Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

#ToLove – We Are St. John: How We Stay Safe

A few months ago I told you all about how my wife knows better than anyone just how much I care and worry about each and every one of you: our Parish Family, our own families, and our guests who come to St. John for the love, joy, and engagement of our Catholic Faith. I have not slept well this week for sure. No matter what the attempted reasoning or explanation, there are no words for the senseless violence that occurred last weekend in Orlando. It calls to my mind all the times we have witnessed these types of acts, both here in the U.S. and abroad. I and my family were in DC on 9/11. My first son had not even had his first birthday. Imagine the weight of knowing how much the world had changed for him that day and magnify it for the 14,000 members of our Parish Family. We are all vulnerable in some way, and it is our responsibility to create a safe environment here within the



campus of St. John, a sanctuary where people can worship, laugh, cry, and come together in a joyous and restorative way every single day. Hatred can only be met and bested by love, not violence. However, love is not an adjective, it is a verb. We love so we must act, both for our own community and to serve those in so much pain in Orlando.

I want to thank all of our ministries and their members for embracing our Safe Environment program. It is essential to our Parish Family to make sure that every face they see at St. John not only illustrates the loving and merciful gaze of Jesus, but that they are ready to provide the protection of our Catholic Church. Several groups that are directly responsible for our safety, namely the Ushers and Greeters and the Knights of Columbus, have become certified Crowd Managers. The North Naples Fire Department came in March to St. John and certified over 30 parishioners in Crowd Management. What is Crowd Management? It is the ability to understand the physical environment and the people within it to ensure their safety. Some of it is common sense. Some of it is situational awareness. Looking around the church, seeing it bursting at the seams during many Masses with standing room only, and this past week, with 500 youth and adults participating in Vacation Bible School, you can see how important Crowd Management is to our church.

I hope you will always feel safe and enjoy your faith journey as part of our Parish Family. We are working together to make this small spot on the Earth a shelter to welcome all to our Catholic Community.

#ToServe – We Are St. John: Whole Parish Family Working Together

It always amazes me each time I attend Mass or participate in an event here at St. John just how many wonderful volunteers we have. The volunteers and ministries of our parish assist and lead almost every facet of the church. They give out the body and blood of Jesus both here in the church, at the hospitals (we now support two!), and at people's homes. They go out into the community and serve food to those in need. They set up dances and doo whop nights. They take care of those grieving spouses who have lost a loved one. There is so much our volunteers do.

In the spirit of this fact, I want to announce the upcoming "We Are St. John" activities. These activities will be focused on bringing our entire Parish Family together, both those who currently serve, as well as those of you who have not had the time to commit to one of the ministries of our Parish. These events are of a scale never before seen at St. John, and they require the engagement of the whole parish, not just one or two groups. These events are not huge obligations. They do not require a family to sacrifice every week or every month, but instead commit to helping on a certain day, for a small period of time.

- Helping Hands: August 4, 5:00 p.m. Imagine being able to feed 20,000 people. Would you like to join us to achieve this goal, all within the span of two hours? Catholic Relief Services will be setting up a "Meals Ready to Eat (MRE)" station in our Ballroom, where we will have the chance to make a major impact on the starving population of the world. Join us in this effort, and bring all the friends you possibly can. There are jobs for all ages, and all abilities.
- Thanksgiving in the Park Preparations: November 22 25 St. John has been blessed to be designated as the primary support organization for Thanksgiving in the Park, the 30-year-old food preparation and service program to the people of Immokalee on Thanksgiving Day. We will need help gathering all the food, preparing it (including last year's fun turkey carving), and getting all the materials out to the park. Last year, we carved more turkey than they ever had done before and we are planning on another banner year. Additional support will

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be needed to clean all the pots, pans, and equipment on Friday, so we need all the help we can get.

• Gaelic and Garlic Festival: March 18-19, 2017 – How much fun is it that both St. Patrick's Day and St. Joseph's Feast share the same weekend this coming year? Our whole Parish Family will come together to share the cultural food, music, dancing and revelry of both the Irish Isles and the Boot of Italy. We will have meatball eating contests, a 5K race to benefit Catholic Charities, dueling Irish Step vs. Tarantella Italian Dancers, and all the food and drink to celebrate these inherently Catholic cultural

celebrations. Perhaps we can get Fr. John to sing "Danny Boy" at least once or twice. And, with all the pomp of Arthur Avenue, we will have the traditional procession of the statue of St. Joseph through the campus and to our party in the Ballroom. We will need everyone to bring their favorite recipes and with the potential Naples community engagement, assist with everything from serving food to handling the games and booths to judging the Gaelic vs. Garlic contests.

I think you would all be as amazed as I am when you see just what we are all capable of doing together in the name of Jesus. Please join us for these activities. More information will be forthcoming on each as we get closer to their dates.




Spiritual Adoption Program Continues With Month Three

The Spiritual Adoption Program is heading into the third month. Your commitment is to pray a short prayer daily through Christmas.

MONTH 3 - Developing Baby – I can suck my thumb!"

Your spiritually adopted baby is quite active in the womb



now – although his mother won't feel him for another couple of months. If his mother's womb had a window, you could watch your spiritually adopted baby squint, swallow and move his tongue. He can make a tight fist if you touch his palm. He is breathing amniotic fluid which continues until birth, although he obtains the oxygen his body needs through the umbilical cord. The baby you are praying for weighs one ounce. Early this month – at just 9 weeks – he began to suck his thumb.

The next Novena of Masses for Life at St. John will be Saturday, June 25 at 3:00 p.m. This Mass will be celebrated in special observance of the life of Jesus in the womb of our Blessed Mother. 



The Face of Christ

hen we take a good look at the gospels we cannot help but see the amazing things that took place during the ministry of Jesus of Nazareth. Today's gospel account of Peter's profession of faith falls within a context. Jesus had just fed the five thousand with five loaves and two fish. The people had witnessed great things accomplished through Jesus' hands. They had seen the raising of a child from death, women being made whole and clean, possessed people being returned to normality once again, and many other mighty acts performed by Jesus. There must have been so much talk around during that time. Many thought Jesus was one of the great prophets who had returned;

some thought that he was nothing more than a mere magician. However, for those who had journeyed with Jesus there was much more of a greater insight given into who he was. Peter, through faith and trust, proclaims Jesus to be the Christ of God. Jesus was being named the Anointed One who would bring freedom to those dwelling in captivity. He was the dream of Israel and an answer to prayers of ancient times – he was the Messiah who brought blessing to the world. After the revelation of Peter, Jesus points out that he would suffer because of who he was. Furthermore, the disciples in following Jesus would also have to carry his cross daily to bear witness to him.

Here we are further along in the passing of time still trying to figure out the significance of the gospel in our daily lives. There is still much to say about Jesus as there was 2000 years ago, but people are still trying to find him. Who do you say that I am? Jesus can most certainly be found in our cathedral churches, local parishes, and the gathering of two or more gathered in His name. However, there is another reality at work here. Jesus can also be discovered amongst the clutter of our lives. Countless people call upon the Lord's name and encounter the Christ of faith daily. Yes, Jesus can be found in our Eucharist – it is the ultimate source and summit of any Catholic Christian. But we cannot neglect the

reality of Jesus in the midst of poverty, conflict, and division. Wherever there is need, Jesus is present also. Jesus reminded us always that he is to be found in all our brothers and sisters, offering the ongoing compassion of God through us. All peoples belong to the Body of Christ. Whenever people hurt it means that the Body of Christ is hurting.

The cross of discipleship is placed upon each of our shoulders in order to bring Christ to others. The yoke of unconditional challenges allows each one of us to clothe ourselves in Christ, as St. Paul reminds us in today's second reading. This means in every socio-economic environment we seek an economy of salvation and redemption. In concrete we are challenged to see the face of Christ in everyone. Again, St. Paul tells us that there are no distinctions made in trying to discern what it means to belong to God. Obviously this makes an impact on the many problematic situations we have to deal with locally, nationally, and globally. We are called to examine what Christ is asking of us in the world in which we live. Any consideration given to matters pertaining to the global economies, increasing threats to national security, immigration, the working poor, the unemployed, the forgotten elderly, and the mentally insane, should always be shaped by our understanding of how Christ is calling us to these challenging times.

Lord, may we always be reminded of your everlasting presence in our Church. Teach us to cherish you in Word and Sacrament. Enable us to go beyond to see you present in a world that is contrary to your own. Help us to recognize your presence in every human being. May we always clothe ourselves in your compassion, mercy and love. Amen.

DIGNITATIS HUMANAE

THE SECOND VATICAN COUNCIL'S DECLARATION ON RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

On December 7, 1965, the Second Vatican Council approved *Dignitatis Humanae*, the Declaration on Religious Liberty. The Declaration addresses a question that comes up in every generation: how do we understand freedom, truth, and the relationship between church and state?

Religious freedom includes two important aspects – freedom *from* and freedom *for*. "Freedom from" is probably familiar and what most of us think of as freedom. It means that we are to be free from coercion. The state is not an all-powerful institution that can force people to act against their consciences.

The right to be free from coercion limits the power of the state. But this freedom must be paired with a "freedom for," a positive orientation to seeking and acting in accordance with the truth. People have both a right and a duty to seek religious truth. Freedom from coercion allows the space for the pursuit of religious truth. Religious freedom requires that a society both refrain from preventing people from living out their religion and help to create the conditions for religious expression to flourish. A free society, then, is one where people actively seek religious truth and fully live out that truth in public and private. As Pope Francis recently said in Cuba, the Church must have "the freedom and all the means needed to bring the proclamation of the Kingdom to the existential peripheries of society."

Human beings are social creatures. Religious freedom means that not only individuals but also families, communities, and institutions enjoy the space to live out religious convictions. Parents have a fundamental right to teach their children their faith. Companies that seek to contribute to the common good by their responsible business practices should be encouraged. Religious freedom belongs to groups as well as individuals.

This social dimension of religious freedom entails that religious freedom includes the freedom to practice our faith in public. In our culture, some tend to think that religious liberty means *only* that individuals can worship without interference from the government. This understanding is inadequate. Religious schools, hospitals, and charities should be able to operate in accordance with their faith. Indeed, the work of these organizations is part and parcel of their faith. They are expressions of religious mission, and religions must have the space to live out their missions.

As the title of the Declaration suggests, human dignity is central to Dignitatis Humanae. A most precious aspect of being human is the two-fold capacity to exercise reason and to respond to found truth. It is natural to ask, How do I live a good life? An Idea for a Last Minute Father's Day Gift

A father possessed of a clear and serene masculine identity who demonstrates affection and concern for his wife is just as necessary as a caring mother.

Father's Day 2016 is also the three-month anniversary of the publication of *Amoris Laetitia*, *The Joy of Love*, the post-synodal exhortation of the Holy Father Francis.

A broad range of issues regarding the family, parents, children, and the Church are addressed in its nine chapters,

but on this Father's Day it is appropriate to focus specifically on what it says about fathers.

Here are a few excerpts that may be of interest to fathers, and grandfathers:


Men "play an equally decisive role in family life, particularly with regard to the protection and support of their wives and children...Many men are conscious of the importance of their role in the family and live their masculinity accordingly. (paragraph 55)

... A father, for his part, helps the child to perceive the limits of life, to be open to the challenge of the wider world, and to see the need for hard work and strenuous effort. A father possessed of a clear and serene masculine identity who demonstrates affection and concern for his wife is just as necessary as a caring mother. (paragraph 175)

We often hear that ours is a "society without fathers." In western culture the father figure is said to be symbolically absent, missing, or vanished. Manhood itself seems to be called into question. The result has been an understandable confusion...Fathers are often so caught up in themselves and their work, and at times in their own self-fulfillment, that they neglect their families... The presence of the father, and hence his authority, is also impacted by the amount of time given over to the communications and entertainment media. Nowadays authority is often considered suspect and adults treated

with impertinence...A reversal of the roles of parents and children is unhealthy, since it hinders the proper process of development that children need to experience, and it denies them the love and guidance needed to mature. (paragraph 176)

THE JOY OF LOVE



God sets the father in the family so that by the gifts of his masculinity he can be "close to his wife and share everything, joy and sorrow, hope and hardship. And to be close to his children as they grow – when they play and when they work, when they are carefree and when they are distressed, when they are talkative and when they are silent, when they are daring and when they are afraid, when they stray and when they get back on the right path." (paragraph 177)

Very often it is the grandparents who ensure that the most important values are passed down to their grandchildren, and "many people can testify that they owe their initiation into the Christian life to their grandparents." Their words, their affection or simply their presence help children to realize that history did not begin with them, that they are now part of an age-old pilgrimage and that they need to respect all that came before

them...(paragraph 192)

In addition, Chapter 4 is a masterpiece that should be read by every couple...who has been married for no matter how many years. It begins with Pope Francis' interpretation of the famous hymn to love in Paul's first letter to the Corinthians (1 Cor 13:4-7). Francis argues that love is not primarily a feeling, but rather a commitment of the will to do some pretty definite and challenging things..."


