Capital Planning for Our Future

One thing I am very focused on for St. John is planning for our long-term success as a Parish Family. It is the core reason for our Capital Campaign, **Build Our Future, Serve Our Past**. We want to ensure that our communities of the Saint John the Evangelist Catholic Church and the Naples Community have a vibrant and engaging environment to faithfully worship and congregate for all types of activities. The campus requires constant upkeep and maintenance, which will only increase with the expanded mission and facilities. Additionally, as we have discussed in the past, the life-span of some of the buildings has either expired or is nearing the time for major renovations. All of these needs have come together in our expansive Capital Campaign, and I continue to thank God every day for the blessings of our Parish Family to respond to this joint initiative, which will invigorate our church for many years to come.

We have a dedicated group of volunteers who have given of their time and expertise to assist with creating a 5-Year Capital Plan. This plan allows us to understand the critical needs we have as a Parish Family, in particular with the physical spaces we worship in and enjoy. Starting at the beginning of the year, I requested all staff to provide me with their capital needs for the upcoming year and they responded. Taking that list, the Capital Panning Committee was able to choose the critical items needed this year, and plan out future opportunities. One critical need we had is the roofing structure on the PLC. There have been leaks for several years, and the patchwork of band aids is no longer sufficient. Due to this project, we will need to prioritize other efforts, like renovating some of the bathrooms. By planning properly, we are able to see issues like this before they become emergencies and we have a waterfall pouring in on the JOP Christmas Tea or some other event. A detailed list of our Capital Plan will be in the upcoming bulletins (and website), so you will be able to see the plans we have as a Parish Family.

However, one component of this planning process is that it illustrates the significant amount of projects we have at St. John. And by putting a timeline on their completion, we can see that we actually do not have five years to accomplish them. The Diocese of Venice has given us the opportunity with our Capital Campaign to utilize the funds gathered for our campaign without the normal 26% assessment that occurs with our normal operating funds. This gift is only available for three years. The sooner we are able to put the funds gathered for our campaign in our savings account, the earlier we will be able to begin our projects.

We need our entire Parish Family to give in order to reach our additional goals. If you haven't turned in your pledge card, please do so as soon as possible. 

SACRAMENTS OF THE CHURCH

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

#ToKnow, #ToLove, #ToServe – Support Group for Divorced and Separated at St. John

My family was so excited when a new couple and their children moved in next to us last summer. They had four children like we do and were planning on making their lives here in Naples, as we know many younger families are doing. Always the evangelist, I gently started bringing up St. John and our church. They were polite, but were not really interested in joining our Parish Family. I soon found out why. It turns out that the parents of the mother were divorced (the father walked out on the family, so there was no chance for reconciliation). The Catholic Church they were going to at the time turned its back on the family, just at the moment they needed the support and healing of our faith. They were told to "just leave" because of the divorce. Shamed, they left the Catholic Church.

It absolutely breaks my heart to know that this story is not out of the ordinary. It seems that some Catholics do not understand that our church is not a museum of saints, but a hospital for sinners. Love, healing, and compassion are in the hearts of Catholics, not ostracizing and condemnation. Our Holy Father certainly has made this a core of his teachings on family, and last week he approached the issue of divorced individuals head-on:

... [T] oday I would like to focus our attention on another reality: how to take care of those who, after an irreversible failure of their matrimonial bond, have entered into a new union.

... If we then also look at these new bonds through the eyes of the young sons and daughters — and the little ones watch — through the eyes of the children, we are aware of a greater urgency to foster a true welcome for these families in our communities. For this reason it is important that the style of the community, its language, its attitudes, always be attentive to people, starting with the little ones.

... Thanks to the in-depth analysis performed by Pastors, led and guided by my Predecessors, the awareness has truly grown that it is necessary to have a fraternal and attentive welcome, in love and in truth, of the baptized who have established a new relationship of cohabitation after the failure of the marital sacrament; in fact, these persons are by no means excommunicated — they are not excommunicated! — and they should absolutely not be treated as such: they are still a part of the Church.

... In the same way all Christians are called to imitate the Good Shepherd. Especially Christian families can cooperate with Him by taking care of wounded families, accompanying them in the life of faith of the community. Each one must do his part in taking on the attitude of the Good Shepherd, who knows each one of his sheep and excludes no one from his infinitive love! – Pope Francis 8/5/15 (http://w2.vatican.va/content/francesco/en/ audiences/2015/documents/papa-francesco_20150805_ udienza-generale.html)

I would like to invite anyone that is going through a separation or has experienced it in the past (no matter how many years ago) to join me on Wednesday evenings from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m. starting on September 23. 



The Fusion of Word and Sacrament

Reflection Questions

- 1. If Jesus offers his own flesh and blood for us, then what am I willing to do for Him?

he people in the gospels these past few Sundays have found themselves asking several questions. The depth of Jesus' teaching proves to be very difficult for them to fathom. We are told that the people started to quarrel – something about Jesus' message led them to a sense of instability and confusion. In today's gospel the people ask, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" Jesus' offering his flesh for the life of the world and as food to eat was a cannibalistic and scientific impossibility for the people of his day. Jesus obviously was talking about the ultimate sacrifice of his own life for the message he proclaimed. His message and the sacrifice of his own life go hand in hand. The Lamb of God hung upon the Tree of Calvary, not just to fulfill scripture, but because his radical message of God's kingdom nailed him to it. The Gospel of John coincides the time of the death of Jesus with the time that the Passover lamb was being sacrificed. Jesus offers the unleavened bread of the Passover and the cup of Elijah as his body and blood the night before he dies.

Every time we celebrate the Mass, we relive the moments of Christ's ministry, last supper, death and resurrection. When it comes to the Eucharist and our belief in the real presence of Christ, we are called to the radical fusion of Word and Sacrament. It is the Word proclaimed that feeds and sustains us. The Word of God is offered to shape our lives so that we may walk the path that leads to everlasting life. As we digest the body of Christ, we are also called to embody His message in our lives. When we approach the Mass we all must realize that, although we are willing to receive Christ's body and blood, we must go out and be Christ for others. Attending Mass ought not to be an ordinary gathering of a given community, but an extraordinary event where we feel sent out by God to spread the message of Christ's love to those around us – those in our neighborhoods, our work, our places of leisure, etc. "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" We already know the answer: by dying on the cross and becoming the new Passover lamb and new covenant. The Mass offers us Christ's body and blood as the Bread of Life and the Cup of eternal blessing. As we partake in Holy Communion, we taste the bitter sweet experiences that will ultimately lead each one of us to paradise.

The life of faith gives rise to many questions. The harsh realities of life often gnaw away at the faith that anchors us. Even though our faith may be rocked from time to time, the Eucharistic presence remains steadfast and constant. If we truly enter with full knowledge into what we are truly participating in at the Mass, our lives can change. If we allow ourselves to be challenged by the Word of God, our lives change for the better, especially our relationships. Christ continues to feed his people two thousand years after his death and resurrection as they approach the altar to receive

his body and blood. As we gather for the Eucharist we may recall how people come in and out of our lives at any given time. There we may recall where people have let us down. However, we have to remember no matter what disappointments come our away, that Jesus remains forever in the everlasting covenant which we celebrate in the Mass. He is always there with us, to guide us, and to be our Living Bread.



A Note About Sacramental **Preparation**

The Diocese of Venice requires that students must attend a minimum of two consecutive years of Faith Formation to receive First Reconciliation, First Holy Communion, or Confirmation. Students must be at least 7 years old by September 30, 2015, and in the 2nd grade to be eligible to receive the Sacrament of First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion. Students are eligible to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation at the end of 10th grade. They must be at least 15 years old.

Because of the increased number of children preparing for First Reconciliation and First Communion beyond 2nd grade, we have added preparation classes on Sunday mornings so that these children can enjoy to the fullest, their Faith Formation classes without being "pulled out" for instruction. We will have a special teacher for them on Sundays from 9:00 - 9:30 a.m. It is our hope that this format will allow children preparing for the sacraments to make the most of this special time. This additional class time is for children in YEAR 2 of their preparation only. YEAR 1 students need only attend Faith Formation classes

with their grade level. Their catechist will be made aware that they are in Year 1 of their preparation for instruction purposes.



Becoming a Catholic, Being a Catholic!

The process for someone to "become a Catholic" begins with an invitation, sometimes directly from God, but more often through the people of God, and that is you and me. Or stated another way, in the Church as in any other organization, the best source of new members are current members. That was the case in the time of Paul and Peter and that continues to be the situation today.

You may have a friend or family member who has never been baptized, or baptized in another Christian faith. An acquaintance or co-worker may have asked you questions about the Church. Someone may indicate to you they are searching for a sense of community, or a desire to hear more of the Good News of Jesus, the Gospel.

These questions and more are addressed during the initial phase of the parish based process to become Catholic, appropriately called the period of inquiry. This is an informal opportunity for interested individuals to begin the journey that may or may not result in taking the next step toward full membership in the Church.

For those that choose, the next step is to enter the more formal process of the Rite for Christian Initiation for Adults (commonly abbreviated to RCIA) which begins in early December and culminates with the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation) that are celebrated at the Easter Vigil in March.

The first step begins with you, today, as you invite your family members, friends, co-workers, or others to come and see what it means to be Catholic.

In September Saint John the Evangelist Parish will host the first Open Inquiry Meeting where common questions will be addressed, the RCIA process will be explained, and inquirers will have the opportunity to raise the issues or questions that are on their minds or in their hearts. Look for the date(s) and time to be announced soon.


Whether you know of someone interested in learning more about becoming Catholic or not, there is another role you can play in the Evangelizing Mission of the Church by joining the RCIA Team. There is a need for many different parishioners to fulfill many different roles during the various phases of the process. There is always need for hosts to make inquirers feel truly welcome. Sponsors walk with the Catechumens providing witness to their faith and support as well. Other parishioners facilitate one or more of the specific weekly programs. Instructions for Fingerprinting at St. John and Other Diocesan Approved Screening Sites

Before visiting St. John (or another diocesan screening location) for fingerprinting, applicants must complete the registration form online at: *http:// www.dov.sofn.net*. Registrants will need a photo identification (such as a driver's license), a major credit card and your social security number. After registration is complete, a receipt with a bar code will be issued. New applicants must present this receipt at St. John (or another diocesan screening location) in order to continue the process. Do not make an appointment at St. John until you have the printed receipt with the bar code.

When registering online, choose St. John as the place to get fingerprinted.
