DIOCESE OF VENICE

SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY



The Diocese of Venice states that, “all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years”. The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as “any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults” (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist

Reading 1

Acts 5:27-32, 40b-41

When the captain and the court officers had brought the apostles in and made them stand before the Sanhedrin, the high priest questioned them,

"We gave you strict orders, did we not, to stop teaching in that name? Yet you have filled Jerusalem with your teaching and want to bring this man's blood upon us."

But Peter and the apostles said in reply, "We must obey God rather than men. The God of our ancestors raised Jesus, though you had him killed by hanging him on a tree. God exalted him at his right hand as leader and savior to grant Israel repentance and forgiveness of sins. We are witnesses of these things, as is the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him."

The Sanhedrin ordered the apostles to stop speaking in the name of Jesus, and dismissed them. So they left the presence of the Sanhedrin, rejoicing that they had been found worthy to suffer dishonor for the sake of the name.







Fr. Tom's Gospel Reflection



Ancient Jewish Rabbis used to teach that every story in Scripture contained four meanings: a literal meaning, a symbolic meaning, an intended meaning and a personal meaning.

First, the literal meaning is simply what the gospel story says. Sometimes it is not always clear what a particular story is saying. In today's gospel, however, this isn't the case. It's perfectly clear what the story was saying. In fact, the story is one of the best-known narratives in the New Testament.

The second meaning is the symbolic meaning. The chief symbolism seems to center around Jesus' question to Peter, which Jesus repeats three times: "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" What symbolism is contained in

this threefold question that Peter seemed to find so embarrassing? Many believe the repetition is related to Peter's threefold denial of Jesus on the night of Jesus' arrest. They see Peter's threefold affirmation of love, "Lord, you know that I love you," as erasing his threefold denial of Jesus. In other words, it allows Peter to make amends for his past and to redeem himself.

This brings us to the third meaning: the intended meaning. Why did John relate this incident? What did he intend to communicate to us? A footnote in the New American Bible points out that the First Vatican Council cited Jesus' threefold response to Peter the authority and responsibility to succeed him as chief shepherd of the flock. In other words, Jesus' threefold response to Peter reaffirmed the decision Jesus had made earlier concerning Peter, when he said, "You are Peter, and upon this Rock I will build my Church . . . I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven. Jesus could have reversed that decision, saying to Peter, Simon, I had great leadership plans for you, but you denied me three times. You failed under pressure. So I'm taking away your leadership role and giving it to someone else." But Jesus didn't do that. Rather, he reaffirmed his decision to make Peter the chief shepherd of his flock.

This brings us to the final meaning: the personal meaning. This is the meaning that the gospel story might hold for the attentive reader. In other words, God can use a Scripture passage or story to speak to us in a personal way. For example, take the episode in today's story, where Peter says that he fished all night but caught nothing. Jesus then tells Peter to try again. Peter does, and the result is amazing. He and his helpers catch so many fish that they need another boat to help them. What personal meaning might we draw from this episode? Consider: Novelist A.J. Cronin says that he nearly gave up his writing career before he ever got started. Halfway through his first book, *Hatter's Castle*, which was eventually translated into 19 languages, Cronin says that he threw his pen down and tossed his half-finished manuscript into an ash can. Then he went outside into the rain and went for a long walk down a lonely rural road in Scotland. He hadn't walked far when he came upon an old farmer ditching a field. The sight of that old farmer, working all alone in the rain, inspired Cronin to retrieve his manuscript from the ash can and try again. Years later, when Cronin became famous, he credited his career to the farmer who inspired him to try again after he had given up the first time around. I would like to think that Christ spoke to A.J. Cronin through the farmer . . . something similar to what he said to Peter: "Recast your nets, Peter, and try again." I would like to think that by his unsuccessful first attempt Cronin learned what Peter learned. He failed the first time because he had been working alone, without the help of Jesus. In the same way Christ calls us. With Him everything is possible. Sometimes He may have to say that to us more than once.

MEMORIAL GARDEN





Reflection 13: True Satisfaction Only Through Mercy

So often in life we seek satisfaction from the passing things of the world. Be it riches, fleshly pleasure, prestige, or anything else, we must come to discover that one thing and one thing alone satisfies. The Divine Mercy of God is what we seek. Everything else is an illusion of satisfaction. If we try to satisfy our souls with other things, we will be left in interior sadness, anguish and disillusion. The Mercy of God keeps calling out and inflicts a sweet pain until we respond (See Diary #8).

Reflect upon the "sweet pain" inflicted upon your soul every time you try to find satisfaction in something other than God's Mercy. It's "sweet" because it's a rebuke of love from God calling us to trust only in His Mercy. It's "painful" in that we should allow ourselves to see clearly that attachment to anything not of God does not sit well in our soul. Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope



The 2025 Jubilee Year, as established by Pope Francis, has begun. Five locations in the Diocese of Venice have been designated as Jubilee pilgrimage sites by Bishop Frank J. Dewane: Epiphany Cathedral in Venice, St. John XXIII Parish in Fort Myers, **St. John the Evangelist Parish in Naples**, St. Paul Parish in Arcadia, and Our Lady of Perpetual Health Retreat & Spirituality Center in Venice. These five locations, located in each of the geographical regions (Deaneries) of the Diocese, were selected for the convenience of the faithful, so that they may take advantage of the grace of the Jubilee Year.

Jubilee 2025 Bull of Indiction: "Spes Non Confundit"

On Thursday, May 9, 2024, the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, Pope Francis officially proclaimed the Ordinary Jubilee of 2025 with the public reading and delivery of Spes Non Confundit, the Bull of Indiction for the Jubilee Holy Year 2025, in Saint Peter's Basilica at the Vatican. This papal document lays out the foundation for the 2025 Jubilee and its theme, "Pilgrims of Hope." Below is paragraph 13 from this document.

Signs of hope

13. Signs of hope should also be present for migrants who leave their homelands behind in search of a better life for themselves and for their families. Their expectations must not be frustrated by prejudice and rejection. A spirit of welcome, which embraces everyone with respect for his or her dignity, should be accompanied by a sense of responsibility, lest anyone be denied the right to a dignified existence. Exiles, displaced persons and refugees, whom international tensions force to emigrate in order to avoid war, violence and discrimination, ought to be guaranteed security and access to employment and education, the means they need to find their place in a new social context. May the Christian community always be prepared to defend the rights of those who are most vulnerable, opening wide its doors to welcome them, lest anyone ever be robbed of the hope of a better future. May the Lord's words in the great parable of the Last Judgement always find an echo in our hearts: "I was a stranger and you welcomed me" for "just as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers and sisters, you did it to me" (Mt 25:35.40).

The Meaning Behind the Jubilee Logo

The logo chosen for the Holy Year depicts four stylized and graceful figures, in four colors that recall the shades of the rainbow: red, orange, green, and blue. The choice of colors is not random, just as the color of sacred vestments throughout the liturgical year is not. Red symbolizes love, passion, and self-sacrifice, Christ's sacrifice and His boundless love for humanity, but also the fire of the Holy Spirit and His strength that animates Christians. Orange expresses joy, vitality, and enthusiasm, the light that illuminates the path of faith. Green is universally recognized as the color of hope, growth, and rebirth. Blue, finally, symbolizes faith, peace, and tranquility, evoking the sky and spirituality, and inviting contemplation and prayer.

The four figures represent humanity as a whole, in its differences and similarities. They proceed to embrace each other, expressing the solidarity and brotherhood that should unite the peoples of the world. Leading them is the red figure, clinging to a Cross formed by a black curve that ends, at the bottom, with an anchor. The Cross is not rigid, not static, but bends towards humanity as if to embrace it. As for the anchor, Monsignor Fisichella himself explained its meaning: "As is known, the anchor has often been used as a metaphor for hope. The anchor of hope is the name given in seafaring jargon to the reserve anchor, used by vessels to perform emergency maneuvers to stabilize the ship during storms." The sense of this symbol in the Jubilee logo is clear: it is precisely in the most difficult moments that we need to rely on an anchor that gives us security and guarantees salvation, and what better anchor than the Cross, a symbol of Christ and His infinite love for all of us? The presence of small, agitated waves at the bottom of the logo confirms the existence of dangers and obstacles, of those personal events and events of the world that make each of our lives not always easy.

Thus, the logo in its entirety takes on a clear meaning, and the Jubilee, with its twelve months of ceremonies and initiatives, becomes a long pilgrimage to be undertaken together, as brothers, towards salvation, guided by the Cross and the hope of salvation promised by God.






