Buildings and Grounds Committee Continues Work Begun in April 2010

This is the first of a series of articles chronicling the work of St. John's Buildings and Grounds Committee (B & G). This article will focus on the establishment of the Committee, its responsibilities and membership. Future articles will focus on projects the Committee has undertaken during its tenure.

The Buildings & Grounds Committee was established by Fr. John in April of 2010 to advise him on **all issues** related to existing and future parish buildings, property, and equipment. He requested that the Committee conduct an annual review of all parish facilities, grounds and equipment and identify, prioritize and determine responsibility for various maintenance projects and equipment purchases.

The Committee's responsibilities include the following:

- Maintain and repair parish buildings, i.e. Church, Parish Life Center, Claussen Family Center and Rectory
- Ensure that all facilities are kept clean, sanitary, safe and in good repair and appearance so as to limit liability exposure.
- Ensure that heating, air conditioning; plumbing, mechanical and electrical systems of all parish properties are properly maintained and fully operational.
- Maintain and enhance the landscaping of parish properties.
- Keep current an asset inventory and develop a replacement schedule.
- Develop a long range plan for buildings and grounds improvements, equipment purchases and major capital expenditures.
- Develop a natural disaster plan.
- Develop a preventative maintenance program for

buildings, grounds and major pieces of mechanical, plumbing and electrical equipment to facilitate projected life cycle of these items.

- Provide for security of parish properties.
- Prepare a yearly budget based on current and future needs, and provide it to the Finance Council for their approval.
- Assume other responsibilities as assigned by the Pastor.

The Committee is composed of parishioners, appointed by Fr. John. Members have backgrounds in building design, construction and maintenance; landscape design, construction, irrigation and maintenance; insurance; etc., Fr. John and Scott serve on the Committee as well.

The Committee held its first meeting on April 6, 2010, and has met on a monthly basis in "season" since that time. The first goal of the Committee was to conduct a comprehensive assessment of the "state of the parish" congruent with the Committee's objectives and responsibilities. This assessment resulted in a comprehensive list of tasks (over 200) which needed to be accomplished, some short term, others long term.

In our next article, Getting Started, we will review how we took all of these disparate items and put together a workable plan.

Ladies of St. John's Luncheon August 28





Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Did you see that our “Lest we Forget” Veteran’s Memorial finally made the Naples Daily News? Although it was via a letter to the editor, there was a picture included and a brief, yet well done narrative on the interpretations of those who may see the work of art. I think we should all be very proud of this amazing Veterans Memorial and the support our parish has shown for our troops!

Thank you to all of our parishioners for your strong showing the first Sunday of “Undy Sunday.” The bags were overflowing by the end of the weekend and as a result, many deserving children in Collier County will have appropriate undergarments as they head back to school this week. There were also numerous donations brought directly to the parish office. Donations at St. John the Evangelist are up over last year. Let’s finish strong this final week of “Undy Sunday.”

The Visiting Nurses Association will once again offer Flu and Pneumonia shots right here at St. John the Evangelist on Thursday, October 10 and Thursday, November 7 beginning at 9:00 a.m. in the ballroom of the Parish Life Center. The seasonal Flu shot is \$25, preservative free Flu shot is \$30, High-Dose Flu shot is \$50 and the Pneumonia shot is \$65. All vaccinations are covered by Medicare Part B and Railroad Medicare. In addition to the Flu Shots and Pneumonia, they will also be offering Tetanus Booster and Pertussis. Did you know that the proceeds from the Visiting Nurses Association will be used to provide Flu, Tetanus and Pneumonia shots to Immokalee Farmworkers free of charge? This should be reason enough to get your shot right here in the friendly confines of St. John the Evangelist.

I published the paragraph below in my column last year at



this time. Considering that we finished last year’s appeal with a surplus of \$60,000.00, I felt it prudent to include again this year. With that said, I also feel it very important that our parishioners understand the mechanics of the CFA, how the assessment is derived and the importance of meeting our goal.

Over the past ten+ years, I have explained in detail from the altar and in writing the importance of the Catholic Faith Appeal and the financial implications of reaching and exceeding our goal. However I will once again lay it out in detail. As you know, the CFA is the single most important component of our annual budget. This year’s assessment/goal is \$454,000.00. How is this number derived? We are assessed at a rate of 26% on all receipts which the Diocese of Venice deems to be assessable income. This includes regular offertory, rental income, and special gifts and donations. Jamaica Outreach, Habitat for Humanity and all Diocesan Collections (Catholic University, Peters Pence, etc...) are non-assessable. We then receive a credit (30%) for all donations made for tuition subsidies and gifts to other parishes. The net of the assessable receipts and credits results in our annual assessment which is based on the prior fiscal year. Beginning in February with kickoff Sunday, we have approximately 11 months to raise the funds to meet our

goal. Everyone receives a mailer from the Diocese and has the option of making an annual pledge. We strongly encourage all parishioners to make a pledge. Many choose to forego this option and make donations to the CFA through the offertory during the course of the year. These checks are then sent directly to the Diocese of Venice. The funds allocated for the CFA are non-assessable and every penny of every dollar donated will be used to offset our assessment. Your contributions to the CFA are not recognized by the parish and therefore you will not see your gifts on the annual statement from St. John the Evangelist. You will receive an acknowledgement from the Diocese of Venice at year’s end detailing your contributions to the CFA if you gave in excess of \$250.00 during the calendar year. If not, you will need to retain

your cancelled checks or copies for tax purposes. If we exceed our \$454,000.00 goal by the last week of December 2013, the excess will be returned to the parish free of assessment to be used for whatever programs or ministries we choose. This could be a huge windfall for the parish as we could use these funds to create reserves to replace the aging Parish Life Center air conditioning units or to purchase materials for Faith Formation, Music, etc... Conversely, if we fall short of our goal, we must use funds out of our general operating income to pay the shortfall. Our budget for 2013/2014 is based on meeting our CFA goal, therefore, if we fall short, this could certainly be a "budget buster." I hope this lengthy explanation has cleared up any questions you may have about the mechanics of the Catholic Faith Appeal. It is imperative that we reach our goal and with your help, I am confident that we can do so. If you are able, please consider making a pledge or contribution to the Catholic Faith Appeal. Please make your check payable to the CFA with St. John the Evangelist in the memo line.


Support for those suffering the loss of a loved one will be held in the Parish Life Center on Tuesdays, September 10 and September 24.



The Word & Life

Jesus Turns the World Upside Down

The Jesus encountered in today's gospel does not appear like he normally does. We are used to the healer, restorer, forgiver, and teacher. However, the gospel of Luke presents the radical Christ. There is an unsettling tone connected with Jesus' words. He tells us that he will bring fire upon the earth and division among families. This message of Jesus is disturbing. When we look at the overall life-project of Jesus we see how it radically challenges the people of his day. Jesus' message disturbs those who had become comfortable in their faith. Christ introduces God as a Father who forgives and restores what is broken. Since the faith of Jesus' day had been reduced to rules and regulations, his message of transformation turned this world upside down. The tax collector, the sinner, the possessed, the poor and the sick now had a place in God's heart. Up until the coming of Christ, sin and illness were always regarded as God's punishment because a familial sin. Jesus confronts this notion with mercy and compassion.

The society in which Jesus lived experienced the Roman occupation and was subjected to taxes. Outside Roman rule, the lived faith experience was almost a theocracy. People's daily lives were ruled by the laws contained within the Torah. Whenever people contradicted the Torah by their actions, they would have been confronted by the religious class, i.e. the Pharisees and the Sadducees. As we journey through the gospels and the experience of the early Church in the Christian Scriptures we discover experiences of people leaving a way of life to follow Christ. The reality of such sacrifice must have brought tension to the families involved. Jesus' message talked of a new reign of God's mercy in which all people were welcomed and honored. When Jesus talked of division, he must have foreseen the consequences of those who would follow his Way. Those who chose to follow Christ had to embrace the new order and teaching that brought the Hebrew Scriptures to fulfillment. These very same people who believed in monotheism and followed the Christ, who had been put to death as a political subversive, were also in danger of becoming enemies of the Roman state. Our history shows that the early Christians were persecuted not only by the Romans, but also by their own. One could almost begin to imagine what arguments would break out in a family when one of their own chose to follow the radical message of Christianity and martyrdom.

Christianity is not just a systematic theology – it is also a way of life. It reveals the canvas of God's will in which all can be saved. Jesus' message of salvation is offered to everyone. The gospel continues to challenge the world and at times confronts the status quo. The wisdom of Jesus when it is truly lived can transform

lives. There are those among us who have called upon Jesus to help them turn away from addiction and violence. They abandon this destructive ways of life by being converted to Christ. These courageous members of our society experience first hand the division that Jesus talks about in today's gospel. Those who are reformed from drug addiction or violence can never be accepted back into their neighborhoods.

The tension of the gospel will become familiar to us whenever we confront sinful situation with the redemptive message of Jesus Christ.


