Life Matters



It's always nice to know that what we believe has been backed up by some solid science. Recently, I found an article at **LifeNews.com** about a paper published in the *Journal of*

American Physicians and Surgeons. The authors studied trends in maternal health and abortion over 40 years in Great Britain where abortion is legal and Ireland, where it is not. The authors found that the overall maternal mortality rate in Ireland is HALF that of England, Wales and Scotland, Additionally, having nearby access to abortion does not necessarily mean that women are fleeing Ireland in massive numbers to have abortions. The abortion rate is still 4 times higher in England than

in Ireland and 6.5 times higher than in Northern Ireland. Finally there is a 36% increased risk of pre-term births and accompanying birth defects in future births following abortion. The paper's authors conclude that abortion provides absolutely no benefits to the overall health of women. You can go to

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. Knights of Columbus Independence Party

Over 250 guests celebrated our Independence and honored our veterans at the St. John Parish Life Center on Saturday evening, June 29th.

Sponsored by the Arthur J. Corr Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus, a patriotism theme permeated the evening with the presentation and posting of our colors by the Golden Gate High School Junior ROTC Color Guard, followed by a 10 minute video of how our National Anthem came to be written by Francis Scott Key during the battle of Baltimore at Ft. McHenry in September of 1814.

When the video finished, everyone stood and sang The Star Spangled Banner with such vigor and emotion that the room seemed to shake. WW II veteran, Sgt. Robert McDonald then played taps for our fallen heroes. "It was truly a somber moment" said Marianne Middlemiss, with tears in her eyes when Sgt. McDonald had finished.

Before saying grace, Fr. John quipped, "After watching that video, I am happy to say that I am now an American Citizen." Fr. John was born in England of Irish parents.

Tony Avalon entertained the guests with "Sounds of Sinatra" songs. One woman said, "If I did not see him (Avalon) singing, I'd swear it was Frank Sinatra." Eileen Fuller also entertained everyone by singing the songs of each branch of the Armed Forces, accompanied by Tom Oram.

Frisco's catering served up a delicious meal. Highlighting the evening was the presentation of awards to three of our treasured veterans. WW II Sgt. Anthony D'Antuono, who landed on Omaha Beach on D-Day, June 6, 1944, and was severely wounded. After spending several months recuperating, Anthony was sent back into battle with the 101st "Screaming Eagles" Division to defend Bastogne. He was severely wounded again and spent 11 months in a Paris hospital before being shipped home

and honorably discharged with a 100 percent disability. For his heroic deeds, Sgt. D'Antuono was awarded the Bronze Star, two purple hearts, the Expert Combat Infantryman's Badge and the European Ribbon.

The second honoree was Sgt. Douglass Roth, a veteran of the Vietnam War, who was drafted into the United States Army in 1964. After completing basic training at Ft. Dix, New Jersey and paratrooper training at Ft. Benning, Georgia, Doug was shipped to the war zone in Southeast Asia where he was assigned to the 101st "Screaming Eagles" Division, as a door gunner aboard a Falcon Helicopter Gunship.







Sgt. Roth logged over 1,400 combat hours in the air, receiving 42 Air Medals as well as the jump Medal and the Combat Infantryman's Badge. After contacting Agent Orange, Sgt. Roth returned home and was honorably discharged with a 100 percent disability in 1966

The Knights third honoree was Staff Sgt. Marc Scialdo. Sgt. Scialdo was killed on March 11 of this year when his Black Hawk helicopter crashed in Kandahar City, Afghanistan. It was his 16th month wedding anniversary. The 31 year old graduate of St. John Neumann High School joined the United States Army following the 9/11 terrorist attacks on our country. In his homily at Sgt. Scialdo's funeral, Fr. John said, "Today we honor the courage that Marc has shown," adding, "He gave us the greatest gift of love, laying down his life for others." He was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star.

All the honorees were given plaques by outgoing Faithful Navigator John Fazackerley and incoming Faithful Navigator Bill Wright. Each plaque was engraved with the Knights of Columbus 4th Degree Logo and thanked them for their service. They were also presented with American flags that had flown over the United States Capitol along with a certificate attesting to that fact.

Receiving the Posthumous award for Sgt. Scialdo was his grieving widow, Kara.

Master of ceremony Knight Bill Janes gave a vivid description of "The POW MIA Remembrance Table." It is a small table in a place of honor and is set for one. The table is our way of symbolizing the fact that members of our profession of arms are missing from our midst. They are commonly called POWs or MIAs. We call them "Brothers." They are unable to be with this evening, so we remember them. S/K Janes asked everyone to make a promise to remember those who have given

so much and remember through the symbolism of The White Table.

The Arthur J. Corr Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus wish to thank everyone who made this tribute to our nation and to our veterans a wonderful success. God Bless America.

As most of you know by now, my fascination for weather has been with me since childhood, so much so that I decided to major in Meteorology in college. This fascination especially includes severe weather which we have had our fair share of recently. When I was much younger, the implications of these severe weather

events really didn't affect me as I was only responsible for myself and owned no tangible property. Now that I am becoming an old man and not only own property but am responsible for the safe keeping of our buildings on campus I have had to keep my priorities straight. Now as I see a massive thunderstorm cell developing or a tropical system forming, while marveling at their power and beauty, I only hope that they keep their distance and the ramifications are minimal.

Following up on my opening paragraph, what a crazy couple of weeks we have had at St. John the Evangelist. Although this has been a painstaking process, we are well covered by insurance and will be able to replace the damaged components, once we figure out what those damaged components include. I would like to thank everyone for their patience as we work our way through this process.

Commemoration of the Declaration of Independence should be the primary reason for the remembrance. Other than historically conscious traditionalists that understand the nature of the Republic, very few perceive the real purpose of the founding of America.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.

Above are the famous words written by Thomas Jefferson that laid the cornerstone of the United States of America. The Declaration of Independence was drafted by Thomas Jefferson with only minor participation by a committee that included John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman, and Robert Livingston, pursuant to a resolution of the Second Continental Congress. It was adopted by Congress on July 4, 1776.

Looking to John Adams' famous letter of July 3, 1776, to his wife Abigail will put the celebration into perspective

"The Second Day of July 1776, will be the most memorable Epocha, in the History of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary Festival. It ought to be commemorated, as the Day of Deliverance by solemn Acts of Devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with Pomp and Parade, with Shews, Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other from this Time forward forever more. You will think me transported with Enthusiasm but I am not. I am well aware of the Toil and Blood and Treasure, that it will cost Us to maintain this Declaration, and support and defend these States. Yet through all the Gloom I can see the Rays of ravishing Light and Glory. I can see that the End is more than worth all the Means. And that Posterity will

tryumph in that Days Transaction, even altho We should rue it, which I trust in God We shall not." (The Book of Abigail and John: Selected Letters of the Adams Family, 1762-1784, Harvard University Press, 1975, 142)

The intention of the remembrance is to memorialize the Declaration of Independence. But the meaning of the word and certainly the idea of independence is routinely ignored and often purged from the gala. A party for the sake of enjoyment snubs the solemn legacy of the founders. Yet, those who rally their attention on patriotic fervor, make an even more profound error.


The basic distinction between establishing independence, which is a prime essential to live out liberty and nationalistic allegiance, risks a fundamental disconnect in the purpose of a consensual union. The American Revolution was fought against a monarchy that prohibited basic rights of all

Englishmen. The original thirteen colonies sought to become independent states, no longer under the boot of George III and the British Crown. The goal for the rebellion was to gain self-government, for each colony and to establish a state sovereignty for each commonwealth. The union that evolved and formed after the Paris Peace Treaty of 1783, into the country known as the United States was a process separate from the crucial principle established in that accord.

We are truly blessed to live in this great country and without the sacrifice of our forefathers, we would not be celebrating the 4th of July.

U.S. Bishops Issue Statement on Supreme Court Decisions on Marriage; Florida Bishops Will Continue to Uphold and Defend Marriage as the Union of One Man and One Woman

"The Supreme Court has dealt a profound injustice to the American people by striking down in part the federal Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA)", said the U.S. Bishops in a statement* on the June 26 U.S. Supreme Court decisions on marriage. "The Court got it wrong. The federal government ought to respect the truth that marriage is the union of one man and one woman, even where states fail to do so. The preservation of liberty and justice requires that all laws, federal and state, respect the truth, including the truth about marriage. It is also unfortunate that the Court did not take the opportunity to uphold California's Proposition 8 but instead decided not to rule on the matter."


The U.S. Bishops also expressed, "Now that the Supreme Court has issued its decisions, with renewed purpose we call upon all of our leaders and the people of this good nation to stand steadfastly together in promoting and defending the unique meaning of marriage:

one man, one woman, for life. We also ask for prayers as the Court's decisions are reviewed and their implications further clarified."

While the U.S. Supreme Court's decisions will have profound consequences on marriage and society as a whole, neither of the two rulings directly affect Article 1, Section 27 of Florida's Constitution approved by 62% of voters in 2008, which defines marriage as the legal union of only one man and one woman as husband and wife. In particular, the limited ruling on DOMA did not strike the portion of the law that protects states from being forced to recognize same-sex marriage, and the Prop 8 ruling is limited to California.

The Bishops of Florida will continue to uphold and defend the true nature and meaning of marriage as an exclusive, lifelong communion between a man and a woman. It is within this union of husband and wife that children are received and nurtured. The common good and the future of our society are best served by ensuring that a child's right to a mother and a father, who bring unique gifts to the education and rearing of children, is protected.


uring the past few weeks, the theme of call and mission has been very prominent in the readings and gospel. Jesus informs his disciples there is much work to be done in proclaiming the good news but very few to offer themselves for this venture. The harvest that Jesus refers to is the message of the kingdom. The laborers are the people who are given the task to take the message of the kingdom and make it a reality for others. Jesus sends his appointed seventy-two in pairs to proclaim the kingdom. Jesus commands them to heal the sick and to bring the good news of salvation to any town they enter. Jesus advises the disciples to accept the hospitality offered them and to bestow peace on every household along the way. If the disciples encounter indifference and opposition, Jesus advises them to shake the dust from their feet. We hear at the end of the gospel that the seventy-two rejoice that the Lord's work is accomplished through them.

Reflection Questions

- 1. How did Jesus want the disciples to proclaim the kingdom?
- 2. How can you proclaim the kingdom?
- 3. Define the areas of your life that are in need of healing.
- 4. How does the world need to be healed?
- 5. What part are you going to play in the world's transformation?
- 6. What does harvest of the Lord represent for you?
- 7. Do you consider yourself to be a laborer for the Lord? Why or why not?
- 8. How are you challenged to incarnate the gospel through your personal discipleship?
- 9. How can you use your personal gifts to proclaim the kingdom?
- 10. What have you accomplished for the Lord?
- 11. What does God want you to accomplish in your lifetime?

The gospel today is often used to promote vocations for the priesthood and religious life. However, to limit this gospel event to this context would be a tremendous mistake. The work of the kingdom of God is not given to those who dedicate their lives to the priesthood or religious life alone. All those marked out in baptism share the divine calling to be a laborer for the harvest of the good news! All baptized Christians are asked to share in the ministry of the gospel. Everyone is asked in his or her given way to bring healing to society. On the surface it would appear to exorcize demons or bring full restoration to the sick is far out of reach for us as individuals. However, some of us can bring healing by simply extending a hand of friendship or by blessing someone with our presence. When life is troubling for someone we know, we may be encountered with a situation where someone is not at peace because they suffer from a dis-ease of the spirit. In those situations we are called to bring calm and solace through our words and support.

We are all asked to witness to the truth as it is given by Christ and his Church. Together we must face the difficult issues facing society and the Church by gently persuading others to seek the wisdom of God in every given situation. We are asked to promote the kingdom of God by promoting the dignity of life itself – by speaking out against abortion, euthanasia, and embryonic stem cell research. Equally, we are invited to promote the kingdom by accompanying young women with their difficult pregnancies, by visiting those who are sick and aiding their recovery with our time and treasure. It is in such simple acts that the reality of the kingdom is made known. If people refuse our efforts, we are simply reminded to move on and take our efforts elsewhere.



Prayer

Lord, may more and more people be inspired to follow your call to serve you. May those who seek the kingdom of heaven find it through our work as a community of faith. Once people become aware of the message of the kingdom within their lives, may they have the courage to share that message with others through their words and actions. Amen.

Marriage Enrichment

Creating a successful marriage doesn't end on the wedding day; it is a lifelong process.

Marriage is Voluntary

For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh (Genesis 2:24).

In our culture the idea that marriage is voluntary is self-evident; after all, what is it called when a man asks his beloved for her hand in marriage? A "proposal." One cannot force another into marriage, for love must be voluntarily given. This "proposing" nature of marriage reflects our relationship with God. He wants more than anything to have a deep communion with each one of us — yet He never imposes Himself upon us. It is up to each person to decide whether to accept or reject God's love.

Marriage is Total

So they are no longer two but one flesh (Matthew 19:4-6).

What would the bride's reaction be if a groom on his wedding day said to her, "I will give most, but not all, of myself to you. I plan to keep back some of myself for other interests-and I don't want you to be involved in them." Not very romantic, is it? (And not very likely to go over well, either). When a person enters into marriage, he or she is giving a total commitment to the spouse, with nothing held back. This is a reflection of God's love, which was so total that He gave His Son up to death for our salvation.

This complete giving of self in marriage involves the whole person: body and soul. A husband who hides a special bank account that he uses to spend on things his wife might not approve of has not given his whole life over to his spouse. A wife who remains emotionally attached to an old boyfriend and keeps in intimate contact with him after marriage has failed to give herself completely to her husband.

The total commitment of marriage also includes our sexuality, which is why the use of artificial contraception violates the marriage bond. Contraception makes impossible the total gift of self, because it withholds a dimension of the self from the spouse: one's procreative abilities. In marriage, spouses give everything they are-even the ability to co-create children-to the other. To hold this gift back is to hold back an essential part of who God created us to be, and to reject that gift from one's spouse is to reject a fundamental part of who he or she is.

Marriage is Faithful

What therefore God has joined together, let not man put asunder (Matthew 19:6).

Marriage-inherently-is an exclusive, life-long relationship between a man and a woman. Why is marriage by definition life-long? For one, like all aspects of marriage, it reflects God's love. God's love for us can never waver and can never end-He will be faithful to us even if we are unfaithful to Him.

But marriage is also to be life-long as a protection for both the married parties as well as any children that are produced in that marriage. Children deserve to be attached to their mother and father, and a life-long marriage does just this: it protects children from losing their father or mother due to divorce. Today's culture has seen the terrible effects that easy divorce has wrought: broken homes in which children are the primary victims.

Adultery is also incompatible with true marriage. The sixth commandment explicitly states that "You shall not commit adultery," thus recognizing the grave evil of extra-marital relationships. In adultery, a person rejects the life-long bond formed in marriage by forming a false union with another person. In the Old Testament, idolatry-unfaithfulness to Godwas often compared to adultery. Marriage is meant to reflect the faithful love of God for us.

Marriage is Fruitful

God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth" (Genesis 1:28).

Sometimes people are struck by the third question of intention in the marriage rite: "Will you accept children lovingly from God and bring them up according to the law of Christ and his Church?" Many young couples are not yet thinking about children and see them as an option in the far-off future. Why is this subject being brought up now?


The fact is that children are integrally linked to marriage. Although not every marriage produces children, every child deserves to be connected to his or her mother and father. Marriage is the institution that protects children, for when children are surrounded by their mother and father, they have the best chance to grow up in a loving environment that has their best interests at heart.

The link between children and marriage goes even deeper. After a wedding ceremony, the Church teaches that the marriage is not yet complete: it is not a valid marriage until it has been consummated by the conjugal act. So, the act which has as its natural end the procreation of children is what makes complete what was begun at the wedding ceremony. Without consummation a union can not be considered a marriage. This is one reason why a same-sex union can never be considered a "marriage," for the conjugal act is simply impossible for those involved.

But what about infertile couples or couples who marry after childbearing years? Does this mean that they are not able to truly marry? Not at all. In such cases, the conjugal act is still possible, even if procreation appears impossible. The actions of the couple are still directed towards procreation and open to life, regardless of whether life is actually created.
