
A Capital Campaign for Saint John the Evangelist Catholic Church

Art must make perceptible, and as far as possible attractive, the world of the spirit, of the invisible, of God. It must therefore translate into meaningful terms that which is in itself ineffable. Art has a unique capacity to take one or other facet of the message and translate it into colours, shapes and sounds which nourish the intuition of those who look or listen. It does so without emptying the message itself of its transcendent value and its aura of mystery.

In our own small way, St. John hopes to do just that with our Life Center and our renovations. As I described last week, we have chosen a palette of colors, materials, and accents that will capture both the warmth and the excitement of Saint John the Evangelist and our Parish Family. I wanted to provide some additional details, including the options for each room and space. The complimentary set of materials, colors, flooring, and focal points will allow us to illustrate the function and focus of each area of our campus, while still being consistent and flowing from one space to another:

Working in the gift shop is a good oppportunity to meet fellow parishioners.



Recognizing Grace and Mercy

eople often remark that it would be much easier to believe in the unfolding events in scriptures had they lived during the time of Jesus and the Prophets. We hear several remarks in today's readings to suggest that is not the case. The prophet Amos, from whom we hear in today's first reading, warned the people not to become complacent in regards to their duties as a People of God. In Jesus' parable, he reminds his listeners that people failed to listen to the prophets. Furthermore, Jesus tells his audience that people would not be persuaded of the importance of God's message even if it were communicated through having someone rise from the dead. Obviously, Jesus was prophesying about people's reluctance to accept his message after his own resurrection (even though his listeners would not have understood this at the time). The parable tells us about a rich man who thought only of himself and vein pleasure, unconcerned about the sufferings and hunger of Lazarus. When the rich man and Lazarus find themselves on the other side of life, God comforts Lazarus because He never wished for Lazarus to suffer. The rich man was given the reward of suffering because he did nothing to alleviate the sufferings of his day – even though he had the capacity to do so.

We are indeed blessed because we look through this lens of resurrection. Each Sunday, as Catholic Christians, we come to worship on the day of resurrection. Jesus' resurrection opened wide the doors

of eternity for all of us. However, even after hearing the message, people are still reluctant to accept and be accountable to the gospel. When we look around us, what do we see? Do we see the reality of the kingdom fully realized? Are we living in complete harmony and peace? Are the rights and dignities of all people recognized and respected? If we all look around us, I honestly do not think we could say yes. There are so many areas where we need to grow and be challenged in. In so many areas of the globe, governments and systems of power have become complacent in their concern for the powerless. People go hungry – forgotten and unnoticed. Peoples' basic rights are ignored or even taken away. The needs of the Body of Christ are unattended to. Christ suffers when others suffer.

In the parable of the poor man Lazarus, we are reminded that our lives and actions pave the way to our destiny. Our concern and acts of charity are what truly makes us rich and acceptable in the eyes of God. Right now in our community we see many families struggling to make ends meet. Likewise, we see many of our seniors living completely alone in our neighborhoods and nursing homes. This is the holy ground of the scriptures. It is in such people as these that the face of Christ can be seen. In attending to the needs of those who live in our community – we attend to Christ himself who has many guises. The encounters we have with those who suffer are moments of grace in which God's mercy may flow through us.



Catholic-Jewish Dialogue Annual Kristallnacht Commemoration

With each new generation, we lament the fact that they don't seem to know basic facts and information, such as the current vice president or who won the Civil War. Anything beyond last week is ancient history to them, but there are many events in our collective past that are necessary and proper to remember.

That is why we (the Catholic Jewish Dialogue of Collier County) hold a Kristallnacht Commemoration each year on the Sunday closest to the historical date of 11/9/38. On that horrible night, the Nazi government prodded gangs of thugs to attack Jewish neighborhoods, businesses and synagogues across all of Germany. To put it in context, think of the riots in Ferguson, Baltimore and Milwaukee multiplied by a few hundred, all going on at the same time. Coincidentally, like the U.S. riots in response to a police shooting, the Kristallnacht riots were allegedly sparked by the murder of a German diplomat in Paris by a distraught Jewish man. When it was over the government blamed the Jews themselves and fined them for the damages.

We encourage all of you to bring your children and grandchildren because in a few years it will be up to them to carry the torch of "Never Forget."

The program this year will feature music and a multimedia presentation of firsthand accounts of the Night of Broken Glass, "Shattered and Broken".
