Sponsored by the Arthur J. Corr Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus, a patriotism theme permeated the evening with the presentation and posting of our colors by the Naples High School Junior ROTC Color Guard, followed by a video of how our National Anthem came to be written by Francis Scott Key during the battle of Baltimore at Ft. McHenry in September of 1814. The explanation of the POW-MIA Table was also presented.

The evening also included dinner, patriotic music and dancing to the tunes of Legends of Las Vegas.

Renaming the Parish Life Center: Suggestions?

It is amazing that we have had over 1,300 responses to our New Programs survey. We are blessed to have such an active and engaged Parish Family, and we are gearing up to provide these new and renewed efforts for ourselves and the larger community. I will be presenting the feedback from the survey over the next few weeks here, but before we delve into our needs, I have a request for you.

The building on our campus that gets used the most after our church, of course, is our Parish Life Center, or PLC. This large building currently houses ten classrooms, meeting rooms, a nursery, offices, our front desk for the parish, and the Ballroom. The PLC is utilized 7 days a week, 365 days a year for every type of program from our Faith Formation and After School programs, to Big Band Dances, to AA Meetings and Bible Study groups. It has lived up to its name as a Life Center. However, our new Life Center is breaking ground this year, and we do not want to cause any confusion with two separate buildings including the same name. We have decided to change the name of the current Parish Life Center and we need your help in choosing a new one. This name must speak to the enlivening and engaging nature of Saint John the Evangelist, as well as to the diverse set of activities that will continue for years to come within its walls. Some options we have thought about include:

- · Parish Family Center
- · Parish Union Center
- · Parish Community Center

This is also a unique opportunity for someone to put their own name on the building, as part of the Capital Campaign. If you are interested, your family name could be added to this active facility for \$1 million. This will ensure the full and complete renovation of the current Parish Life Center and bring its capability up to the level of our new Life Center.

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

#ToKnow – Ministry Organization: Making it Easier to Find and Communicate What We Are Doing

I have been describing these next years here at St. John as the time of flexibility and patience. We are building a brand new Life Center. We are renovating existing buildings. We are starting new programs and enhancing current ones. We will be taking a hard look at some efforts of our parish and determining their priority and validity in supporting Our Mission. For example, the Super Bowl Party attendance and engagement of the Parish Family has been steadily declining for the past 5 years. The amount of money raised to support the Youth Group has been minimal. It is time to try something different, especially in the spirit of our new Catholic Youth Organization and Catholic Adult Organization. The same focus on how we effectively serve the Parish Family and the community around us is being applied to our Ministries as well.

Several months ago, we held Town Halls with all the leadership of the ministries of Saint John the Evangelist. It was clear in those meetings just how many dedicated and passionate individuals there are in our parish. So many efforts are going on to help our church, the Naples area, and all over the world. It was heartening to see how much everyone wanted to collaborate and find ways to better engage our Parish Family to grow. It was also clear that being able to work together requires all of us to understand each other's ministries and how they could relate to each person that may be looking to join our active church. The Pastoral Stewardship Council, led by Rick Beebe, took the feedback from the Town Halls, along with the material we have gathered about each ministry over the past year, and has developed several new initiatives to make it easier to communicate and attract people to both our ministries and our parish as a whole.

One of these initiatives is a new communication strategy illustrating the categories of the various groups that live here at St. John. Sometimes, it can be confusing for someone looking for an activity to quickly browse our bulletin or website and find what they are looking for because many different types of activities are bundled together. Starting next week, we will begin to organize the ministries and groups of St. John to make it simple to find an organization that you may want to be a part of or learn more about. The main categories for this ministerial opportunities will be:

• Operational: There are many efforts here at St. John that directly impact our ability to perform the mission essential functions of our Parish, namely providing Masses and Services that make us a Catholic Church. The organizations ensure those functions occur seamlessly for our Parish Family, like the Sacristans, Lectors, Arts and Liturgical, Faith Formation, Gift Boutique and others,

which are called to serve in a dedicated and devotional way.

- Ministry: These organizations truly live out the St. John Mission Statement in actively pursuing their own vision and goals as well as engaging the entire parish in growing their ministry in both function and membership. They are specifically developed and operated within our Parish Family, even if they have additional membership from the larger community. The Knights of Columbus, Ladies of Charity, Men's Club, and Companion Driving Ministry are just a few example of the dozens of ministries here at St. John.
- **Group:** These primarily external organizations provide social, spiritual and service type programs here for our Parish Family as well as for Naples. Groups usually have an "inward" focus, and some of the examples of groups include Al-Anon, Alcoholics Anonymous, Faith and Wine, and Mahjong.

In the next few weeks, you will see the bulletin will be reorganized to represent these different organizations in these categories so more description can be provided and a deeper understanding can be created. This is not going to be a perfect way to organize ourselves, and I am sure we will refine it over



time. The focus and priority of these opportunities may change over time, so this will always be a "living document". I am looking forward to this journey with all of you as we know, love and serve God together.







uring the past few weeks, the theme of call and mission has been very prominent in the readings and gospel. Jesus informs his disciples there is much work to be done in proclaiming the good news but very few to offer themselves for this venture. The harvest that Jesus refers to is the message of the kingdom. The laborers are the people who are given the task to take the message of the kingdom and make it a reality for others. Jesus sends his appointed seventy-two in pairs to proclaim the kingdom. Jesus commands them to heal the sick and to bring the good news of salvation to any town they enter. Jesus advises the disciples to accept the hospitality offered them and to bestow peace on every household along the way. If the disciples encounter indifference and opposition, Jesus advises them to shake the dust from their feet. We hear at the end of the gospel that the seventy-two rejoice that the Lord's work is accomplished through them.

Reflection Questions

- 1. How did Jesus want the disciples to proclaim the kingdom?
- 2. How can you proclaim the kingdom?
- 3. Define the areas of your life that are in need of healing.
- 4. How does the world need to be healed?
- 5. What part are you going to play in the world's transformation?
- 6. What does harvest of the Lord represent for you?
- 7. Do you consider yourself to be a laborer for the Lord? Why or why not?
- 8. How are you challenged to incarnate the gospel through your personal discipleship?
- 9. How can you use your personal gifts to proclaim the kingdom?
- 10. What have you accomplished for the Lord?
- 11. What does God want you to accomplish in your lifetime?

The gospel today is often used to promote vocations for the priesthood and religious life. However, to limit this gospel event to this context would be a tremendous mistake. The work of the kingdom of God is not given to those who dedicate their lives to the priesthood or religious life alone. All those marked out in baptism share the divine calling to be a laborer for the harvest of the good news! All baptized Christians are asked to share in the ministry of the gospel. Everyone is asked in his or her given way to bring healing to society. On the surface it would appear to exorcize demons or bring full restoration to the sick is far out of reach for us as individuals. However, some of us can bring healing by simply extending a hand of friendship or by blessing someone with our presence. When life is troubling for someone we know, we may be encountered with a situation where someone is not at peace because they suffer from a disease of the spirit. In those situations we are called to bring calm and solace through our words and support.

We are all asked to witness to the truth as it is given by Christ and his Church. Together we must face the difficult issues facing society and the Church by gently persuading others to seek the wisdom of God in every given situation. We are asked to promote the kingdom of God by promoting the dignity of life itself – by speaking out against abortion, euthanasia, and embryonic stem cell research. Equally, we are invited to promote the kingdom by accompanying young women with their difficult pregnancies, by visiting those who are sick and aiding their recovery with our time and treasure. It is in such simple acts that the reality of the kingdom is made known. If people refuse our efforts, we are simply reminded to move on and take our efforts elsewhere.



Prayer

Lord, may more and more people be inspired to follow your call to serve you. May those who seek the kingdom of heaven find it through our work as a community of faith. Once people become aware of the message of the kingdom within their lives, may they have the courage to share that message with others through their words and actions. Amen.

On Sunday, October 8, 1995, Pope Saint John Paul II concluded a five-day American tour with a mass in Oriole Park at Camden Yards, Baltimore. In his homily he said:

"One hundred thirty years ago, President Abraham Lincoln asked whether a nation 'conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal' could 'long endure'. President Lincoln's question is no less a question for the present generation of Americans. Democracy cannot be sustained without a shared commitment to certain moral truths about the human person and human community. The basic question before a democratic society is: 'how ought we to live together?' In seeking an answer to this question, can society exclude moral truth and moral reasoning? Can the Biblical wisdom which played such a formative part in the very founding of your country be excluded from that debate?

Would not doing so mean that America's founding documents no longer have any defining content, but are only the formal dressing

of changing opinion? Would not doing so mean that tens of millions of Americans could no longer offer the contribution of their deepest convictions to the formation of public policy? Surely it is important for America that the moral truths which make freedom possible should be passed on to each new generation. Every generation of Americans needs to know that freedom consists not in doing what we like, but in having the right to do what we ought."

As we celebrate the 240th anniversary of our nation's independence, let us take a moment to reflect on the freedoms that we enjoy and give thanks to our God for the gifts He has given us and our country. 
