

Changes to the Roman Missal

My dear parishioners,

Change happens.

Just take a look at your grade school picture; you will know what I mean. Change happens throughout the span of our lives. We change in appearance. We change in interests. We change in behavior. History records changes that have taken place in every society, in every culture, in every organization. Some changes mark progress. Horsedriven carriages have given way to combustion-engine cars. Combustion-engine cars are giving way to hybrids. Typewriters succumbed to the emergence of the computer. The photocopier replaced the messy stencils on the mimeograph machine. Fax, e-mail and smart phones have changed the ways in which we communicate. Some changes mark decline. Regimes collapse, businesses fold, stock portfolios fall, homes are lost, and churches close. Change characterizes all life, personal and organizational.

Change happens.

Change happens in the Church as well. This should not surprise us. While the Magisterium keeps the Church in continuity with the intentions of its founder, Jesus Christ, the church as a living institution changes. Throughout the church's history, liturgical changes have taken place — some significant, some minor, some grand, some very simple. Consider what has taken place in the liturgy in our own life times since the Second Vatican Council's promulgation of Sacrosanctum Concilium (Constitution of the Sacred Liturgy) in 1963. The priest now faces the community. We pray in the vernacular. People participate in a full and conscious way. Laity serve as lectors and extraordinary ministers of holy communion, as cantors and psalmists.

Organizational development teaches us that change is always messy, fraught with challenges. Change can take an emotional

toll, evoke different and oftentimes idiosyncratic response from people and can disrupt and divide a community. Change can leave an individual or an organization better or worse depending on how that change is prepared for and dealt with. People need to understand why changes are being made and become convinced of the change's wisdom. Change comes with difficulty, sometimes with resistance, oftentimes with

a sense of loss. Just look at the changes after Vatican II.

Some people neither understood nor accepted the changes that were put into effect. In many places the changes happened overnight with little or no preparation. That was a great mistake. Where and how one prays is sacred to people, affecting us at our deepest roots.

St. John the Evangelist Parish, during these past months, began the communication process concerning the changes to the New Roman Missal to take effect on Sunday November 27. We have placed in the weekly bulletin a series on the upcoming changes. Shortly, we will begin to review the new music at Mass, and we have talked about it at

Mass from the ambo. We want to do everything possible to make this a positive change for all of us. To further enhance our communication we have scheduled group sessions for all parishioners to attend, which will include the reasons for the changes, the changes for the people, the changes for the presider, and some catechesis of the Eucharist, which have been strongly recommended by the United States Council of Catholic Bishops, and most importantly an opportunity for questions and answers.

We have scheduled a total of fifteen sessions in an effort to provide a time convenient for everyone. Each session will cover the same topic. The sessions will be led by myself. The sessions will last for about an hour and a half.

Adult Takes Lesson From the Youth

"...we should thank God for all of the young people in the world..." — Brendan Budlong

Brendan Budlong, director of the Saint John the Evangelist Youth Group, and three teens travelled to St. Lucia as missionaries August 1 - 12, 2011, along with Fr. John, pastor. Brendan shares his insights and experiences while serving as a chaperone.

My experience of the Mission Trip to Saint Lucia offers a slightly different perspective than the viewpoints you've already read about. Being that I was a chaperone on the trip, I felt my primary duty was to encourage participation and ensure the safety of the young people involved. When things didn't go the way that we planned, my mind immediately started working on finding solutions. When we were working with the St. Lucian children during Vacation Bible School, I made sure I urged our youth to enthusiastically be engaged. When we went to visit the

missionary communities, I kept tabs on our youth and made sure they were helping out where needed. Afterall, I had done mission work before and knew what it was all about, so I felt that I was merely there to encourage our youth.

Most of the trip, I went through all of these motions, making sure I fulfilled my responsibilities as a chaperone, but toward the middle of our time there my perspective began to change. The insights and experiences that the youth were sharing blew me away! I realized that our young people were showing me that I wasn't there just to keep them safe, but I was also there to reach out to the people of Saint Lucia. I was there to build relationships with them, to hear their stories, and to share mine with them. When I reached this epiphany, I felt much like Martha, from the story of Martha and Mary in Luke's Gospel. Here I was focusing so much attention on doing my job as a chaperone and making sure that our youth were doing what they were supposed to do, that I almost missed out on the opportunities to spend time with the people in St. Lucia.

On the last day that we visited the missionary communities, I made it a point to spend all of my time with the people we were visiting. Our group went to Saint Lucy's Home, which is a home for the physically and mentally disabled. We had already been there once before, so I knew what to expect, or so I thought. I marched right through the building and into the

garden, where most of the residents spend their time, and I said "Hello!" When I did, one of the residents, who I had met on my earlier visit, smiled so big at my greeting that my heart burned

with joy. He remembered who I was. Now, that might not sound too amazing, but if you understood the mental capacity of this individual, you would be impressed also. In a way, it almost felt like Jesus, himself, was welcoming me through this man. Like Jesus knew that I had realized that I was there to see him in and through these people, so he welcomed me with open arms.

I spent most of the visit to Saint Lucy's Home that day talking to my new friend Kendy. I would talk and ask questions, and Kendy would simply respond with "Yes," which was about the only word he would say. While the conversation was very one-sided, I felt that I was receiving so much from my time with him. I will never forget him, nor will I forget that it was our youth who reminded me of what I was really there to do. It becomes so easy

to lose sight of the blessings unfolding right in front of us when we focus solely on the task at hand. However, we should thank God for all of the young people in the world because as Jesus tells us, "Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." (Mark 10:15)

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Schwarz for getting the carillon back up and running.







here is power in Jesus' Word today as he confronts the chief priests and the elders with their hypocrisy. He uses the parable method to present the case and then poses a question to the religious establishment of his day. They seal their own fate in the way in which they answer the question. In Jesus' example, the first son does the father's will regardless of his reluctance to do what was asked of him. The second son, however, tells his father what he wants his father to hear and then does nothing about it. Jesus is pointing out to the chief priests and elders that they are like the second son. The Father in heaven wills that they bring others closer to him. The leaders accept the invitation, but then hide behind the letter of the law, failing to bring people into the presence of God. They give lip service to God's saving power but do not put in the effort to make it a reality in the world. Furthermore, even though tax collectors and prostitutes were looked down on by the ruling classes, Jesus points out that these sinners were more ready to receive John's message than they were. God's grace was at work in their lives, turning them away from their sin, allowing themselves to be transformed by the wisdom they received and to grow in the eyes of God.

Cynics often criticize people who attend church on a regular basis for just giving lip service to the message of the gospel. Many will accuse church-goers as hypocrites.

Some use this as an opportunity to suggest that is why they do not attend church. It is hard to be a Christian today because it demands more than lip service — it means that we must put into practice what we preach. A great deal of effort is involved in living the Christian life. The work of Jesus is never over. Even though we may be reluctant in our approach to the Father's will in our lives, once we struggle with the demands of our faith, God sees t blessing of our endeavors. God loves the one who tri

we struggle with the demands of our faith, God sees the blessing of our endeavors. God loves the one who tries. Jesus warned the chief priests and elders not to be self-righteous and superficial. Instead, he encourages these men to reach out to sinners and recognize the sacred ground of their road to transformation. Jesus invites us to also journey down this road of transformation.

In order to discern the Father's will, we need to discern the needs of those around us. God is constantly asking us to reach out to the vulnerable and the poor. These people are present in our communities. Our response to their need ultimately reflects our understanding of the demands of faith and our commitment to God. When we truly live a Christian life we feel the pinch

of sacrificing our time, and we turn our energies to those who do not yet know the Living God. Jesus reminds us to hold onto the vocabulary of outreach and acceptance. This is what it means to know the Father's will — to follow the example of Christ and his commandment to love. The parable encourages us to move beyond spoken promises to incarnate the Word in our lives. By truly embracing the wisdom Jesus imparts in this parable, our lives become an expression of God's Word among us.

Safe Environment Training for Sunday's Faith Formation students will be conducted on Sunday, October 9, at 9:15 a.m. Safe Environment Training for Wednesday's Faith Formation students will be conducted on Wednesday, October 12, at 5:30 p.m. The Diocese has changed the Safe Environment Training policy for the 2011-2012 school year. Unless we receive a signed opt-out form in advance from the child's parents or guardian, the child will automatically be opted-in for Safe Environment training. If the child is absent for Safe Environment Training without the Faith Formation Office having his/her signed opt-out form, it will count as an absence and the child will have to attend a make-up Safe Environment Training session. Parents cannot avoid this training for their children by simply not attending. An opt-out form is required for the child to miss the training!


Usher/Greeter Meeting Monday, October 3
