# Gospel Reflections

### Gospel Reflections with Father Tom

Bartimaeus was in a sad state. Blindness is a terrible affliction. He was sitting by the side of the road on the margins of life. He was forced to beg and so was totally dependent on the charity of others. His situation was hopeless.

And yet it seems that he had one kind of riches. He had faith in Jesus.

It may have been only the faith of the desperate, but faith is what matters. When he heard that Jesus was passing by, overcoming his pride and shame, he began to cry out, "Jesus, Son of David, have pity on me." He was not put off by the fact that Jesus didn't immediately grant his request, or by the fact that people tried to silence him. He went on crying out.

When he heard that Jesus was calling him, he jumped to his feet, threw aside his cloak, and made his way to Jesus. That cloak was the one thing of value that he had. It meant the world to him. It not only provided him with warmth, but also covered his wretchedness, thus giving him some measure of dignity and respectability. Yet he threw it aside and came to Jesus just as he was – in all his darkness, poverty, and wretchedness. And Jesus received him and gave him back his sight.

When we go to see a doctor we may be asked to take off some or all our clothes. It's not something we find easy. To strip is to become very vulnerable. But how can we have our ills diagnosed and treated, if we won't even let the doctor see them in the first place?


We too are blind in many ways. We too are poor before God. Jesus calls us to come to him. He wants to make us well. However, we find it hard to throw the "cloak" away, and come to Him just as we are. Pride makes us try to put on an outward show.

We may believe that we have to be perfect, otherwise He won't love us. To admit our sins and weaknesses would cause Him to reject us. But if we were perfect, if we were well, we wouldn't need Him at all.

We have to make a radical act of faith and trust in Jesus. We must give up pretending, covering up, hiding behind various screens and masks, and be content to appear before Him as we really are. We have nothing to fear but His kindness and healing. A patient does not feel accepted unless the worst in him/her is also accepted. So we will never feel accepted and loved by God unless we let Him see our worst side.

Many people sit at the roadside of life begging, not for money, but for love, for attention, for a feeling that they are important and that life has a meaning. Many of them are too embarrassed to ask for help. They

are afraid of being silenced by the indifference of others.



Bartimaeus serves as a model for others. Many people were blind and without direction, but have found purpose, energy, and direction in their lives as a result of following Christ. An enthusiastic following of Christ results in a happy and fulfilled life, a life shared with others.

Lord, that we may see – see our needy brothers and sisters, that we may hear their silent cries, that we may not pass by. For we too were beggars, and you enriched us. We too were blind, and you enlightened us.







### David J. Keys, Ph.D. Biography

Dr. David Keys has a Ph.D. in Physics from Washington University in St. Louis, MO (1984) and a Masters in Theology from Franciscan University in Steubenville, OH (2013). For 38 years he worked in the field of Medical Physics, being involved in the physics of radiation treatment of cancer patients and in the physics of diagnostic imaging of patients. During that time, he was named a Fellow by the American College of Radiology, by the American Association of Physicists in Medicine, and by the American College of Medical Physics. In addition to his professional life, Dr. Keys raised seven children (six boys and a girl), coaching over 800 of his children's games, while living the Parish life. However, in order to more deeply understand his Catholic Faith, he entered into a Masters Theology program at Franciscan University of Steubenville in 2002. It took a while, but he persevered, and in 2013, he received his Master's degree in Theology. Subsequently, he left Medical Physics and has become a Catholic speaker/author.






