Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

Spotlight on Stewardship: Jamaica Outreach Program Shakeefa Mckie

A Most Improved Student At the Dupont School in Jamaica

As a first grader at the Dupont Primary School located on the grounds of our sister parish in Jamaica, Shakeefa Mckie was recently selected as the Most Improved Student at the Dupont School for the academic 2010-2011 year. Shakeefa lives in the inner city of Kingston where her school day begins by walking through slums that are marked by violence, drugs, trash and filth. Her determination to attend school is exceeded only by her enthusiasm for her studies.

If you ask her, Shakeefa will tell you she likes school, she likes to read, and she likes adjectives! Her teacher will tell you how wonderful it is to teach a first grader how to read and how especially wonderful it is that each of her students has his or her own book to learn from. That was not always true at the Dupont School. Shakeefa knows she is lucky to be in school, but what she doesn't know is that the uniform she wears so proudly and the book in her hand and the hands of her classmates were made possible by the JOP's Education Committee and your donated dollars. Something else Shakeefa probably doesn't know, but we do, is that the computer lab and the bright

and cheerful library stocked with books, chairs, and colorful posters didn't just appear out of nowhere; they were supplied by the hard work and diligence of JOP volunteers coupled with the generosity of you and others. We thank you for all of that.

To fill you in on the effect the JOP has had on the Dupont School, a little history needs to be shared. When the JOP first became involved with the school, supplies were totally inadequate, the staff was discouraged, and student achievement extremely low. Since our involvement, the school's scores on a national achievement test have risen from the zero percentile level to the 74th percentile! Success has many faces. Shakeefa's face says it all.

The library and classrooms at Dupont are always in need of books at all grade levels. We supply text books whenever we can, but that isn't the only type of book that



makes up a school. If your bookshelves at home are storing books that your children no longer read, could you possibly donate them to us? Shakeefa and her teacher might be just the reason why you might be inspired to do so. Donations may be left at the main office in the PLC.

I hope that everyone will enjoy a HAPPY THANKSGIVING this coming Thursday. If you are traveling over the holiday to be with family and loved ones, we wish you a safe return. It just so happens that there is another occurrence this same week for which we should give thanks. Fr. John's birthday falls on Saturday, November

26th. Please wish him well on his big day!

Speaking of Thanksgiving, don't forget that the annual Thanksgiving Mass will be celebrated on November 24 at 9:00 a.m. This is a very special Mass for several reasons. Obviously, we are able to give thanks to God for all that He has given us in our lives. In addition, we will have the opportunity to improve the lives of those who are not as fortunate. The entire collection from the Thanksgiving Mass will be given to our St. Vincent De Paul Society to assist families in need in our parish community. I can assure you that the need has never been greater. As many of you have read in the Naples Daily News or seen on TV, the food pantry at the main St. Vincent De Paul office is literally running on empty. Our volunteer caseworkers have also been working feverishly to accommodate all of the calls they have received. The requests are many and those requesting assistance basically have nowhere else to turn. Our Society assists these families on several different levels including, but not limited to, rent assistance, utilities, fuel and food. The families are screened prior to being assigned a caseworker at which time one of our volunteers meets with them to further assess their needs. Many of these families are those who never thought they would be in need of assistance. Believe it or not, some of these families requesting assistance are former supporters of St. Vincent De Paul themselves. Please consider my comments while attending Mass this Thanksgiving and be as generous as possible. As I have said before: The family that you are assisting through your generosity could be sitting right next to you at Mass.

Time is running out for the Pension Protection Act which will expire at the end of this year. Our financial representative has indicated that most money managers/financial advisors have set the date of December 7, 2011 for the cutoff to make such a gift. Several of our parishioners have taken advantage of these favorable guidelines as mentioned in my column last week. For those who are not familiar with the Pension Protection Act, here is a brief summary:

Have you taken advantage of the favorable IRS regulations (Pension Protection Act) regarding distributions from your IRA? Many of you have done so, however, many more may not be aware of this opportunity which will expire in 2012. In an attempt to increase philanthropic giving, the IRS has extended the deadline in which distributions from your IRA may be directed to a charitable organization tax free. Once an individual attains the age of 70 1/2, he or she is required to begin taking minimum distributions from their IRA. This distribution is taxed at the individual's particular tax bracket (15%, 25%, 28%, etc...). For the remainder of the 2011 tax year, you may choose to gift your distribution (up to \$100,000) directly to your favorite charity (i.e. St. John's, Jamaica Outreach, CFA) completely tax free. This is a great opportunity to make a one time gift without the federal government getting their "cut". Please see your financial advisor or tax professional to obtain the forms necessary to make your gift.

As the year end approaches, I have received numerous calls regarding the donation of stock. All stock gifts are processed through the Diocese of Venice for the benefit of St. John the Evangelist. If you would like to make such a year end stock gift, please call the Diocese of Venice at 941-484-9543 and ask for the development office. They will handle the transfer for you and allocate the funds as you request. You may split your gift, however, you like (i.e. 50% for general operating, 35% CFA 15% Jamaica Outreach). The DOV will acknowledge your gift and notify us of the transfer and allocation. You will then receive an acknowledgement from St. John's. Your annual statement will also reflect the gift.

Due to the fact that I had to submit my column very early, there will be no collection information this week. I will include this information in next week's bulletin.

As my form of Thanksgiving to all of you that do so much to make this parish so wonderful, I will not include a plea for the Catholic Faith Appeal or the lighting project this week. Although I make this comment in jest, please know that on behalf of all the clergy and staff, we are forever grateful to our amazing parishioners for sharing your many gifts of time, talent and treasure.







The Guise of Christ

t is hard to believe that we have come to the end of another Liturgical year. During the past year, we journeyed through the gospel of Matthew, the teacher. As we end the year with the great Solemnity of Christ the King we hear the poignant passage of the Last Judgment in Matthew's gospel. Today, Jesus extends his reign to include those who were normally excluded from society. He tells us that whatsoever we do to our brothers and sisters, we actually do to Him. Jesus is clearly calling us to recognize him in the midst of those who are hungry, thirsty, naked, sick, imprisoned, or a stranger. Through the world's eyes this seems to be an unlikely place to find a king, but through God's eyes this is where the king of glory is to be found and attended to. God's presence is always to be discovered where vulnerability exists. God's will is that we become collaborators with him in helping to reach out and attend to the needs around us.

Jesus directly associates himself with a fragile and broken world. He reminds his listeners, as He does with us today, that the Son of Man will judge us according to how we have responded to the vulnerable lives around us. To fail to reach out to the needy is to fail Christ. To treat the broken and their plight with discontent is to treat

Christ with discontent and apathy. The wisdom of today's parable challenged the conventional wisdom of the religious establishment of the day. The poor, sick, and imprisoned were regarded as those with sin and outside the faith. But Jesus gave them the dignity of being sons and daughters of God, making them kingdom people. The gospel today challenges us to dedicate our lives to faith and good works. There are many Christians who argue that faith alone and belief alone is what secures eternal life and a dwelling place with God in heaven. However, as Catholics, we believe that faith must always be accompanied by good works in order to enter the Father's house. There is no mistaking Jesus intended us to grasp this teaching as we listen to the Last Judgment in Matthew's gospel. Jesus tells those who do nothing about the needs around them, "...these will go off to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life."

Are we ready for the challenge? If we are honest, we would probably admit that not a lot has changed. The poor tend to be forgotten by the majority of the world. Even though many are involved in charitable efforts, world hunger and malnutrition still exists in staggering proportions.

There are those who struggle financially and face eviction because of unemployment or bad domestic choices. People's responses to such as these are varied. Some say that this really is not their problem; others frown up such situations and look down at those who find themselves on the poverty line. How many times have we heard or even made judgments about those who cannot hold down a job and depend on the State to feed them? When did we last welcome a stranger into our community? Gospel wisdom challenges us to embrace this issue in the midst of the debate on immigration reform. While there is most certainly a need to secure our sovereign borders, we must never lose sight of those who are trying to flee from poverty and recognize in God's eyes that they are brothers and sisters, made in the image and likeness of God. Similarly, those who are imprisoned are treated with contempt because of their crimes. Society's thirst for retribution often neglects to awaken God's mercy at work in us. In essence, this is where the message of Christ challenges us to the very core of our existence. Christ is calling us to be faithful stewards of creation and the people of the world. Wherever need is perceived, God is to be found, calling us to recognize that the needy are truly our brothers and sisters. As Catholic Christians, we are challenged to be the light and leaven for all those who struggle and are vulnerable. To be faithful witnesses to the message of Jesus, we have to become the voice for the voiceless and strength for the weak.

She took hold of my hand, as she said one word only, "Thank you,", and she died.

In early 2010, Sandi Paniccia approached Fr. John regarding the possibility of establishing a Prayer Garden on Campus. Sandi and her husband (Deacon Frank) agreed to provide the seed money to get the project underway. Fr. John loved the idea and put together a focus group to research possible locations. Sandi had initially envisioned the garden on the west side of the service road adjacent to the church. Unfortunately, that land is deemed a preserve and may not be disturbed. We then decided that we would place the garden on the east side of the service road immediately adjacent to the courtyard. After further research, we found that this space also was mitigated as a preserve and unusable. We then reconvened in the courtyard with Fr. John to discuss alternatives. Fr. John suggested building the garden right where we were standing or on the west side of the courtyard, which is never utilized. Everyone was in agreement that this would make an ideal location. In addition, the infrastructure was already in place and we would only have to make changes to the paver walkways.

Frank and Sandi Paniccia have a strong devotion to St. Francis of Assisi so they asked if the garden could be themed as such. Fr. John agreed and the planning was underway. The garden would have a Tuscan feel with landscaping to compliment. There would also be a beautiful water feature as a focal point of the garden with a statue of St. Francis of Assisi perched atop the waterfall.

During a preliminary planning meeting, Sandi suggested allowing the parishioners the opportunity to purchase the Stations of the Cross as a way to memorialize or honor loved ones. In addition to creating a personal touch in the prayer garden, this would allow the parish to raise the funds necessary to complete the garden. Fr. John agreed with Sandi's

idea, and also suggested that we include granite benches to compliment those that were planned for the memorial garden.

On February 11, fundraising efforts began to sell the 14 Stations of the Cross and six benches. During this process we added a very large mosaic to be located on the north side of the garden and a fountain to be located in the gazebo, which serves as the main entrance. We also added two more benches in the gazebo opposite the fountain. Due to the generosity of our parishioners, the Stations, benches, statue of St. Francis of Assisi, fountain and the mosaic all sold before the end of May. There was actually a waiting list for Stations of the Cross.

In early June, we officially broke ground for the Paniccia Prayer Garden. Since that time, the garden has been obscured by a very large construction fence. You can see towering Italian Cypress trees extending above the fence line. The landscaping is absolutely tremendous and has had much of the rainy season in which to become established and thrive. We have developed a truly beautiful and spiritual space that will far exceed everyone's expectations. The Prayer Garden is nearing completion with only some minor touch up work remaining. We are planning to dedicate the Paniccia Prayer Garden on December 4 following the 9:00 a.m. Mass. We hope that you can join us to celebrate this momentous occasion.

We would like to sincerely thank each and every parishioner who gave so generously in order to make the Prayer Garden a reality. Due to space limitations, we will not list every donor, however, join us for the dedication and see the beauty of their gifts in real life. Each Station, bench, etc. will prominently display the name of the donor and the loved one they are remembering or honoring.


