

"Mission Possible" Reflections from Elma McCaughey and Fr. John

he "Mission Possible" Youth team embarked on a journey to get to know God on a deeper more profound level when they spent two weeks working with the poor of St. Lucia.

The young missionaries assisted the Missionaries of Charity sisters helping to feed the children who lived in the slums that surround the convent. They hiked up treacherous mountains as they witnessed the greatest poverty but the richest and deepest of faiths. The youth took time out to visit the abandoned elderly in the Marion Home, which is run by Carmelite Nuns; the physically and mentally impaired who resided at St. Lucy's Home, run by the Sisters of Jesus the Saviour; and visited with the children from the





Holy Family Children's Home, run by the Dominican Sisters. In the different locations the young missionaries sang songs, exchanged conversations, listened and embraced all with love and the human touch. Many times the missionaries were told that their visit brought those they encountered "Hope!"

They shared in the joy of the children from the Home who received new outfits from the "Mission Clothe Me" Project. Some of the children eagerly tried on and modeled their new clothes. Amos, one of the children living in the home asked Fr. John, "Is this what Christmas is like?" It was a rare yet great moment to see all the children happy and smiling. Most of them are sad and angry because they were left behind by their parents.

On a visit to the St. Lucia Crisis Center, set up by the Catholic church to help steer kids away from the streets and violence, the team listened in shock as the children recalled how they live out their daily lives surrounded by violent acts of shootings, stabbings and even rape. The team left the center in silence, pondering the stories they just heard.

The Youth on Mission had been given the task of painting a hall for the Marion Home and had much time to reflect on all their experiences and visits. It was not just the transformation of the building that emerged but the hearts of each one of our young team members as well.

The Youth worked hard, answering the call of the poor, treating all they met with great dignity. The Mission Office is proud of how they represented the Diocese of Venice and shared their Catholic Faith.

In the Missionaries of Charity. In all these experiences, our missionaries brough the joy and hope of the gospel of Christ to all they served.

The Good News of the Gospel was clearly seen in the acts of love shown on the trip. In working with the poorest of the poor, our young people certainly recognized the importance of taking a preferential option for the poor. They realized the voices of the poor must be

listened to and responded to. Many of the group commented that the mission trip changed their lives forever because of their encounters. Many of the missionaries shared they had a profound experience of God by entering into the lives of the poor.

Jesus entered into the lives of his disciples; he spent three years getting to know them, eating with them, traveling with them, listening to them, and teaching them. By his active presence and his desire to enter into relationships with them, Jesus proved his love for his disciples.

Following Jesus, the St. John Youth Ministry wants to be Incarnational and Relational as well. We are looking for adults and young adults who care deeply about adolescents and teens, who will go to where they are, to enter into relationships with them, to share their faith, and to personally invite them to a deeper walk with the Lord.

AUGUST 12, 2012 NINETEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Quoting scripture from the first book of the Old Testament, Genesis 1:3 states: *Then God said "Let there be light," and there was light.* I figured this would be a great segway into a very exciting announcement regarding the lighting in our church. After long last, we are

finally moving ahead with the lighting project in the church. Thanks to the generosity of several parishioners, we now have the funds available to proceed. I would like to especially recognize **John and Maureen Wurtz** for their financial sacrifice in getting us over the hump with regards to this project as they fully funded the remaining substantial shortfall. Jokingly, John mentioned that he was motivated due to the fact that he was unable to read his Missal during Mass.

Below is a brief history and recap of what we are planning

for the lighting project. We eagerly anticipate work being completed in the month of September.

We have made great strides during the past several years to enhance the buildings and grounds here at St. John the Evangelist. The last remaining major project is the lighting in the church. I will begin with a little history: The church is now nearly 20 years old with the first Mass being celebrated on Christmas Eve in 1992. The original lighting is still in place and the problems are now mounting at an exponential rate. First and foremost, the original lighting was designed and installed for more of a residential application and certainly not a commercial application. In order to change any of the bulbs in the ceiling or on the clerestory windows, a lift

must be rented and the front doors removed. This isn't your basic scissor lift but instead a 45' boom lift which will allow the operator to reach the 55' ceiling. The lift must be carefully navigated down the center aisle as to not damage the pews. There is a clearance of $\frac{1}{2}$ inch on either side. There is obviously very little room for error. Just to change the bulbs in the sanctuary, we spend several thousand dollars in lift rental, bulbs and labor. The bulbs in the sanctuary ceiling are a combination of metal halide and par lamp spotlights. The fixtures are controlled by an archaic Lutron dimmer pack system. Even after replacing all of the bulbs in the ceiling, many burn out in as little as six months after replacement. The lighting over the altar is mounted on a track system and consists of the same par lamp spotlights. We replaced every single light and a few of the fixtures following the renovation last September. As you can see, nearly all of these bulbs have burned out. Many burned out after only six months. The lighting over the altar is also controlled by the dimmer packs. The dimmer packs have reached the end of their useful life. We have replaced a few and the problems still persist. Due to the malfunction of the dimmer packs, much of the lighting has been rerouted, bypassing the dimmer packs. As for the rest of the church, the lighting is very poor at best. The Narthex is very gloomy and dark. The back wings are also very dark even after removing the old wood

> ceiling two years ago. The lectors and the celebrant often have a very difficult time reading the word of God from the Ambo. We have made numerous patches over the years, but the problem seems to worsen as time goes by.


We have now retained a commercial lighting professional to address our problems. They have come up with a solution which will illuminate the church while solving the problems of maintenance. With this new proposal, we will be able to lower the lights over the altar for easy access. We will replace the fixtures in the sanctuary ceiling to new energy efficient fixtures and bulbs with a life over ten times what is currently in place. We will also illuminate the Narthex and back wings by installing very tasteful chandeliers and adding ancillary fixtures. The entire system may

be controlled by an Ipad from anywhere inside the church. There are 999 different scenes which may be programmed and accessed simply by the push of a button. The stage lighting proposed above the altar may be manipulated in a plethora of different variations, even including the addition of color. Imagine being able to flood the back walls of the Altar with green or purple to coincide with the particular color of the liturgical season. The technological advances made over the

past 19 years with regards to lighting have been numerous. We would like to take advantage of these advances and install a new lighting system which will bring our church into the 21st century. I am aware that many of you have a difficult time reading your missal due to the abysmal lighting in the sanctuary. I apologize for the delay in addressing the lighting, however, we made a decision that temporary patches would no longer be acceptable. The church lighting needs a total overhaul and we are now off and running.

If you have visited the Wal-Mart around the corner recently, you may have seen the beautiful yellow flowering ground cover located in their parking lot. It is called "Dunes Sunflower"(see picture) and provides beautiful coverage for "dead" areas which normally go without landscaping or shrubs. This is a very hearty variety which blooms year round and requires very little water or maintenance. It is also fairly inexpensive. We will initially install the ground cover at the front of our site along 111th avenue to see how it does before proceeding throughout the campus. This should provide a beautiful splash of cover to our campus year round

he gospel of John offers us a tremendous insight into the intimate relationship that Jesus has with the Father in heaven. The Father sends his Son to nourish the world with a food that is everlasting. Jesus is the living bread that comes down from heaven to give people everything they need for life's journey. Jesus constantly presses the issue of the unity in the persons of the Trinity. Jesus associates his words and teachings with the wisdom of the Father. Believing in his Word will bring us eternal life. In today's gospel, the fourth evangelist quotes the prophets, "They shall all be taught by God." Jesus is the Word Incarnate. When Jesus taught the people of his day, God himself was speaking.

Jesus' message provides us with an in-depth view into the heart of God. Christ's wisdom is given to those who are rejected by members of society and by their own religious establishment, and offers them compassion and support. The poor, the sinner, the outcast, the possessed, the unclean, the vulnerable, are all embraced by the life of Christ. In these very acts, he is showing us that it is God's initiative to reach the rejected, the oppressed, and the forgotten. Jesus makes these broken and fragile human beings beloved in the sight of God. The bread that Jesus gives is not discriminatory, but life-sustaining and accepting. Jesus offers himself as flesh for the life of the world. What does this mean? Jesus offers his very body and blood on the Tree of Life on Calvary to save us. The economy of salvation is offered to all those who wish to partake in the food that he offers – the life that he lived. Those who wish to walk down the gospel byways of unconditional love, pave their way to the Father's house in heaven.

St. Paul tells us today that we should imitate God's very initiative – that we become imitators of Jesus Christ. This action leads us into the depth of God's heart – every time we reach out in love to those who are regarded as

useless, poor or vulnerable, we do so knowing that God becomes present in our very endeavors. We might well ask ourselves, who am I to accomplish such great a task? People criticized Jesus because of his humble background. Many question his authority based on the fact that they limited him to his parentage. Jesus advances in ministry doing extraordinary things because he is aware of the mission given him by the Father in heaven. We, too, are called to do those extraordinary things in the midst of the ordinariness of our lives regardless of how worthy or unworthy we deem ourselves to be.

The example of Jesus' life sets us on our feet to make a difference in this world. When we truly come to know and believe in what Jesus says our lives change. Once Jesus' wisdom penetrates the depths of the human heart the world begins to change. Our relationships are transformed when we truly embrace Christ's message. Bitterness, fury, anger, and malice are replaced by kindness, compassion, forgiveness, and love.






