

## Divine Mercy Novena Begins Good Friday

An appropriate time for the Divine Mercy Novena is from Good Friday until the Saturday after Easter. Given to Saint Faustina by Jesus to do on those days (*Diary #1209*), it makes obvious the connection between Jesus' sacrifice on Good Friday and the Sacrament of Reconciliation, God's great mercy, which Jesus instituted when he appeared to the Apostles after his Resurrection, breathing upon them and giving them power to forgive sins as he himself had when people came to him for healing miracles.

The Gospel of the Sunday after Easter, namely (not "or" as in the English translation) Divine Mercy Sunday, has this story as well as that of Jesus' handling of Thomas and his doubts (*John 20:19-31*), itself a great mercy.

Pope John Paul II, who gave approval for Divine Mercy Sunday in 2000, died just after the Vigil of Divine Mercy Mass in his room in 2005, was declared Blessed on Divine Mercy Sunday in 2011, and he was canonized Saint John Paul on Divine Mercy Sunday, April 27, 2014.

# #ToKnow, #ToLove – Holy Week Spurs Us On

This Palm Sunday is a spring board for both our Catholic Church in general and our Parish Family of Saint John the Evangelist in particular. We are about to embark on the journey through the pain and suffering that Jesus endured for all humanity, with the brightest moment of the resurrection at hand in Easter. This is a moment of reflection, but also the time to get ready for the promise of the love, and mercy of our faith, and to share that joy with the rest of the world.

Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, has some choice words for the youth of our community, giving them (and all of us around them) direction on how to journey in this world and create the Culture of Encounter described on the front page of our bulletin:

We are accompanied on this journey by Our Mother, the Virgin Mary. She encourages us with her faith, the same faith that she expressed in her song of praise. Mary said, "The Mighty One has done great things for me" (Lk 1:49). She knew how to give thanks to God who looked upon her littleness, and she recognised the great things that God was accomplishing in her life. So she set off to visit her cousin Elizabeth who was old and needed her to be close by. Mary did not stay at home because she was not a young couch potato who looks for comfort and safety where nobody can bother them. She was moved by faith because faith is at the heart of Our Mother's entire life story.





## Passion Sunday

t is with much reverence and devotion that we begin the most holy of all weeks. Palm Sunday recalls how the drama of the cross quickly unfolded. As Jesus entered Jerusalem, the crowds were ecstatic with joy. "Hosanna to the Son of David," they shouted as they waved their olive branches. Jesus was the answer to their prayers and his welcome to Jerusalem was one fit for a king! However, within the space of five days, these same voices turn their shouts of acclamation and praise to the shrill of anger and condemnation: "Crucify him! Crucify him!"

The five days that followed Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem speak of intrigue and deception. The religious leaders started to spin their web of deceit and plotted against Jesus. He had been too much for them — he brought people to God in ways that they never had thought possible. Jesus challenged these leaders by the things that he taught and

the miracles he performed in the name of the Father. He confronted the Pharisees, Scribes and Sadducees with their hypocrisy and narrow views. Their discontent was such that they sought to have Jesus condemned by Roman law — a law despised by the religious class. During this week, Judas plots against Jesus and betrays the one whom he had left everything to follow. What went wrong? Was Jesus too radical for this man, or did Judas' hunger for money motivate his betrayal? When recognized as one of the companions on Jesus' journey, Peter denies his Lord and Master three times. Even the Rock of the Church folds under the cross of discipleship. Peter's guilt is overwhelming — the rough and ready fisherman flees and weeps bitterly over his denial.

The Passion and death of Jesus is a heart-rendering story of a man who was put to death only because of his love and compassion — for doing what God wanted. The Incarnate Word enters into the realm of suffering, revealing to the world that God can truly enter into solidarity with humanity's suffering. The weight of the cross is not necessarily characterized by the burden of the wood's weight, but the weight of our sins. Jesus bears the cross of sin courageously, so that we might be freed from sin and be delivered from death to new life. As Jesus is lifted high on the cross, so does our hope for salvation. Jesus surrenders his life into the hands of the Father.

Each one of us still encounters the same sin that Jesus died for. The sins that brought Jesus to the cross still exist in our world today. Holy Week reminds all of us that we are asked to learn from the Christ event — we are to open our minds and hearts to a message that is sometimes hard to take. We are also called not to allow our hunger or greed for material things to replace our love for the Lord. As baptized Christians, we are asked to stand firm in our resolve in giving witness to what we believe in. Peter's denial brought pain to his life causing him to weep bitterly. Let Peter's weakness two thousand years ago be our strength today!

## Prayer

Lord, through your passion and death, lead us in the ways of your truth. May we appreciate every step that you took on the way to the cross. Help us to turn away from the sin that nailed you to the Tree and to carry the cross of discipleship. Amen.

#### A Holy Week of Passion

For three years the disciples walked on Accompanying their rabbi and friend They witnessed his calming and challenging words As he forgave the sinner and confronted embittered hearts

Miracles and signs the disciples did see
The dead were raised, the blind did see
With lepers cleansed, the oppressed set free
God stirred them on to see heaven wedded to earth

Companions on a journey they are taught by God They are fed by the one who provided for five thousand hungry hearts Who was their Living Bread They tasted the water made wine by Jesus, the True Vine

As Jesus brought peace to those possessed by evil
And set them free to be possessed by the love of God
They saw the calming of the storm and their Master walking upon
the waters

But now they walk on to face the week of all weeks
To realize what Jesus meant to carry the cross
Men and women of the passion they will be
Put to the test they might flee

The triumphal entry to the city stirs them on
As they see branches waved and Blessed Song
Welcoming their teacher, savior and friend
Lost in this euphoria they are unaware of the awaiting passion

And so the divine drama of that week unfolds
Cunning plots play out as Spy Wednesday does pay
Silver pieces placed in betrayer's hand
Who will watch and wait to deliver his friend by that fateful kiss

The Passover is celebrated as a Last Supper of Christ
He tells of his betrayal and the fragility of Peter's resolve confronted
The master takes the unleavened bread of deliverance and the cup of
promise

"This is my body...this is the Cup of my blood...do this in memory of me." He does say.

Curious minds understand not of what is taking place before them And so the sacred meal does end and sacred passion begin As Jesus leads them out to the Mount of Olives And invites his friend to pray bidding them not to undergo the test

As Jesus communes with the Father He prays that His will be done As his agony in the garden begins and his sweat becomes like blood The disciples grow fragile and weak and so fall prey to sleep

Jesus returns to find followers sleeping from grief He bids them sleep not as to not undergo the test As the darkness descends And so a crowd and his betrayer does approach A kiss on the face of Christ is all it takes
To hand Jesus over into the hands of death
Betrayal now evident the disciples thrash out
But Jesus commands them to stop healing the high priest's
servant's ear

Taken into custody, Jesus is set to face his trial In High Priest's courtyard, Peter sits down Questioned three times he does demand that with this Jesus, he does not stand

And so the cock crowed as Jesus did promise
The eyes of Jesus and Peter meet in that moment
"Before the cock crows today, you will deny three times"
The words of Jesus ring true, as Peter retreats and weeps bitterly

But scribes and Sandhedrin question on "If you are the Christ, tell us"

## Celebrating the Triduum: Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday

There is only one Adult Faith Formation program scheduled during Holy Week to allow participation in as many liturgical celebrations of the Easter Triduum (three days) as possible.

The Triduum celebrations begin with evening Mass on Maundy Thursday and end at vespers on Easter Sunday. The **Thursday** Mass recalls the Last Supper and Christ's institution of the Eucharist.

On **Good Friday**, after the reading of the passion according to St. John, special prayers for the whole world, and the adoration of the cross, comes the Mass of the Presanctified, in which



there is no consecration, but hosts already consecrated are distributed.

After sunset on Holy
Saturday, the Easter
Vigil celebrates Christ's
resurrection and our dying
and rising with him in
baptism. A service of light
and the blessing of the
paschal candle introduce a
series of scriptural readings
that recapitulate the whole
history of salvation from
creation to the resurrection.
The catechumens are

baptized, they and the candidates are confirmed, and the whole community renews its baptismal promises before the Eucharist


