

Saint John Welcomes Deacon Forrest Wallace

Dear friends of Saint John the Evangelist, brother deacons and Reverend Fathers,

I am grateful to Bishop Frank J. Dewane and to our pastor Father John Ludden for my new assignment to the parish of Saint John the Evangelist. I came to the Naples area five years ago as Director of Public Relations and Marketing at Ave Maria University to help open the new university campus near Immokalee. Bishop Dewane installed Fr. Robert Tatman, who many of you know, as pastor and I served as the deacon of the Quasiparish of Ave Maria Oratory. One year after I took the job at Ave Maria my family joined me here in Florida. The process of moving for a job is difficult, but moving a whole household raises the bar quite a bit. Since I was commuting back and forth to Cincinnati, Ohio every other week, bringing six of our

eight children, my mother and Elvis (our dog) to SWFL largely fell into the capable hands my beloved wife Mary. I am most grateful for the love, care and courage of my partner of 32 years. We have moved seven times and to new states four times. Each time saying to one another, "I think we will be here for the rest of our lives." So we are not saying that any more. But please know that to all of us Saint John already feels like home.

My life in the Church has taught me many valuable lessons, and perhaps the most important is to *wait on the Lord*, and His Church. I was ordained in 1993 by Sean Cardinal O'Malley, OFM Cap., who was at the time the new Bishop of Fall River, Massachusetts. When he arrived my formation class had already been studying for two and a half years. We expected to be ordained the following year. Bishop Sean decided to let us cool our heels for two additional years so that he could be sure of the men he was about to

Professionally he has worked in public affairs and product management positions for Fortune 500 companies in the financial services industry. He received his undergraduate degree from Fairleigh Dickinson University, Madison, NJ, and his MBA from Thomas More College in Villa Hills, KY. 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distribute in his diocese. Sometimes the wisdom of the Church is evidenced in the patience of her servants. Cardinal O'Malley is a patient man.

In the additional two years of formation two of my classmates discerned that they were not called to serve through diaconate. The rest of us got a better and deeper education than we had expected and further developed our spiritual lives. I bring this up because I have enjoyed the ability to preach homilies in the four dioceses in which I have lived: Fall River, MA; New Orleans, LA; Cincinnati, OH; Venice, FL. It is a faculty which I take seriously. In our Diocese of Venice Bishop Dewane requires that Deacons who desire to preach at Mass must take instruction in Venice and be approved by a review board of evaluators. In other words, patience is required. As with the ordination experience, sometimes we have to wait on the Church so that we can be prepared for her duties.

My hope in serving at Saint John is that I will be a useful servant. Having worked and taught at Ave Maria I realized there were many intellectual and theological giants there, and I was not one of them. What I offered the community there and what I offer to the family of Saint John the Evangelist is the perspective of a family man who loves the Church. It is the theology-of-the-kitchen-table. God asks us to do His will every day in the simple, small things that make up our daily life. One of my favorite spiritual writers, Fr. Jean Pierre de Caussade, calls this the *Duty of the Moment*. The Will of God is what is in front of us at the moment. It is not glamorous. It is washing dishes, cutting the grass, loving a child, or making a living. I have always explained this to my children and my students as, "Line up every day and play every play." I look forward to doing the Duty-of-the-Moment with and for the Saint John the Evangelist family.

I thank you for the warm welcome that we have received and look forward to being with you for some time to come.

St. John Youth Ministry

St. John Bosco's Vision for Youth Ministry: Part One

St. John Bosco is called the *Apostle of Youth*. He is known affectionately as Don Bosco, *Don* is Italian for Father. Don Bosco was a pioneer in the field of youth ministry — perhaps the first youth minister in Church history!

Don Bosco's guiding principle was *Loving Kindness*. This was expressed by his three mottos:

- "Give me souls; take away the rest."
- "It is enough that you are young for me to love you."
- "For you I study, for you I work, for you I live, for you I am even ready to give my life."

St. John Bosco received his mission to become the Apostle of Youth as a young boy. He was visited by Jesus in a dream. In his dream, he was

on a playground surrounded by other boys. The boys began to misbehave, curse and blaspheme. John lost his temper, jumped in and tried to stop the boys by force: shouting at and fighting with them.

Suddenly, John saw a man, whose face was illuminated by light and wearing a white flowing mantle. The man called to John and told him that he would be the leader of these unruly boys. He spoke these words: "You will have to win these friends of yours not with blows but with gentleness and kindness." The boys in the dream then turned into the wild animals they were behaving like. The man told John: "What seems so impossible you must achieve by being obedient and acquiring knowledge."

Once he grew in humility, virtue, faithfulness and knowledge, John would witness a change in the boys who would be under his charge. At the conclusion of the dream, the man gave John a glimpse into the fruits of his future work: the wild animals were suddenly changed into gentle lambs.

From then onward, the image of Jesus that Don Bosco chose to emulate was the Good Shepard. He took the great St. Frances deSales as his spiritual father. St. Frances de Sales, renowned Bishop and Doctor of the Church, was known as the Gentle Saint. Don Bosco was convinced that the key to winning the hearts

of young people for Christ is practicing *Loving Kindness*. This would be achieved not through force, shouting and losing one's

temper, but rather through gentleness and tireless patience. Perhaps this is why Don Bosco recognized the necessity of going to Confession on a regular basis and frequent reception of Holy Communion!

I look forward to sharing more of Don Bosco's vision for youth ministry with you in the coming weeks. It is with his spirit that I hope to animate youth ministry here at St. John the Evangelist. *St. John Bosco, pray for us!*

After numerous iterations and several failed attempts, we have finally chosen appropriate light fixtures for the chandeliers and wall sconces in the church. I have certainly learned a very valuable lesson in all of this. The lesson is that I have absolutely no business attempting to pick out light fixtures or any other fixtures for the church. I knew I was lacking in this department,

I have had several questions from parishioners recently regarding the "expired" tax law for IRA owners to make qualified contributions to the charity of their choice. Below is the best information I can find.

Parishioners who would like to make a gift to St. John the Evangelist or the Diocese of Venice directly from their individual retirement account this year may have to think twice before donating. The tax code provision that allowed IRA owners to contribute up to \$100,000 directly from their IRA to the qualified charity of their choice—without recognizing the donation as income—expired at the end of 2011, and Congress has given no indication if it will be renewed.

Parishioners need to know the rules as they stand now, or they could be in for an unpleasant surprise during next year's tax season.

The Pre-2012 Donation Rule

As it existed through December 2011, the "donation rule" worked as follows: an owner of an IRA who was over 70½ could directly transfer IRA funds to the charity of his or her choice without counting the donation as income. Because IRA owners who have reached age 70½ are required to withdraw a certain amount, called a minimum distribution, from their IRA assets each year and count this as taxable income, the donation rule was attractive to clients who wished to minimize income.

Minimizing income is a goal for many IRA account owners aged 70½ and older. Increased levels of income can push retirees into higher tax brackets for Social Security tax purposes, and can also make them liable for higher Medicare payments. Until the end of 2011, it was possible to exclude the entire required minimum distribution from income, assuming that the IRA owner's annual minimum distribution requirement was below \$100,000 and he or she donated the entire amount.

The taxable gifts were not deductible under the pre-2012 provision, but the income-reducing benefits made it a smart choice for many IRA owners.

Donating IRA Funds in 2012 and Beyond

Congress has a history of reinstituting expired tax code provisions and applying them retroactively. It is possible, therefore, that Congress could act at some point this year or next to reinstate the donation rule for gifts made in 2012.

If the account owner is confident that he or she wants to make the donation regardless of the tax treatment, the IRA sponsor can transfer the gift directly from the IRA to the qualified charity. If Congress does act to retroactively reinstate the donation rule, the gift will be excluded from income just as under the pre-2012 rule.


If Congress does not act to reinstate the donation rule, any charitable donation made from the parishioner's IRA would be treated in the same manner as a gift made from any other source. This means that the distribution from the IRA would be recognized as income by the account owner, and the gift would later be included on his or her tax return as an itemized deduction. While the deduction would offset income, the benefit is not nearly as great as it was when the income was not recognized in the first place.

And now you know the rest of the story!

The Gift of Hearing

phphatha!" – that is, "Be opened!" These are the words of Jesus to the deaf man. In Jesus' day, a deaf man was considered to be of no use to society. Physical impediments were viewed to be symptomatic of individual of familial sin. The lack of hearing also brought with it a speech impediment. Living with disabilities in first century Israel would have filled a man with fear and anxiety in terms of security and the future. "Be opened!" These are words of hope and words of healing given by Jesus to a man who hungered for belonging and security. The words and action of Jesus bring back the fullness of life and promise. The man experiences a new way of life. He is able to hear clearly and to express the thoughts of the mind and heart.

When we were baptized these same words were uttered to us as the priest or deacon touched our ears. These same words, just like the man from the district of the Decapolis, bring us life and secure for us a destiny of hope and promise. Through baptism each one of us enters into a life that enables us to hear an alternative wisdom than that of the world. We are asked to proclaim one faith to the glory and praise of God the Father. As we grow in Christian faith, we listen to words of healing, restoration and forgiveness.

Today's story of healing is very significant for the history of salvation because it took place in the Gentile world – a world deemed beyond God's interest and favor. When Jesus heals this man, he is showing that no one, absolutely no one, is beyond God's love and concern. Why is this important to us? It is important to us because no person should ever be considered unworthy of our love and acceptance. If we have closed our minds and our ears

to the needs of others because of something they have said or done, we cannot adequately express a lively faith. Jesus continues to offer hope for others of: "Ephphatha!" - that is, "Be opened!" Jesus encourages us to embrace the life that he lived and the compassion that he shared. The cries of the hungry and poor of the world fall upon deaf ears. Those who remain hidden because of prejudice and discrimination experience the muting of their voice because they are deemed unimportant. In the midst of these sinful attitudes that are contrary to the gospel proclaimed, the one from Nazareth, cries out "Be opened!" Be open to his presence in the guise of the lonely, the forgotten and the unwanted. Who are these people? They are the men and women of the road who, for whatever reason, wander up and down our highways – yes, the ones we see from time to time coming out of the woods with a sleeping bag rolled up under their arms. These are the ones who wander into food pantries looking for something to eat. These are the very ones with sun scorched faces who often ask for money for alcohol to dull their emotional pain. When we are confronted by these complex situations in life, we are asked to take a radical stance and allow the wisdom of Jesus to dictate.


Wisdom of the Fathers

"Ephphatha, be opened!" (Mk 7:34). The words spoken by Jesus at the healing of the deaf mute ring out once more for us today; they are stimulating words of great symbolic intensity which call us to open ourselves to listening and to bearing witness.

Does not the deaf mute mentioned in the Gospel bring to mind the situation of those who are unable to establish a communication which gives true meaning to life? In a certain way, he reminds us of those who shut themselves up in a presumed autonomy, which leaves them isolated from God and often from their neighbor as well. Jesus turns to this man to restore to him the capacity to open himself to the One who is Other and to others, in an attitude of trust and freely-given love. He offers him the extraordinary opportunity to meet God who is love and who allows himself to be known by those who love. He offers him salvation.

Yes, Christ opens man to a knowledge of both God and himself. He who is truth (cf Jn 14:6) opens man to the truth, touching him from within and thus healing "from within" every human faculty."





What is Conscience?

In **Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship** (no. 17), the Catholic Bishops of the United States Conscience remind us:

"The Church equips its members to address political and social questions by helping them to develop a well-formed conscience. ... Conscience is not something that allows us to justify doing whatever we want, nor is it a mere "feeling" about what we should or should not do. Rather, conscience is the voice of God resounding in the human heart, revealing the truth to us and calling us to do what is good while shunning what is evil."

Conscience is a judgment of practical reason that helps us to recognize and seek what is good, and to reject what is evil (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 1778, 1796).



The Second Vatican Council wrote:

"Always summoning [one] to love good and avoid evil, the voice of conscience can when necessary speak to [one's] heart more specifically: do this, shun that" (*Gaudium et Spes* 16).

Conscience does not simply "come to us"! Throughout our lives, we have to spend time *forming our consciences* so that we can make well-reasoned judgments about particular situations.

How Do I Form My Conscience?

As the bishops note in **Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship**, we need to form our consciences in an *ongoing manner*. How do we do this?

- 1) When examining any issue or situation, we must begin by being open to the truth and what is right.
- 2) We must **study Sacred Scripture** and the **teaching** of the Church.
- We must examine the facts and background information about various choices.
- 4) We must **prayerfully reflect** to discern the will of God (Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, no. 18).

The United States Catholic Catechism for Adults adds:

- The prudent advice and good example of others support and enlighten our conscience.
- 6) The **authoritative teaching** of the Church is an essential element.
- 7) The **gifts of the Holy Spirit** help us develop our conscience.
- 8) Regular examination of conscience is important as well (p. 314).



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Reflections on Conscience

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church

1777 Moral conscience, present at the heart of the person, enjoins him at the appropriate moment to do good and to avoid evil. It also judges particular choices, approving those that are good and denouncing those that are evil. It bears witness to the authority of truth in reference to the supreme Good to which the human person is drawn, and it welcomes the commandments. When he listens to his conscience, the prudent man can hear God speaking.

1778 Conscience is a judgment of reason whereby the human person recognizes the moral quality of a concrete act that he is going to perform, is in the process of performing, or has already completed. In all he says and does, man is obliged to follow faithfully what he knows to be just and right. It is by the judgment of his conscience that man perceives and recognizes the prescriptions of the divine law.

Reflections on Conscience Formation

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church

1784 The education of the conscience is a lifelong task. From the earliest years, it awakens the child to the knowledge and practice of the interior law recognized by conscience. Prudent education teaches virtue; it prevents or cures fear, selfishness and pride, resentment arising from guilt, and feelings of complacency, born of human weakness and faults.



The education of the conscience guarantees freedom and engenders peace of heart.

1785 In the formation of conscience the Word of God is the light for our path,³ we must assimilate it in faith and prayer and put it into practice. We must also examine our conscience before the Lord's Cross. We are assisted by the gifts of the Holy Spirit, aided by the witness or advice of others and guided by the authoritative teaching of the Church.⁴
