Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.



Spiritual Adoption Program Continues With Month Three

The Spiritual Adoption Program is heading into the third month. Your commitment is to pray a short prayer daily through Christmas.

MONTH 3 - Developing Baby - I can suck my thumb!"

Your spiritually adopted baby is quite active in the womb



now – although his mother won't feel him for another couple of months. If his mother's womb had a window, you could watch your spiritually adopted baby squint, swallow and move his tongue. He can make a tight fist if you touch his palm. He is breathing amniotic fluid which continues until birth, although he obtains the oxygen his body needs through the umbilical cord. The baby you are praying for weighs one ounce. Early this month – at just 9 weeks – he began to suck his thumb.

The next Novena of Masses for Life at St. John will be Saturday, July 27 at 8:00 a.m. This Mass will be celebrated in special observance of the life of Jesus in the womb of our Blessed Mother. Life Matters



Summer is here and we certainly know it! Those of us who haven't yet headed off the cooler climes are facing the heat with our Floridian flair.

We are kicking off the official days of summer with our Parish

commitment Monday at Planned Parenthood. All are welcome to join us on the sidewalk at any time from 8:30 a.m. until about 3:00 p.m. to be a prayerful witness to the abortions taking place inside. Our prayers do matter. Planned Parenthood's total number of abortions has fallen since they began in the fall of 2008. As we have seen from the news all over the country, the abortion industry is like the illegitimate child of the medical field. It continues to lack oversight, state certification

and even the barest minimums of safe medical practices that safeguard women in sites all over the country. I have no direct knowledge of the conditions here in Naples, but, like many other cities, I do know that they employ a "circuit riding" doctor whose only practice is abortions and who has no hospital admitting privileges anywhere in the state.

In contrast to our country's practice of throwing children away, I recently had a reason to research how cats give birth, in anticipation for our own queen who was ready to give birth at any time. One of the sites I found online showed a

series of cats and dogs in various stages of gestation. These animals were brought to the vet to be "fixed" but were found to be already pregnant. The piece went on to say how many vets often refuse to do this procedure because it is so hard on

the staff to have to kill so many animals which are otherwise able to survive. But that is exactly what we do in the abortion business. By the way, we have five all black kittens available for adoption by this time next week. In another ironic piece I recently read of a dog, I believe in Thailand, which brought a plastic bag home from a nearby dump, which she had never done before. The daughter noticed the bag moving and immediately opened it to show her parents. They were all amazed to find a live baby! The

amazed to find a live baby! The called an ambulance which transported the baby to the hospital where the baby is doing fine, despite being premature and a little dehydrated. Even the dog knew there was something special in that bag!

Please pray tomorrow for the fourth victim in five weeks on Florida's death row. Marshall Gore will be executed Monday June 24t at 7:00 p.m. in Starke. William Van Poyck was executed June 12.

Mass. A Hearing Loop is an assistive listening system that transmits sound directly into ones hearing aids or cochlear

implants rather than depending on sound coming from the loudspeakers. To receive the Loop signal, manually activate your T-coil or telephone setting on your hearing aid or cochlear implant. If you don't know if you have a T-coil or if yours is properly




programmed, consult with your audiologist or hearing aid professional. If you don't wear hearing aids, ask to

use a Loop receiver to receive the sound. A receiver may be checked out from the Sacristy. If you have further questions about Looping, please contact the installation company, Complete Hearing Solutions at www. CompleteHearingSolutions.org or call 727.260.3488.



The Face of Christ

hen we take a good look at the gospels we cannot help but see the amazing things that took place during the ministry of Jesus of Nazareth. Today's gospel account of Peter's profession of faith falls within a context. Jesus had just fed the five thousand with five loaves and two fish. The people had witnessed great things accomplished through Jesus' hands. They had seen the raising of a child from death, women being made whole and clean, possessed people being returned to normality once again, and many other might acts performed by Jesus. There must have been so much talk around during that time. Many thought Jesus was one of the great prophets who had returned;

some thought that he was nothing more than a mere magician. However, for those who had journeyed with Jesus there was much more of a greater insight given into who he was. Peter, through faith and trust, proclaims Jesus to be the Christ of God. Jesus was being named the Anointed One who would bring freedom to those dwelling in captivity. He was the dream of Israel and an answer to prayers of ancient times – he was the Messiah who brought blessing to the world. After the revelation of Peter, Jesus points out that he would suffer because of who he was. Furthermore, the disciples in following Jesus would also have to carry his cross daily to bear witness to him.

Here we are further along in the passing of time still trying to figure out the significance of the gospel in our daily lives. There is still much to say about Jesus as there was 2000 years ago, but people are still trying to find him. Who do you say that I am? Jesus can most certainly be found in our cathedral churches, local parishes, and the gathering of two or more gathered in His name. However, there is another reality at work here. Jesus can also be discovered amongst the clutter of our lives. Countless people call upon the Lord's name and encounter the Christ of faith daily. Yes, Jesus can be found in our Eucharist – it is the ultimate source

and summit of any Catholic Christian. But we cannot neglect the reality of Jesus in the midst of poverty, conflict, and division. Wherever there is need, Jesus is present also. Jesus reminded us always that he is to be found in all our brothers and sisters, offering the ongoing compassion of God through us. All peoples belong to the Body of Christ. Whenever people hurt it means that the Body of Christ is hurting.

The cross of discipleship is placed upon each of our shoulders in order to bring Christ to others. The yoke of unconditional challenges each one of us to clothe ourselves in Christ, as St. Paul reminds us in today's second reading. This means in every socio-economic environment week seek an economy of salvation and redemption. In concrete we are challenged to see the face of Christ in everyone. Again, St. Paul tells us that there are no distinctions made in trying to discern what it means to belong to go. Obviously this makes an impact on the many problematic situations we have to deal with locally, nationally, and globally. We are called to examine what Christ is asking of us in the world in which we live. Any consideration given to matters pertaining to the global economies, increasing threats to national security, immigration, the working poor, the unemployed, the forgotten elderly, and the mentally insane, should always be shaped by our understanding of how Christ is calling us to these challenging times.



Prayer

Lord, may we always be reminded of your everlasting presence in our Church. Teach us to cherish you in Word and Sacrament. Enable us to go beyond to see you present in a world that is contrary to your own. Help us to recognize your presence in every human being. May we always clothe ourselves in your compassion, mercy and love. Amen.




