
MASS INTENTIONS...

Spiritual Adoption Program Continues With Month Two

The Spiritual Adoption Program is heading into the second month. Your commitment is to pray a short prayer daily through Christmas.

MONTH 2 - Developing Baby - "I'm dancing!"

Your spiritually adopted baby is making progress developing all of her external features and internal organs. Her brain is functioning at 40 days. Her mother can hear her heartbeat now on an ultrasonic stethoscope. Baby-teeth buds are present at $6\frac{1}{2}$ weeks. The central nervous system is functioning and 40



muscle sets begin their first exercises. From this moment, your spiritually adopted baby grows and refines her body. But everything she needs to survive after birth is already present by the end of the eighth week. She is now called a "fetus" a Latin word meaning "little one".

Ultrasound reveals that this little one can now spring, flip and jump – her first dance steps!

Capital Punishment and Our Commitment to Life

What an awesome job we all did with 40 Days for Life! As a parish, we made a great showing. The final numbers for the campaign worldwide are not yet in, but as of April 7, there have been 437 babies saved that we know about. Here in Naples, the numbers of abortions performed has decreased and our prayers are being answered, showcasing the love and joy of life to all around us.

But we care about life at all ages and all stages. St. John has performed our first prayer vigil against Capital Punishment with the execution of Robert Henry on March 20. The vigil included exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and Benediction. Prayers were offered for Henry, all those involved in his execution, his family, and for his victims, Janet Cox Thermidor and Phyllis Harris. Of all the Respect Life components, speaking out against the Death Penalty can be challenging, in our culture and

our community. Our faith teaches us that even the most evil criminal is still a child of God and deserving of the gift of life. As long as God grants this man life, He also extends His rays of mercy and forgiveness toward him. During Holy Week, we remembered Jesus' sacrifice for our sins; let us also remember that He died for everyone — holy and chaste as well as those not living their lives with God's grace. If you are interested, you may learn more about the church's teachings on this subject in the Catechism #2267.

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

As Christian adults, we have a moral and legal responsibility and are entrusted by God with the spiritual, emotional and physical well-being of minors and vulnerable adults. A Safe Environment Training session has been scheduled at St. John for Wednesday, June 4 from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. in the Seminar Room of the Claussen Center.

Thanks to the help of Joe Molter (owner of Molter Landscape), we have now identified the tree which sits alone on an island on the west side of the church. We recently removed two trees that were shrouding this beautiful tree allowing everyone to appreciate its grandeur. The scientific name of this tree is **Kigelia**

Africana and it is commonly known as the Sausage Tree. Why, you ask? Because of the very large sausage sharped fruit it bears year round. In addition, it yields beautiful maroon flowers which hang from vines adjacent to the sausage.

The traditional use of Kigelia fruit in Africa has been both medicinal – as a treatment for skin complaints from eczema

to skin cancer – and cosmetic, as a preparation to firm and enhance skin tissue. Several scientific studies in recent years suggest that Kigelia may indeed have remarkable healing and conditioning effects on the skin.

For many years we thought that this tree may have been planted with some type of religious significance, however, we now know that this is not the case. Nevertheless, we now know the origin of this very beautiful tree. If you get a chance, check it out before or after Mass.

If you were questioning

whether or not season is officially over, one quick glance at our **collection summary** will certainly reveal the answer. Our regular offertory collection has dropped to 50% of its average during the winter months of December through April. As a reminder, we operate "in the red" seven out of twelve months. If last summer was any indication of what we will experience this summer, we are once again in for a "rocky road" with respect to covering our operating expenses until the seasonal residents return in the fall. On a brighter note, regular offertory collections are up nearly 7% (fiscal year to date) versus the same period last year. This will give us a little cushion while operating at a significant deficit for the next several months. The finance council continues to make numerous efforts to reduce operating expenses so that we may survive the lean summer months in the face of a somewhat suspect economy.

It is no secret that the current economic state of affairs in Collier County is shaky at best as mentioned above. Even after one of the busiest and most lucrative seasons in recent memory, the stark realization is that many involved in the service sector will have their incomes greatly reduced over the summer months. As most of you can attest, many people locally will find it difficult to meet their monthly obligations during the summer. This is where the **St. Vincent De Paul Society** will step in and assist families who are experiencing difficulties. Whether it is assistance in the form of a rent payment, a gift card from Publix in order to provide food or a gas card, St. Vincent De Paul provides an incredibly valuable service to those in our community. As I have stated before, the only source of income for our St. Vincent de Paul Society comes in the form of donations made through two annual collections, the poor box and random mail-in contributions. If you would like to donate, here are your options. You may donate furniture, appliances, house wares, vehicles and even boats. Simply call

the main office at 775.1667 and they will arrange to have your donation picked up free of charge. Donations of food or clothing may be taken directly to the main office on Mercantile Avenue. And last but not least, cash donations may be made through the poor boxes conveniently located at nearly every church exit. The current donations received through the poor boxes will satisfy less than one case per week. St. Vincent De Paul is one of my favorite ministries as I have seen firsthand the amazing work they perform and the end

result. Under the direction of Bill Smart, the St. John chapter of the St. Vincent De Paul Society is assisting several families per week. This number is expected to increase exponentially as the summer progresses. If you would like to volunteer your talent and time, St. Vincent De Paul is actively looking for new members to serve needy individuals in our own backyard (literally.) If you would like to join a ministry that will provide you with a true sense of worth and accomplishment, here is your chance. 





The Dwelling Place of the Holy Spirit

iscerning the Spirit of Truth in one's life is to discover a unique and imperishable gift. Early in salvation history, Moses was told to remove his sandals because the ground on which he stood was holy ground. Likewise, Jesus reminds us today that our lives become the holy ground of God's dwelling as we live in Him and he continues to live on in us. Our gospel story recounts the fear the disciples encountered when Jesus spoke of his departure from this world to the next. He assures them, however, that they would not be left orphaned because he would send them the Advocate, the Spirit of Truth, which would make them aware of the ongoing reality of his dwelling with them. To put more simply, the people of Christ were promised that they would never be alone!

- 3. What does it mean to Sanctify Christ in your heart?
- 4. How does the Holy Spirit help your life?

Today, our solace, as a community of faith, is strengthened as we are reminded that Jesus lives on in his Word proclaimed, in the breaking of the bread, in the Church, and in our very being as baptized Catholic Christians. The theology of the body that Saint John Paul II spoke about recalls how our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit and should be treated with dignity and respect. As a community we are called to constantly to seek the Lord in the interior silence of self — to discern God's will and presence in our lives and to reverence such discovery with an adequate response.

Our first Pope, Peter, tells us in our second reading that we must sanctify Christ as Lord in our hearts. We are invited to let the Lord take over our lives and rule them with a power and love beyond all telling. The gift of this knowledge is a treasure, not of gold, but of a promise that will give us life. If we remain in Jesus by loving him and those around us and if we live in the Spirit of truth, then our motivation to live God's goodness will ultimately lead us to the gates of heaven and eternal life. This means that to make sense of the Christian call in the midst of the modern world, we must simply follow his example and contemplate the wisdom of gospel. Conscious of our vocation of baptism, we become aware that even though we may feel alone or broken from time to time, or shunned because we make a stand for the truth, that we are not alone. Jesus lives on in us as we continue his mission and ministry on earth.

How do we accomplish the mission of Jesus here on earth? We achieve

Christ's mission by allowing the Holy Spirit to work through us, moving us to touch the lives of others. Many people share in the role of mother and father. A mother or a father accomplishes the mission of Christ by instilling in their children values that will bring them to the threshold of eternal life. These values speak to the inherent dignity that exists in every human person, that is, that all are called to love themselves in the purest of ways and others likewise. The mission of Jesus is given to us a community of faith where we are to discern the needs of the community and

in a concrete way respond to such needs. It also means that we confront sinful structures that inhibit human dignity and true freedom. Jesus was not afraid to stand up for the Truth. Neither should we be afraid to embrace the Truth. We must always live the Truth in love. Christ was willing to walk with the outcast and the sinner, the forgotten and the broken, the ashamed and the lost. He always brought the light of transformation to these dark realities. We are called to be the Christ light for those who find themselves deprived of peace and acceptance. This can only be achieved by listening to the voice and promptings of God's Spirit moving through us.

Wisdom of the Fathers

"The Holy Spirit, in his mysterious bond of divine communion with the Redeemer of man, is the one who brings about the continuity of his work: he takes from Christ and transmits to all, unceasingly entering into the history of the world through the heart of man. Here he becomes... the true "father of the poor, giver of gifts, light of hearts"; he becomes the "sweet guest of the soul," whom the Church unceasingly greets on the threshold of the inmost sanctuary of every human being. For he brings "rest and relief" in the midst of toil, in the midst of the work of human hands and minds; he brings "rest" and "ease" in the midst of the heat of the day, in the midst of the anxieties, struggles and perils of every age; he brings "consolation," when the human heart grieves and is tempted to despair...

Praying thus, the Church unceasingly professes her faith that there exists in our created world a Spirit who is an uncreated gift. He is the Spirit of the Father and of the Son: like the Father and the Son he is uncreated, without limit, eternal, omnipotent, God, Lord. 293 This Spirit of God "fills the universe," and all that is created recognizes in him the source of its own identity, finds in him its own transcendent expression, turns to him and awaits him, invokes him with its own being. Man turns to him, as to the Paraclete, the Spirit of truth and of love, man who lives by truth and by love, and who without the source of truth and of love cannot live. To him turns the Church, which is the heart of humanity, to implore for all and







The 2014 theme focuses on "Freedom to Serve" poor, vulnerable




Catholic dioceses and parishes across the United States are once again encouraged to raise awareness for domestic and international religious freedom concerns during the third annual Fortnight for Freedom, June 21 - July 4. The two-week celebration will focus on the theme, "Freedom to Serve," emphasizing the link between religious liberty and service to the poor and vulnerable.

"During the Fortnight, our liturgical calendar celebrates great martyrs who remained faithful in the face of persecution by political power — St. John Fisher and St. Thomas More, John the Baptist, Peter and Paul and the first martyrs of the Church of Rome," said Archbishop William E. Lori of Baltimore, chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee for Religious Liberty of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) in Washington on April 28. "This is a time when Catholics can unite themselves in prayer to the men and women throughout history who spread the Gospel and lived out Jesus' call to serve the 'least of these' in even the direct of circumstances."

Two nationally televised Masses will bookend the Fortnight. Archbishop Lori will celebrate Mass at the Baltimore Basilica on June 21, at 5:30 p.m. EDT. Cardinal Donald W. Wuerl of Washington will celebrate Mass at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington on July 4, at noon EDT. USCCB President Archbishop Joseph E. Kurtz of Louisville, Kentucky, will be the homilist at the July 4 Mass. Both Masses will be televised nationwide on EWTN. — U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB)


