# **Veterans Remembrance Mass**

Over 450 of the faithful attended the Veterans Remembrance Mass on Thursday, November 10. Sponsored by the Knights of Columbus, Fr. John celebrated the 9:00 a.m. Mass, which included dozens of veterans and their loved ones.

Prelude music by Tom Oram, Peter Heaney, Phyllis Gryskiewicz, Melissa McCormick, Ellie VanderMeuse and the St. John Choir, included theme songs from the series Pacific, Band of Brothers, Ashokan Farewell (Civil War), Eternal Father Strong to Save, and God Bless the USA.

The Harp and Thistle Pipe Band led the procession into church, with members of the Knights of Columbus Color Corps, the Marine Corps Color Guard and our beloved veterans following to the tune of the Minstrel Boy.

In his homily, Fr. John asked all veterans to stand and be recognized, then requested only the WW II veterans remain standing. The congregation gave the men who saved the world a well-deserved round of applause. He called these brave men, some only teenagers, who went off to save our nation real heroes.

Fr. John showed a miniature statue of the a member of the Armed Forces in battle fatigues being hugged by Christ, and he made a promise that a life size replica would be on the St. John grounds in the near future.

The Marine Corps Rifle team rendered a three volley salute to the fallen, and taps were played by Sgt. Robert McDonald, US Army Air Force (Retired).

At the end of Mass, Fr. John and Grand Knight Jim Follese, St. John Council 11281 Knights of Columbus, presented a posthumus Fourth Degree Assembly award to Arthur J. Corr for services to his family, his friends and his country. Accepting the award was Artie's widow, Pat Corr, and son, Ken. The Arthur J. Corr Fourth Degree Assembly 3308 was founded following Artie's passing as a tribute to a man who was a True Knight.

### Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.



# **Cash Gifts**

A cash contribution can lower your tax payment to the Federal Government.

# Gifts of Life Insurance

Life Insurance can be used to create a major gift at relatively low cost to the donor. If the Diocese or Catholic Community Foundation is named owner or beneficiary of a new or existing policy, the donor receives a tax deduction. Additional premiums paid through the Foundation are tax deductible, and proceeds pass to your designated parish, school or Catholic program, free of estate tax upon your passing.

# A Gift of Stock - Provides Tax Advantages

A gift of appreciated stocks can provide you with the best tax advantages. You will get a charitable deduction for the fair market value of the stock, just as you would if your gift was made with cash, and you do not incur capital gains tax on the appreciation. If you cannot use all of the income tax charitable deduction resulting from the gift, you can carry it forward for as many as five years! You can also sell stocks that have lost value, contribute the proceeds of the sale and receive a capital loss tax break.

# **How to Transfer a Gift of Stock**

Call the Development Department to facilitate a transfer of stock. Be sure to let us know if your gift is being restricted for a certain use such as a building fund, scholarships, CFA or unrestricted for the greatest need.

# **Gift of Real Estate**

Avoid capital gains tax on the sale of a home or land.

You can stay in your home for the rest of your life, receive tax deductions and avoid capital gains tax on the sale of a home or land.

# **Charitable Gift Annuities**

Charitable Gift Annuities provide for your own and your family's financial future with a dependable, secure, and unchanging life income. You write a check or give securities to the Catholic Community Foundation for the benefit of your parish, Catholic school or the diocese, and we agree to pay you a fixed payment for as long as you live at a rate above those paid by banks! In addition, you receive an initial tax deduction for the gift and a substantial amount of your payment comes to you tax-free.

Example: For a person of 75 years of age, a \$20,000 cash gift, will produce an annual fixed payment of \$1,300 for the rest of her/his life, \$993 of which is tax-free, and a tax deduction of \$7,678 which can be used for up to five years.

The minimum amount required to establish a CGA is \$5,000.

I have had to submit three weeks worth of Scott's Corner in a very consolidated period of time. So much so that I am not sure of which week I am writing. But here goes...

I hope that everyone enjoyed a HAPPY THANKSGIVING this past Thursday. If you were traveling over the holiday to be

with family and loved ones, we wish you a safe return.

We have yet to experience any unseasonably cold weather to speak of here in "paradise" this fall with the exception of a very short lived cool snap several weeks ago. Many up north have also not experienced any miserable winter conditions as of yet. These miserable conditions are usually "just what the doctor ordered" to chase the remaining seasonal residents out of their residences up north and bring them down to Southwest Florida. There used to be a very clear pattern with the seasonal travel habits of our winter residents. Many that have dual residences would come down in late October/early November and open up their winter homes. They would then stay with us until the week before Thanksgiving and head back up north to spend the holidays, returning in the middle of January. Over the past couple of years, this pattern has changed. Many of our winter residents are foregoing their fall visit and instead arriving after the first of the year. Easter also plays a major role in the length

of time our seasonal residents remain in Southwest Florida, especially for those who rent versus own. I am overly optimistic that the current poor state of our economy will not prevent those who rent from making their annual trek to Southwest Florida for the winter months. Many that rent do so on a month-to-month basis and will generally stay in Naples until Easter. Easter in 2012 will fall on April 4.

This means that many of our winter residents will stay through the month of April in 2012. Why am I discussing the seasonal travel patterns of our winter residents? Because these travel patterns have a substantial effect on our local economy. As we are all aware, the Naples economy is heavily based on tourism. Many of our work force are employed in the service industry and count on our seasonal residents to survive. If our seasonal residents arrive one month later or depart even one month early, this will have a dramatic effect on the ability for many that rely on their economic influx to survive. This is certainly the case

here at St. John the Evangelist. As I have stated before, we generally operate "in the red" 7 out of 12 months. Our seasonal parishioners are crucial in allowing us to build a surplus in the winter so that we may sustain during the very lean summer months. Let us pray that the local and nationwide economy improves in short order and that we have long and prosperous winter season.

Did you notice the beautiful addition to the narthex of the church? Last year at the International Catholic Stewardship Conference I was given the idea by a parish in California to design and build a "Ministry Wagon" so that our numerous ministries could display their literature. It just so happens that we have an incredibly talented carpenter in our parish. I presented the idea to Marty Gauthier and he graciously agreed to build the wagon. Marty constructed this beautiful piece by hand from scratch with no template. He is an amazing steward of his time and talent and we are blessed to have him at St. John the Evangelist. The next step is to populate the open sleeves on the wagon. If you would like your ministry included in the wagon, please see me for specifications on the size of your flyer.

Did you know that the mosaic to be located in the north end of the Paniccia Prayer Garden is being designed and built by one of our parishioners? Julie Kwiatkowski has been working for several months to fabricate this massive 5' x 9' mosaic featuring

a scene from the city of Assisi in Italy. For those familiar with mosaics, this is a very painstaking process involving the manipulation of thousands of pieces of small tiles. Julie sent me a picture from her studio of the work in progress, which I have included in my column. She is performing all of this work as a gift of time and talent and we are very grateful. Thanks, Julie, for all your hard work and we look

your hard work and we look forward to seeing the finished product for the dedication of the Prayer Garden.

The miniatures sculptures of the Blessed Mother, St. John the Evangelist and the crucifix are slated to arrive from December 9 - December 12. This is a far cry from the original arrival date of mid September. When they arrive, our team of volunteers will contact those of you that purchased the statues to arrange for pick up. Although there has been a lengthy delay, we are confident that the finished product will be well worth the wait.

Please offer what you can and join me in supporting this Annual Collection, and in praying for God's continued blessing on our nation's elder sisters, brothers and religious order priests.







# A Season of Holy Longing – Be Watchful!

s we begin a new Liturgical Year, we take step back to examine the divine drama of when heaven's treasure is deposited upon the earth. The First Sunday of Advent invites us into a period of holy longing; a time of prayerful reflection upon the mystery of the Incarnation. Sometimes it is hard to grasp this reality when the world is already celebrating Christmas. Our neighborhoods, stores, places of recreation and clubs have already got all the decorations up and Christmas music is heard everywhere. The Church gifts us with the season of advent every year so that we can really discern and examine what the coming of Christ means to us. Today's gospel reminds us that we have been endowed with responsibilities until the Lord returns. We are to be watchful for the day when the Lord will come to us, ensuring that we have been faithful stewards on this earthly pilgrimage.




There is a tendency among people to almost look at the celebration through the eyes of a child and relive the chronological events surrounding the Incarnation. We most certainly must approach our preparation for the Christmas event with the mind of an adult but also the heart of a child. Our adult minds make us aware of why the event of the Incarnation took place. The world had separated itself from God and was awaiting its redeemer and savior. In the midst of this longing, Jesus became flesh and lived among us. The divine drama that

unfolded around his birth will forever warm the hearts of children for years to come and rekindle the light of the child that still lives in each one of us. The coming of Jesus Christ in Bethlehem with stories of angels, shepherds, and kings is almost told as if were a fairy tale, but the reality of Jesus' life mission challenges the adult life to its core.

Advent celebrates the 'coming' of the Lord. As a people of God and members of His Church we are entrusted with his mission to proclaim the good news of the kingdom. While memories of childhood crèches warm the heart, the conviction of Jesus' compassion sets our hearts on fire. The gospel challenges us to be alert at all times and watch for the time of the Lord's arrival. Since Christ has already been made Incarnate, we are invited to be alert to the subtleties of His presence around us. Advent constantly reminds us that Jesus is Emmanuel – that is, God-with-us. We pray this advent that we will allow God to be with us in all that we do and say.

# Wisdom of the Fathers

"Today, with the First Sunday of Advent, we begin a new liturgical year. This season invites us to reflect on the dimension of time, which always exerts great fascination over us. However, after the example of what Jesus loved to do, I wish to start with a very concrete observation: we all say that we do not have enough time, because the pace of daily life has become frenetic for everyone. In this regard too, the Church has "good news" to bring: God gives us his time. We always have little time; especially for the Lord, we do not know how or, sometimes, we do not want to find it. Well, God has time for us! This is the first thing that the beginning of a liturgical year makes us rediscover with ever new amazement. Yes, God gives us his time, because he entered history with his Word and his works of salvation to open it to eternity, to make it become a covenantal history. In this prospective, already in itself time is a fundamental sign of God's love: a gift that man, as with everything else, is able to make the most of or, on the contrary, to waste; to take in its significance or to neglect with obtuse superficiality.

.....The liturgical season of Advent celebrates the coming of God in its two moments: it first invites us to reawaken our expectation of Christ's glorious return, then, as Christmas approaches, it calls us to welcome the Word made man for our salvation. Yet the Lord comes into our lives continually. How timely then, is Jesus' call, which on this First Sunday is powerfully proposed to us: "Watch!" (Mk 13: 33, 35, 37). It is addressed to the disciples but also to everyone, because each one, at a time known to God alone, will be called to account for his life. This involves a proper detachment from earthly goods, sincere repentance for one's errors, active charity to one's neighbor and above all a humble and confident entrustment to the hands of God, our tender and merciful Father."

# **Beautiful Granite Benches Adorn Prayer and Memorial Gardens and Main Church Entrance**

This is the final installment in a series of eight describing the improvements made to our campus during the past year. We discussed the church renovation, liturgical enhancements, adoration chapel, statues of the Blessed Mother and St. John the Evangelist, the crucifix, memorial garden, prayer garden, and we will now commence with the granite memorial benches. As a result, we now have 22 custom made butterfly blue granite benches with silver lithograph engraving. The benches are located in the Memorial Garden (10), Prayer Garden (8) and in front of the main church entrance (4). The sale of the benches was an instrumental

component in allowing us to finish the Prayer Garden and further enhance the Memorial Garden. We began offering the benches for sale in February of this year and by the end of May they were all spoken for. Thank you once again to all of our parishioners that took advantage of this opportunity.


