A Capital Campaign for Saint John the Evangelist Catholic Church

Fruits of Campaign: Air Conditioning Maintenance for Church

We have been discussing the future endeavors for our campus, our programs, and our new Life Center here recently. However, we should also communicate our Capital Campaign's additional focus, solving priority issues for our buildings and grounds right now. As Fr. John has made it clear over the past few months, we developed our Campaign Pinnacle Goal of \$14 million in order to ensure all the needs of our church will be met. This includes major initiatives like installation of the same doors across the campus, renovating the church confessionals, and replacing the roofs of the existing buildings.

One item that we all agree needs to be a priority is the air conditioning of the church. I remember my first Christmas as the General Manager, when a volunteer accidentally ripped out the wires that control the AC in the church, causing an extremely uncomfortable Christmas Eve for all of us. A few years before then, a system called Metasys was installed in the church (and the Parish Activity Center), promising to control both the temperature and the cost of electricity used by St. John. Unfortunately, that decision has not resolved any of the above issues. In fact, our energy usage has increased since the installation of Metasys. It


forces our AC units to turn on and off without completing their tasks to either dehumidify the air, or set the temperature properly. There are times that it seems like our church is an icebox. This cannot continue.

We had our new HVAC provider, who was not involved in either the decision or the implementation of Metasys, evaluate the entire building, and they have found significant issues with the system, including a temperature sensor actually sitting in the attic, of all places. We are moving forward with a new system. It is a simple and integrated temperature/humidity sensor system that will ensure our comfort in the pews as well as for the clergy who sit under the hot lights in their vestments. We will begin the installation of the new system in the next month or so. Thank you all for your patience as we identify these types of priority issues and resolve them.

While the money has been pledged in our **Build Our Future, Serve Our Past** capital campaign to build our Life Center and some of our other urgent needs, we still need our entire Parish Family to give in order to reach our additional goals, including the detailed execution of the above programs. Parish Mission & Life

#ToKnow, #ToLove, #ToServe – Respecting Life is at the Core of Our Faith and Our Church

This weekend is the beginning of Respect Life Month. There are so many facets to this focus of our Catholic Faith, to love, honor, respect, cherish, and support all life, in all forms. Our Holy Father has clearly made Respect Life a cornerstone of his papacy, and every form of life is precious and it should be supported at every stage. From conception to natural death, every person is a gift of God's love. We should put the same priority efforts to protect life for the unborn, the infirmed, the aged, the homeless, those with special needs, migrant workers, those in prison, and those battling addiction. We are called to protect the environment to ensure its future for our children and generations beyond ours. It can be called one of our greatest vocations as Catholics to support life. Pope Francis eloquently stated it in his address to the United Nations last year when he visited the United States:

I began this speech recalling the visits of my predecessors. I would hope that my words will be taken above all as a continuation of the final words of the address of Pope Paul VI; although spoken almost exactly fifty years ago, they remain ever timely. "The hour has come when a pause, a moment of recollection, reflection, even of prayer, is absolutely needed so that we may think back over our common origin, our history, our common destiny. The appeal to the moral conscience of man has never been as necessary as it is today... For the danger comes neither from progress nor from science; if these are used well, they can help to solve a great number of the serious problems besetting mankind (Address to the United Nations Organization, 4 October 1965). Among other things, human genius, well applied, will surely help to meet the grave challenges of ecological deterioration and of exclusion. As Paul VI said: "The real danger comes from man, who has at his disposal ever more powerful instruments that are as well fitted to bring about ruin as they are to achieve lofty conquests" (ibid.).

The common home of all men and women must continue to rise on the foundations of a right understanding of universal fraternity and respect for the sacredness of every human life, of every man and every woman, the poor, the elderly, children, the infirm, the unborn, the unemployed, the abandoned, those considered disposable because they are only considered as part of a statistic. This common home of all men and women must also be built on the understanding of a certain sacredness of created nature.

Such understanding and respect call for a higher degree of wisdom, one which accepts transcendence, rejects the creation of an all-powerful élite, and recognizes that the full meaning of individual and collective life is found in

selfless service to others and in the sage and respectful use of creation for the common good. To repeat the words of Paul VI, "the edifice of modern civilization has to be built on spiritual principles, for they are the only ones capable not only of supporting it, but of shedding light on it" (ibid.). – Pope Francis 9/25/2016 (http://w2.vatican.va/content/ francesco/en/speeches/2015/september/documents/papafrancesco_20150925_onu-visita.html)

If you have not gotten a chance to read the entire address (or watch the video, which is available at the above link), I highly recommend you do so.

Our spiritual principles as Catholics, along with our engagement in our larger society, is what allows us to advance life and the principles that respect and support it throughout the world. That can be as simple as holding a door open for someone with a walker, or by providing a welcoming environment for those with special needs. It means not ignoring those around us who may be lonely. We are a Parish Family and we take care of our family and those around us. Please join us in ensuring that life in all its wondrous forms is cherished and respected.



Mass Times Revert to Winter Schedule Beginning Sunday, November 6; Weekday Evening Mass Will Be Moved to Wednesday





With each new generation, we lament the fact that they don't seem to know basic facts and information, such as the current vice president or who won the Civil War. Anything beyond last week is ancient history to them, but there are many events in our collective past that are necessary and proper to remember.

That is why we (the Catholic Jewish Dialogue of Collier County) hold a Kristallnacht Commemoration each year on the Sunday closest to the historical date of 11/9/38. On that horrible night, the Nazi government prodded gangs of thugs to attack Jewish neighborhoods, businesses and synagogues across all of Germany. To put it in context, think of the riots in Ferguson, Baltimore and Milwaukee multiplied by a few hundred, all going on at the same time. Coincidentally, like the U.S. riots in response to a police shooting, the Kristallnacht riots were allegedly sparked by the murder of a German diplomat in Paris by a distraught Jewish man. When it was over the government blamed the Jews themselves and fined them for the damages.

We encourage all of you to bring your children and grandchildren because in a few years it will be up to them to carry the torch of "Never Forget."

The program this year will feature music and a multimedia presentation of firsthand accounts of the Night of Broken Glass, "Shattered and Broken".

Lord Increase Our Faith

hen reading the Scriptures, it is important to understand the passages in context. Today's gospel begins with the apostles asking Jesus to "Increase our faith." This request follows a lesson about forgiving the repentant sinner. Through this teaching, Jesus wants his apostles to recognize the importance of tangible faith — a faith that can heal and make a difference. Such faith can be perceived by others when one puts his or her faith into action. The apostles' response is very human. They find it hard to forgive and live this radical grace. Jesus knows the great tension that exists in his disciples and decides to teach them an important life lesson in the form of a parable.

Our faith and our actions must always flow from one another. Can we honestly say that we are people of faith while neglecting the duties of forgiveness and ministry to the vulnerable? Jesus shows us that our faith cannot be isolated — it involves others. For us, faith calls us to the community that we call "Church". We are asked to live our faith in the context of reaching out to others with the wisdom of Jesus. It would be powerful if our prayer as a community would be: "Lord, increase our faith." Once we commit ourselves to faith, we commit ourselves to the constancy of God in our lives. It is the God who calls us to extend the hand of healing to those in pain. Most of us wonder where to start to make this healing a reality. Jesus tells us in the parable of

the mustard seed that the great miracles of faith bear fruit when we dare to plant the small seeds of compassion and truth. By attending to these small seeds, an immense growth of fruit will result from our cultivation of mercy.

If we peer beneath the surface of our daily experiences, we will discover that we are living in a wounded world and indeed a wounded Church. It is in this context that we are called to live out our faith. Jesus spoke of the importance of forgiveness, turning away from sin, and the things that separate us from the Father. In the image of the mustard seed we are reminded that if we learn to forgive and turn away from the things that constantly separate us from God, then we will truly be capable of great things. Our challenge is to examine where God is to be found within the community. It is our responsibility to offer support and love to those who suffer. If we know that someone has fallen from grace as a result of sin — it is our responsibility to initiate reconciliation. Once others see our example of forgiveness, they may be inspired to forgive as well. This is what we are called to as a community. True healing takes place in our community when we recognize individuals who are wounded and reach out to them. Then we will see the tangible fruits of our faith. Taking on this responsibility requires the constancy of God's grace working through us. Our sacraments offer this ultimate healing — but in order to celebrate the sacraments in true faith, we must first live the reality of Jesus in our lives.

Prayer

Lord, increase our faith. May we follow you with all our hearts. Teach us the wisdom to know what you want from us. May we always be conscious of those around us. Stir up the flame of faith in our lives so that we may be inspired to reach out to all people in your name. May others find in us a true resting place of your constant love and forgiveness. Amen. 

Consider these statistics for the United States:

- Only 30 percent of Americans who were raised Catholic are still practicing.
- Fully 10 percent of all adults in America are ex-Catholics.
- The number of marriages celebrated in the Church decreased dramatically between 1972 and 2010.
- Only 60 percent of Catholics believe in a personal God.

If the Church is to reverse

these trends, the evangelizers must first be evangelized, in other words, Catholics-in-the-pew must make a conscious choice to know and follow Jesus before they can draw others to him.

This work of discipleship lies at the heart of **FORMING INTENTIONAL DISCIPLES: The Path to Knowing and Following Jesus**, by Sherry A. Weddell. This book will be the basis for a six-session workshop that will lead participants through steps that will help them enter more deeply into a relationship with God and discover gifts that flow from that relationship for the sake of the Church and the world.

The workshops will continue every other week, to allow time for reading a few chapters from the book between each session.



St. Thomas Aquinas, the theologian, is this week's Pivotal Player

The relationship of faith and reason is under intense scrutiny in an age beholden to the competing claims of fundamentalism and secularism. So called "new atheists" insist that the claims of religion amount to mere superstition, a retrograde holdover from a time long ago. Others insist that the life of faith is a retreat into emotions and subjectivism. St. Thomas Aquinas anticipated these objections and trends and demonstrated that to believe is to think and that the life of the mind is integral to life in Christ.


