Salesian Sisters Kick Off Families in Christ Season With Lesson on God's Love


With over 300 people in attendance, the kickoff for Families in Christ took place on Wednesday, September 25. We made a few key changes to the program over the summer to ensure an even better program this year. For example, we moved Families in Christ to Wednesday evenings to coincide with our Faith Formation program; we have shortened the sessions to one hour in length; we're offering a free family dinner (pizza, salad, pasta, etc.); and best of all — the Salesian Sisters of Don Bosco are organizing and hosting each session: Sr. Patricia Roche, Sr. Rosemary Cordes, Sr. Jennifer Kane, and Sr. Brittany Harrison. The Sisters, whose order was founded by St. John Bosco, have been administering St. John Neumann High School for the last four years. The charism of their religious order is to love, work with, and educate the young. They follow St. John Bosco's "preventative system": a system of working with youth that emphasizes preventing bad behavior, instead of punishing it — founded on the principles of Reason, Religion, and Loving Kindness.

While they possess a diverse richness of talents (speaking,

music, multi-media, creativity), perhaps what sets these Salesian Sisters of Don Bosco apart is their authentic love for young people, their genuine sense of Christian joy, and an abiding and contagious peace. Our first Families in Christ hosted by the Sisters was dynamic, interactive and captured the attention and imagination of the children and their parents. The theme was the dignity of the human person. And, the Sisters were able to present this topic in a way that all the children both understood and took to heart.

Through creative activities, movie clips and music, the Sisters taught everyone present that God loves us not because of anything we have (or don't have), not because of what we can do (or not do), not because of our status (or lack of status), but rather because He made us and continues to hold us in existence moment by moment out of his prodigal love for us. Secure in this unshakeable foundation for our true sense of dignity and worth, nothing the world can say or do can ultimately bring us down. God's love for us — especially Jesus' passion — is the greatest proof for the dignity of the human person and is the

rock upon which we can build our lives! All else is sand.





Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Our Parish Reaches 25 Year Milestone on October 8, 2013

The first weekend Mass at Saint John the Evangelist here in Naples was offered on Saturday, October 8, 1988, at 4:30 p.m. in the cafeteria of Naples Elementary School, 685 111th Avenue N. The new pastor, Fr. Thomas Glackin, was the celebrant. Masses on Sunday, October 9 were held at 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. Several parishioners set up and took down the chairs before and after the congregation assembled.

Over 700 persons attended the first weekend. The collection was about \$2,000.00.

On the weekend of October 15-16, 1988, a list of suggested names for the Mission Church was in the bulletin for the parishioners to vote for the selection by the majority. The names included in order of preference: St. John the Evangelist, St. Agnes, St. Brigid and Holy Family. The preferred choice of St. John the Evangelist was announced on October 29, 1988. Starting on Tuesday, October 25, celebration of daily Mass at 8:00 a.m. began, Masses were held in the Blue Bill Center

located in the condominium development at the beach end of 111th Avenue.

The adult choir was organized on Monday, October 24, and the choir first sang for the 4:30 p.m. Saturday Vigil Mass on October 29, 1988. The folk group led the singing at the 10:30 a.m. Mass, October 30.

The month of October, 1988 was indeed a special month in the parish life of Saint John the Evangelist.

As a new parish, St. John held its first picnic November 13, 1988, at Wiggins/Delnor State Park in Thanksgiving celebration of our new family. Everyone was assigned something to bring based on the first initial of their last name. A Christmas party was also held that first year.

Under Construction

Who is St. John the Evangelist? (c. 6-C.104)

Born in Galilee, the son of Zebede and Salome and younger brother of James the Greater, he was a fisherman on Lake Genesareth until with James, he was called by Christ to follow Him. He was the youngest of the apostles. James and John were called "Sons of Thunder" by the Lord because of their volatile temperaments, and John became the beloved disciple.

That he was one of the closest to Christ was attested to by the fact that only he, Peter, and James were present at such events as the Transfiguration, the healing of Peter's mother-in-law, the raising of Jairus' daughter from the dead, and the agony in the garden of Gethsemane. He and Peter were sent to prepare the Passover and were the first apostles at

the tomb of the risen Christ. He was the only apostle at the Crucifixion, where Jesus placed Mary in his care. He was imprisoned with Peter and appeared before the Sanhedrin, accompanied Peter to Samaria to transmit the Holy Spirit to the new converts, and was at the Council of Jerusalem in 49.

Soon after, he went to Asia Minor and in all probability was present at the passing away of Mary. He was named, with Peter and James, by Paul as "these leaders, these pillars" of the Church in Jerusalem. According to tradition, he went to Rome during the reign of Emperor Domitian, miraculously escaped martyrdom (he emerged unscathed from a cauldron of boiling oil, according to Tertullian), and was exiled to the island of Patmos,

where he wrote Revelation. He returned to Ephesus on the death of Domitian in 96, wrote the fourth gospel and three epistles, and died there, the only one of the apostles who did not suffer martyrdom. Although traditionally he has been considered the author of the fourth gospel, Revelation, and the three epistles, some modern scholars questioned his authorship; however, the preponderance of opinion among most contemporary biblical scholars now accepts the early tradition that he is the author of these New Testament books.

John is often surnamed "the Divine" because of his theological brilliance and is represented in art as an eagle for the soaring majesty of his gospel. His feast day is December 27.

October is typically a transition month with regards to the return of our seasonal parishioners. Just this past week I saw no less than ten car carriers unloading the vehicles of these seasonal residents. For those who are now returning or have already returned, we wish you a spiritual and fun-filled winter season at St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church.

World Mission Sunday, organized by the Propagation of the Faith, is a day set aside for Catholics worldwide to recommit themselves to the Church's missionary activity through prayer and sacrifice. In 2013, World Mission Sunday is celebrated on October 20. Annually, World Mission Sunday is celebrated on the next-to-last Sunday in October. As described by Pope John Paul II, World Mission Sunday is "an important day in the life of the Church because it teaches how to give: as an offering made to God, in the Eucharistic celebration and for all the missions of the world." We will have a second collection for World Mission Sunday on October 19 and 20.

Believe it or not, on this very same week last year, I was commenting that we were only \$111,500.00 shy of our Catholic Faith Appeal goal with three months remaining. As you know, we raised the \$111,500.00 and another \$60,000.00 for good measure thanks to your incredible generosity. Currently, we are \$58,805.00 shy of our goal for the 2013 appeal with three months remaining. Considering the strong finish we had in 2012, I am very optimistic as to what will happen this year. Remember that every dollar in excess of our goal (\$454,000.00) comes back to the parish "free of assessment" to be used as we choose. Last year's overage was used to enhance several parish ministries and to create capital reserves so that we are able to replace aging AC units in the Parish Life Center.

According to the Catholic Faith Appeal statistics released by the Diocese of Venice, there is plenty of room for growth within our parish as only 30.60% of our registered families are responsible for the funds contributed thus far. If you have yet to make a pledge or contribution to the Catholic Faith Appeal then now is the time to do so. You may contribute by credit card on the DOV website https:// secure.pledgeconnect.com/donation. aspx?catholicgiving, drop a check in the offertory basket made payable to the Catholic Faith Appeal (CFA) with St. John the Evangelist in the memo line, or pick up a pledge card in the

church Narthex. The pledge card may either by dropped in the offertory or mailed to the Diocese of Venice. Thank you in advance for your consideration.

Big Brother is watching! After long last, we now have an active surveillance system in the church. Although there are more cameras which will be added in the next few weeks, we are currently able to see all areas of ingress and egress as well as the "trouble areas" such as poor box/candle box locations. Once we are satisfied with the performance of the system in the church, we will begin installation of the cameras in the Parish Life Center and then the Claussen Family Center.

Last week we switched over to our new service provider for internet and are now taking advantage of much higher upload and download speeds for all applications. The new fiber optic connection was a must for our campus as the new phone system and surveillance system use a considerable amount of bandwidth.

Speaking of the phone system – Although we have installed all of the hardware, we were waiting on the fiber connection to be in place before making the final move. The new phone system should be fully operational this week. Due to the staggered nature that it was installed, there should be absolutely no interruption in service.

I would like to thank Randy McNichols, parishioner and president of Telecom Solutions USA, for his generous gifts of time and talent in assisting us with the setup and implementation of both the phone and surveillance system. Randy is a recent RCIA graduate and has spent an inordinate amount of his personal time making this transition as seamless as possible. Thanks Randy!



The seasonal Flu shot is \$25, the preservative free Flu shot is \$30, High-Dose Flu shot is \$50 and the Pneumonia shot is \$65.

All vaccinations are covered by Medicare Part B and Railroad Medicare.



Lord Increase Our Faith

hen reading the Scriptures, it is important to understand the passages in context. Today's gospel begins with the apostles asking Jesus to "Increase our faith." This request follows a lesson about forgiving the repentant sinner. Through this teaching, Jesus wants his apostles to recognize the importance of tangible faith — a faith that can heal and make a difference. Such faith can be perceived by others when one puts his or her faith into action. The apostles' response is very human. They find it hard to forgive and live this radical grace. Jesus knows the great tension that exists in his disciples and decides to teach them an important life lesson in the form of a parable.

Our faith and our actions must always flow from one another. Can we honestly say that we are people of faith while neglecting the duties of forgiveness and ministry to the vulnerable? Jesus shows us that our faith cannot be isolated — it involves others. For us, faith calls us to the community that we call "Church". We are asked to live our faith in the context of reaching out to others with the wisdom of Jesus. It would be powerful if our prayer as a community would be: "Lord, increase our faith." Once we commit ourselves to faith, we commit ourselves to the constancy of God in our lives. It is the God who calls us to extend the hand of healing to those in pain. Most of us wonder where to start to make this healing a reality. Jesus tells us in the parable of

the mustard seed that the great miracles of faith bear fruit when we dare to plant the small seeds of compassion and truth. By attending to these small seeds, an immense growth of fruit will result from our cultivation of mercy.


Reflection Questions

- 1. What does the mustard seed represent for you?
- 2. In what ways have you planted the seeds of faith for others?
- 3. What energy do you invest in carrying out God's will?
- 4. What would you consider to be the obligations of the Christian faith?
- 5. How do you think you can bear fruit for the gospel?

If we peer beneath the surface of our daily experiences, we will discover that we are living in a wounded world and indeed a wounded Church. It is in this context that we are called to live out our faith. Jesus spoke of the importance of forgiveness, turning away from sin, and the things that separate us from the Father. In the image of the mustard seed we are reminded that if we learn to forgive and turn away from the things that constantly separate us from God, then we will truly be capable of great things. Our challenge is to examine where God is to be found within the community. It is our responsibility to offer support and love to those who suffer. If we know that someone has fallen from grace as a result of sin — it is our responsibility to initiate reconciliation. Once others see our example of forgiveness, they may be inspired to forgive as well. This is what we are called to as a community. True healing takes place in our community when we recognize individuals who are wounded and reach out to them. Then we will see the tangible fruits of our faith. Taking on this responsibility requires the constancy of God's grace working through us. Our sacraments offer this ultimate healing — but in order to celebrate the sacraments in true faith, we must first live the reality of Jesus in our lives.

Prayer

Lord, increase our faith. May we follow you with all our hearts. Teach us the wisdom to know what you want from us. May we always be conscious of those around us. Stir up the flame of faith in our lives so that we may be inspired to reach out to all people in your name. May others find in us a true resting place of your constant love and forgiveness. Amen.





Faith in Jesus Gives Us Power

Faith ties us and connects us to God and to Jesus, God's Son. Faith is not a fact or an opinion. Faith doesn't really have size like small, medium, and large. Faith is a relationship, like the bond or trust between you and your parents. Faith is so deep we don't always even think about it. It's a little like breathing. We live and breathe and trust God's love for us. Like our faith in our parents and their love for us, faith in God is an act of trust. Our faith in God anchors us. We trust all that is good. We trust God loves us. Faith is the kind of trust Jesus had in God even on the cross.

Jesus teaches us that faith as small as a mustard seed is enough to do great things. From Jesus we learn that forgiving, sharing, welcoming outsiders, and loving are the way God acts. To bind ourselves to Jesus in friendship is to bind ourselves to living the same way.

Jesus promises us that faith gives us power to act as he acts. Our faith in Jesus impels us to forgive, include, welcome, and love others as he did.

Every parent hears it sooner or later: "Jane's mom lets her do it." "Dave has a cell phone." "All the other kids are going." I had a merciless approach to corking this whine. I grabbed some stats on what all the other kids (worldwide) were really doing: walking six miles a day to fetch water, going blind from vitamin A deficiency, subsisting on half-cups of rice—you get the idea, and so did my children.

In today's Gospel, Jesus takes a similar tack: Even if we did all we are supposed to do (and none of us can quite manage that), should we expect to be treated any better than people treat their servants? It's only human to want to be rewarded for good work (or even merely for good effort), but thinking we deserve God's consideration is quite another thing.

Luckily for us, God isn't always so strict about meting out justice; we're far more likely to find ourselves on the receiving end of endless mercy. Most of us don't get what we deserve—we get far better.




