

Marriage Enrichment at St. John: Remembering When and How You Said "I Do"



Last Saturday, October 24, St. John Family Mission programs presented a marriage retreat entitled, "Remembering When and How You Said I Do." With a wonderful response from the Parish Family, 25 couples participated in the day and evening retreat, with anniversaries ranging from 1 year to over 70 years of marriage. Three couples led discussions about keeping Christ at the center of marriage. In a moving ceremony, the afternoon culminated with each husband and wife renewing their marriage vows during a Mass concelebrated by Fr. John and Fr. Jim. Some of the participants remarked:

- "Mass and the renewal of our promise to each other was wonderful. This event refreshed my heart."
- "We gained helpful and practical steps to improve the quality of our relationship."
- "We really enjoyed the topics. I'm glad the church agreed to host a marriage renewal."
- "Meeting with other couples was great. I enjoy hearing that we are not alone as a Catholic couple."

Pope Francis has made it clear that churches and families must focus on the entire lifetime of marriage, not just preparation: "A marriage is not successful just because it endures; quality is important. To stay together and to know how to love one another forever is the challenge for Christian couples... Living together is an art, a patient, beautiful, fascinating journey. It does not end once you have won each other's love... Rather, it is precisely there where it begins!"

St. John has taken Our Holy Father's encouragement to support marriages seriously! Look for more Family Mission events coming soon that will focus on encouraging, strengthening and supporting couples in their sacrament of marriage.

Synod Fathers and Pope Francis Call for Parish Family to Take Care of Each Other

We have all had a very busy Fall. From our Parish Family members returning from their Northern homes to the constant activity of the families with their sports and dancing and school events, I cannot believe it is already November. In the midst of all this activity, however, the leaders of the Catholic Church held a historical meeting in Rome to discuss the future of how our church approaches many challenging and essential topics of our time and our faith. This Synod of Bishops has ended and some of the most important themes about pastoral support of families, which do not look like the traditional nuclear family anymore, need to be tended to with care and mercy. In our parish, we have grandparents raising their grandchildren. We have single parents. We have blended families. We are here to support, heal, encourage, and enliven all around us. That is the focus of this Campaign, to provide a church and a

community that illustrates the joy, love, and mercy of the Catholic faith. Pope Francis put it best in his homily to close the Synod Assembly:

Jesus' disciples are called to this, even today, especially today: to bring people into contact with the compassionate Mercy that saves. When humanity's cry, like Bartimaeus', becomes stronger still, there is no other response than to make Jesus' words our own and, above all, imitate his heart. Moments of suffering and conflict are for God occasions of mercy. Today is a time of mercy!

This is the temptation: a "spirituality of illusion": we can walk through the deserts of humanity without seeing what is really there; instead, we see what we want to see. We are capable of developing views of the world, but we do not accept what the Lord places before our eyes. A faith that does not know how to root itself in the life of people remains arid and, rather than oases, creates other deserts. — Pope Francis 10/25/2015

SACRAMENTS OF THE CHURCH

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

Some have been parishioners for 20+ years, having helped established this church when it was meeting next door at Naples Park Elementary. Others just joined last week. Some have watched the buildings and events mature over decades. Still others have only just begun to explore the vast array of programs and opportunities to engage their faith. One term that those who have been part of our Parish Family for many years will recall is the Catholic Faith Appeal (CFA). There are many, however, who may not know about the CFA, or what it is for. I wanted to spend this week educating everyone, just in case there are some preconceptions about this very important and worthy cause.

The CFA is a Diocesan contribution in which all the members of the churches in Southwest Florida work together to support the central services we all rely on as Catholics and active community members. There are several essential efforts that rely on the CFA:

- Catholic Charities: As a leading provider of social services, Catholic Charities supports over 40,000 people with programs like direct assistance to pay their utility bills, emergency intake programs for those that have become homeless, ending human trafficking in our backyard, citizenship assistance, and veteran housing.
- Catholic Schools: It costs a tremendous amount to provide a high-quality education, and the CFA supports the Catholic Schools in the area to ensure all members of our community can have access to this faith-based education system through high school
- **Vocations:** From the Seminarian programs that



Beacons of Light

as anyone told you that their ultimate goal in life is to become a Saint? You are probably wondering if they did — you would almost think they are self-righteous. However, the reality is that all Christians are called to become saints. Each one of us who has received baptism is initiated into the life of Jesus of Nazareth so that we can achieve holiness and reach heaven one day. The Solemnity of All Saints is a reminder to all of us of the great Christian witness and heroism of the men and women of salvation history. Ordinary people have been called by God through different times to do extraordinary things with their live. Whenever we read the lives of the Saints we are often confronted by the reality of imperfection and sin. Many of the Saints that we honor today were not always exemplary in their witness to Jesus the Christ. Some of them led very sinful lives. Others struggled with depression and their faith in God. Still others were complacent in their living paying no attention to God at all. What matters is this – they ultimately achieved holiness in their lives. The Saints are people who allowed themselves to be led by God and do mighty things in His name.

Let us consider a couple examples so that we can ponder what God is calling us to. The life of St. Paul reminds us that one may well be on the wrong track when God decides to confront a sinful and dreadful situation. Paul was part of a zealous Party that absolutely hated the Christians. He would stand and hold the cloaks of those who would stone the early Christians to death. He was fanatical in his practice of religion and was totally intolerant of other people's beliefs. Paul was absolute in his view on religion and had no problem murdering others who did not hold the same beliefs. However, something happened to totally turn him around. Paul experienced an encounter with Jesus of

Nazareth on his way to Damascus which changed his life. Jesus speaks to him in the midst of his hatred and asks, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" Paul realizes that Jesus is still alive in that moment and knows that the message of the gospel was not something fictitious, rather a reality which ends in resurrection. He spent the rest of his life taking this message of hope to many countries. He experienced persecution, ship wrecks, imprisonment, and ultimately martyrdom to bring others to a relationship with Jesus Christ. Similarly, the life of St. Maximilian Kolbe also sheds light on Christian discipleship. From a very early age he was closely connected to God. He entered a Franciscan seminary at the age of 13. After he was ordained a priest he returned to Poland where he strongly opposed the communist movements. Maximilian was involved in creating a monthly periodical in which the people could remain connected with God and not sold by the secular world. He was no stranger to the problems of the world. During World War II he witnessed the invasion of Poland by the Nazis. He provided shelter to the refugees (which included between 1,000

- 2,000 Jews) and helped put together a temporary hospital for those who were injured. Maximilian did not waiver in his commitment and witness to his faith. He continued to publish religious works encouraging the people during World War II. He was eventually arrested by the Gestapo and was imprisoned on February 17, 1941. In May of that same year he was transferred to Auschwitz. He endured much suffering in the form of beatings. In July of that same year three men escaped the camp. The commander in charge of Auschwitz chose to make an example of this by selecting 10 men as a deterrent by putting them in a bunker to starve to death. One of the men

putting them in a bunker to starve to death. One of the men cried out for mercy and deliverance so he could live for his wife and children. When hearing his pleas, Maximilian offered himself to take this man's place. The offer was accepted. All but Maximilian died of starvation. He was the only one alive after two weeks. It was reported that Maximillian was injected with carbolic acid by the guards to take his life. This was an ultimate example of his selfless love for his fellow man.

How can we learn from the example of these Saints and others like them? It does not matter where we are on life's journey whether we are at the high points or the low points, the Saints are

beacons of light that show us the path to holiness. What is holiness? Holiness is a way of belonging to God and turning away from sin. The Saints show us through their lives how to do this. Just like St. Paul, some of us may be intolerant of others because of their views; their culture, their religion or way of life, but having Jesus in our lives reminds us that faith, hope, and love remain and the greatest of these is love. Our love must always triumph over the need to be right. Our love must build a civilization of tolerance. Similarly, like St. Maximilian Kolbe, we might be faced with difficult circumstances where we need to sacrifice in order that another experiences God's protection and mercy. We are all called, like the Saints, to be beacons of light and hope. Most of us will be humble to admit that we are just ordinary human beings. However, by virtue of the gospel we proclaim, we are challenged to do extraordinary things.



Becoming Catholic

To begin, RCIA is not:

- An adult confirmation program
- · An adult education program
- A marriage preparation program, even if one person in the couple is not Catholic
- CCD for adult Catholics who "dropped out" after confirmation
- A small faith-sharing community
- A support group
- A class
- A club
- A program for making Protestants into Catholics

What RCIA is, is a conversion process that:

- Allows inquiry and provides an introduction to Gospel values, an opportunity for the beginning of faith
- Nurtures and grows faith and conversion, and assists the process with celebration of the word and prayers and blessings
- Facilitates reflection centered on conversion and is marked by rites and the scrutinies
- Culminates, for those who choose, in the Sacraments of Initiation at the Easter Vigil.

Any adult who has been attracted to the Catholic Church and desires to consider the possibility of becoming Catholic is invited to join those currently gathering on **Tuesday evenings at 7:00 p.m.** in the Seminar Room of the Claussen Center. Remember beginning the process entails no commitment to become Catholic, and there is no expectation that everyone will.
