Sacrament of Baptism

#ToKnow – Gifts of the Holy Spirit: Message on Piety from Pope Francis

In preparation for Pentecost last weekend, the Holy Father wanted to discuss the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety and fear of the Lord. In particular, his comments on piety help us understand how a "humble heart" creates a joyous and loving relationship with God:

This relationship with the Lord is not intended as a duty or an imposition. It is a bond that comes from within. It is a relationship lived with the heart: it is our friendship with God, granted to us by Jesus, a friendship that changes our life and fills us with passion, with joy. Thus, the gift of piety stirs in us above all gratitude and praise. This is, in fact, the reason and the most authentic meaning of our worship and our adoration. When the Holy Spirit allows us to perceive the presence of the Lord and all his love for us, it warms the heart and moves us quite naturally to prayer and celebration. Piety, therefore, is synonymous with the genuine religious spirit, with filial trust in God, with that capacity to pray to him with the love and simplicity that belongs to those who are humble of heart.

If the gift of piety makes us grow in relation to and in communion with God and leads us to live as his children, at the same time, it helps us to pass this love on to others as well and to recognize them as our brothers and sisters. And then, yes, we will be moved by feelings of piety — not *pietism!* — *in relation to those around us and to those* whom we encounter every day. Why do I say "not pietism"? Because some think that to be pious is to close one's eyes, to pose like a picture and pretend to be a saint. In Piedmont we say: to play the "mugna quacia" [literally: the pious or serene nun]. This is not the gift of piety. The gift of piety means to be truly capable of rejoicing with those who rejoice, of weeping with those who weep, of being close to those who are lonely or in anguish, of correcting those in error, of consoling the afflicted, of welcoming and helping those in need. The gift of piety is closely tied to gentleness. The gift of piety which the Holy Spirit gives us makes us gentle, makes us calm, patient, at peace with God, at the service of others with gentleness. – Pope Francis General Audience June 4, 2014 (http://w2.vatican.va/ content/francesco/en/audiences/2014/documents/papafrancesco 20140604 udienza-generale.html)

#ToServe - Putting our Faith Into Action

Last week, I focused on Service as the essential component of our faith. I am not sure if Pope Francis is reading our church website or gets our bulletin, but his homily on June 9 on the Beatitudes specifically calls us into action, like our Immokalee Mission Team and Homeless Feeding Program.

"[I]f you are meek in life, people will think you are not clever". Let them think that – he said – "but you are meek because with this meekness you will inherit the Earth". "Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness". It is so easy – the Pope observed – to become part of the corrupt and referred to "that daily approach of 'do ut des'. Everything is business". How much injustice does that approach cause – he noted – and how many people suffer because of injustice. And Jesus says: "Blessed are they who fight against injustice. Blessed are the merciful for they will be shown mercy". The merciful – the Pope said – "those who forgive and understand the mistakes of others". Jesus – he pointed out – does not say "blessed are they who seek revenge".

"Few words, simple words, but practical for all. Because Christianity is a practical religion: it is not just to be imagined, it is to be practiced. If you have some time at home today, take the Gospel, Matthew's Gospel, chapter five. At the beginning there are the Beatitudes; in chapter 25 the rest. And it will do you good to read them once, twice, three times. Read this programme for holiness. May the Lord give us the grace to understand his message".

Third Fortnight for Freedom Will Be Observed June 21-July 4

The 2014 theme focuses on "Freedom to Serve" poor, vulnerable



Catholic dioceses and parishes across the United States are once again encouraged to raise awareness for domestic and international religious freedom concerns during the third annual Fortnight for Freedom, June 21 - July 4. The two-week celebration will focus on the theme, "Freedom to Serve," emphasizing the link between religious liberty and service to the poor and vulnerable.

What is the Fortnight for Freedom? A two-week period for all American Catholics to pray, fast, and work to reverse growing discrimination against the practice of faith in the public square, as particularly evidenced by the odious HHS mandate, which, by forcing Catholic institutions to pay for sterilizations, contraception, and abortion-inducing drugs, strikes at our institutions' ability to simply be Catholic!

Two nationally televised Masses will bookend the Fortnight. Archbishop Lori will celebrate Mass at the Baltimore Basilica on June 21, at 5:30 p.m. EDT. Cardinal Donald W. Wuerl of Washington will celebrate Mass at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington on July 4, at noon EDT. USCCB President Archbishop Joseph E. Kurtz of Louisville, Kentucky, will be the homilist at the July 4 Mass. Both Masses will be televised nationwide on EWTN.

Before each Mass, we will pray the Prayer for the Protection of Religious Liberty.


Each day, after daily Mass, and after the 5:00 p.m. on Sundays, we will have a Holy Hour with Eucharistic Adoration and the Rosary.



Mirroring the Love and Nature of God

s we gather to celebrate the solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, we stop to contemplate the height and depth, breadth and width of the mystery of God in Salvation History. The Trinity is ultimately a mystery, which the human intellect will never fully comprehend. However, our faith allows us to penetrate the shroud of mystery that surrounds the self-giving reality of God. The mystery of the Trinity is about God's relationship with the world—of how God gives of himself in human history. God may be experienced in many ways, not only through prayer, worship, and the sacraments, but also through the gifts of others and of nature.

Reflection Questions

- 1. Name the ways in which each person of the Trinity offers gifts to the world.
- 2. How is the Trinity present during the sacrifice of the Mass?
- 3. How is God a Father to you?
- 4. How do you experience the Incarnate Word in your daily life?
- 5. How does the Holy Spirit prompt you to become a member of Christ's Body?
- 6. In what ways are you challenged by the perfect unity of the Trinity in your relationships?
- 7. How do you reflect the selfless giving and generosity of God in the Holy Trinity?

The theology of the Trinity reminds us that in God we find perfect unity. God is Three-In-One, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. No person is greater than the other, rather an integral part that compliments the others.

Confusing? We are constantly limited in our human expression and the way in which we use language. We cannot adequately express such a divine and wonderful mystery. However, our humble attempts to understand the nature of God and to grapple with the mystery opens us to the reality of God in our lives. In our efforts to understand God and in following God's way, we will, in the end, glorify God. The Most Holy Trinity is an inexplicable expression of God's desire that unity be preserved. This mystery also calls us to that same unity in the Church and in the world.

Throughout the passages of time, God has communicated Himself in astounding ways. God's Spirit hovered over the waters of the deep at creation. God's voice spoke to the Patriarchs and the Prophets, thus making His will known for the world. The Word (Jesus), present in the beginning of time, became Flesh and made his dwelling among us so that our humanity may be blessed and fulfilled. And such was God's gift that he gave us his only Son that we would believe and have eternal life. Jesus offers himself as the living bread that came down from heaven. In eating his flesh and drinking

his blood, Jesus becomes the eternal life force that nourishes the world. God's initiative for the human race is that we would be saved, not condemned, and given paradise. This is the generosity of God — a generosity that we are invited to share. We are asked to be selfless in dealing with others, just as God has continually been selfless in giving of himself to the world. As the Trinity relentlessly gives to the world and equally witnesses to each of its persons, so the gift of married love must always be mutual, generous, and unified. We must always be aware of the call to live as one in the community of the Church — seeing each member as an equal and integral part of ecclesial life. As the Trinity has constantly given of itself throughout history, we are invited to mirror this giving in the choices we make and lifestyles that we embrace.

Father, may we be one in worshipping you. Let us love you above all things. Help us to live as your Son lived — following the message of love and compassion. Let the Holy Spirit penetrate our very being that we may be reflections of your presence in the world today. May our words and actions reflect the love that is to be found in your trinity of persons. May we be one as you are one. Amen.



USCCB Fact Sheet 2014

Pope Benedict XVI spoke in 2012 about his worry that religious liberty in the United States is being weakened. He called religious liberty the "most cherished of American freedoms." Unfortunately, our most cherished freedom is under threat:

- HHS mandate for sterilization, contraception, and abortioninducing drugs. The mandate of the Department of
 Health and Human Services forces religious
 institutions to facilitate and/or fund a product
 contrary to their own moral teaching. Further, the
 federal government tries to define which religious
 institutions are "religious enough" to merit
 protection of their religious liberty.
- Catholic foster care and adoption services. Boston, San
 Francisco, the District of Columbia, and the State
 of Illinois have driven local Catholic Charities out
 of the business of providing adoption or foster care
 services—by revoking their licenses, by ending their
 government contracts, or both—because those
 Charities refused to place children with same-sex
 couples or unmarried opposite-sex couples who
 cohabit.
- State immigration laws. Several states have passed laws that forbid what they deem as "harboring" of undocumented immigrants—and what the Church deems Christian charity and pastoral care to these immigrants.
- Discrimination against small church congregations. New York City adopted a policy that barred the Bronx Household of Faith and other churches from

- renting public schools on weekends for worship services, even though non-religious groups could rent the same schools for many other uses. Litigation in this case continues.
- Discrimination against Catholic humanitarian services.
 After years of excellent performance by the U.S.
 Conference of Catholic Bishops' Migration and Refugee Services (MRS) in administering contract services for victims of human trafficking, the federal government changed its contract specifications to require MRS to provide or refer for contraceptive and abortion services in violation of Catholic teaching.
- Christian students on campus. In its over-100-year
 history, the University of California Hastings
 College of Law has denied student organization
 status to only one group, the Christian Legal
 Society, because it required its leaders to be
 Christian and to abstain from sexual activity outside
 of marriage.

Is our most cherished freedom truly under threat?

Yes, Pope Benedict XVI recognized just two years ago that various attempts to limit the freedom of religion in the U.S. are particularly concerning. The threat to religious freedom is larger than any single case or issue and has its roots in secularism in our culture. The Holy Father has asked for the laity to have courage to counter secularism that would "delegitimize the Church's participation in public debate about the issues which are determining the future of American society."

What can you do to ensure the protection of religious freedom at home and abroad? The U.S. Bishops have called for a Fortnight for Freedom from June 21 to July 4, 2014.
