

#ToKnow, #ToLove, #ToServe – Vocations: Not Just Collars and Habits Part 3: Single Life

I remember it was the smell that hit me first. We had just been pushed out of a van with tinted windows into the middle of a block in Southeast Washington, DC. My friends of only three days and I had signed up for the Freshmen Orientation to Community Involvement (FOCI), an opportunity before college started to be immersed in service in one of the most crime-ridden cities in America. We were dazed by the streetlights, because the van was so dark. We were not allowed to see where we were going, since this safe house was a transition location for women and children in extremely high-risk abusive situations. There had been times that the volunteers who served these women and their children would be threatened and attacked, just for making dinner, or reading a book. When we finally got our bearings, we were rushed into the row house, and the door was barred behind us, eight separate locks and a metal bar sealing us in.

Of the six of us, only two were men, myself and a hulking football player named CJ. The women inside the home were so scared of us (well, probably way more CJ than me) from the violence they had experienced in their lives. The fear in their eyes, the hopelessness, was palpable.

CJ and I were only there to create what we call "Operational Security". We were supposed to pretend that this house was just like any other on the block. If someone came to the door, we were there to protect the inhabitants of the house and call the police if something went wrong. The women and children went upstairs after dinner. They had been speaking with our female FOCI members over dinner, weary of strangers, but they could not contain their love of their kids and their desire to give them a better life. CJ and I ate

their desire to give them a better life. CJ and I ate dinner in the front room, away from them. It was what happened next that changed my life.

Dozing in a chair, I awoke as the entire house was shaken to its core. A "husband" had found the house at 1:00 a.m. He pounded on the door, his weapons of choice included a handgun and a crowbar. Brandishing both, he screamed that he would be leaving with his wife and son, dead or alive. We sprang into action. The only cell phone in the house barely worked (this was before even the BlackBerry, much less today's pervasive communications), so one of the FOCI women called 911 from the land line, and CJ and I jumped to the door. We matched the tone of this "person", screaming back at him that we were ready to stop him if he tried to get into our house. He stumbled back, partly due to his surprise at the male voices and partly due to his intoxication. He pressed forward again, convinced that this was the location of his wife.

I looked back up the stairway behind me and could see the sheer terror in the dozens of eyes looking down at us, holding back the door that was now being pounded on. We yelled that we were coming out and we were going to take care of this "man", but the sound of the approaching police sirens must have jolted him out of his furry and he bolted from the house. CJ and I dropped to our knees and started praying. Then, I felt some hands on my shoulders. Looking up, the mother and her son had come down the stairs and were encircling both of us in their arms, praying with us and thanking us for saving their lives

The vocation of single life is not a "placeholder" vocation. The opportunities to serve God and heed his call to love and

support those who need it can be equally served by those who choose not to go into religious life, or get married. Single life may be lived out either from choice or from circumstance. Some people choose to remain single because they believe this is how they can best serve God and his people. They do not feel called to join a religious order or the priesthood. They may be lay missionaries, like a teacher or a doctor, who can more easily respond to need, wherever it is perceived, if they are not tied by an intimate relationship or family responsibilities. But equally they may be a carpenter, office worker, scientist, or truck driver, who has a fulfilling personal relationship with Jesus which they feel able to live out deeply.

Other people are single because of where they are on their life's journey. This may be a temporary or permanent situation. For example, a young person who is contemplating their future is still called to live their life for God while they are single. A person who has been widowed or divorced and thus is no longer living the vocation of Marriage may now can live the vocation of Single Life and find new opportunities to enrich the world around them with their faith.

I can tell you that I would never have experienced that life-changing moment of the mother and son holding me and praying for their safe future if I had been married, or if I had chosen a religious life. That opportunity would not have been open to me, and if it was, I would have prioritized my time with my own family that I love above everything else in this world. Single Life is a vocation, a call to serve God and others. I hope those of you who have the opportunity to live out your Single Life vocation take the world by storm, showcasing the love and mercy of our faith to all around you.



We will follow the winter Mass schedule until May, 2017.



Encountering the Mercy of God

s we journey through the Sunday gospels, we are exposed to the radical message of Jesus Christ. In our reading today we meet Zacchaeus; he may have been short in stature, but many were aware of his reputation in Jericho. Tax collectors during the time of Jesus were known to be corrupt and sinful. They were the ones who collected monies for Caesar (the dictator who had held Israel under Roman occupation). Hence, tax collectors were held in disdain by the Religious State of Israel. It is of no surprise to us, then, how people became hostile when Jesus invited himself to Zacchaeus' house. Jesus takes this risk in order to bring salvation to a man who was hungering for God and the truth. Jesus' action of entering the house of Zacchaeus etches into salvation history the imprint of a new initiative of God, i.e., to enter into the world of sin to transform it! Zacchaeus recognizes a new way of life

Reflection Questions

- 1. Describe the life of a tax collector in Jesus' day and how people would respond to his presence.
- 2. Why do you think Zacchaeus seeks out Jesus?
- 3. What is Jesus' response when he spots Zacchaeus in the tree?
- 4. Why do people react negatively when Jesus enters Zacchaeus' house?
- 5. What is Jesus communicating about the mercy of God in this gospel story?
- 6. Have there been times when you have behaved badly?
- 7. Have you encountered Jesus in the midst of your personal sin?
- 8. How does Jesus offer salvation to you today?

by encountering Jesus. Therefore, it is not surprising to hear that once Zacchaeus encounters the truth in the love and compassion in Jesus, that he moves to change his life and do what is right.


The Church continues to be the refuge of the sinner. The work of salvation is never done. Salvation has to be worked at and the presence of Jesus still needs to be made known. There are still many people today who have heard of Jesus and understand the concept of his message — but they do not know him. Lives often remain unchanged because the personal encounter with the Lord Jesus has not taken place. If we truly know Jesus deeply, our lives will change and be transformed in ways that we never knew possible. The challenge for us today is to seek Jesus out as Zacchaeus did. Once we find Christ in the midst of our every day realities, it is then we can offer to change our lives for the better. Whenever we turn our lives over to Christ, salvation comes to rest in our homes. The only way we can enter into a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ is through prayer, discernment,

and contemplation. Just as it takes time to cultivate our personal relationships, it also takes our time and sacrifice to get to know Jesus.

What does all this mean in concrete? It means that we commit ourselves to the path of ongoing conversion.

It means that we recognize the grounds of the endless possibilities of God's mercy when we encounter sin.

It means that our lives must always be open to Jesus' message of love and acceptance of the sinner. It means that we take the risk that Jesus took to make Zacchaeus his disciple. It means that we have to think outside of the box so that we can ultimately bring people into the conformity of Christ's truth in love. The first reading today reminds us that God does not loathe or hate any of his creation. All God expects from humanity is that people abandon wickedness and believe in his Word. In Jesus' words, "For the Son of Man has come to seek and to save what was lost!"



Prayer

Lord, may we be always conscious of your call to transform our lives. Help us recognize the areas of weakness and sin in our lives so that we may turn away from all the things that separate us from you. May salvation be made known in our homes – transform us and inspire us to lead others to you. Amen.

It is not easy to entrust oneself to God's mercy, because it is an abyss beyond our comprehension. But we must! ... "Oh, I am a great sinner!" "All the better! Go to Jesus: he likes you to tell him these things!" He forgets, he has a very special capacity for forgetting. He forgets, he kisses you, he embraces you and he simply says to you: "Neither do I condemn you; go, and sin no more."

With each new generation, we lament the fact that they don't seem to know basic facts and information, such as the current vice president or who won the Civil War. Anything beyond last week is ancient history to them, but there are many events in our collective past that are necessary and proper to remember.

That is why we (the Catholic Jewish Dialogue of Collier County) hold a Kristallnacht Commemoration each year on the Sunday closest to the historical date of 11/9/38. On that horrible night, the Nazi government prodded gangs of thugs to attack Jewish neighborhoods, businesses and synagogues across all of Germany. To put it in context, think of the riots in Ferguson, Baltimore and Milwaukee multiplied by a few hundred, all going on at the same time. Coincidentally, like the U.S. riots in response to a police shooting, the Kristallnacht riots were allegedly sparked by the murder of a German diplomat in Paris by a distraught Jewish man. When it was over the government blamed the Jews themselves and fined them for the damages.

We encourage all of you to bring your children and grandchildren because in a few years it will be up to them to carry the torch of "Never Forget."

The program this year will feature music and a multimedia presentation of firsthand accounts of the Night of Broken Glass, "Shattered and Broken".





November 3's Pivotal Player will be G. K. Chesterton, the Evangelist



How does one engage a culture that is befuddled by Christ and suspicious of the Church? The life and witness of this nineteenth century literary convert shows that the fundamental disposition of effective evangelization is joy, and life in Christ is a day-to-day encounter with an abundant and surprising offer of grace.

At 6'4" and over 300 lbs. at his heaviest, G.K. himself was a heavy-weight, and his intellect even heavier-weighted. Nonetheless remembering that "angels can fly because they take themselves lightly", this larger than life apostle of common sense also took himself lightly because he took his faith seriously. He came to know God, but he came to know himself better; which made him a better man. He was a joyfully serious thinker and wordsmith whom people loved (and love).

C.S. Lewis, one of the twentieth century's other great minds, thought Chesterton to be dangerously good at conveying "what is" to his readers — or perhaps "Who is." He wrote:

"In reading Chesterton, as in reading [George] MacDonald, I did not know what I was letting myself in for. A young man who wishes to remain a sound atheist cannot be too careful of his reading."





