Parking and Vehicles to Help Our Parishioners Get Around

In our first meetings with the Diocese on the major renovations and the new Life Center, we were asked about some of additional efforts we would like to undertake. The first words out of our mouths were "fix the parking". As any of you who attend our Masses have seen, the parking layout at Saint John the Evangelist is not sufficient, nor is it laid out effectively for our Parish Family. Some people have taken it upon themselves to park in dangerous locations, both for themselves and others. That is not effective for anyone, so I continue to implore all of you to respect fire lanes and not to park along the hedges of the church. Not only have we seen more car accidents due to this type of parking, we had an issue with an ambulance reaching the church when someone needed attention.

In order to resolve these issues, we are looking for your assistance with our Capital Campaign to include the following parking and vehicle improvements:

- Redevelop Parking Lot Layout: From the confusing one-way sections to the bottlenecks around the various lots, we need to take a look at how the parking is laid out and configured.
- Covered Parking for Handicap Access: We want to make it as safe as possible for all our Parish Family to attend Mass. It will make it easier for those with special needs to be able to walk from their cars into church without needing an umbrella.
- Vehicles for On-Campus Transportation: Did you know we actually have a significant parking lot in the very back of our campus, behind the Claussen Family Center? That lot is rarely used by our regular Mass attendees, mostly because it is far from the church. It is completely understandable that people do not use it, especially those who need to be close to the church for medical reasons. The only way to get people back and forth from that location would be to have transportation carts that will take people from the back lot right to the church. That will alleviate much of the parking congestion.
- Vehicles for Off-Campus Transportation: How can we assist our Parish Family who does not have the ability to come to church anymore? Our Companion Driving Ministry has done a wonderful job in helping individuals come to our campus for Masses, and we want to continue that effort for all the programs and activities we have here. These vehicles, from vans to small buses, would provide access to St. John for those who would otherwise be alone.

While we have begun the work our current blessings have allowed us to accomplish for the **Build Our Future**, **Serve Our Past** capital campaign, we still need our entire Parish Family to give in order to reach our additional goals. Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

Fr. Jim Will Celebrate 25 Years as a Priest With a Special Mass

A special anniversary Mass will be celebrated on Friday, April 1 in honor of Fr. Jim Simko's 25th Anniversary of his Ordination of the Priesthood. Everyone is invited to attend the anniversary Mass.

Fr. Jim was ordained a priest on June 8, 1991, for the Archdiocese of Denver.

After graduating from Metropolitan State College in Denver in 1976 with a degree in Business Management, Fr. Jim worked in various retail and restaurant venues until 1985 when he entered the seminary first at St. John Vianney, Miami, and then St. Thomas, Denver.



"Until the age of 30, I saved my money to open a retail shop. I asked myself the question, 'And then what?' I'll have another shop. 'And then what?' I'll have my 1.8 children and a dog. The answers to the question, 'And then what?' were never enough. However, studying for the priesthood was more than enough. Even though I gave up the aforementioned (except the dog) the days were and continue to be filled with new surprises," Fr. Jim said.

He served in parishes in the Denver area and was the pastor at Our Lady of the Mountains in Estes Park, CO from 1996 to 2002. A year later Fr. Jim returned to Southwest Florida.



Prior to coming to St. John, Fr. Jim was at St. Francis Xavier parish in Fort Myers, where he served the parish from 2009. Indeed, his ministry has lived up to his expectations.

"When one works in the service of God and others, you have to be ready for the unexpected. Everyday is unique and filled with surprises. When there is nothing on the calendar for the day, stand back! I've worked with street gangs, drug addicts and people living on the street. In addition to the homebound, the very lonely, families, and all the issues surrounding them, it has certainly been an interesting 25 years," Fr. Jim said.

Parishioners and visitors will remember Fr. Jim's homilies — sometimes because they are on the long side and other times because they generally include homework.

"In the seminary we were trained for eight to eleven minute homilies. Whatever!" he justifies as the reason for the length.

"Many folks are into headline news and instant everything. Coming to Mass is a time of honor. We give praise and glory to God to move in our lives and that is a very individual matter. I was trained to preach without notes. In the homily you will note one key idea supported by three corollaries. Watch for these and listen!" he instructs.


As for homework, he says, "Every homily should apply the

scriptures to everyday life. I like to allow people to participate in this process by giving them 'homework'...go, 'get 'er done!'"

Parishioners and especially the staff always know Fr. Jim is in the building by his infectious and laugh-out-loud laugh.

"My dad's greatest gift to me was my laugh. His

dad gave the gift to him as well! I think it's a Hungarian thing. Why not?!" he says.



Fr. Jim and his family moved to Bradenton, FL in 1971, when he was just 16 years old. "I was a parishioner at St. Joseph's in Bradenton where Fr. Rourke served as pastor in 1974."

Fr. Jim enjoys traveling, beaches, Florida history and "everything Florida has to offer, as well as my Terrier-Schnauzer."

On his anniversary, June 8, Fr. Jim will be traveling.

"On that day, I will be in Joure, in the Netherlands. It is a little town of 12,000 people. The town is known for making Frisian wall clocks from scratch. I hope to have one made while I am there."

The Voice That Calls to Each of Us

on our gospel today we recall the event of Christ's transfiguration. As the apostles headed out for a walk with their Rabbi, they probably had no idea what would happen as they climbed the mountain to pray. They encounter the extraordinary magnificence of God on what they thought would be another ordinary day. Peter, James and John witnessed the face of Jesus change in appearance as well as his clothes. In this moment the apostles realize that Jesus is more than they ever imagined. One could say that they experienced Christ in his divinity and glory. The voice from heaven tells them, "This is my chosen Son; listen to him." Jesus' authority is given him by heaven – an authority that brings eternal life, not only to the apostles but to the entire world.

The voice spoken from heaven, also invites us to listen to words of Christ. Every time we hear



the gospel proclaimed, we encounter God's voice speaking to us. Jesus always speaks to the heart of the matter in the midst of the vast circumstances in which he finds himself. Whenever we hear the words of Christ calling us to forgive, to heal and transform our lives in the proclamation of the gospel and the homily of the priest, God is speaking to the heart of our own situation – especially when the Liturgy of the Word strikes a chord.

We are also all called to see the extraordinary reality of God in the ordinary things that we take for granted. If we look through the lens of our Christian experience, then we will ultimately find Christ in places where he has always been. The face of Christ changed in appearance on the mountain 2000 years ago – today that face is transfigured in many different guises. Jesus, God's Son, continues to speak to us every time we come to the mass. Jesus is present in the Sacred Word proclaimed to us. Jesus appears to us at the altar under the forms of Sacred Bread broken, and blessed

wine outpoured. However, his presence is not to be limited to our Mass. At the very end of the Mass, we are called to go in peace and encounter Christ in society. We are challenged to see Christ's presence in the face of the poor, to hear his voice in the voices of the vulnerable who have no-one to speak for them, and to embrace Christ in the needs of our world. This act of listening involves a great sacrifice and act of will to recognize the divine fingerprint of God engraved upon the shattered souls of our society.

The event of the Transfiguration reminds us that God reveals himself throughout human history. Peter, James and John receive a foretaste of Christ's divinity and resurrection. As we recall this experience today, we call to mind the glory of Christ that will be revealed to us in the transition from this life to eternal life. As we, and all those belonging us leave this world, Christ will illuminate the darkness of death and lead us to a place of eternal light.



Prayer

As we continue to go through our Lenten journey, we pray that we open our hearts and our eyes to your presence around us, O Lord Jesus. May we be attentive to the needs of others around us. Enable us to hear your voice calling out to each one of us. Inspire us to be generous with our time and our treasures to transfigure the darkness of the world into a beacon of light and hope. Amen.

Wisdom of the Fathers

"Today's Gospel reading also reminds us of this, re-proposing to us the episode of the Transfiguration of Christ on Mount Tabor. Awestruck at the sight of the transfigured Lord who was speaking with Moses and Elijah, Peter, James and John were suddenly overshadowed by a cloud, out of which came a voice which proclaimed: "This is my beloved Son on whom my favour rests; listen to him".

When one has the grace to live a strong experience of God, it is as if one is living an experience similar to that of the disciples during the Transfiguration: a momentary foretaste of what will constitute the happiness of Paradise. These are usually brief experiences that are sometimes granted by God, especially prior to difficult trials.

No one, however, is permitted to live "on Tabor" while on earth. Indeed, human existence is a journey of faith and as such, moves ahead more in shadows than in full light, and is no stranger to moments of obscurity and also of complete darkness. While we are on this earth, our relationship with God takes place more by listening than by seeing; and the same contemplation comes about, so to speak, with closed eyes, thanks to the interior light that is kindled in us by the Word of God.

The Virgin Mary herself, among all human creatures the closest to God, still had to walk day after day in a pilgrimage of faith (cf. *Lumen Gentium*, n. 58), constantly guarding and meditating on in her heart the Word that God addressed to her through Holy Scripture and through the events of the life of her Son, in whom she recognized and welcomed the Lord's mysterious voice.


