



## DIOCESE OF VENICE SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY



The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist

## Readings For The Fifth Sunday of Easter

## Fr. Tom's Gospel Reflection

This Sunday's first reading from the Acts of the Apostles offers us a powerful and timely reminder of what it means to persevere in the faith, even when the path becomes difficult.

Paul and Barnabas have just completed a grueling mission through Lystra, Iconium, and Antioch. They have preached the Gospel with boldness, healed the sick, and brought many to the faith—but not without cost. In Lystra, Paul was stoned and left for dead. In every city, they faced opposition, confusion, and danger. And yet, as they return to these same communities, they do not focus on fear or failure. Instead, they focus on strengthening the hearts of the believers and encouraging them to stay the course.

Their message is not a sugar-coated one. They don't say, "Follow Jesus, and everything will be easy." They say, "It is necessary for us to undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God." This isn't meant to discourage—but to prepare. To remind the faithful that suffering is not a sign of failure or abandonment. In fact, it can be the very mark of a life deeply rooted in Christ.

We live in a culture that tries to avoid hardship at all costs. Inconvenience, discomfort, even silence—these are things we're often trained to escape. But the Christian life calls us to a deeper truth: that the cross is not the end of the story, and that the wounds we carry in faith can become instruments of grace, healing, and witness.

Think for a moment about those early believers Paul and Barnabas visited. Many were new to the faith. Some had just seen Paul nearly killed. Others were facing real persecution—rejection from family, loss of livelihood, even threats to their safety. How easy it would have been for them to turn away, to say, "This is too much." And yet, they remained. Why?

Because someone strengthened their souls. Because someone reminded them of the why behind the what. Because someone spoke the truth in love: that God does not abandon us in our suffering—He transforms it.

This passage speaks loudly to our own parish community, especially in times when we feel stretched thin spiritually, emotionally, or physically. Whether it's a personal struggle, a family burden, an illness, or even the day-to-day weight of being a Christian in a world that often forgets God, the temptation to give up can creep in.

But the witness of Paul and Barnabas reminds us: we are not alone. We are part of a Church that has always grown through difficulty. We are strengthened not by our own willpower, but by grace—and by one another. When we pray for each other, when we encourage each other, when we share stories of faith and endurance, we are doing exactly what the apostles did—we are strengthening the souls of the disciples.

And let us not miss how this passage ends: with joy. After all their struggles, Paul and Barnabas return to Antioch and gather the Church. They "reported what God had done with them and how He had opened the door of faith to the Gentiles." The tone is one of celebration and gratitude.

Even in the midst of hardship, God is at work. Even through bruises and battle-wounds, the Gospel advances. And even when we feel tired or tested, there is a deeper joy that comes from knowing we are walking the path that leads to the Kingdom.

As we walk through our own challenges, let us remember the words of Acts 14:22—not as a warning, but as a promise:

"It is necessary for us to undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God." Yes, the road may be difficult—but the destination is more than worth it.

#### Reflection 16: Total Abandonment to God

Fall down before God. Prostrate yourself before Him. If you can, do it literally. If it would be a distraction to others then do it interiorly. Fall down prostrate before God and beg Him to show you His Divine Mercy and His most holy Will. There are many times in life when a simple prayer or two are not enough. What we need is to totally abandon ourselves before God. Of course this is what we must do every day all day. But in order to carry this interior disposition of total abandonment to God, we need concrete moments when we make this our absolute and complete act of surrender (See Diary #9).

Reflect, today, upon how deeply you pray. Do you only offer a few prayers here or there? Or do you take time each week to make an act of complete abandonment and surrender to God? Do you intentionally lay your life before our Great God in total love and trust? If you are not sure, then make sure you do so today.



Lord, I abandon myself into Your hands and trust in Your perfect goodness and Mercy. I prostrate myself before Your Divine Majesty and surrender to Your loving care. Jesus, I am totally Yours. Jesus, I trust in You.



## Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope



The 2025 Jubilee Year, as established by Pope Francis, has begun. Five locations in the Diocese of Venice have been designated as Jubilee pilgrimage sites by Bishop Frank J. Dewane: Epiphany Cathedral in Venice, St. John XXIII Parish in Fort Myers, **St. John the Evangelist Parish in Naples**, St. Paul Parish in Arcadia, and Our Lady of Perpetual Health Retreat & Spirituality Center in Venice. These five locations, located in each of the geographical regions (Deaneries) of the Diocese, were selected for the convenience of the faithful, so that they may take advantage of the grace of the Jubilee Year.

#### **Jubilee 2025 Bull of Indiction: "Spes Non Confundit"**

On Thursday, May 9, 2024, the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, Pope Francis officially proclaimed the Ordinary Jubilee of 2025 with the public reading and delivery of Spes Non Confundit, the Bull of Indicition for the Jubilee Holy Year 2025, in Saint Peter's Basilica at the Vatican. This papal document lays out the foundation for the 2025 Jubilee and its theme, "Pilgrims of Hope." Below is paragraph 14 from this document.

#### Signs of hope

15. I ask with all my heart that hope be granted to the billions of the poor, who often lack the essentials of life. Before the constant tide of new forms of impoverishment, we can easily grow inured and resigned. Yet we must not close our eyes to the dramatic situations that we now encounter all around us, not only in certain parts of the world. Each day we meet people who are poor or impoverished; they may even be our next-door neighbours. Often they are homeless or lack sufficient food for the day. They suffer from exclusion and indifference on the part of many. It is scandalous that in a world possessed of immense resources, destined largely to producing weapons, the poor continue to be "the majority of the planet's population, billions of people. These days they are mentioned in international political and economic discussions, but one often has the impression that their problems are brought up as an afterthought, a question which gets added almost out of duty or in a tangential way, if not treated merely as collateral damage. Indeed, when all is said and done, they frequently remain at the bottom of the pile". [7] Let us not forget: the poor are almost always the victims, not the ones to blame.

#### The Meaning Behind the Jubilee Logo

The logo chosen for the Holy Year depicts four stylized and graceful figures, in four colors that recall the shades of the rainbow: red, orange, green, and blue. The choice of colors is not random, just as the color of sacred vestments throughout the liturgical year is not. Red symbolizes love, passion, and self-sacrifice, Christ's sacrifice and His boundless love for humanity, but also the fire of the Holy Spirit and His strength that animates Christians. Orange expresses joy, vitality, and enthusiasm, the light that illuminates the path of faith. Green is universally recognized as the color of hope, growth, and rebirth. Blue, finally, symbolizes faith, peace, and tranquility, evoking the sky and spirituality, and inviting contemplation and prayer. The four figures represent humanity as a whole, in its differences and similarities. They proceed to embrace each other, expressing the solidarity and brotherhood that should unite the peoples of the world. Leading them is the red figure, clinging to a Cross formed by a black curve that ends, at the bottom, with an anchor. The Cross is not rigid, not static, but bends towards humanity as if to embrace it. As for the anchor, Monsignor Fisichella himself explained its meaning: "As is known, the anchor has often been used as a metaphor for hope. The anchor of hope is the name given in seafaring jargon to the reserve anchor, used by vessels to perform emergency maneuvers to stabilize the ship during storms." The sense of this symbol in the Jubilee logo is clear: it is precisely in the most difficult moments that we need to rely on an anchor that gives us security and guarantees salvation, and what better anchor than the Cross, a symbol of Christ and His infinite love for all of us? The presence of small, agitated waves at the bottom of the logo confirms the existence of dangers and obstacles, of those personal events and events of the world that make each of our lives not always easy. Thus, the logo in its entirety takes on a clear meaning, and the Jubilee, with its twelve months of ceremonies and initiatives, becomes a long pilgrimage to be undertaken together, as brothers, towards salvation, guided by the Cross and the hope of salvation promised by God. 20

#### **Personal Encounter**


