St. John the Evangelist has a proud musical tradition, which we are all blessed to uphold, and even add to. One of the ways in which we are doing so (in addition to the pilgrimages and concert tours, and the upcoming CDs) is through **Sacred Music in Sacred Spaces**, our free monthly music series.

We have worked to continue to bring excellent sacred music to St. John within the liturgy, of course; Sacred Music in Sacred Spaces (SMSS) continues that process outside of the Mass, featuring a variety of styles, instruments and ensembles. We had our most successful season yet last year, but 2013-14 will be even better!

We begin next month with **Samuel Peliska**, **clarinet**, who presents a recital in our Music Room in the Claussen Center, on Saturday, November 23 at 1:00 p.m. Samuel, finishing his doctorate in clarinet performance at Florida State, is the son of parishioners James and Noreen Peliska, who head up our parish's (and perhaps Naples') most outstanding musical family. You might wonder how instrumental music can be considered sacred, in the absence of words? Well, come and learn — and be entranced by pieces like Olivier Messiaen's *Abîme des*

December will of course see a return of our muchloved **The Christmas Story**, on Friday, December 20 in the church at 7:00 p.m. This retelling of the story of the Incarnation and the Nativity, as composed by our pastor, Fr. John, has been very successful, with a cast of nearly a hundred!

You've heard her cantor many times, but you haven't heard **Ellie Roberts, soprano**, *sing* nearly as often: cantoring is quite different from solo recital singing. Therefore, on January 26 at 2:30 p.m. in the Music Room, you'll get to hear her, "no holds barred"! Ellie will present a thoroughly enjoyable vocal recital (accompanied by yours truly) of sacred favorites.

#### Speaking of cantoring, baritone Stephen

**Richardson**, son of David and Margaret Richardson of our parish, has done just that when visiting St. John on several prior occasions. Everyone wants to hear more of him, and so we've arranged a concert for him, together with our Adult Choir, in the

church at 2:30 p.m. on February 16! Stephen recently finished his Master of Music at Northwestern and has been singing professionally in Chicago ever since. You'll hear timeless classics like the *Libera me* from the Fauré *Requiem*, and more.

March brings Sixtus, an a cappella ensemble of four seminarians

— (well, they would be seminarians, if Zuzu's godfather hadn't been ordained a priest last summer!) — who entertain just as well as they sing. Sixtus was a group I actually started when I was at Theological College, but it has since taken off (go figure) and they have recently released "In Living Collar", a CD which amply demonstrates their unique sound. They have toured the East Coast several times, and we'll be fortunate enough to have





them come visit on their spring break. Concert date is still TBA, but around March 12-14, depending on the rest of their tour schedule.

Also on tour, but from even further away than DC, is the **Lyra Ensemble**, a small chorus from St. Petersburg, Russia (!) whose talents I have managed to secure. This evening will also be a beautiful evening of *a cappella* singing — but in a *very* different style! Please join us in the church at 7:00 p.m. on Easter Wednesday (April 23) for the very spiritual experience that is Orthodox liturgical music.

Finally, my friend **Rich Dittus**, who is my counterpart at Our Lady of Light in Estero, comes to us May 10 at 7:00 p.m. in the Seminar Room for an evening of contemporary music. I have been a fan of Rich's since 2006, when I got my hands on his first album. He is an amazing songwriter, a gifted performer, and most importantly, a deeply spiritual man who I am now proud to call a friend. Rich will be joined by perennial favorites Gabi Frei and Jennine Fuentes.

Whew! That's quite a busy year. I do hope you'll avail yourself of as many of these musical events as you are able to make.

A note about our free status: while I think it's important, some have advised me that people don't come because they don't have to pay (apparently they think it must not be good if it were free?). I would have thought the **opposite** were true — but then, I don't know Naples as well as most. In any case, perhaps you are one of those people that think things can only be worth what you pay for them. If that is so, just let me know, please — I'll be **more** than happy to charge you what you would have to pay to see these artists at the Phil (or whatever it's named this week)!



#### Sacrament of Baptism

## Jamaica Outreach Program Al and Ann Kerns...Retiring, (Sort of)...

Al and Ann Kerns joined St John the Evangelist parish in 1996; they didn't know it at the time, but he would eventually be numbered among the founders of the Jamaica Outreach Program (JOP). That small band of parishioners, with names like Kasputis, Van Buskirk, Kerns, and Paniccia, set out in 1998 to put into practice (in a "people to people" kind of way) the teachings of Jesus Christ. Those early days were full of challenges such as: finding a third world parish that would benefit most from our time, effort, and support; finding a long distance pastor who would welcome our interest and commitment; and finding ways to make a difference in the lives of people who oftentimes have empty pockets. That search for a sister parish ended



when Wally Kasputis found St. Pius X parish in Kingston, Jamaica. It was an ideal parish with many opportunities for an organization like the JOP.

On the St. Pius property there was an elementary school that was in need of major repairs and supplies. There was also a medical clinic in desperate need of medicines and refurbishing, and a makeshift eye clinic that needed up-to-date equipment to make it function better. There were also thousands of people in the environs of the parish who needed clothing, food, housing, and goods of every kind. In short, the parishes of St John the Evangelist and St Pius X were a match that was heaven sent. Al and Ann Kerns were in the forefront of it all.

Over the years Al and Ann became in many ways the face of the JOP in Kingston. In the past 15 years they have made more than 30 trips to St. Pius at their own expense meeting the poorest of the poor in His name and ours. Al's comment about that kind of service is simply put, "For the Jamaicans the JOP represents a real presence that says people they have never met care about them. In turn we who go there meet Christ in the faces of a people who struggle every minute of the day to maintain a sense of dignity in the midst of poverty and all the ills that accompany it. It's been a privilege to serve. "

Ann and Al have made lifelong friends among the Jamaicans. They have opened their home to many of them who visit Naples for JOP events or come here in search of advanced medical care. Names like Fr. Burchell, Boxer, Miss Bradford, and Peta-Gaye are etched on their hearts and numbered in their prayers. Al sums it up this way, "Our efforts haven't always been easy

or successful. For every step forward sometimes there were maybe a few steps sideways as we learned how best to serve. But I'm convinced that the sister parish concept is the way to go when serving our sisters and brothers who have the very least. I would encourage any parish to pursue such a ministry. There are many parishes on not so distant islands that need the kind of help and interaction that the JOP gives."

Al and Ann have recently retired from the JOP Board of Directors. That doesn't mean they will stop putting out signs to remind us of second collections or stop collecting Pocket Change at the doors of our church. Al will continue to purchase medicines with money from our second collections, package them and deliver them to Food for the Poor for distribution to the St. Pius Medical Dispensary.

In Al's words, "it's time to step aside and let others take a turn at the helm and continue the work of the JOP that is always ongoing." JOP will sponsor its annual Volunteer Appreciation Party next Friday night, October 25, in the library. If you


## Job Search Skills and Support Group Meets Monday Evenings From 6:30 to 8:30 in Library





## **Persistence vs. Weariness**

rayer is at the heart of today's gospel. Jesus tries to teach his listeners the necessity of persistence in prayer. At the conclusion of the parable, the rights of the woman are upheld because she is persistent in dealing with the judge. And so it is with prayer. When we are persistent in asking God for what we truly need, the divine judge will answer our needs.

Perhaps you are wondering how this gospel message can be life-changing. Lives are changed when they are touched by the presence of God. But how do we discern God's presence? The answer comes through prayer and reflection. It is when our prayer life lies dormant that we experience the angst of despair. Communication with God opens our hearts to his presence and our eyes to the reality of Jesus' call in our day to day activities.

### **Reflection Questions**

- 1. How would you describe your prayer life?
- 2. Do you ask God for what you want or what you need? What do you think is the difference?
- 3. Have there been times when you thought your prayers have not been answered?
- 4. How has God answered your prayers?
- 5. How do you think you can secure a good prayer life?
- 6. How much time do you dedicate to entertainment, work, and ordinary activities?
- 7. How much time do you spend with God?

We are so accustomed to a life of instant results. In the aftermath of natural disasters, people struggle with the slow pace of rebuilding. Victims of devastation yearn for normality and want to see rapid results rather than being faced with the long waits associated with rebuilding their lives. This feeling may also be present in our outlook on prayer. We may call on God begging him to quickly enter our lives in order to alleviate suffering, pain, or upset. Sometimes we find ourselves asking God for what we want rather than what we need. There are also moments when we feel that our prayers are unanswered, that our deepest cares fall on deaf ears. The same is true in scripture, especially in the Old Testament; we hear of the prophets and the people pleading with God to answer their cries for help. In the sacred text we find God's responds with compassion. Today, we are asked to remember that God will respond to us in the very same way.

*Prayer never goes unheard.* It not only takes patience and persistence for something to happen, our prayers must be accompanied by action. The Iron Curtain was torn down not just as a result of prayer, but because of the efforts of all those who sat down in earnest dialogued, those who put their prayers of inclusion into practice. We are asked to live our lives as a prayer so that others may hear God speaking to them through our actions. But it takes time and persistence Pope John Paul II asked us, many times, to pray for peace and at the same time reminded us of the importance to work for justice. Our efforts are always recognized by God and our prayers always answered through our constant dialogue with him. Reflecting on the Sunday Readings with Fr. John J. Ludden, Pastor

#### REFLECTION

Asking God for our needs is the point of Sunday's Gospel. The widow in Jesus' story gets what she needs by wearing down the unjust judge. The widow persists in seeking her rights. The judge has little reason to care about her but gives her her rights because she keeps coming back – she persists – and because he starts to worry that others will think he is unjust.

Jesus' story invites us to recognize that God will be better than the judge about answering our prayers. The Gospel invites us to imitate the widow in asking always and repeatedly for what we need. Sometimes when we persist in a prayer to God, we see a way we can help God answer the prayer.

Asking for what we need or want helps us see which things and people really matter to us and how we can help. "Pray always without losing heart," Jesus says.


"Hi."

"The heart of a volunteer is not measured in size but by the depth of the commitment to make a difference in the lives of others."


The Ladies of Charity meet the second Friday of every month from October through May in the Library after the 8:30/9:00 a.m. Mass.






