The Requirements for serving at Mass are:


- 1. The altar server must have received first confession and Holy Communion. They should be mature enough to be able to sit for the length of the mass and be attentive at all times.

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. PARISH INFORMATION...

"What we experienced with her (an elderly lady) was the true presence of God among us."

Pour weeks ago, on a cool Friday morning, as you were all in bed getting some much needed beauty sleep, a rag-tag group of missionaries gathered in a Naples WalMart parking lot, not quite sure what to expect — but ready and willing to do the Lord's work serving the poor. There was myself; my brother Jonathan; our new Director of Youth Ministry, Bill Maguire; our beloved Pastor, Fr. John; our fiery mission coordinator, Elma; and a group of youth missionaries from other parishes.

Our mission began in a rundown airport in St. Lucia with feelings of excitement and an overwhelming sense of nervousness. From there, we enjoyed a beautiful drive through

the mountains to the seminary where we stayed. During the time we spent on mission, we engaged in the corporal works of mercy: painting, visiting the elderly, playing with children, and bringing the Blessed Sacrament to the homebound. But it wasn't all work; we enjoyed a couple days on the beautiful St. Lucian beaches. Through all this, I believe it was what we received from these people, and not what we gave, that made the mission trip a great success.

Take a second and imagine the most intense poverty you can; now multiply this by ten and you will have the level of poverty that we experienced. The children we met talked about murders, stabbings and rapes they saw in their own neighborhoods. Women talked about the destruction of families caused by drug addictions. The level of poverty and fear that these wonderful people live in shocked me beyond belief, but what truly baffled me is how they kept such an intense faith in God through all these hardships. It is very easy to love God when everything is going our way, but it is much harder to keep such faith through hardships. The St. Lucian people taught me that through everything that comes our way, God will always be there for us. It brings to mind Matthew 6: 25-34: The people we encountered truly live

Perhaps the best experience I had was during a home visit with an elderly lady. Father John, two sisters, a couple missionaries and I were bringing her communion. The Sisters brought her communion regularly, but when she opened the door she had a knowing look on her face. When we asked her about this, she began to tell us how she had seen us coming to her in a dream and that she was expecting us. This vision and the joy she had because of our simple act of bringing the Eucharist to her stirred in me an emotion I had yet to feel during the entire trip. I am convinced that what we experienced with her was the true presence of God among us. Our mission trip to St. Lucia was one of great spiritual growth for all involved, and I believe that no one left the island unchanged. It is a trip I hope all will embark on at once in their lifetime.

After bragging about our lake filling up from a plethora of precipitation only two weeks ago, we have encountered a dry stretch and levels have dropped considerably since that time. In addition, the grass parking areas that were beginning to rebound have turned brown once again. Hopefully, by the time you are reading Scott's Corner, we will

have resumed our typical summertime pattern of afternoon

thunderstorms. We have a substantial deficit with regards to rainfall for the year to date. There is a developing tropical system in the Eastern Atlantic that could bring much needed rainfall to our area by next week. Other than that, I feel that further water restrictions are imminent.

Can you believe that Collier County Schools begin again on Monday, August 20? That is only two weeks from this coming Monday. Since most people associate the beginning of the school year with the end of summer, one

with the end of summer, one could surmise that we have only two weeks of summer remaining. Is it possible that our summer is already over? I thought it was only just beginning! Even though public schools are resuming shortly, I refuse to recognize this as the end of summer and will instead defer to the Labor Day Holiday as the true end of summer. Or better yet, we could use the Autumnal equinox as an end date and postpone the true end of summer to September 22. I know that summer in Naples is not what it used to be only ten years ago when the month of August rendered our sleepy little town nearly void of everyone other than only true full time residents. These days, I have a hard time differentiating between August and February with the exception

of the fact that an August walk from the parking lot to Mass will drain upwards of a pound of water weight from one's body. It is true that the face of Naples has changed with the recent influx of more young families and full time residents.

Work continues on the bathrooms in the Parish Life Center.

The new travertine flooring was installed this past week in the men's room and looks fantastic. What a difference this is going to make. We will not polish the travertine following installation but will apply an enhancer which will bring out the vivid colors of the stone. The finish will be a semi gloss. Due to the commercial nature of the bathrooms, we don't want the surface to be too slippery. The finished product will be very similar to what you would find in a high end hotel. 
Work began this past Monday to refinish the dance floor and stage in the Parish Life Center. As the attached picture shows, there was nearly eight years of "gunk" built up on the dance floor. Work will be finished by this past Friday. The process involves sanding off the old finish and then applying three new coats of polyurethane. Did you know that our dance floor in the PLC is a floating dance floor? What does this mean? The dance floor is not directly installed on the concrete slab but instead there are wood "ribs" underneath

the flooring. This process provides some "give" and cushioning to the hard wood surface. If you ever noticed that your feet are not sore after a long night of dancing on our floor, you can thank the floating floor.

With five months remaining, we have officially reached the two-thirds mark with regards to the Catholic Faith Appeal. As of this past week, we have pledges totaling \$294,679.20. Our goal is \$443,000.00, which means we must come up with another \$148,320.80 by the end of December. For those that have not made a pledge, I urge you to do so. The amount of your pledge is inconsequential as there is power in numbers. Every dollar counts and every penny of your pledge will be used to

directly offset our assessment. My hope is that every parish family will find a way to make a pledge no matter how small the amount. 
Prayer for the Protection of Religious Liberty

God's Bountifulness

s we enter into the story of Sacred Scripture we are confronted by what it truly means to be a person of faith. All of us are called to examine the foundation of our lives and to contemplate how God nourishes us with his Word and presence. In our first reading we recall the great event of the Exodus and how God had delivered the Israelites from the cruel Egyptian slave drivers and the terrible reign of the Pharaoh. As they journey through the wilderness with Moses they soon forget what the Lord has done for them and start to grumble and complain. Their current situation of suffering, impoverishment and lack of food cloud their ability to trust that God will see them through. Even in the midst of their failure to trust in the Lord, He hears their cries and provides. Quail and manna are gifted to feed their hunger. Bread from heaven satisfies these hungry souls. God's generosity and bounty is offered freely.

Likewise, in the reading from St. Paul to the Ephesians, he encourages the Christian community not to lose sight of God in their lives. A life without God is one which is open to corruption, deceit and futility. Paul reminds these believers that they are to live the truth in love by allowing the righteousness and the holiness of his truth to shape their lives. In Paul's view, living such truth offers a renewal in spirit; a new consciousness of the blessing of God in their relationships with one another and the world.

In today's gospel, Jesus knows the hearts of those who seek him out. They look for signs in order to figure the purpose of God in their lives. Jesus tells the people not to be satisfied by the fill of the meal which he had just offered, but to take the food that will not perish and which will be preserved for eternity. Of course Jesus is talking about himself. He truly is the bread which has come down from heaven, gifted by the Father, to satisfy the hunger of the soul. Jesus could not be any clearer when he said, "I am the bread of life, whoever comes to me will never hunger and whoever believes in me will never thirst." By digesting the wisdom of Christ and integrating that wisdom


into hearts, our lives and our relationship, we are given food for the journey that will ultimately to heaven.

As we continue through the liturgical season of Ordinary Time this summer, we will hear more from the Bread of Life discourse from John's Gospel. Jesus will tell his listeners that this very bread that he offers is his flesh for the life of the world. Our Scriptures will encourage us. contemplate our belief in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. We have all heard it said, "You are what you eat." When it comes

to our belief in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist this is of profound significance. As we digest the body of Christ, we are called to become the Body of Christ – to become what we eat.

The food that Jesus gives us is different from the food the world offers us. Christ's food nourishes our very mind, body, soul and spirit. Whenever we feel down or lonely in life, Jesus nourishes us with his very presence — "...whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst." This is Jesus' promise to all of us. The words and actions of Jesus give us much food for thought. Jesus constantly shows us what is expected of us in our relationship with others. Jesus always brings people to the dignity of self — he heals, forgives and restores what is broken. Jesus' example is our food for the journey that will bring us one day to everlasting life. We are

all asked to share in the mission of the Church to feed the hungry and clothe the naked. We can do this in material ways, but sometimes there is a deeper call present to minister to the hunger of the heart.





We pray: Lord, may we always hunger for you as the Bread of Life. May your words and example lead us to feed all those who are in need. May our words feed the poverty of spirit and my actions mirror those of Jesus who is forever the life of the world. Give us the grace to recognize hunger and bless us with the strength to become living wells for others. Amen.




