

Journeying with Mary

ith the topic, "Mary, Our Sister: Journeying with Mary in Faith," Sister Brittany, a Theology teacher at St. John Neumann High School, educated and entertained 140 women at Faith and Wine's second event of the season on October 11. Her upbeat – and at times hilarious – approach combined the story of her own religious journey that lead her to join the Salesian Sisters in 2007 and the story of Mary's journey from a young girl promised in wedlock to Joseph, who became an unwed mother (a transgression punishable by death in those times), and

who was transformed to the woman we honor today as the mother of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

Sister Brittany provided the historical background to enable the audience to understand the enormous risk undertaken by Mary (not to mention Joseph!), and the complete trust she placed in God when she agreed to become Jesus' mother. Sister was able to humanize Mary while at the same time help us understand why Mary remains such a strong role model

today for all of us as we make our own religious journey.

Sister Brittany's willingness to share her own story and experiences and her unique presentation about Mary's journey through amazing 3D PowerPoint images captivated the entire audience. By the end of her presentation, everyone in the room could clearly feel her love of Christ, her respect for Mary, and her gift for sharing the faith with young people as a catechist. In fact, many in the audience

wondered how much more they could have learned if their high school theology teacher had been someone like Sister Brittany.

> seniors visit emergency food programs each month? Many more are isolated, too proud or embarrassed or infirm to go where the food is.





Jesus: "What do you want me to do for you?"

The past two weeks we considered the dignity of the human person as it applies to the life issues in our culture. We discussed how the dignity of the human person is not based on what we can *do* or what we *have*, but rather on who we *are* — persons created in the image and likeness of God. We discovered our worth is not determined by others recognizing it, but is determined by

our origin and destiny: we are capable of union with God and are destined to experience God's love for eternity.

This week, I would like to consider the dignity of the human person as it applies to our own self-image. Sometimes it is easy to believe that God loves everyone else, but couldn't possibly love me.

After all, I live with me and know all my sins, faults and failures. How could God possibly love me?

Today's Gospel is good news for those of us who struggle with negative self-images or even self-hatred. We witness an incredible encounter between Jesus and a man named Bartimaeus. When we slow down and prayerfully consider who Jesus is, we can recognize just how remarkable Jesus' question is: "What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus is God, the Eternal Word of the Father. So, it is God himself who asks Bartimaeus what he wants Jesus to do for him. Yet, as Catholics, we believe that Scripture is not dead, but alive. Thus, we are able to put ourselves in the position of Bartimaeus. When we do so, we realize that God asks us the same question. God's desire to heal Bartimaeus is the same desire he has to heal us.

Jesus' physical healings always point to God's desire to heal us spiritually as well. We can see this throughout Scripture when Jesus and the prophets speak about eyes that do not see and ears that do not hear. Thus, while the physical miracle of Jesus curing Bartimaeus' blindness is remarkable, the spiritual healing that Jesus brings about is even more powerful.

Bartimaeus replies to Jesus' question by saying: "I want to see." Doesn't this request represent the deepest longing of our hearts, especially for those of us who struggle in our faith that God loves

us? We want to see and believe that we have dignity and worth, that we are precious in God's sight, that our lives matter. And, Jesus longs to fulfill our desire, to cure our spiritual blindness; he longs to give us the grace to see ourselves with his eyes.

Today, Jesus asks us: "What do you want me to do for you?" And, what do you want Jesus to do for you? In this Year of Faith, let us approach Jesus with courage and expectation. Let us not be afraid to ask Jesus to fulfill the deepest longings of our hearts. Let us pray for the grace of being surprised by a fresh and miraculous outpouring of God's love in our lives and in the lives of our loved ones. May we all be granted the great gift of seeing ourselves and others with the eyes of Christ.

I hope I am not speaking prematurely in suggesting that we may have experienced our last 90 degree day of the year. One can certainly feel the "slight" change of seasons upon us now in Southwest Florida. These are certainly the days we year round residents look forward to all summer long. After Hurricane Sandy passes far to our East this weekend, we are in store for a magnificent stretch of

weather with highs in the upper 70s/low 80s and lows in the low 60s. I believe this is what is referred to as "Chamber of

Commerce" weather in the Urban Dictionary. My suggestion to all of our parishioners is to get out there and enjoy it while it lasts.

Ground breaking officially took place this past week on the "Lest we Forget" Veteran's Memorial. We have a very short window in order to get the job completed by November 10, however, we are going to do everything in our power to do so. Believe it or not, we experienced a lengthy delay with Collier County in getting the

proper approval for the flagpoles which had to be certified to Southwest Florida wind load standards. In addition, the benches (which will be memorialized) will not be installed until after the dedication. We had a difficult time obtaining accurate pricing and since the benches are going to be engraved, there is no way we could accomplish this task in time. We do now have pricing for the flagpoles, benches and brick pavers, which is as follows.

(2) 20' Flagpole - \$4,000.00 – flying the Papal flag and St. John the Evangelist flag (features a bronze plaque at the base of the flag)

(1) 25' Flagpole - \$4,500.00 – flying the American flag (features a bronze plaque at the base of the flag)

(6) Granite benches - \$3,500.00 - engraved with an honorarium or memorial

(50+) Brick pavers - \$150.00 - engraved with an

honorarium or memorial

Currently, one of the 20' flagpoles, two of the benches and numerous pavers are reserved. If you are interested in purchasing any of these items, please contact me a 566.1678. This is going to be an absolutely amazing memorial to our veterans.

I am sure many of you have seen the attached parking sign in commercial parking lots at one time or another. As far as I am concerned, there are far too few. We have purchased two and will install them in the next week in our parking lot in two "prime" spots in front of the church. Undoubtedly by doing so, we will take away someone's favorite parking spot, however, I am sure you will understand. We have a lot of younger families and you will agree that there are always a couple of expectant mothers at Mass. This will be a nice gesture in allowing these mothers to park without having to trek across the lot.





Thank you so much to everyone that gave so very generously to the second collection last weekend for World Missions. The collection totaled \$7,280.00. Offerings from Catholics in the United States, on World Mission Sunday and throughout the year, are combined with offerings to the Propagation of the Faith from Catholics worldwide. Mission dioceses -- about 1,000 at this time -- receive regular annual assistance from the funds collected. In addition.



Faith Gives Birth to Sight

he story of Bartimaeus is well known to all of us. On the surface it appears to be simply another account of healing. As with all the other stories of healing, this miracle witnesses to a deeper reality. Bartimaeus was blind and had become a beggar because of his disability. In the eyes of those around him he was of no use to society ~ he was a man without hope. The people of his day thought that he was unworthy of Jesus' attention and they rebuke him as he calls out to Jesus to come to his aid. However, Jesus

looks beyond Batimaeus' blindness and hopelessness and recognizes him as a man of great faith. In Jesus' eyes he was a man worthy of God's attention and God's love. Once the people see Jesus' interest and genuine concern for this poor man, their rebukes turn into chants of encouragement: "Take courage; get up, Jesus is calling you." In this very act, their narrow attitude toward illness and poverty moves toward the initiative of concern and unconditional love. Therefore today's gospel is an encounter of physical and spiritual healing.

It is hard to imagine what Bartimaeus must have felt like as the vivid colors of life came back to his eyes. His blindness is taken away and his position in society is once again restored. Bartimaeus would no longer have to beg or live in the dark again. The faith of this man restores him to the light and a position of

belonging. Faith gives birth to sight for this man who was willing to trust and to take the risk.

Today, we are issued a call from Jesus to reach out to those who lack hope and courage. Our response to the gospel should be to give those who think that they are unimportant or unworthy of God's attention the courage to know Jesus loves them through the gift of our unconditional love. We must always seek to remove the blindness of prejudice, discrimination, and sinful attitudes

that lead others to a sense of isolation. Whenever we succumb to the temptation

of feeling more righteousness than others, we block the vision that God had intended us to embrace. If we deem someone unworthy of our support and acceptance as Church, then we place them outside of God's love. Our call is to offer them, not criticism or rejection, but the hope of God that is truly theirs. Once we take this story of healing to heart, we must realize that we are called like the bystanders in today's gospel to call others to take courage for Jesus is calling them to a life of transformation.







Mark 10:46-52
Bartimaeus, the blind beggar

Bartimaeus was a blind beggar in Jericho. When Jesus was leaving that city for his final journey to Jerusalem, he passed the beggar. Bartimaeus called out to Jesus, calling him Son of David, a messianic title. Even in his blindness, Bartimaeus recognized who Jesus was.

When Bartimaeus was told to come to Jesus, he threw off his cloak. As a beggar, he had to look more pitiful than other beggars to receive alms. His cloak was surely torn and dirty to get more sympathy from passerby. By throwing off his cloak, he was throwing off his old life to gain a new life with Christ.

When Jesus asked what he wanted, the beggar said he wanted to see. Jesus told him that his faith had saved him. Bartimaeus immediately had his sight. He then followed Jesus.

What can a parent do? This Gospel shows that Jesus wants us to see him for what he is, our savior. We can explain to our children that we can call to Jesus to help us, that faith in Jesus brings us everlasting life.


