Paniccia Prayer Garden Provides Sacred Space for Prayer

The vision that Deacon Frank and Sandi Paniccia had of a prayer garden located on the campus of St. John the Evangelist came to fruition with the dedication of the Paniccia Prayer Garden Friday evening, December 2.

The dedication took place just at dusk showcasing the prayer garden in all its lighted splendor. Spiritual readings by both Fr. John and Deacon Frank, along with music were highlights of the dedication. Some of the songs were: The Taize "Stay With Me", Sebastian Temple's "Prayer of St. Francis", and Ps 84, "How Lovely Is Your Dwelling Place"(setting by Tom Oram, pastoral musician).

From the benches to the Stations of the Cross to a mosaic depicting a scene from the city of Assisi in Italy, the prayer garden became a reality through the generosity of many donors, in addition to Deacon Frank and Sandi.

Fr. John blessed each feature in the Paniccia Prayer Garden, including all the benches, the stations of the cross, the mosaic, the fountain and the St. Francis of Assisi statue, the focal point of the garden. Afterwards, all the attendees accompanied Fr. John to the Memorial Garden and then into church where he blessed all the new features of both of these areas:

fountains, benches, the new Stations of the Cross inside the church, as well as the statues of St. John the Evangelist, the Blessed Virgin Mary, the tabernacle and candlesticks.

Following the dedication, all the donors and their guests enjoyed a reception back at the PLC.

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

I saw Christ today, In the clothes of a beggar he stood With outstretched hands he called to me


A heart waiting to be understood.



The Christ of Promise

t would seem that today's gospel is a repeat of last Sunday's gospel. We hear John's gospel echo the message of Mark's gospel last week. Once again we focus on the character of John the Baptist. The fourth gospel account emphasizes the role of the Baptist. He is not Elijah or one of the prophets from of old, neither is he the Christ. John describes himself as the fulfillment of the Prophet of Isaiah — he is the voice crying out to the world of his time to make straight the way of the Lord. He was no stranger to the dark realities of people's lives. Indeed, he called them to conversion and repentance. John the Baptist's mission is to prepare the world for the coming of Christ and to testify to the light.

Reflection Questions


- 1. What does it mean to testify to the light?
- 2. What are the areas of darkness in your life/relationships that need to be illuminated by Christ's presence?
- 3. How is Jesus the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy, i.e. sent to bring glad tidings to the poor, healing to the broken hearted, liberty to captives?
- 4. In what ways will you bring glad tidings to the poor?
- 5. Is there anyone in your life that you know is broken-hearted?
- 6. If so, how will you help in the healing process?
- 7. What holds you or others you know captive?
- 8. How will you use the grace of Christ to transform that situation(s)?

Little did John know how powerful the coming of Christ would be. In today's reading from Isaiah, we hear of the anointed one who was sent to bring glad tidings to the poor, healing to the broken, liberty to the captives, release to prisoners and to announce the year of the Lord. This anointing blessed the world when Jesus began his public ministry and all these things came to pass. The coming of Jesus as the Christ (Anointed One) brings with it the healing and comfort of heaven. Jesus' presence brought transformation for those who encountered him during his ministry on earth. The life and ministry of Jesus Christ enabled the world to be touched directly by the hand of God. Jesus situated himself in the midst of the poor, the vulnerable, the sinner, the outcast, the broken, the unwanted and the unwelcomed. In all of these experiences, he was ultimately teaching us how to love and live our lives. Jesus is indeed the Anointed One who empowers us to be anointed and continue his saving work by virtue of our baptism. We are all anointed in baptism to be priest, prophet and heirs to the kingdom of heaven. In concrete that means as the priesthood of all believers, that we become people of charity who are able to sacrifice ourselves for the sake of the kingdom.

In our works of charity we become signs of hope for those who are poor. In the prophetic nature of our baptism, we are constantly challenged to discern God's will in regard to the problems that exist in our society and our world. We are called to speak out with the courage of a prophet if we know that something is wrong and goes against what God intended when he created the world. We have to live everyday knowing that our journey's end will bring us to a kingdom where right relationship is restored and we are reconciled with God.

As we enter the third week of our advent season, we rejoice in the Lord's initiative to save us. Preparing for Christmas does not only bring beautiful memories of childhoods gone by; it reminds us of why Christ came in the first place. The advent season calls to mind our salvation in Christ. It reminds us of the promise given in our baptism. It recalls all the hopes and expectations of those who waited in faith for the coming of the Messiah. As Christians, we know that Jesus has already come to the world and departed it to be seated at the right hand of the Father in heaven. However, we await the second coming of Christ with hope and faithfilled expectation. The dream of the Christian is to look upon the face of Jesus one day and gaze into his heart. In the meantime, we experience his presence veiled in the Eucharist and are called to recognize him in the needs around us. During this time of preparation, we are asked to reach out to those who will have nothing this Christmas or know one to care for them. This is our calling and challenge as we wait for Christ to come to each one of us.





Prayer

We Pray: Heavenly Father, help us to prepare ourselves for the second coming of your Son. Thank you for the generosity that you have shown us by sending your Son into the world to save us from sin. Let us remember with great joy the event of the Incarnation and the revelation of your Word made flesh. May we be challenged by the word and example Jesus shared through the proclamation of the good news. Find us ready to experience the fullness of your presence this Christmas. Amen.

The Advent Wreath — Full of Symbolic Meaning

How many times have we looked at an Advent wreath? How many times have we understood what it represents? Perhaps we intuitively know that evergreens are a symbol of eternal life, and that light is a symbol of Christ, the Light of the World, but what else? There are many layers of meaning beneath this simple but lovely image of the season — perhaps the iconic symbol of the season of Advent.

That the four candles are the four weeks of Advent seems clear, but what is with the rose candle (popularly called the "pink" one)? This is for the Third Sunday of Advent, Gaudete ("rejoice!") Sunday. Why do we rejoice? Because Advent is half over! (Interestingly, the Fourth Sunday of Lent, Laetare

("rejoice!") Sunday is colored rose for the same reason. However, since there is no "Lent Wreath" the similarity is often overlooked.)

One modern adaptation we employ here at St. John is the addition of the white candle in the center — a candle for Christmas!

Particular to St. John is the addition of the altar runners — for each week of Advent, members of the Arts & Liturgical Environment Committee add a strip of cloth, similar to the candles of the wreath.

John the Baptist's Testimony to Himself

Who are we? John the Baptist was asked this same question. Sometimes our identity is tied to another person. We are Bill's wife, Ann's husband, Andy's mom, or Mary's daughter. Like John the Baptist, we sometimes define ourselves by who we are not. However, we are the same thing as John and that is a herald—the person who brings the Good News about Jesus Christ into the lives of others. We need to bring the Good News into our families through our faithful participation in worship, prayer and actions.

What can a parent do?

A Lived Faith

An important step in raising children in the Catholic faith is enrolling them in Catholic school or sending them to parish religious education. But this is only the beginning. The most important thing is showing our children how to live their faith each and every day. This kind of education can only come from a Catholic parent.

Why did the Magi give gifts to Jesus?

The Magi knew that they were greeting a new king and brought gifts that were proper for a king at the time. Over time, the Church has interpreted the gifts in terms of Jesus' life. The gold recognized Jesus' royalty. The expensive Frankincense was a symbol of his priesthood, and Myrrh was a sign that Jesus would suffer and die for us.






