Mission Possible

Six Youth from St. John Will Travel to Grenada to Minister to the Orphans, Elderly, and Handicapped

"I am hoping to broaden my perspectives of life. I've only been exposed to a very comfortable loving environment. I want to be able to reach out to those who don't get the same opportunities as me and donate my time and abilities to improve their everyday life. Going on this trip will give me a chance to step out of my comfort zone and direct my full attention and being to the well being of others." – Francesca Goduti

CYO and Saint John the Evangelist are sending six students and three adults on a life-changing experience, along with Fr. John, the Diocesan Mission Director. These individuals will participate in the Mission Impossible Missions Trip to Grenada, Caribbean July 8 to July 14.

"We will join two other parishes in the diocese of Venice and partner to minister to the people of Grenada in the Caribbean, a peaceful island that is inhabited by many poverty-stricken people, but rich in joy, love, and soul," said Kyle VanDuser, CYO Social and Spiritual Director.

"We will take donated items collected by our participants and with our talents, treasure, and time use them to minister to the orphans, elderly, and handicapped. Some of us will get the chance to even leave a lasting impact by repairing some building and structural damages left in the path of hurricanes. We hope to help the lives of those we encounter, but we guarantee the trip will change the lives of our students with this experience," said Kyle.

Student participants include Madison Campbell, Francesca Goduti, Dominique Tedrow, Crystal Valentine, Julia McDonald, and Alex Farrell. Adult chaperones are Jennine Fuentes, Kayla and Kyle VanDuser.



#ToKnow, #ToLove, #ToServe – Liberty and Justice for All

During this Fortnight for Freedom, we are called as Catholics to live our faith within our society, especially here in the United States. There is no separation of our beliefs or convictions when we live as Catholic and citizens of this great country. We are not to live apart, but as Pope Francis tells us, to "go out into the streets". In fact, the Pledge of Allegiance is a perfect example of this fact. It is not just some cobbled together set of words that children are forced to recite every day at school. Title 4, Chapter 1, Section 4 of the US Flag Code states:

The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag: "I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.", should be rendered by standing at attention facing the flag with the right hand over the heart. When not in uniform men should remove any non-religious headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Persons in uniform should remain silent, face the flag, and render the military salute. Members of the Armed

Forces not in uniform and veterans may render the military salute in the manner provided for persons in uniform.

Each and every word has been chosen carefully to craft a simple and direct pledge. Did you know that the Knights of Columbus, the Catholic Fraternal Organization (and one of the most active groups here at St. John) was the first group to add "under God" to the Pledge

in 1951, after hearing it at a Sons of the American Revolution meeting? The Knights of Columbus lobbied to have the words added nationally, and along with several other individuals and groups, successfully amended the Pledge in 1954. "Under God" is a crucial component of the Pledge, especially for us Catholics, who believe that we can work for "liberty and justice for all" as part of our mission.

The US Conference of Catholic Bishops has stated that "we are called to follow Christ as missionary disciples by seeking the truth, serving others, and living our faith in all that we do". They ask that we take some time during the Fortnight for Freedom to reflect, pray, and take action to defend our freedoms:

- To serve migrants and refugees
- To care for the sick
- To bear witness to Truth



A Love Beyond All Telling

s the apostles were led more deeply into Jesus' ministry, more was asked of them. Following Jesus meant that they had to take risks and love in a way that they had never loved before. Jesus' request might have appeared very strange to his followers. How could they love this man from Nazareth more than father or mother, son or daughter? In the reality of knowing Jesus, heaven and earth collide, and the wisdom of God is personified. In following Jesus down the road less traveled, the apostles realized that discipleship involves a love beyond all telling — a love that puts Christ above all things.

Jesus certainly did not want his apostles to love their families any less, but wanted them to be aware of the cost involved in following him.

Much was expected from these simple and sinful followers as they



engaged themselves on this road of transformation with Jesus. Their road would lead them away from sin and towards new life. However, the journey would lead them through the suffering of the cross in order to reach their goal.

Each one of our lives is divinely given. Imprinted on our souls is the fingerprint of God. He has marked a path for us that leads to life eternal. It is very much up to each one of us to use the gifts he has given us to pave our way to such a destiny. As Jesus called the apostles, he also calls us. He invites us to enter into a deeper relationship with the Father in heaven. We are asked to love the members of our families as we love ourselves and to love God with our whole hearts, our minds, and our strength. This certainly involves sacrifice. It means that we give until it hurts

in the different aspects of life itself. The cross of discipleship is heavy. The weight of giving witness bears down on us as we make ourselves aware of the needs around us. The poor and broken are still around us. Some have lost their way. Still others live in the chasm of fear and loneliness. And out of all this broken reality of the world, the shadow of the cross descends calling us to love and care for those around us. In reaching out to others this way, we learn to love Christ more.

To follow Christ is not easy. To call oneself a Christian is to realize that we are called to be people of prayer and action. We are invited to listen closely to the wisdom of God of Jesus Christ in the Scriptures and to etch it into our consciousness. Every step that we take and move that we make must be governed by what we know of Christ.

May I always put you first in my life, inspiring me to love as you love, and forgive as you have forgiven. Wisdom of the Fathers


"He [Jesus] declares that one who wishes to become his disciple must accept being a servant, as He has made himself a servant, and cautions: "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me."

To undertake the discipleship of Jesus means to take up your cross — we all have one — to accompany him on his path, an uncomfortable path that is not of success or of fleeting glory, but one which takes us to true freedom, to that which frees us from selfishness and sin. It is necessary to clearly reject that worldly mentality which places one's "I" and one's own interests at the center of existence. That is not what Jesus wants from us! Instead Jesus invites us to lose our life for him and for the Gospel, to receive it renewed, fulfilled and authentic. We are certain, thanks to Jesus, that this path leads us to the resurrection, to the full and definitive life with God. Choosing to follow him, our Master and Lord who made himself the Servant of all, one to walk behind and to listen attentively to his Word — remember to read a passage from the Gospel every day — and in the Sacraments.

There are young people here in the Square, young men and women. I want to ask you: do you feel the desire to follow Jesus more closely? Think. Pray, and allow the Lord to speak to you.

May the Virgin Mary, who followed Jesus to Calvary, help us to always purify our faith of false images of God, in order to adhere fully to Christ and his Gospel."


