

Prayer Garden Uplifting for the Eyes, Ears and Spirit

If you've spent any time in our still-new Paniccia Prayer Garden (and I hope you have!) you've probably heard some of the music and prayers that come from the sound system there! It is our hope that the sounds you hear will blend with the beautiful surroundings to enable you to have an even more profound spiritual experience.

The Buildings and Grounds committee planned for music in the Prayer Garden from the start, and an MP3 player was donated by a wonderful parish family for that purpose. Five different playlists are now on the player, one for each season of the liturgical year: Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter and Ordinary Time. This last, of course, is the one you hear daily at the present time.



Parishioners and visitors to the Paniccia Prayer Garden will be greeted with prayers, music or even silence, depending on the time of day.

Each playlist has music especially

suited to that season, spanning the two millennia of the Church from Gregorian Chant to songs from last year. While some of the music is instrumental, there is much that is sung as well (both solo and choral), and languages from Latin to French to Spanish (even Russian!) are included in addition to English. I have personally chosen and approved each selection, from the great chant Masses, to the choral music of Poulenc & Duruflé, to the contemporary songs of Danielle Rose and Matt Maher.

Prayer is an especially important part of the Paniccia Prayer Garden playlists — as it should be! From midnight to 6:00 p.m., the garden is silent, but just after the first soft sounds at 6:00 each morning, brief daily prayers are offered, including the *Memorare*, the St. Michael prayer, the Guardian Angel prayer and the Morning Offering.

Every day at noon, the Rosary is prayed, and at 3:00 p.m., the Divine

Mercy Chaplet — first spoken and then sung. Anything that moves people to prayer is a good thing, and perhaps there are some people out there who would pray the Rosary or the Chaplet, etc., more often if they had someone —even a recording — with whom to pray. Those who are unfamiliar

with these beautiful devotions, but perhaps are unsure how to ask for guidance, can also be "walked" through the prayers in this way.

If you listen for familiar voices leading the prayers, you'll be disappointed — for now. In the future, we plan on recording all these prayers, and more, with our wonderful priests, as well as staff members and parishioners too. In fact, a whole series of albums highlighting music and prayer from St. John the Evangelist is in the works.

That's not to say you won't hear familiar voices, however. Fr. John's music can be heard several times throughout the day, especially his setting of the "Irish Blessing". A few recordings also feature my own music, and if you are particularly perceptive you might notice a couple 1940s-era recordings. These are my late grandfather, Donald Tiedemann, singing

the Ave Maria and the Lord's Prayer, among others, in his tremendous baritone.

Silence is as much a part of prayer — and music! — as sound, and so to facilitate this, there is not "non-stop" music in the garden. During Ordinary Time there is a moderate amount of silence; during the celebratory seasons of Christmas and Easter,

there is less, and during the more penitential seasons of Advent and Lent, there is more. It is Fr. John's hope that those who prefer complete silence would find the Adoration Chapel of particular use for that purpose.

It is the hope of all of us — from the clergy and staff to all the tremendously generous donors, especially Deacon Frank and Sandy Paniccia, that the Prayer Garden be a place for spiritual reflection and prayer. After all, revelation history both began, and culminated, in a

garden (cf. Gn 2:8 and Jn 19:41). A garden is a gift from God our Father and Creator, of course, who created all things; but its ordered beauty also requires the participation of man in its formation — an ideal metaphor for our spiritual lives.

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. 

St. John Youth Ministry

Are Catholics Required to Leave Their Brains at the Door of Faith?

Young Catholics are constantly bombarded with propaganda from what is called the "new atheism." All too many Catholics are, however, unprepared to meet the claims of the new atheism on "their" turf: i.e., the field of ideas and rational evidence.

While many of us have earned even advanced academic degrees, we did not pursue our faith formation with equal intellectual rigor. Our religious education did not keep pace with our secular education, leaving us with what some have termed "Crayola Catholicism" (faith without sufficient reason).

Yet if we want our teens to embrace the Catholic faith with enthusiasm, we must offer them

something beyond "Crayola Catholicism." We must engage their full aspirations: both their hearts and their minds. (Yes, teens have intellectual aspirations!) In short, teens will stay Catholic only if we do not ask them to leave their brains at the door of faith.

It is precisely this concern that motivated Pope Benedict XVI to declare 2012-2013 the Year of Faith. In his apostolic letter *The Door of Faith*, the pope identifies our present crisis: Faith is no longer "a self-evident proposition for life in society. . . . It is often openly denied. . . . A profound crisis of faith has affected many people."

Benedict XVI highlights *Orthodoxy* (right belief) and *Orthopraxy* (right action) as the two pillars essential to experience the joy and enthusiasm of encountering Christ through faith. In other words, faith has two inseparable components: the Mind (content) and the Heart (practice).

The pope puts this beautifully: "Knowledge of the content of faith is essential for . . . adhering fully with intellect and will to what the Church proposes. Knowledge of faith opens a door into the fullness of the saving mystery revealed by God"

On the other hand, "Knowing the content to be believed is not sufficient unless the heart, the authentic space within the person, is opened by grace. . . . Faith without charity bears no fruit."

Effective youth ministry must, then, take a balanced approach: appealing to the hearts *and* minds of young people.




Prayer for the Protection of Religious Liberty

Reflection Questions

- 1. How is today's gospel teaching me?
- 2. What do I see when I look within my heart?
- 3. Do I live the faith I profess with my lips?
- 4. Is there a disconnect between my faith and my life?
- 5. How do I view the traditions and teachings of Church?
- 6. Am I able to surrender to God's will and to embrace the wisdom of God contained within the given magisterial teachings of the Church?
- 7. Do I allow Jesus' teachings to transform my life?

t seems so strange to find that the only people who annoy Jesus in the gospels are the religious people – those who criticize others because they think their understanding is the only way to God. In today's gospel, Jesus confronts the Pharisees who are the observers of the Law. The orthodox Jew was expected to follow every precept of the Torah, especially where purification rites were concerned. The Pharisees in the gospel criticized the followers of Christ for not adhering rigidly to the laws of purification. The Pharisees were zealous in the observance of the Law, but fundamental in the execution of the practices of the Law. Jesus recognizes the very Law that was meant to lead people to God had become a stumbling block to people's faith. Laws were meant to bring people closer to God. The external practices of the Law of the Torah were there to remind the people of the interior dispositions which lead one to live a good life. Jesus rebukes the Pharisees because their focus had moved away from making people aware of God's presence, to making sure the systems and practices were strictly followed. In essence, the Pharisees' only concern was the externals. They had no interest for the interior being which shapes the soul.

To believe in God requires more than practice and observances – it involves the language of the heart that leads others to God no matter where they are in life. As a Church we are called into the depth of God's heart. The laws of our Church are there to guide and govern – to lead people to the point where they are touched by God's heart – by God's love. Our laws are not there to control, to set apart or to diminish someone's dignity. They are there, rather, to bring others to the fullness of life in Jesus Christ. We are called to humbly welcome the Word that has been planted in us by Jesus. Our very attitudes must always reflect that of Jesus. Even when someone falls short of the laws of our Church – through our prayers, our witness and our efforts, we must always be willing to go the extra mile to convince

others of the power of God's love and forgiveness. This is not accomplished by words alone. It is communicated by the acts of love and reconciliation that we perform.

Millions of peoples have tried to follow God's will since the time of Abraham. Much knowledge has been imparted upon the world throughout salvation history. This knowledge communicates the wisdom of God passed on to us through those God chose to communicate his message. Jesus Christ as Word Incarnate brings us



the fullness of revelation which is passed on to the Church through the apostles. This knowledge remains with the Catholic Church to bring the whole world to salvation. The challenge for the Church is to transform people and the world through the knowledge and love of God that has been bestowed upon the world. The Magisterium of the Church, the ordained clergy, theologians and catechists in local parishes are entrusted with the sacred duty of handing on this deposit of faith. Each parish throughout the world shares in this great endeavor of transformation. Every individual who lives in the parish must remember that tradition and the practices of the Church are handed onto us to shape our lives and lead us to salvation. All members of the Body of Christ are called to look at the interior disposition of their lives and to nurture that which is perfect and pure.
