered that God is the author of all truth; thus, there can be no contradiction between science and faith. Science has as its object empirical, natural truths: i.e., truths that are knowable through our senses. Faith has as its object non-empirical, supernatural truths: i.e., truths that are knowable only through revelation.

Even the atheist must admit that if there is a God and God has given us revelation, that revelation would necessarily be true. And we would be more certain about the truths God revealed than the truths we discover through science, because God would be infinitely more intelligent and knowledgeable than us. As creator of the universe, God's science would be a bit more sophisticated and accurate than ours.

We also discovered that the Church does not ask us to have blind faith. In fact, the Catechism clearly instructs us *not* to have blind faith: "faith is by no means a blind impulse of the mind" (CCC, 156). St. Thomas Aquinas (1225-1274), Doctor of the Church, said: "I would not believe if I did not realize that it is reasonable to believe." God gave us reason for a reason: he expects us to use our brains to discover truth.

Because God respects our reason, he gives us credible evidence to believe what he has revealed. For example, if the Gospels are historically accurate and true, Jesus does not simply claim to be God — he backs up his claim with miracles: curing the blind, the deaf, the paralyzed, casting out demons, controlling the weather, raising people from the dead, and his own resurrection. If Jesus really did perform these miracles, it is reasonable to believe his claim to be God — and *unreasonable* to refuse belief.

Thus, the reasonableness of the Christian faith — at least in the first place — comes down to this: is it reasonable to believe the testimony of the New Testament writers? Bl. John Henry Cardinal Newman (1801-1890) once wrote: "Faith by its very nature is the

acceptance of a truth . . . simply and unconditionally on the basis of testimony."

This should not shock us! We accept the truth of any number of things based solely on the testimony of others. In fact, we are even comfortable determining a man's fate based on the testimony of others: in the courtroom, a man can be convicted or acquitted of murder based on credible eyewitness testimony. Moreover, our knowledge of almost any historical event — especially before audio and video recorders — is based almost exclusively on the testimony of others. How do you know Lincoln was assassinated?

In our next column, we will examine the testimony of the New Testament writers to see if they stand up to the tests historians use to determine the historical reliability of ancient texts. If we are willing to follow the evidence wherever it takes us, and the evidence confirms the historical reliability of the New Testament, we must reasonably conclude: Jesus' teachings are true; he is God; we must worship and obey him as Lord.





s we recall the event of the wedding feast at Cana, we can almost imagine ourselves there. Weddings are usually beautiful affairs. Cana was no exception. The music was playing. People had gathered to honor the love of a couple. The dancing and festival was underway and the wine was flowing — so much so that they ran out of it! On the surface, the wedding feast of Cana sounds like any other wedding. However, for the author of John's gospel, Cana sets the stage for a divine drama to unfold. The mother of Jesus approaches her son to tell him there is no more wine. It appears that Mary wants her son to do something about the lack of wine, saving her hosts from embarrassment. We can ask ourselves whether or not something stirred in Mary that day telling her that it was Jesus' time to reveal the power of God within him. The interchange between Jesus and Mary seems to be quite intense. Jesus inquires why this embarrassment should be of concern to him. Mary knows that her intercession with her son would ultimately lead him to provide. This intensity culminates in the powerful sign of changing water into wine. The abundance of wine points to the generosity of God through the ministry of Jesus. Jesus changes the water, used for Jewish ceremonial washings, into wine. Using the fruit of the vine, Jesus reveals God's bounty, through himself, as the essential purification. The knowledge that God provides for us inspires us to lead holy and pure lives.

This same generosity is gifted to us in our Christian experience. Jesus' ministry, recorded in the gospels and the scriptures, reveals God's great love for humanity. The miracles, parables, and teachings communicate that our God wants to enter into deeper relationship with all of us. Mary's words are just as important to us today as they were 2000 years ago — we must do whatever Jesus tells us to do and follow his example of

love and concern. God can bear fruit through us. We can experience God's generosity every time that we reach out to others in love. As Christians we must do what the Lord told us to do in the gospel and follow his example.

Our second reading points out that each of us have been given different gifts to express our love and concern. But it is the one Spirit and the one God who provides us with these realities. When we consider peoples of different Christian traditions and other faiths, we find that God's spirit of truth is immeasurable and quite abundant. We believe as Catholics

that we have been given the fullness of God's truth through scripture and tradition, but we are called to recognize the presence of God in those who are not of our faith and strive for unity. Likewise, we are asked to bestow God's generosity on those who do not share the same faith that we do.

He knew he'd succeeded when he met a charming young woman—and her last name already matched his own!


