


America Attacked

Fifteen years ago next Sunday, terrorists attacked our country, our faith, our freedom, and our way of life by hijacking airplanes and using them as weapons, killing thousands of people in New York City, Washington, DC, and Pennsylvania. While we can meet such hatred with the love, prayer, healing, and forgiveness that are the hallmarks of the Catholic Church, that day has forever transformed the world we live in. Saint John the Evangelist will mark this anniversary with a special Mass next Sunday at 9:00 a.m. The entire community is invited to join us in this remembrance.

CYO Comes to Life at Saint John the Evangelist!

Did you know that the first Catholic Youth Organization (CYO) was initiated in Chicago in 1930? Its first three activities for the at-risk youth in the middle of the Great Depression were boxing, theater productions, and educational outreach to the working class communities in that city. We are going back to the roots of CYO with our persistent programs, dedicating our Parish Family in supporting the youth of the Naples area without any discrimination of economic or religious status. We will be focusing on sports and wellness, social and spiritual, and arts and music programs, with weekly and monthly activities. We are officially kicking off the first active CYO in Florida this Fall, thanks to all of your amazing gifts and prayers!

Over the past several years, it has become clear that Catholic families and youth in Naples are slowly being engaged in fellowship at various locations, including Christian and non-religious groups. Whether it is due to a sports program, a relationship, or a school activity, these families are being fed in their needs for programs specific to their age groups and their interests. They are then turning to those same groups for spiritual fulfillment once they have been fully integrated. This is a clear illustration of needs that are simply not provided for in Naples by the Catholic Churches, and it is wonderful that those groups have been serving our community for so many years. However, these programs and activities are core foci of the Catholic Church, and CYO in particular, in other areas of the country. When CYOs are active in those communities, the families and youth stay with the church and draw more people to the faith.

The St. John CYO is an umbrella program that will house sports, social, arts, afterschool activities, and service programs for the youth of Naples. The main focus of CYO is to provide low-cost, persistent, and consistent events and activities that will enliven and engage all the youth and draw them closer to Jesus and the Catholic Faith through their relationships and fellowship with

each other. That will also allow for the families to come together at the same time and for the common purpose of providing a safe and exciting place for their children. And we now have these programs and activities at Saint John the Evangelist. We invite you to learn more at our CYO Social Hour on September 8, from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. in the Seminar Room.

Now, as we look forward into what God has for us, we want to share with you what we believe is God's vision for CYO. Jesus said in Matthew 18:2-5:2: He called a little child to him, and placed the child among them. 3: And he said: "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. 4: Therefore, whoever takes the lowly position of this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. 5: And whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me.

His positive and infectious love of Jesus shines through every conversation you have with him, so I hope you will all have the pleasure of meeting and speaking with him soon.

Special Mass of Remembrance at St. John Will Commemorate 15th Anniversary of 9/11

September 11 will mark the 15th anniversary of the terrorist attacks on New York City's World Trade Center, the Pentagon and a field in Shanksville, Pennsylvania, when brave passengers took matters into their own hands and overpowered the hijackers. The plane crashed, killing all 45 on board the doomed flight.

These attacks of hatred not only took the lives of 2,819 innocent Americans, including 343 New York City Firemen, 37 Port Authority Police Officers and 23 New York City Police Officers, but changed our way of life forever.

Here at Saint John the Evangelist, both the Arthur J. Corr Assembly 4th Degree Knights of Columbus and the Saint John the Evangelist Council 11281 Knights of Columbus, will sponsor a Mass of Remembrance at 9:00 a.m. on Sunday, September 11 to remember those who were murdered on that day of terror.

All parishioners are invited to attend this special commemorative Mass. Additionally, the Knights and the clergy of Saint John the Evangelist extend an invitation to all firefighters, law enforcement personal and first responders to join us in honoring you for all you do in protecting us.

Members of the Harp and Thistle Pipe Band will lead the procession into church, followed by members of the Knights of Columbus Color Corps and the United States Marine Corps League of Naples, who will present and post our colors.

Please join us on September 11 at the 9:00 a.m. Mass to pay tribute and pray for those brave souls who made the ultimate sacrifice at the hands of Jihadist terrorists.

The Challenge of the Cross

ur readings today speak to the heart of what it means to be a follower of Jesus Christ. There is a cost associated with following Jesus. We are told that unless we carry our own cross that we cannot be his disciple. But does this mean that we should favor suffering in our lives? Does this mean that we will ultimately be miserable in following Jesus' way? No it does not! However, Jesus is telling us quite clearly that we will face challenges when we follow his way of love. His message was counter cultural in his time just as it is for the world today. That is why Jesus was crucified. He disturbed the peace. He shook people out of their complacency. Jesus' message of intimacy and approachability towards the Father in heaven ultimately distressed the religious teachers and challenged their concept of God. They sought to have him killed to silence his message. It is amazing to think that a carpenter from Nazareth would cause such a commotion and fall into the hands of the Romans, charged with civil disobedience. His cross represented the hardness of heart of the people who were closed to his message, adding to the many sins of the world that nailed him to the tree.


Reflection Questions

- 1. What does the "cross of discipleship" mean to you?
- 2. In what ways have you experienced the cross in your life?
- 3. How are you challenged as a disciple of Jesus?
- 4. When have you failed the test of discipleship?
- 5. How does the world's wisdom differ from Jesus?
- 6. How far are you prepared to go to give witness to your faith?

In the second reading, St. Paul finds himself carrying the cross of discipleship. He is now an old man, imprisoned in chains, who seeks to pass on the vital message of the kingdom of light and peace to Philemon and eventually to the world.

What is it about Jesus' message of peace and hope that brings so much contention? When we explore the significance of Jesus' teachings, we begin to see the inconsistencies in the values of the world that surrounds us. The gospel message confronts sin and makes all people accountable. When people are confronted with their sin, their immediate reaction is to close themselves to criticism. This is an instinctive human reaction. If we apply gospel values to the areas of politics, ethics, economics and social conditions, we find we are called to conversion in every aspect of life. When we take a stand as individuals and as a Christian community, it is then that we are faced with the cost of discipleship.

People become cynical and at times belittle our faith, suggesting that our values have no place in real world issues. As Christians we are asked to commit ourselves totally to Jesus' messages with every choice that we make. Sometimes we have to sacrifice popularity and choose the gospel path — the road less traveled. The cross of discipleship burdens us with the Truth that will set us and others free!

Lord, may we come to know you in all things. Help us realize that in following you that we are building a solid foundation for eternal life. May we not hold on to values that are contrary to your own but have the courage of our convictions. Help us to carry the cross of discipleship. Amen.




their families. The event is open to all families in the parish outside of Faith Formation as well.
