Papal Nuncio Explains Our Plan to Bishops

It was extraordinary this past month that it seems the Papal Nuncio to the United States, the Vatican's "ambassador", and liaison between the Holy See and the US, has been reading all about our focus on youth engagement and how we are focused on creating a new way of engaging the youth of Naples in fellowship and activities, CYO. Well, he may not be reading our bulletin and website, but his speech to all the US Bishops on November 14 sounds like he has been paying attention and it certainly illustrates that we are on the right path:

Many adults lament that young people are not in the pews. If they are not in our churches, why are they not there?...

But we, the Church, have to seek them out to provide the occasion, the environment, and the moment that allows for this encounter. Do young people have a sense of being sought out, welcomed and appreciated enough that they can have this encounter with Jesus Christ through the Church? We know that youth are critical to the life of the Church, and that it is becoming increasingly difficult to transmit the faith to young people in a changing environment and in a Church in which very often they do not have a profound sense of belonging, even if they have

the desire to belong. Our youth find themselves at the "peripheries" of both the Church and society. We must go out to them...

A new language, new methods, and a new missionary ardor is necessary so that each young person may experience tangibly the

mercy of God. Our methods of evangelization require a profound reconsideration to see whether they are effectively communicating the authentic Christian experience - with closeness, simplicity, warmth and transparency.

#ToServe – Catholic Faith Appeal: Essential Support to Parish Services

A few months ago, I provided information about the Catholic Faith Appeal, the Diocese of Venice annual assessment of all parishes that assists with many programs here in Southwest Florida. From the Catholic Charities support for Golden Gate Senior Citizens and Immokalee Migrant Workers, to the Seminarian programs, the CFA is an essential program that we must focus our gifts to in any way we can. However, it has come to my attention that many of our Parish Family members may not understand the CFA and what it is for. The CFA is a Diocesan contribution in which all the members of the churches in Southwest Florida work together to support the central services we all rely on at Catholics and active community members. There are several essential efforts that rely on the CFA:

- Catholic Charities: As a leading provider of social services, Catholic Charities supports over 40,000 people with programs like direct assistance to pay their utility bills, emergency intake programs for those that have become homeless, ending human trafficking in our backyard, citizenship assistance, and veteran housing.
- Catholic Schools: It costs a tremendous amount to provide a high-quality education, and the CFA supports the Catholic Schools in the area to ensure all members of our community can have access to this faith-based education system through high school
- Vocations: From the Seminarian programs that instruct our future priests and deacons to providing support for the 35 different women's religious orders and 26 different communities of brothers and priests within the Diocese, the CFA ensures we provide for the education and wellbeing for those who have dedicated their lives in service to us and our faith.

One component of the CFA that is not discussed frequently, however, is the set of programs that the CFA supports for our Parish Family. Below are a few of the initiatives that we could not accomplish here at St. John without the CFA:

- Marriage Preparation: All the Diocese marriage programs needed to be married at Saint John the Evangelist are funded completely through the CFA. If a Parish Family member is going to be married here or one of their children/grandchildren, they have the ability to be prepared here and can take all the preparations through these programs,
- **Religious Education:** The Diocese supports our youth and our adult Faith Formation programs

with materials, schedules and additional catechesis opportunities. The CFA supports the certification of our catechists and the development of the schedules for Confirmation.

• Good Works: From the 40 Days for Life to Immigration Support for our Parishioners, the CFA provides resources for the good works of the parish. We give so others can have a better life, from picking themselves up with our direct support to supporting social justice initiatives.

Every year, the Diocese of Venice places a goal for each parish to provide a certain amount towards an overall need of the Diocese. It is true that St. John has been one of the primary supporters of the CFA and in fact we have normally been the largest contributor parish. For 2016, we have been asked to contribute \$518,000. We have understandably been focused on our Capital Campaign, which has been successful in reaching and exceeding our goals in very short order. However, that has clearly made it impossible for us to reach our CFA goal this year, and we currently stand at \$320,886. That is a large gap, and it will require the parish to direct our resources from operational efforts and savings to cover the shortfall.

Next weekend, we will have a second collection for our CFA Goal. This CFA Last Hurrah will include comments from some of the leaders of our Parish Family, from the Finance Council, the Pastoral Stewardship Council, and other members of our community that receive such wonderful programs and support from the CFA. I hope you will give them your attention and assist us with this necessary goal. If you have any additional gifts you wish to support Catholic organizations with, please prayerfully consider a donation to the Catholic Faith Appeal. 



The Revolution of Hope

s we gather to listen to the Sacred Scriptures on this Second Sunday of Advent, we are certainly encouraged to have hope. John the Baptist presents himself as the wild and unlikely prophet who foretells the coming of the promised Messiah — the one who would set the world on fire! His message is clear: Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand...make straight His paths. As we continue along the Christian way, we are asked to prepare ourselves to receive Jesus into our lives as we approach the day of his birth. Our preparation should reflect our longing for God and a willingness to accept the message that Christ himself left as an eternal gift to the world.

Each individual lives a certain context in the world today. We live in specific communities, within specific states, and within specific countries. Our identity is forged by the world community into which we are born. As people of faith, we also find ourselves within yet another context. From the beginning of time, God sent patriarchs and prophets to lead us deeper into the reality of His unfailing love. The prophet Isaiah certainly sets the stage for a day of hope where all will experience unity and peace. In our first reading we hear: "The wolf will be the guest of the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid..." How will we get to this point of perfect existence? The answer lies in the coming of the Christ — the Jesus of God, led by the spirit of wisdom, understanding, counsel, strength and knowledge, to give us a profound respect for God in our






People lose hope when they look at what is going on in the world today. The middle-east continues to pull at the fragile strings of peace and people repeatedly seek stability in their lives. Closer to home, the reality of suffering in our own stories can often lead to despair. However, our reason to have hope is found in the Christ event. We cannot lose sight of the adult Christ at Christmas. Jesus did not come to give us the answer to the world's suffering, but rather entered into it himself. The whole message of Jesus and his acts of charity teach us to have hope and courage. The sign of the cross casts its shadow over Bethlehem itself — but it was not the light that gives its shadow, but the radiant dawn of the resurrection day that opened wide the gates of an eternal promise.

- 1. Why is the ministry of John the Baptist significant?
- What does John say about the coming of the Messiah?
- 3. What surprises you about John's description?
- 4. What does it mean to make straight the path of the Lord?
- 5. How do you prepare to meet the Lord when you are getting ready for Mass or heading out to greet a new day?
- 6. How do you welcome Jesus Christ in your everyday activities?
- 7. Is this Christmas going to be different for you spiritually? Why or why not?
- 8. Are you making a straight path for the Lord in your life?

Lord, as we prepare to celebrate the events of the Incarnation, teach us to have hope. As we approach this joyful season, may we remember days gone by with childlike wonder and recall the gift of family ties. May we also look forward to the day when we will meet you face to face and be reunited with those for whom we have shed many a tear. Let our longing be the song that unites us with your presence every day of our lives. Amen.

Wisdom of the Fathers

"The joy of the gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus. Those who accept his offer of salvation are set free from sin, sorrow, inner emptiness and loneliness. With Christ, joy is constantly born anew....

The great danger in today's world, pervaded as it is by consumerism, is the desolation and anguish born of a complacent yet covetous heart, the feverish pursuit of frivolous pleasures, and a blunted conscience. Whenever our interior life becomes caught up in its own interests and concerns, there is no longer room for others, no place for the poor. God's voice is no longer heard, the quiet joy of his love is no longer felt, and the desire to do good fades. This is a very real danger for believers too. Many fall prey to it and end up resentful, angry and listless.

That is no way to live a dignified and fulfilled life; it is not God's will for us, nor is it the life in the Spirit which has its source in the heart of the risen Christ. ...


I invite all Christians, everywhere, at this very moment, to a renewed personal encounter with Jesus Christ, or at least an openness to letting him encounter them; I ask all of you to do this unfailingly each day. No one should think that this invitation is not meant for him or her, since "no one is excluded from the joy brought by the Lord". The Lord does not disappoint those who take this risk; whenever we take a step towards Jesus, we come to realize that he is already there, waiting for us with open arms. Now is the time to say to Jesus: "Lord, I have let myself be deceived; in a thousand ways I have shunned your love, yet here I

am once more, to renew my covenant with you. I need you. Save me once again, Lord, take me once more into your redeeming embrace". How good it feels to come back to him whenever we are lost! Let me say this once more: God never tires of forgiving us; we are the ones who tire of seeking his mercy. Christ, who told us to forgive one another "seventy times seven" (*Mt* 18:22) has given us his example: he has forgiven us seventy times seven. Time and time again he bears us on his shoulders. No one can strip us of the dignity bestowed upon us by this

boundless and unfailing love. With a tenderness which never disappoints, but is always capable of restoring our joy, he makes it possible for us to lift up our heads and to start anew."

Separated/Divorced Ministry 12-Week Healing Program Begins Wednesday, January 11, 2017



Beginning in January two programs will be offered.



Look for the details on when and where, but decide this is the year you will begin.


