

Fr. John Addresses Issues of Vandalism and Theft

Dear Friends of St. John the Evangelist,

My prayers are with you all as you continue to journey through this joyful Easter Season. It is normally the role of the pastor of the parish to share with you the Good News of the gospel and the blessings of the Church's activity. Here at St. John, we have most certainly seen the fruits of both. However, there have been several incidents of vandalism and theft within our parish facilities that have warranted my writing to you today.

During this past year the parish has been the victim of several major thefts. The reception area was targeted and the proceeds for the St. Joseph's Feast celebration were stolen. This took place during the regular operating hours of the parish. The St. Vincent de Paul poor boxes and the candle monies have been a constant target of revenue for thieves. The kitchen has also been plundered by these unwanted guests. Several doors have been forced open in order for thefts to take place. During this past Holy Week, one of the recently installed monitors, along with the brackets securing it to the wall, was stolen during the night. It obviously took a team of people to successfully remove something so large.

At this time we need to be proactive rather than reactive in this regard. It is obvious that the parish has to address the issue of security and surveillance. The front doors of the Church have been damaged several times in the past and have become buckled. Several locksmiths have been called to fix the problem, but to no avail. The doors (which are custom-made) have to be replaced. However, fixing doors is only a temporary fix and does not secure our parish property. A new security system is being installed in the church to protect it during the night hours. Since we have to keep most our buildings open to the various groups that meet here on a regular basis, locking our doors is not a solution to this problem. The Buildings & Grounds Committee of the parish has suggested that it is time to install security cameras in our buildings and around the grounds. This measure will hopefully deter and catch on film those who are targeting our parish community.

These measures to protect the parish's assets are obviously going to create a substantial expense. I would greatly appreciate your generosity in helping with this endeavor. If you would like to help us, I kindly ask that you contact the Parish Manager, Scott Schlossberg, who will be able to direct you further. Please be vigilant when you come to Mass or parish events in keeping your cars locked and your valuables out of sight.

Thank you for your attention in this matter.

Life Matters



As promised, I'm back with our regular Life Matters report. On Tuesday of last week our committee talked about protecting our neighbors who are enslaved in the human trafficking business, right here in Collier County. The victims, mostly young women, have been lured here from developing countries with offers of work, in hotels, as nannies, in restaurants, etc. The main point is they are told they will have legitimate work with a path to citizenship. Once these handlers have the young women here, they are usually housed somewhere and drugged to make them addicts and are abused multiple times a day to break them down.

Once these victims realize they are totally controlled by their handlers, they are then put to work, but not in the kinds of jobs they expected. Very few girls are able to escape these handlers.

We are all complicit in keeping them invisible. When they are being transported to and from "work" there might be several young women and girls being driven by one or two men. They like to shuttle them as privately as possible. Do we ever see this kind of arrangement in our neighborhoods?

They are counting on people seeing them, but ignoring the weird goings on in a particular residence. Do they only come and go at night? Do the residents stay inside all day? Are there signs this isn't just June, Ward, Wally and the Beaver living next door? When we are at Wal-Mart, do you ever see one or two men with a lot of scared or just zoned out looking women?

I'm not suggesting that trafficking victims are living on every street in town, but the evidence suggests that there's a lot more here than we would ever believe. When you see things that don't look on the up and up, report your suspicions to the Collier County Sherriff's Dept. There is often nothing that can be done immediately, but the information will be sent to the human trafficking task force at work in Lee and Collier counties. Women have been rescued and are being helped. We can help by not ignoring our intuition when we see something that doesn't seem right.

We are currently in the process of replacing the very dated carpet in the classrooms and hallway in the Parish Life Center. First and foremost, when the carpet is permanently damaged by a stain or tear, the tile(s) may simply be removed and replaced, affecting only the damaged area. Secondly, the carpet tiles are much less expensive than traditional carpet and may be installed by our maintenance staff, thereby eliminating the labor cost of installation. Finally, the new carpet tiles really look great. We hope you will agree once installation is completed.

The lighting renovation in the church is finally complete. All of the lighting is now installed and operable remotely from our iPad. This project, which began in November, has been a great learning experience to say the least. We ultimately had to retrofit all of the old lighting in order to have it compatible with the new wireless system. I truly believe the finished product is magnificent. The new fixtures are a breath of fresh air in the church and the amount of new light available is amazing. Thank you for your patience while we endured months of changes to the old system.



Reconciling Love

hen we consider the role of Peter in the Sacred Scriptures we recall the great interchange between him and Jesus. Peter claims Jesus to be the Christ at Caesarea Philipi. He is named as the rock on which Christ will build his Church, a fisherman by trade. Peter is invited by Jesus to climb the mountain of Tabor to witness the transfiguration. In recent times we call to mind Peter's failure to stand by Jesus in his trials and his three-fold denial. Peter's weakness caused him to weep bitterly. When he heard that Jesus had risen from the dead, he must have reserved joy knowing that he was to face the Lord that he had turned his back on. In today's gospel, we hear how the dreadful choices of Peter's past are turned around by Jesus. Peter's three-fold denial is replaced by his three-fold affirmation of love. Jesus gives Peter the opportunity to be reconciled with him, after which he commissions him to feed His sheep and to follow Him once

again.

The beauty of this resurrection episode notes the interiority of Jesus' heart. Restoration if found within the gift of Christ's resurrection. Within restoration there is a way forward to move beyond failure and sin and to move forward in hope. Today's gospel paints for us a tender moment for Jesus' followers. Jesus is seen to be imitating his action of the last supper – of breaking bread with his disciples. He does this regardless of his follower's failures to be with him in his hour of need. Jesus provides nourishment for this group. He also shows the early disciples that he is not a ghost by eating with them. This tender moment offers the gift of his forgiveness and hope.

We are reminded today that Jesus takes the same initiative with us. Sometimes we prove to be halfhearted in our commitment to ourselves, others, and God. Even in resurrection time we are offered to be reconciled with our God. The Lord wants to sit with us and to break bread with us. Every time we come to Mass, no matter what our disposition, he makes himself present to us through the Word proclaimed and the Sacred Bread broken and the wine outpoured. We are asked to reconcile our differences in order to share in the beauty of such communion.







In the house where I grew up, there was a great emphasis on table manners. Sitting up straight, using the correct utensils, and saying "please" and "thank you" were de rigueur. With nine of us around the table, an elbow on the table was not only a breach of etiquette, it also ensured a sleeve full of someone else's dinner.

I was more lax with my own kids. If we were dinning out, or at a friend's or relative's house, I wanted them to know what was expected. At the same time, I wanted our mealtimes to be a time for the family simply to be together. My oldest daughter defined the distinction well: "Strangers want to see if you know how to hold your fork. At home, Mom just wants you to enjoy dinner."

A shared meal is one of the most solemn and unifying facets of our Catholic faith. The motions of the Mass become second nature when you've done them hundreds of times but, like a meal at home, the "manners" are not why we gather. We come together to recognize the great family to which we all belong, and to recognize in one another Christ, who makes us into a family.


