Next Steps: Claussen Family Center Renovation

Now that we as a Parish Family have successfully pledged the necessary funds to build the Life Center, the **Build Our Future, Serve Our Past** Capital Campaign can turn its attention to the needs of the rest of our programs and facilities, which has always been part of our joint vision and goals for the campaign. The overwhelming support we have already received has come from a section of our parish, and with all the rest of your help, we can tackle the challenges we have with our church and other structures. Let's focus next on the Claussen Family Center, or CFC.

As the most recent building added to our Campus, the Claussen Family Center (sometimes called just the Claussen Center), has been primarily used as a classroom and meeting room space. Its primary focus has been for our Youth Faith Formation program, which catechizes children from kindergarten to tenth grade for our parish. Parish and community groups like the Kiwanis Club, Al-Anon, AA, NA, and Knitting and Crocheting use the classrooms and conference room for their gatherings. The St. John Music Ministry and choirs call the building home as well. The Claussen Center houses our Youth Room, a large, open, get-together space for our Youth Group and Young Adult programs.



The Claussen Family Center has worked well for the many purposes, ministries and groups that inhabit it on a weekly basis, from Faith Formation classes to Knights of Columbus socials. There are several underlying issues that must be addressed, however, with the generosity of our Parish Family. For example, the AC systems in the building are essentially home systems, not commercial building units. They use a tremendous amount of electricity and are at the end of their normal lifetime. During the renovation of the CFC, we plan to tie its AC into the new Life Center cooling tower, a powerful and energy efficient

mechanism to properly control the temperature and humidity in multiple buildings.

One of the main renovations planned for the Claussen Center is our new Library. The current Library, located in the PLC, does not contain books or reading space. This newly expanded Library in the CFC will provide a quiet, contemplative location with Catholic literature, religious papers, small discussion space, a full digital library, and study areas for our after school program and Adult Faith Formation. We are very excited to be able to provide such a resource to our Parish Family and the community.

In order to reach these additional goals, we need our entire Parish Family to give. If you haven't turned in your pledge card, please do so as soon as possible. Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

Getting #ToKnow Our Parish Grounds: Veterans Memorial

For many of our Parish Family, the church is the singular part of our campus they interact with, aside from the parking lots and walkways. We are much more than the church, which will always be the core of our community and our faith. As part of our continuing illustration of St. John as an enlivening, inviting place for our parish and our community, I wanted to showcase some lesser-known areas of our facilities and grounds. Hopefully, you will get a chance to visit them the next time you come.

It is a stark and visceral image as you enter our church campus and park in the front lot, especially on this July 4th weekend. The “Lest We Forget” statue stands tall below the American Flag, the yellow and white Papal Flag with the Vatican crest, and our blue eagle of Saint John the Evangelist. This location is called our Veterans Memorial. This spot is one of my favorite places at St. John. I take my Faith Formation classes there to have discussions sitting on the benches. I go there to reflect on the operations of our church and understand how so many have sacrificed to give us the opportunity to freely and openly worship and heal together. As a Veteran myself, it fills me with joy to be able to share this beautiful illustration of our faith, honor, and service.

For those who come in the side entrance and do not park in the front, I highly recommend you take a walk before or after Mass out the front of the church and visit this memorial. The first thing you will see is the amazing statue of Jesus embracing a soldier. This is a poignant illustration of how the emotional and physical scars of war are cleansed through Christ’s loving embrace, which is also the source of a soldier’s strength. To truly experience the power of this statue, you need to walk all the way around it, seeing the expressions on both Jesus’ and the soldier’s faces. I have heard that people have come to our church due to the fact

that we have the “Lest We Forget” statue on our grounds. Sculptor Timothy P. Schmalz, who is also responsible for our Crucifix in our Sanctuary, is widely known for his religious artwork, and we are blessed to be a primary location for it in Southwest Florida.

The rest of the Veterans Memorial is just as touching. Benches for sitting can be found around the statue, with intentions carved into them. On the ground of the memorial, you will find stones that have been dedicated to parishioners and their families and friends. Many of the stones have the crests of their tours of duty, service branch or division. These bricks illustrate the love and remembrance we all feel for the soldiers, airmen, sailors, Marines, and first responders that have protected us. If you have a desire to add a name to our Veterans Memorial, please contact me and we can set up a time to discuss it. The cost of a brick is only \$150.

I hope you are filled with pride at this loving tribute we have at St. John.

Wisdom Beyond Time and Space

The Incarnation represents for us the dawning of salvation. The characters involved in the events surrounding this watershed in history were people like us. Since salvation was to be offered to the world, God's wisdom came to rest in the midst of the human condition. Jesus, for us, is the wisdom of God. Jesus was confronted by the fragility of human existence. His hand of healing was extended to the poor, the broken hearted, the weak, the strong, the outcast, the sinner, the possessed, the dispossessed, the depraved, the religious, the nonreligious, the God-filled, the Godless, the blind, the sick and the dead. Jesus was a man for all seasons who touched and transformed the heart

of humanity. The most powerful factor in all of this, the Word became flesh to dwell among us, to transform us. God becomes one with us to show us how to be truly human.

We cannot fully appreciate the context within which Jesus lived. Scripture tells us that he came from a small town of Nazareth. It was a basic town in which very simple town folk existed. Their lives would have been very basic where trade and commerce took place on a very local level. Roman legions would have probably been scarce, but the people had to pay taxes to Caesar. Jesus was born into this simple life. He was the son of Mary and the Carpenter, Joseph. He would have been taught

the trade of his foster father in order to make ends meet. His contemporaries watched him grow and mature. It is not surprising, therefore, to see Jesus being rejected in today's account of the gospel. For the believers of the day, God existed in the heavens. The work of the Lord was accomplished in the Anointed people God had chosen. The questions they would have been asking, "How can Jesus perform the great acts of faith? How can he have such wisdom for he is one of us?" Jesus realizes their lack of faith and is not able to accomplish God's

work among his own and has to move on. The negative aspect of humanity gets in the way of Jesus' gift to transform humanity.

The reality of God is clear. Jesus became flesh to become a model of perfection for humanity. Just like the prophets and the chosen disciples, God likewise chooses people like us to accomplish his mission. Through the very nature of baptism, we are set apart to make his presence known in the world today. The wisdom of God is to speak through us – our words and deeds. We have an opportunity to reach out to the various groups of people that Jesus reached out to. The ministry and wisdom of Jesus transcends time and space to occupy an important place in our faith life and journey. We might

very well face opposition from the contemporaries of our day. Maybe there will be some who might always be on the sidelines pointing out our inconsistencies when we are trying to be consistent in living out the gospel. The scriptures today give us courage. In the words of Paul in the second reading today: "Therefore, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and constraints, for the sake of Christ; for when I am weak, then I am strong."

A Note About Sacramental Preparation

The Diocese of Venice requires that students must attend a minimum of two consecutive years of Faith Formation to receive First Reconciliation, First Holy Communion, or Confirmation. Students must be at least 7 years old by September 30, 2015, and in the 2nd grade to be eligible to receive the Sacrament of First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion. Students are eligible to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation at the end of 10th grade. They must be at least 15 years old.

Because of the increased number of children preparing for First Reconciliation and First Communion beyond 2nd grade, we have added preparation classes on Sunday mornings so that these children can enjoy to the fullest, their Faith Formation classes without being "pulled out" for instruction. We will have a special teacher for them on Sundays from 9:00 - 9:30 a.m. It is our hope that this format will allow children preparing for the sacraments to make the most of this special time. This additional class time is for children in YEAR 2 of their preparation only. YEAR 1 students need only attend Faith Formation classes with their grade level. Their catechist will be made aware that they are in Year 1 of their preparation for instruction purposes.


