With selections from the gospels of Matthew, Luke, and John, accompanied by reflections written by Fr. John, dozens of young people from the parish will reenact the wonder and beauty of the Incarnation of our Lord.

We are providing *a free pasta supper before the concert, at 6:00 p.m. in the ballroom*. Families especially are invited to attend this supper with their children before bringing the children over to the church for the program.

Of course, there will be plenty of music, featuring several soloists and ensembles, including our Children's Choir and Contemporary Ensemble. But it will be an extra special night for our Adult Choir as well. Not only will they be contributing several anthems, but their first album will also be released that evening as well!



*La Vergine degli Angeli: Live From Rome* is a recording of the concert we gave in the Basilica of Our Lady of the Angels & Martyrs in Rome on Tuesday, February 5 of this year. It was well-attended and well-received, as you'll be able to hear! Works by Verdi, Mozart, Oram, and Ludden are featured among its 15 tracks; surely many parishioners will enjoy having a live recording of Fr. John singing his famous setting of "An Irish Blessing" with the choir. Other soloists include Jennine Fuentes, Dino Valle, and of course, Ellie Roberts.

#### Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:15 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

#### Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

December 28 is the Feast of the Holy Innocents. The feast day officially remembers all the male children slaughtered by Herod's order in an effort to kill the newborn king of the Jews. Those little boys were the first martyrs for Jesus. Likewise, in the modern age, we recognize all the innocents; those babies who were never born, or those who died in childhood.

Here at St. John, we commemorate these children in a special way on their feast day. On Saturday, December 28, the 8:00 a.m. Mass will be said for all those who have suffered a pregnancy loss, or born the grief of the death of a child. Before the Mass, you will be invited to enter your child or children's names in the Book of the Innocents. You can then take a rose to the altar for each child you have listed in the book. The children listed in the book will be remembered in that Mass, as well as all of us who are left to remember their precious lives, however short they might have been.

## Gaudete Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent

Gaudete Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent, gets its name from the first word of its Introit, or Entrance Antiphon, for the day: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say rejoice. Indeed, the Lord is near." (*Phil. 4:4-5*) Why do we rejoice? Because the third Sunday of Advent always means that we are more than halfway to Christmas (*cf.* the modern "celebration" of Wednesday as "hump day" of the traditional work week). Thus, the liturgical color of the day is rose, the color of joy, although more often observed on the Advent wreath than on your priest's chasuble (*cf.* the less-common expression, "in the pink")! Interestingly, the 4th Sunday of Lent is Laetare Sunday (also "Rejoice!") for the same reason. These are the only two Sundays of the church year when the liturgical color is rose. (You might not have known that, though, since there's no "Lent wreath".)







# A Dream Come True

C

ohn the Baptist is the great model of preparation as we move forward through this holy season of Advent. He spent his life preaching repentance and urged people to prepare themselves to meet the promised one. In today's gospel, we hear of John's longing to know whether or not Jesus was the dream of God. John is in prison because of his witness to the truth. Even though he gives witness to Christ at the Jordan River, he begins to doubt in his isolation — he needs reassurance. Jesus' response is very clear: "Tell John what you hear and see: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and poor have the good news proclaimed to them." This is the prophecy of Isaiah fulfilled; the dream of the people of Israel comes true. John the Baptist was the messenger, and Jesus was certainly the message. Jesus continues to reassure us that he is the answer to our prayers; it is through him that God's dream for each of us is realized. The coming of the Messiah brought with it the advent of healing and restoration. This is what we are asked to focus on as we approach the sacred time of the Incarnation. In the Christmas event, humanity is redeemed, restored, and made whole by the events surrounding Jesus' life, death, and



resurrection. As we approach the story where extraordinary events surrounded the unlikely location of a Savior's birth, we are reminded that all this took place for each one of us.

The needs of our time are not unlike the needs that Isaiah and Jesus discerned. The world still requires healing. People remain feeble, weak, frightened, poor, and needy. In a sense we long for Jesus in the midst of our challenges just as much as John the Baptist longed to know if Jesus was the one who is to come. We are asked to wait patiently for the Lord as we discern his presence in our lives. Faced with many challenges, we must remember that Jesus walks with us throughout those experiences offering us hope. How do we know this for sure? The answer lies with faith. Without faith we have no hope. With faith, we

have the assurance of everlasting life and are given the promise that we will never be left alone. Jesus is with us until the end of time!

There is a danger in viewing the past events of the gospel as if they are a reality beyond our reach. In the event of the Incarnation, we are reminded that redemption and salvation are readily available to each one of us. Every time Jesus heals someone in the gospel, *he is teaching us how we may be healed or how we can heal one another through faith*. Jesus shows us the way to the Father every time that he reaches out to the feeble and the weak. Each of Jesus' parables and teachings give us the blueprint of how to live our lives — opening us to the heart of our God. This is what salvation in Christ means — to know God and to live in His ways. In living the gospel, we keep the dream of God alive!

## Prayer

Come, Lord Jesus. Enter into our lives with your healing. Make strong our feeble hearts and make us firm. Alleviate the fear that undermines our courage and strengthen our hope in your lasting goodness. Amen.



#### REFLECTION

In Sunday's Gospel John the Baptist raises a question we often ask: Who is Jesus? Is he the long-awaited Messiah? Jesus sends John a message – the deaf hear, the blind see, lame people leap, lepers are healed, the dead are raised, and Jesus preaches to the poor.

Jesus' message tells us not only who he is but also who we, his followers, are. Jesus and his followers are people who heal, who give life to others, who reach out especially to the poor.

Working for justice for poor people is one of the most important ways we can follow the Gospel. To follow Jesus is not to get ahead with God for one's self. 
## "We are Catholic" Says Patrick Madrid, Renowned Radio Network Host

We caught up with Anthony at school to see how he's keeping the faith while staying busy in school:



What are you liking best about college so far? My favorite part about college thus far is the freedom. There are so many new experiences to be had and friends to be made and the freedom I have allows me to take part in everything I want to do. Unlike high school, I'm not in class all day from 7-2 so I have a lot more time to get involved.

What's proven the most challenging thing? The freedom! Having a lot of free time can be blessing, but it was hard to acclimate to at first. I found that to avoid abusing it and getting no work done, I had to



dedicate time each day to my studies and not Netflix.

Has it been easy to practice your faith at FSU? How so? It has been easy to practice my faith so far because I chose to get involved in a Catholic group (Catholic Student Union) run by the Brotherhood of Hope. This group has provided me with wonderful friends and opportunities to grow in my faith. The friends I made there provide me with the motivation to attend the group's events, and Sunday Mass when I'd rather just sleep.

How is the Catholic community there? What's it like, etc. The Catholic community here is very loving and accepting. My first time attending a CSU event, I felt extremely welcome. Everyone there wants to get to know you; the brothers are easy to talk to, and actively seek to create a relationship with you.

What were your fondest memories of youth ministry at St. John? My fondest memories of the youth group are the mission trip to St. Lucia and the snorkeling trip we took.

What advice would you give to high school students about keeping the faith? My advice to high school students about keeping the faith is surround yourself with friends that share your faith, for it is friendships built on Christ that last. Those friends are the ones that will build up and push you to grow. I would also advise you to ask lots of questions. If something is bothering you about the faith, do not keep it inside. Ask someone. Have your concerns addressed. My last piece of advice would be to always keep talking to God. Our relationship with God is like any other; if you don't keep talking to him, if you don't seeking to strengthen the relationship, it will fade.


