

Pope Francis Seeks Input from the Faithful

The Synod of Bishops will be convening a meeting in the Fall of 2014 to discuss the pastoral challenges to the family in the context of the new evangelization. Pope Francis has called on the bishops of the Church to listen to the faithful in regard to the challenges they face when living out their faith in today's society. St. John the Evangelist Parish will be holding a listening session on Wednesday, December 11th, 2013 at 5.30 p.m. to facilitate the Holy Father's request. During this meeting, people will have time to offer comments and considerations on the questions outlined on pages 5 - 7. These questions have been sent to the conferences of bishops across the globe. It may be helpful for some to visit our parish website at: www.saintjohtheevangelist.com to view background information on the questions that are being asked.

During the listening session, notes will be taken and a summary of the meeting will be sent to the diocese. Once all of the parishes of the Diocese of Venice submit their summaries, Bishop Frank J. Dewane will then submit these findings to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, who in turn will then submit their data to the Vatican during the Extraordinary Synod of Bishops.

I would like to encourage you as members of the Body of Christ to participate in this pastoral endeavor in which the pastoral dimensions of the local Church may shed light on some of the pastoral challenges facing the Church universal. It is my hope that people of various ages will come to this important meeting.

Let us prayerfully reflect upon and consider the questions. I look forward to seeing you at this important event.

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:15 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Vatican Questionnaire

The following series of questions allows the particular Churches to participate actively in the preparation of the Extraordinary Synod, whose purpose is to proclaim the Gospel in the context of the pastoral challenges facing the family today.

- 1. The Diffusion of the Teachings on the Family in Sacred Scripture and the Church's Magisterium
 - a) Describe how the Catholic Church's teachings on the value of the family contained in the Bible, *Gaudium et spes, Familiaris consortio* and other documents of the post-conciliar Magisterium is understood by people today? What formation is given to our people on the Church's teaching on family life?
 - b) In those cases where the Church's teaching is known, is it accepted fully or are there difficulties in putting it into practice? If so, what are they?
 - c) How widespread is the Church's teaching in pastoral programmes at the national, diocesan and parish levels? What catechesis is done on the family?
 - d) To what extent and what aspects in particular is this teaching actually known, accepted, rejected and/or criticized in areas outside the Church? What are the cultural factors which hinder the full reception of the Church's teaching on the family?
- 2. Marriage According to the Natural Law
 - a) What place does the idea of the natural law have in the cultural areas of society: in institutions, education, academic circles and among the people at large? What anthropological ideas underlie the discussion on the natural basis of the family?
 - b) Is the idea of the natural law in the union between a man and a woman commonly accepted as such by the baptized in general?

- c) How is the theory and practice of natural law in the union between man and woman challenged in light of the formation of a family? How is it proposed and developed in civil and Church institutions?
- d) In cases where non-practicing Catholics or declared non-believers request the celebration of marriage, describe how this pastoral challenge is dealt with?

3. The Pastoral Care of the Family in Evangelization

- a) What experiences have emerged in recent decades regarding marriage preparation? What efforts are there to stimulate the task of evangelization of the couple and of the family? How can an awareness of the family as the "domestic Church" be promoted?
- b) How successful have you been in proposing a manner of praying within the family which can withstand life's complexities and today's culture?
- c) In the current generational crisis, how have Christian families been able to fulfill their vocation of transmitting the faith?
- d) In what way have the local Churches and movements on family spirituality been able to create ways of acting which are exemplary?
- e) What specific contribution can couples and families make to spreading a credible and holistic idea of the couple and the Christian family today?
- f) What pastoral care has the Church provided in supporting couples in formation and couples in crisis situations?

4. Pastoral Care in Certain Difficult Marital Situations

- a) Is cohabitation *ad experimentum* a pastoral reality in your particular Church? Can you approximate a percentage?
- b) Do unions which are not recognized either religiously or civilly exist? Are reliable statistics available?
- c) Are separated couples and those divorced and remarried a pastoral reality in your particular Church? Can you approximate a percentage? How do you deal with this situation in appropriate pastoral programmes?
- d) In all the above cases, how do the baptized live in this irregular situation? Are they aware of it? Are they simply indifferent? Do they feel marginalized or suffer from the impossibility of receiving the sacraments?
- e) What questions do divorced and remarried people pose to the Church concerning the Sacraments of the Eucharist and of Reconciliation? Among those persons who find themselves in these situations, how many ask for these sacraments?
- f) Could a simplification of canonical practice in recognizing a declaration of nullity of the marriage bond provide a positive contribution to solving the problems of the persons involved? If yes, what form would it take?
- g) Does a ministry exist to attend to these cases? Describe this pastoral ministry? Do such programmes exist on the national and diocesan levels? How is God's mercy proclaimed to separated couples and those divorced and remarried and how does the Church put into practice her support for them in their journey of faith?

5. On Unions of Persons of the Same Sex

a) Is there a law in your country recognizing civil unions for people of the same-sex and equating it in

some way to marriage?

- b) What is the attitude of the local and particular Churches towards both the State as the promoter of civil unions between persons of the same sex and the people involved in this type of union?
- c) What pastoral attention can be given to people who have chosen to live in these types of union?
- d) In the case of unions of persons of the same sex who have adopted children, what can be done pastorally in light of transmitting the faith?

6. The Education of Children in Irregular Marriages

- a) What is the estimated proportion of children and adolescents in these cases, as regards children who are born and raised in regularly constituted families?
- b) How do parents in these situations approach the Church? What do they ask? Do they request the sacraments only or do they also want catechesis and the general teaching of religion?
- c) How do the particular Churches attempt to meet the needs of the parents of these children to provide them with a Christian education?
- d) What is the sacramental practice in these cases: preparation, administration of the sacrament and the accompaniment?

7. The Openness of the Married Couple to Life

a) What knowledge do Christians have today of the teachings of *Humanae vitae* on responsible parenthood? Are they aware of how morally to evaluate the different methods of family planning? Could any insights be suggested in this regard pastorally?

- b) Is this moral teaching accepted? What aspects pose the most difficulties in a large majority of couple's accepting this teaching?
- c) What natural methods are promoted by the particular Churches to help spouses put into practice the teachings of *Humanae vitae*?
- d) What is your experience on this subject in the practice of the Sacrament of Penance and participation at the Eucharist?
- e) What differences are seen in this regard between the Church's teaching and civic education?
- f) How can a more open attitude towards having children be fostered? How can an increase in births be promoted?

- 8. The Relationship Between the Family and the Person
 - a) Jesus Christ reveals the mystery and vocation of the human person. How can the family be a privileged place for this to happen?
 - b) What critical situations in the family today can obstruct a person's encounter with Christ?
 - c) To what extent do the many crises of faith which people can experience affect family life?

9. Other Challenges and Proposals

What other challenges or proposals related to the topics in the above questions do you consider urgent and useful to treat?

Feast of the Holy Innocents Memorial Mass December 28

The season of Advent is upon us, reminding us again to be hopeful and to wait. We are noting the final month of development for our spiritually adopted babies. Like many pregnant mothers, this month seems to last the longest, because it is so hard to just wait.

We must also remember that sometimes the waiting does not bear the expected results. Sometimes the pregnancy ends with a stillborn child, or the waiting was cut short by a miscarriage. Sometimes the entire inconvenient waiting period was terminated with an abortion. For all of these sad endings, God has given us hope. He is always our hope. For every child lost in pregnancy, there is a soul in heaven who is waiting to meet again with her parents in eternity. My own child, Ann Teresa, who died in an abortion in 1979, is waiting for me. Our little treasures, the babies who never became adults, have their own feast day on the church calendar. December 28 is the Feast of the Holy Innocents. The feast day officially remembers all the male children slaughtered by Herod's order

in an effort to kill the newborn king of the Jews. Those little boys were the first martyrs for Jesus. Likewise, in the modern age, we recognize all the innocents; those babies who were never born, or those who died in childhood.

Here at St. John, we commemorate these children in a special way on their feast day. On Saturday, December 28, the 8:00 a.m. Mass will be said for all those who have suffered a pregnancy loss, or born the grief of the death of a child. Before the Mass, you will be invited to enter your child or children's names in the Book of the Innocents. You can then take a rose to the altar for each child you have listed in the book. The children listed in the book will be remembered in that Mass, as well as all of us who are left to remember their precious lives, however short they might have been.

Pre-registration is not required.







The Revolution of Hope

s we gather to listen to the Sacred Scriptures on this Second Sunday of Advent, we are certainly encouraged to have hope. John the Baptist presents himself as the wild and unlikely prophet who foretells the coming of the promised Messiah — the one who would set the world on fire! His message is clear: Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand...make straight His paths. As we continue along the Christian way, we are asked to prepare ourselves to receive Jesus into our lives as we approach the day of his birth. Our preparation should reflect our longing for God and a willingness to accept the message that Christ himself left as an eternal gift to the world.

Each individual lives a certain context in the world today. We live in specific communities, within specific states, and within specific countries. Our identity is forged by the world community into which we are born. As people of faith, we also find ourselves within yet another context. From the beginning of time, God sent patriarchs and prophets to lead us deeper into the reality of His unfailing love. The prophet Isaiah certainly sets the stage for a day of hope where all will experience unity and peace. In our first reading we hear: "The wolf will be the guest of the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid..." How will we get to this point of perfect existence? The answer lies in the coming of the Christ — the Jesus of God, led by the spirit of wisdom, understanding, counsel, strength and knowledge, to give us a profound respect for God in our






People lose hope when they look at what is going on in the world today. The middle-east continues to pull at the fragile strings of peace and people repeatedly seek stability in their lives. Closer to home, the reality of suffering in our own stories can often lead to despair. However, our reason to have hope is found in the Christ event. We cannot lose sight of the adult Christ at Christmas. Jesus did not come to give us the answer to the world's suffering, but rather entered into it himself. The whole message of Jesus and his acts of charity teach us to have hope and courage. The sign of the cross casts its shadow over Bethlehem itself — but it was not the light that gives its shadow, but the radiant dawn of the resurrection day that opened wide the gates of an eternal promise.

As we approach this joyful season, may we remember days gone by with childlike wonder and recall the gift of family ties. May we also look forward to the day when we will meet you face to face and be reunited with those for whom we have shed many a tear. Let our longing be the song that unites us with your presence every day of our lives. Amen.

Wisdom of the Fathers

"The joy of the gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus. Those who accept his offer of salvation are set free from sin, sorrow, inner emptiness and loneliness. With Christ, joy is constantly born anew....

The great danger in today's world, pervaded as it is by consumerism, is the desolation and anguish born of a complacent yet covetous heart, the feverish pursuit of frivolous pleasures, and a blunted conscience. Whenever our interior life becomes caught up in its own interests and concerns, there is no longer room for others, no place for the poor. God's voice is no longer heard, the quiet joy of his love is no longer felt, and the desire to do good fades. This is a very real danger for believers too. Many fall prey to it and end up resentful, angry and listless.

That is no way to live a dignified and fulfilled life; it is not God's will for us, nor is it the life in the Spirit which has its source in the heart of the risen Christ. ...


I invite all Christians, everywhere, at this very moment, to a renewed personal encounter with Jesus Christ, or at least an openness to letting him encounter them; I ask all of you to do this unfailingly each day. No one should think that this invitation is not meant for him or her, since "no one is excluded from the joy brought by the Lord". The Lord does not disappoint those who take this risk; whenever we take a step towards Jesus, we come to realize that he is already there, waiting for us with open arms. Now is the time to say to Jesus: "Lord, I have let myself be deceived; in a thousand ways I have shunned your love, yet here I

am once more, to renew my covenant with you. I need you. Save me once again, Lord, take me once more into your redeeming embrace". How good it feels to come back to him whenever we are lost! Let me say this once more: God never tires of forgiving us; we are the ones who tire of seeking his mercy. Christ, who told us to forgive one another "seventy times seven" (*Mt* 18:22) has given us his example: he has forgiven us seventy times seven. Time and time again he bears us on his shoulders. No one can strip us of the dignity bestowed upon us by this

boundless and unfailing love. With a tenderness which never disappoints, but is always capable of restoring our joy, he makes it possible for us to lift up our heads and to start anew."



Seeing is believing...in our mission and our resolve

As we close out the calendar year the JOP has lots of stories to tell, but the mission trip to St Pius X in Kingston

last April was one of the most dramatic and exciting trips of the year. Serving the poor is always a privilege, and watching a dramatic, life changing event on the spot has no rivals.

The mission trip was devoted exclusively to cataract and glaucoma surgeries staged in the donated surgery center of Dr. William Lee, a Kingston ophthalmologist and friend of the then Father Burchell. A total of 71 patients received the gift of renewed sight in the space of four days. The surgical team was headed by Dr Brian Stahl of Ohio and two of his assistants. It was the doctor's fourth mission trip for JOP. Floridians, Sally and Richard

VanBuskirk and Jack Beagan, a parishioner at St John's, rounded out the mission team; their duties covered logistical, clerical, and back up support for the medical team. According to Sally, the surgical team operated like a "well oiled machine; the compassion and caring they showed for their patients was among the most beautiful examples of "The Body of Christ" one would ever hope to see."

Mere words cannot capture the excitement of the weekend, but the following is an attempt at it:

NOTABLE FACTS: Dr. Stahl supplied all medicines, implants and staff at no charge to JOP. Father Burchell and his parish supplied patients with lunch which he delivered each day. Father Thomas arranged transportation for the patients and team throughout their stay. Vivienne Bradford, St Pius X secretary, contacted approximately 80 patients to come for preoperative exams by the medical team. These patients had been identified during previous JOP eye clinics at St Pius X. Dr. William Lee committed to their follow-up care. Twenty-one patients also received a new RX and glasses

NOTABLE FACTS REGARDING PATIENTS: A 26 yearold patient suffering from severe glaucoma and cataracts was a final day patient. His twin also suffers with the exact same vision issues, but only one of the brothers came with hope for treatment. Shurlon had two surgical procedures; the first surgery corrected his severe glaucoma, the second removed

his cataracts and implanted lenses. The following day when his patch was removed Shurlan could see. His vision was not perfect, but Dr. Stahl assured him that the vision would increase each day. His Dad's face was wet with tears as they left the facility.

On the last day, a female patient arrived at the surgery site with no paper work. She had heard from a friend that we were doing cataract surgery with no charge and she was seriously in need. She lived in the St. Pius X neighborhood and a friend urged her to go to St. Pius X and hop on the bus to the surgery center; she did so. Once there, Dr. Stahl did her pre-operative exam and approved her

for surgery. She is now officially one of our success stories! Never underestimate the power of a woman on a mission of her own.

Although talent, equipment, supplies and airfares were donated to this mission, the cost of licensing, local transportation, lodging, and the like came to over \$2,300. In spite of the cost, our board of directors has made a faith based decision to stage another cataract mission trip in 2014. We believe the funds will be there from people like you and

thank our donors and supporters for giving us the means to make a difference in the lives of many.






