


World Mission Sunday 2016: Mercy Changes the World

On September 4 of this year, the world witnessed the canonization of Mother Teresa of Kolkata. St. Teresa gave great witness as a missionary of Jesus and the Church. As we celebrate World Mission Sunday on October 23, 2016, we recall her humble wisdom. She once said: "Let us touch the dying, the poor, the lonely and the unwanted according to the graces we have received and let us not be ashamed or slow to do this humble work." Mother Teresa started her work by

creating a new group of missionaries called the "Missionaries of Charity". Her great witness of mercy toward the poor inspired 12 of her former students to join her in entering into solidarity with the lives of the poor and the forgotten by living and ministering to them. Since the creation of the Missionaries of Charity on October 7, 1950, St. Teresa's community is now over 4,500 Sisters strong in 517 missions in 100 countries. The

community continues to grow this day. The Missionaries of Charity continue to run orphanages and shelters for individuals living with and dying from complications of AIDS, the homeless, the disabled, the aged, those living with addictions, and victims of famine, "Let us touch the dying, the poor, the lonely and the unwanted according to the graces we have received and let us not be ashamed or slow to do this humble work."



#ToKnow, #ToLove, #ToServe – Vocations: Not Just Collars and Habits Part 1: Grandparents

As we continue the path of vocations for our Parish Family, it is important that we all recognize the call God has for each of us. The call can be soft and we may not even hear it, sometimes for years. But, that call is there nonetheless. If anyone loves us with patience and kindness, it is God. Last week, I started to shine a light on some of those calls we see as vocations. Vocations are not just the calling to becoming a priest or nun, but they are clear directions on how we can take our faith and turn it into action for the betterment of world around us. This week, I wanted to focus on a special vocation: Grandparents.

Last week, Pope Francis celebrated National Grandparents Day in Italy, with a clear direction of the vocation of Grandparents:

I am happy to be together with you to experience this day of reflection and prayer, placed in the context of Grandparents Day. I greet you all with affection, starting with the Presidents of the Associations, whom I thank for their words. I express my appreciation to those who have faced difficulties and hardships in order not to miss this event; and at the same time I am close to all elderly persons, who, because they are ill or on their own, could not move from home, but who are spiritually united with us...

Not a few elderly people who generously spend their time and the talents that God has bestowed upon them by helping and supporting others. I think of how many you make yourselves available in parishes for a truly valuable service: some of you are dedicated to decorating the house of the Lord, others as catechists, leaders of the liturgy, others as witnesses to charity. And what about their role in

the family? How many grandparents care for grandchildren, simply by passing on to children the experience of life, the spiritual and cultural values of a community and a people! In countries that have suffered a severe religious persecution, grandparents are the ones who pass on the faith to new generations, leading the children to be baptized in a context of underground suffering...

Dear grandfathers and grandmothers, thank you for your example of love, dedication and wisdom. Continue with courage to bear witness to these values! Let not your smiles and the beautiful brightness of your eyes be lacking in society! I accompany you with my prayers – and do not you forget to pray for me

We can all be grandparents, spoiling the children of our Parish Family, everso-slightly, while we instill the virtues and faith that have made us their positive role models.

The poorer communities in the continents of Africa, Oceana, Europe, Orient, and the Americas are blessed to receive countless missionaries and experience the mercy of Jesus through their ministry. Missionaries reach out to the poorest of the poor in war torn countries. They offer healing in the clinics that are operated in the most rural parts of the globe and also in the poorest of slums. Missionaries are the face of Christ who

reminded his disciples, "Whatsoever you did to the least of my brothers, you did to me" (Matthew 25:40). The Missionaries serve the Catholic Church in many capacities. Some are priests who serve rural parishes. Many Religious Sisters and Brothers aid the work of health clinics, schools, social services, catechesis and charitable homes and shelters. Thousands of lay missionaries join in this universal mission in entering into solidarity with the forgotten of the world and collaboration with priests and religious. The Mission of the Church continues to express itself in the realization of a Church fully alive and active which fulfills the hopes and aspirations of the Second Vatican Council.

In this Year of Mercy, Pope Francis continues to urge all members of the Church to participate in the Mission of Jesus. He states, "On this World Mission Sunday, all of us are invited to "go out" as missionary disciples, each generously offering their talents, creativity, wisdom and experience in order to bring the message of God's tenderness and compassion to the entire human family.... She [The Church] is commissioned to announce the mercy of God, the beating heart of the

Gospel" (Pope Francis' Message for World Mission Sunday, 2016). All Catholics in the Diocese of Venice have an integral part to play in joining the mission endeavor of the Church. The mission mandate given by Jesus in Matthew 28:19-20 reminds all of us to go out into the world and make his presence known to all through our personal acts of witness to mercy and charity. For some this may manifest itself by taking a risk and going on a mission trip as a missionary. For others this may reveal itself in the generosity of offering money to aid the work of missionaries who serve the Church every day.

When we listen to the Gospel, we are reminded by Christ himself, "The poor you will always have with you" (Mark 14:7 and Matthew 26:11). So long as we live in an imperfect world the poor will always be in our midst. There is an ongoing challenge to reach out to the poor with the mercy of

God through our time, talent and treasure. Those who live in poverty are real people. They have names. They live in the fear of tomorrow and experience the hunger of today. Pope Francis reminded people working at the Headquarters of the World Food Program in Rome on June 13th, 2016 of this reality. "Poverty has a face!" He remarked, "It has the face of a child; it has the face of a family; it has the face of a people, young and old. It has the face of widespread unemployment and lack of opportunity. It has the face of forced migrations, and of

empty or destroyed homes." Missionaries who serve the Catholic Church know this reality too well. Men and women accompany the poor in their mission of mercy. They offer the Church's consolation and the hope that belongs to the call to be Christian.

Please know when you hear of World Mission Sunday that it is not simply a second collection but a call from the Holy Father to make a difference by joining the work of mission. It is a way of the local Church reaching out to God's poor through priests, religious, and laity to the marginalized half a world away. Your profound prayers and financial support will help missionaries to accomplish their task and allow them to change the world one person at a time in ministering to them. The Pontifical Mission Societies in the United States beautifully captures how you can be part of the Universal Mission. It states, "Your World Mission Sunday gift may be

> used to buy Bibles for catechists in Sierra Leone, or provide for a small parish in India. Your offering may be used to help Sisters in Sudan who lovingly care for orphans in Jesus' name, or it may buy a bicycle for a priest in Thailand so that he can travel

from village to village to celebrate Mass. Most importantly, wherever you offering is sent, it brings with it the Good News of Jesus Christ and His message of peace, hope, and salvation."

We will follow the winter Mass schedule until May, 2017.



Self-Righteousness Gives Way to Humility

he wisdom of Jesus was radical for the people of his time. While he communicated such a simple wisdom, he also disturbed the teaching classes of his day. In today's gospel, Jesus uses a parable to demonstrate his disdain toward the Pharisees. The Pharisees were members of an ancient sect within Judaism who emphasized a strict interpretation and adherence to Mosaic Law. Dictionaries today add a secondary description to the meaning of "Pharisee" as "hypocrite" or "sanctimonious person". Such descriptions relate to how Jesus encountered this group in his ministry. The gospels show how there was a disconnect between Jesus and the religious class. The parable points out how holiness does not come from self righteousness but an earnest desire to please God. Jesus opens the reality of God's justification to the one who was despised, i.e. the tax collector who asks for mercy.

Reflection Questions

- 1. What surprises you about the parable Jesus
- 2. What is God's view to the self-righteous?
- 3. In what way does God respond to the humble plea from the repentant sinner?
- 4. Which person in the parable do you relate to?
- 5. Name an experience where you have reached out for God's mercy.
- 6. How has God revealed himself in the midst of your weakness?
- 7. Knowing that you are a member of the Body of Christ, how do you think God wants you to react when you are confronted by another's sin?

There is no doubt that Jesus would have seen the zeal within the group of Pharisees and their desire to help people follow the laws of the Torah. The only problem was these zealous people forgot why their laws were there in the first place – to bring others to God.

There is a hidden humility in the wisdom of Jesus. His message is so relevant to us as a community of faith. People are often tempted within the Christian community to view themselves as better than those who do not share in our life or morality. Our true mission is to include such people by encouraging them rather than judging them. Jesus always associated with the sinner, teaching them the mercy of a God who always rejoiced at a repentant sinner. He was criticized for that association – it must have taken a lot of his time and energy. Likewise we are asked to spend time with others, giving witness to the mercy of God through our witness.

Humility calls us to recognize that every human person possesses the same dignity regardless of their station in life. The sinner is loved just as much as the one who leads a holy life. The difference is that God hates the sin but loves the sinner. God is glorified by the one who leads a holy life and rejoices in the face of a sinner turning away from sin. The only danger that remains for the Christian community is that it just focuses on itself alone. Sometimes people can become so inwardly looking, in terms of their religiosity and rigid observance or ritual, forgetting the reason why the Church exists, i.e. to give worship to God and bring others to His message. The mission of the Church is not self serving; rather it is to always reach out to those who need to experience the saving power of God.



Prayer

Lord, may we always recognize the sacred dignity that every person in our world possesses. May our bold proclamation of faith bring with it a gentle witness which encourages others to know and love you. Help us to live as you lived in humility and patience. Inspire us to treat the stranger, our neighbor, our family, and the sinner with the traits of your mercy. Amen.

With each new generation, we lament the fact that they don't seem to know basic facts and information, such as the current vice president or who won the Civil War. Anything beyond last week is ancient history to them, but there are many events in our collective past that are necessary and proper to remember.

That is why we (the Catholic Jewish Dialogue of Collier County) hold a Kristallnacht Commemoration each year on the Sunday closest to the historical date of 11/9/38. On that horrible night, the Nazi government prodded gangs of thugs to attack Jewish neighborhoods, businesses and synagogues across all of Germany. To put it in context, think of the riots in Ferguson, Baltimore and Milwaukee multiplied by a few hundred, all going on at the same time. Coincidentally, like the U.S. riots in response to a police shooting, the Kristallnacht riots were allegedly sparked by the murder of a German diplomat in Paris by a distraught Jewish man. When it was over the government blamed the Jews themselves and fined them for the damages.

We encourage all of you to bring your children and grandchildren because in a few years it will be up to them to carry the torch of "Never Forget."

The program this year will feature music and a multimedia presentation of firsthand accounts of the Night of Broken Glass, "Shattered and Broken".

The Incredible Mercy of Our God on Tuesday, November 15

It is very difficult for us as human beings to understand the mercy that God offers to us. Pope Francis declared the current liturgical year as an *Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy*. To emphasize the importance of this jubilee and help us understand how bountiful God's mercy is for us, Pope Francis issued a papal bull (letter), *Misericordiae Vultus/The Face of Mercy*, explaining in great detail this incomprehensible mercy of God.

This seminar will explore this incredible mercy of our God by reviewing and explaining Pope Francis's letter. We will also investigate what other sources have to say about the mercy of God, such as other Popes, religious leaders, and the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

The Eucharist (The Mass) on Thursday, November 17

This seminar examines the richness of our Eucharistic celebration to enable us to participate at the deepest level possible.

The catechism of the Catholic Church (1324) tells us that "The Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life." It goes on to say that "the Eucharist is the sum and summary of our faith (1327)." Vatican II in *The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy* tells us that "For it is the liturgy through which, especially in the divine sacrifice of the Eucharist, the work of our redemption is accomplished [I (2)]."

The Mass is central and perhaps the most important aspect of our Catholic life. There is a great deal of meaning and theology contained in our Mass, but how much do we really know and understand about the Eucharist? How much do we really understand about what is contained in the Eucharist? How about a little quiz?

- 1. What does the word Eucharist mean?
- 2. What is the most important part of the Mass?
- 3. Why do we process in with the book of the Gospels but do not process out with it?
- 4. At what point of the Mass do we all receive general absolution from all of our non-serious sins?
- 5. What does the Priest or the Deacon say after proclaiming the Gospel and kissing the Book of the Gospels?
- 6. What do the gifts of bread and wine which are brought up and placed on the alter represent?
- 7. What does the Priest or the Deacon say when he pours the water into the cup containing the wine?
- 8. Why does the Priest break off a small piece of the Body of Christ and place it in the chalice?
- 9. What is the fraction rite and what does it represent?
- 10. What is the GIRM?
- 11. At the Eucharist, who offers what?
- 12. What is the Totus Christus and why is it central to our understanding of the Eucharist?
- 13. Why is it so very important that we do not leave prior to Mass ending?
