Sacrament of Baptism

To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. 

St. John Bosco's Vision for Youth Ministry: Part Two

As mentioned last week, Don Bosco took St. Frances de Sales as his spiritual father. St. Frances is famous for his teaching about the Devout Life: our spiritual life should sync with the duties of our state in life. For example, the spiritual life of a young mother or father is necessarily different than a religious sister or brother. Yet, lay people should not feel less devout on account of this. In fact, any attempt to live as a religious would be disastrous for them — not to mention the unbearable smell of unchanged diapers that would result.

Perhaps St. Frances de Sales was ahead of his time, making clear the call to holiness is universal and not limited to the "spiritual elite." Don Bosco took a similar approach in calling young people to holiness. Let's encourage ourselves and our teens to become the saints of today! After all, what else is there?

- 3. I will stay close to Jesus in the Eucharist
- 4. I will honor and love Mary as my Mother and Helper

LET US PRAY...



What a sight we had at 7:30 a.m. this past Monday morning. Perched atop the cross on the very pinnacle of the roof of the church was an extremely beautiful and stoic American Bald Eagle. Although this was a very rare site, the symbolism of his visit is far reaching. Did you know that the symbol of St. John the Evangelist is the Eagle? Because it soars upward, the

eagle is a symbol of the resurrection or ascension of Christ. By extension, the eagle symbolizes baptized Christians, who have symbolically died and risen with Christ. The eagle is the symbol of John the Evangelist. The eagle represents John because of his lofty and "soaring" gospel (it is much more theological in nature than the other three). Christian tradition has long connected the authors of the four canonical Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, John) with the four "living creatures" that surround God's throne, as described in Revelation 4:7, in the following pairs: Matthew – Human/Angel, Mark – Lion, Luke – Ox and John – Eagle. Believe it or not, this is the

second such sighting in the past three years, and I was once again unable to get a picture worthy of publication in the bulletin.

Although it does not feel like autumn in Naples with temperatures and humidity levels in the mid 90s, fall will arrive next Saturday morning at 10:49 a.m. in conjunction with the autumnal equinox. So as the sun begins to head south of the celestial equator and the days become shorter and shorter, we can take solace in the fact that there will be less searing heat, if only for the fact that there will be progressively fewer minutes of daylight each day. Ironically enough, as we complain about the oppressive heat, our friends to the north have just experienced their first cold front of the year. If you have always wondered how our seasonal parishioners choose the date of departure from their

northern residences, one parishioner appropriately stated that the thermometer rather than the calendar dictates when they head south. With that being said, I would assume that we will be seeing a substantial influx within the next few weeks.

Samples of the new wall sconces for the lighting project arrived this past week and were unanimously approved. We are attempting to expedite the six week lead time on these fixtures as well as the chandeliers.

"Andrea's Angel" is now installed in the southeast corner of the Memorial Garden. I assumed this would be done last week, but we were unable to get a crew onsite to re-route the irrigation. Attached is a picture of the finished product (minus the landscaping.) Please take a minute to check it out after Mass as the picture really doesn't show its true beauty. 
Parishioners have asked me for years if there was a way to make

s the disciples continue on the Way, they must have been astonished by the wisdom and the questions that Jesus gave them. The episode that took place on the journey to Caesarea Philippi is a moment of enlightenment during the public life of Jesus. Jesus asks the disciples about who the people thought that he was. This is one of the most profound questions that Jesus poses to his disciples. Peter recognized Jesus as the Anointed, the Christ, the One who is sent from God. Peter's wisdom comes from the enlightened heart of a simple fisherman. However, when Jesus goes on to tell his disciples that as the Christ he would suffer for the message, Peter is not ready to experience the suffering of Jesus' mission. Jesus sees Peter's reluctance to embrace the cross as the work of the evil one and rebukes him by saying, "Get behind me, Satan. You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do." The mission and gospel of Jesus Christ offers the challenge to embrace discipleship. Sometimes that involves suffering for the message and carrying the cross.


The challenge for every individual parish all over the world is to rediscover its Christological heart. Every Christian must seek the presence of the Lord in every situation, so that Christ may be present to the Church today, just as much as He was experienced two thousand years ago; where he walked the dusty roads of our world, encountering need and offering God's healing to a waiting world. The mission of the Church today is to proclaim our Salvation in Christ and the Redemption found in moments of conversion. The work that we must engage ourselves in today is to find and embrace our Christological heart and to hold it out to a broken world, waiting to be transformed, made whole and yearning for peace. Every time

an individual of the world has his/her heart broken as a result of war, violence, poverty, prejudice, or inattention, the heart of Christ aches too. The Last Judgment of Matthew's gospel reminds us, "Whatsoever you do to the least of my brothers and sisters, you did it to me"(Mt.25:40). In our second reading today, St. James reminds us faith and works have to go hand in hand to rise to an authentic and lively faith. This is a radical knowledge to have, that is, in encountering the needs of the world, we also

encounter Christ who is inviting us to use our gifts, our resources, our very lives, to give witness to faith, the mission of the Church and the heart of Christ.

Jesus is asking us the same question that was posed to Peter in today's gospel – "And you, yes you, who do you say that I am?" The discerning Christian is asked to search the depths of his or her soul to answer this profound question and to respond in an appropriate way. In our attempts to live the gospel, Christ makes himself present and known through each one of us!

Jesus, you are the Christ, the answer to all our prayers, and our reason to have hope. May we be inspired to find you in all people and in the fragile areas of society that have yet to see your presence and experience your unconditional love. Let each of us have the courage to bear the cross of disciples by sacrificing our time and lives for the needs around us. We know that we are called to be attentive to those who are vulnerable. As we reach out to others, may we find your Christological heart at work in us. Amen.
